1.1 A bill for an act

relating to health and human services; creating a safe harbor shelter and housing grant program; appropriating money for sexually exploited youth; amending Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 145.4716, subdivision 3; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 256K.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.7 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 145.4716, subdivision 3, is amended to read:

Subd. 3. **Youth eligible for services.** Youth 24 years of age or younger shall be are eligible for all services, support, and programs provided under this section and section 145.4717, and all shelter, housing beds, and services provided by the commissioner of human services to sexually exploited youth and youth at risk of sexual exploitation under section 256K.47.

Sec. 2. [256K.47] SAFE HARBOR SHELTER AND HOUSING.

Subdivision 1. Grant program established. The commissioner of human services must establish a safe harbor shelter and housing grant program. Under this grant program, the commissioner must award grants to providers who are committed to serving sexually exploited youth and youth at risk of sexual exploitation. Grantees must use grant money to provide street and community outreach programs, emergency shelter programs, or supportive housing programs consistent with the program descriptions in this section to address the specialized outreach, shelter, and housing needs of sexually exploited youth and youth at risk of sexual exploitation.

Subd. 2. Youth eligible services. Youth 24 years of age or younger are eligible for all shelter, housing beds, and services provided under this section and all services, support,

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and pr	ograms provided by the commissioner of health to sexually exploited youth and youth
at risk	of sexual exploitation under sections 145.4716 and 145.4717.
<u>Su</u>	bd. 3. Street and community outreach. (a) Street and community outreach programs
must 1	ocate, contact, and provide information, referrals, and services to eligible youth.
<u>(b)</u>	Information, referrals, and services provided by street and community outreach
progra	ams may include but are not limited to:
<u>(1)</u>	family reunification services;
<u>(2)</u>	conflict resolution or mediation counseling;
<u>(3)</u>	assistance in obtaining temporary emergency shelter;
<u>(4)</u>	assistance in obtaining food, clothing, medical care, or mental health counseling;
<u>(5)</u>	counseling regarding violence, sexual exploitation, substance use, sexually transmitted
infecti	ons, and pregnancy;
<u>(6)</u>	referrals to other agencies that provide support services to sexually exploited youth
and yo	outh at risk of sexual exploitation;
<u>(7)</u>	assistance with education, employment, and independent living skills;
<u>(8)</u>	aftercare services;
<u>(9)</u>	specialized services for sexually exploited youth and youth at risk of sexual
exploi	tation, including youth experiencing homelessness and youth with mental health
needs;	and
<u>(10</u>)) services to address the prevention of sexual exploitation and homelessness.
Su	bd. 4. Emergency shelter program. (a) Emergency shelter programs must provide
eligibl	e youth with referral and walk-in access to emergency short-term residential care.
The pr	ogram shall provide eligible youth with safe and dignified shelter that includes private
showe	er facilities, beds, and meals each day and must assist eligible youth with reunification
with th	nat youth's family or legal guardian when required or appropriate.
<u>(b)</u>	The services provided at emergency shelters may include but are not limited to:
<u>(1)</u>	specialized services to address the trauma of sexual exploitation;
<u>(2)</u>	family reunification services;
<u>(3)</u>	individual, family, and group counseling;
(4)	assistance obtaining clothing.

3.19	(4) assistance in securing housing appropriate to needs and income;
3.20	(5) counseling regarding violence, sexual exploitation, substance use, sexually transmitted
3.21	infections, and pregnancy;
3.22	(6) referral for medical services or chemical dependency treatment;
3.23	(7) parenting skills;
3.24	(8) self-sufficiency support services and independent living skills training;
3.25	(9) aftercare and follow-up services; and
3.26	(10) services to address the prevention of sexual exploitation and homelessness
