1.17	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2023 Supplement, section 201.061, subdivision 3, is amended
1.18	to read:
1.19	Subd. 3. Election day registration. (a) An individual who is eligible to vote may register
1.20	on election day by appearing in person at the polling place for the precinct in which the
1.21	individual maintains residence, by completing a registration application, making an oath in
1.22	the form prescribed by the secretary of state and providing proof of residence. An individual
1.23	may prove residence for purposes of registering by:
1.24	(1) presenting a driver's license or Minnesota identification card issued pursuant to
1.27	
1.25	section 171.07;
1.26	(2) presenting any document approved by the secretary of state as proper identification;
1.27	(3) presenting one of the following:

2.1 (i) a current valid student identification card from a postsecondary educational institution
 2.2 in Minnesota, if a list of students from that institution has been prepared under section
 2.3 135A.17 and certified to the county auditor in the manner provided in rules of the secretary
 2.4 of state; or

2.5 (ii) a current student fee statement that contains the student's valid address in the precinct
2.6 together with a picture identification card; or

(4) having a voter who is registered to vote in the precinct, or an employee employed 2.7 by and working in a residential facility in the precinct and vouching for a resident in the 2.8 facility, sign an oath in the presence of the election judge vouching that the voter or employee 2.9 personally knows that the individual is a resident of the precinct. A voter who has been 2.10 vouched for on election day may not sign a proof of residence oath vouching for any other 2.11 individual on that election day. A voter who is registered to vote in the precinct may sign 2.12 up to eight proof-of-residence oaths on any election day. This limitation does not apply to 2.13 an employee of a residential facility described in this clause. The secretary of state shall 2.14 provide a form for election judges to use in recording the number of individuals for whom 2.15 a voter signs proof-of-residence oaths on election day. The form must include space for the 2.16 maximum number of individuals for whom a voter may sign proof-of-residence oaths. For 2.17 each proof-of-residence oath, the form must include a statement that the individual: (i) is 2.18 registered to vote in the precinct or is an employee of a residential facility in the precinct, 2.19 (ii) personally knows that the voter is a resident of the precinct, and (iii) is making the 2.20 statement on oath. The form must include a space for the voter's printed name, signature, 2.21 telephone number, and address. 2.22

2.23 The oath required by this subdivision and Minnesota Rules, part 8200.9939, must be2.24 attached to the voter registration application.

(b) The operator of a residential facility shall prepare a list of the names of its employees
currently working in the residential facility and the address of the residential facility. The
operator shall certify the list and provide it to the appropriate county auditor no less than
20 days before each election for use in election day registration.

(c) "Residential facility" means transitional housing as defined in section 256E.33,
subdivision 1; a supervised living facility licensed by the commissioner of health under
section 144.50, subdivision 6; a nursing home as defined in section 144A.01, subdivision
5; an assisted living facility licensed by the commissioner of health under chapter 144G; a
veterans home operated by the board of directors of the Minnesota Veterans Homes under
chapter 198; a residence licensed by the commissioner of human services to provide a

residential program as defined in section 245A.02, subdivision 14; a residential facility for 3.1 persons with a developmental disability licensed by the commissioner of human services 3.2 under section 252.28; setting authorized to provide housing support as defined in section 3.3 256I.03, subdivision 10a; a shelter for battered women as defined in section 611A.37, 3.4 subdivision 4; a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter or dwelling designed to 3.5 provide temporary living accommodations for the homeless; a facility where a provider 3.6 operates a residential treatment program as defined in section 245.462, subdivision 23; or 3.7 a facility where a provider operates an adult foster care program as defined in section 3.8 245A.02, subdivision 6c. 3.9

3.10 (d) For tribal band members, an individual may prove residence for purposes of3.11 registering by:

3.12 (1) presenting an identification card issued by the tribal government of a tribe recognized
3.13 by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, United States Department of the Interior, that contains the
3.14 name, address, signature, and picture of the individual; or

5.3	paper registration application may include the voter's email address, if provided by the voter.
5.4	The electronic voter registration application must include the voter's email address. The
5.5	registration application may include the voter's interest in serving as an election judge, if
5.6	indicated by the voter. The application must also contain the following certification of voter
5.7	eligibility:
5.8	"I certify that I:
5.9	(1) am at least 16 years old and understand that I must be at least 18 years old to be
5.10	eligible to vote;
5.11	(2) am a citizen of the United States;
5.12	(3) will have maintained residence in Minnesota for 20 days immediately preceding

5.14	(4) maintain residence at the address or location given on the registration form;
5.15	(5) am not under court-ordered guardianship in which the court order revokes my right

5.17	(6) have not been found by a court to be legally incompetent to vote;

5.19	(8) have read and understand the following statement: that giving false information is a
5.20	felony punishable by not more than five years imprisonment or a fine of not more than
5.21	\$10,000, or both."
5.22	The certification must include boxes for the voter to respond to the following questions:
5.23	"(1) Are you a citizen of the United States?" and
5.24	"(2) Are you at least 16 years old and will you be at least 18 years old on or before the
5.25	day of the election in which you intend to vote?"
5.26	And the instruction:
5.27	"If you checked 'no' to either of these questions, do not complete this form."
5.28	The form of the voter registration application and the certification of voter eligibility
5.29	must be as provided in this subdivision and approved by the secretary of state. Voter
5.30	registration forms authorized by the National Voter Registration Act must also be accepted

- as valid. The federal postcard application form must also be accepted as valid if it is not
  deficient and the voter is eligible to register in Minnesota.

Failure to check a box on an application form 6.13 that a voter has certified to be true does not cause the registration to be deficient. The election 6.14 judges shall request an individual to correct a voter registration application if it is deficient 6.15 6.16 or illegible. No eligible voter may be prevented from voting unless the voter's registration application is deficient or the voter is duly and successfully challenged in accordance with 6.17 section 201.195 or 204C.12. 6.18

A voter registration application accepted prior to August 1, 1983, is not deficient for
lack of date of birth. The county or municipality may attempt to obtain the date of birth for
a voter registration application accepted prior to August 1, 1983, by a request to the voter
at any time except at the polling place. Failure by the voter to comply with this request does
not make the registration deficient.

A voter registration application accepted before January 1, 2004, is not deficient for lack
of a valid Minnesota driver's license or state identification number or the last four digits of
a Social Security number. A voter registration application submitted by a voter who does
not have a Minnesota driver's license or state identification number, or a Social Security
number, is not deficient for lack of any of these numbers.

6.29 A voter registration application submitted electronically through the website of the
6.30 secretary of state prior to April 30, 2014, is not invalid as a result of its electronic submission.

  wants write-in votes for the candidate to be counted must file a written request with the
  filing office for the office sought not more than 84 days before the primary and no later
  than the seventh day before the general election. The filing officer shall provide copies of
  the form to make the request. The filing officer shall not accept a written request later than
  5:00 p.m. on the last day for filing a written request.
- (b) The governing body of a statutory or home rule charter city may adopt a resolution
  governing the counting of write-in votes for local elective office. The resolution may:
- 7.11 (1) require the candidate to file a written request with the chief election official no later

If a governing body adopts a resolution authorized by this paragraph, 7.27 the resolution must be adopted and the clerk must notify the county auditor before the first 7.28 day of filing for office. - 7.31 (d) A candidate for president of the United States who files a request under this
  7.32 subdivision must include the name of a candidate for vice president of the United States.

in subdivision subdivisions 5 and 6a, a major political party may fill a vacancy in nomination
of that party's candidate as defined in subdivision 1, paragraph (a), clause (1), (2), or (3),
by filing one nomination certificate with the same official who received the affidavits of
candidacy for that office.

A major political party may provide in its governing rules a procedure, including 8.13 designation of an appropriate committee, to fill a vacancy in nomination for any federal or 8.14 state partisan office. The nomination certificate shall be prepared under the direction of and 8.15 8.16 executed by the chair and secretary of the political party and filed within the timelines established in this section. When filing the certificate the chair and secretary shall attach an 8.17 affidavit stating that the newly nominated candidate has been selected under the rules of 8.18 the party and that the individuals signing the certificate and making the affidavit are the 8.19 chair and secretary of the party. 8.20

(b) In the case of a vacancy in nomination for partisan office that occurs on or before
the 79th day before the general election, the major political party must file the nomination
certificate no later than 71 days before the general election. The name of the candidate
nominated by the party must appear on the general election ballot.

(c) Except as provided in subdivision 5, in the case of a vacancy in nomination for a 8.25 partisan office that occurs after the 79th day before the general election, the general election 8.26 ballot shall remain unchanged, but the county and state canvassing boards must not certify 8.27 the vote totals for that office from the general election, and the office must be filled at a 8.28 special election held in accordance with this section. Except for the vacancy in nomination, 8.29 8.30 all other candidates whose names appeared on the general election ballot for the office must appear on the special election ballot for the office.
