The CPR training must have been provided by an individual approved to provide CPR instruction. License holders, second adult caregivers, and substitutes must repeat pediatric CPR training at least once every two years within 90 days of the date the training was initially taken, and the training must document the training be documented in the license holder's records. License holders, second adult caregivers, and substitutes must not let the training expire.

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- (b) Persons providing CPR training must use CPR training that has been developed:
- (1) by the American Heart Association or the American Red Cross and incorporatespsychomotor skills to support the instruction; or
- 2.10 (2) using nationally recognized, evidence-based guidelines for CPR training and incorporates psychomotor skills to support the instruction.
