1.14	in this section. The state general levy base amount is \$592,000,000 \$717,100,000 for
1.15	commercial-industrial property and \$39,800,000 for seasonal residential recreational
1.16	property for taxes payable in 2002 2012 and thereafter. For taxes payable in subsequent
1.17	years, the levy base amount is increased each year by multiplying the levy base amount
1.18	for the prior year by the sum of one plus the rate of increase, if any, in the implicit price
1.19	deflator for government consumption expenditures and gross investment for state and
1.20	local governments prepared by the Bureau of Economic Analysts of the United States
1.21	Department of Commerce for the 12-month period ending March 31 of the year prior to the

(a) The Pollution Control Agency shall improve 6.13 air quality by promoting, in the most practicable way possible, the use of energy sources 6.14 and waste disposal methods which produce or emit the least air contaminants consistent 6.15 with the agency's overall goal of reducing all forms of pollution. The agency shall also 6.16 adopt standards of air quality, including maximum allowable standards of emission of air 6.17 contaminants from motor vehicles, recognizing that due to variable factors, no single 6.18 standard of purity of air is applicable to all areas of the state. applicable to all areas of the state. In adopting standards, the Pollution Control Agency
shall recognize that elements of control which may be reasonable and proper in densely

populated areas of the state may be unreasonable and improper in sparsely populated
or remote areas of the state. The agency shall consider existing physical conditions,
topography, soils, and geology, climate, transportation and land use. Standards of
hazardous waste control shall be premised on technical knowledge, and commonly
accepted practices. Hazardous waste generator licenses may be issued for a term not to
exceed five years. No local government unit shall set standards of hazardous waste control
which are in conflict or inconsistent with those set by the Pollution Control Agency.
