1.7	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 120B.11, is amended by adding a subdivision

1.9	Subd. 10. Suspension. Provisions under this section are suspended from the beginning
1.10	of the 2023-2024 school year through the end of the 2028-2029 school year. A school district
1.11	or school site must continue to fulfill federal reporting requirements under the provisions

1.13	Sec. 2. [120B.111] READING PROFICIENCY GOAL.
1.14	Subdivision 1. Adopting plans and budgets. (a) For the 2023-2024 school year through
1.15	the 2028-2029 school year, a school board at a public meeting must adopt a comprehensive
1.16	plan to support and improve teaching and learning that is aligned with the goal of having
1.17	90 percent of third grade students achieve grade-level reading proficiency. The plan must
1.18	include:
1.19	(1) clearly defined district and school site goals and benchmarks for instruction and
1.20	student achievement for all student subgroups identified in section 120B.35, subdivision 3,
1.21	paragraph (b), clause (2);

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2.1	(2) a process to assess and evaluate each student's progress toward meeting state reading
2.2	standards; and
2.3	(3) strategies for improving instruction, curriculum, and student achievement in reading.
2.4	(b) For the purposes of this section, the following terms have the meanings given them:
2.5	(1) "instruction" means methods of providing learning experiences that enable a student

2.7	(2) "curriculum" means programs and written plans adopted by a district or school for
2.8	providing students with learning experiences that lead to expected knowledge and skills

2.10	(3) "reading proficiency goal" means to have 90 percent of third grade students achieve

2.14	Subd. 2. Performance measures. Student performance on the third grade reading
2.15	proficiency assessment as measured by a statewide or locally adopted reading assessment

2.18	Subd. 3. Report. (a) The school board must hold an annual public meeting to review
