(d) A health carrier may not refuse to renew or reissue, or otherwise terminate or restrict, coverage of an individual solely because the individual is diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder.

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- (e) A health carrier may request an updated treatment plan only once every six months, unless the health carrier and the treating physician or mental health professional agree that a more frequent review is necessary due to emerging circumstances.
- (f) An independent progress evaluation conducted by a mental health professional with expertise and training in autism spectrum disorder and child development must be completed to determine if progress toward <u>function</u> <u>functional</u> and generalizable gains, as determined in the treatment plan, is being made.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective January 1, 2016, and applies to coverage offered, sold, issued, or renewed on or after that date.
