provisions relating to continuing education for certain licensed occupations,  
securities transaction exemptions, and mortgages; amending Minnesota Statutes  
2008, sections 80A.46; 80A.65, subdivision 1; Minnesota Statutes 2009  
Supplement, section 45.30, subdivision 6; Laws 2009, chapter 37, article 2,  
section 13.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

7.34 **Sec. 8. TRANSFER; ASSIGNED RISK PLAN**

8.1 By June 30, 2010, the commissioner of  
8.2 management and budget shall transfer  
8.3 \$15,000,000 in assets of the workers'  
8.4 compensation assigned risk plan created  
8.5 under Minnesota Statutes, section 79.252, to  
8.6 the general fund.

8.7 Sec. 9. Minnesota Statutes 2009 Supplement, section 45.30, subdivision 6, is amended  
8.8 to read:

8.9 Subd. 6. **Course approval.** (a) Courses must be approved by the commissioner in  
8.10 advance. A course that is required by federal criteria or a reciprocity agreement to receive  
8.11 a substantive review will be approved or disapproved on the basis of its compliance with  
8.12 the provisions of laws and rules relating to the appropriate industry. At the commissioner's  
8.13 discretion, a course that is not required by federal criteria or a reciprocity agreement to  
8.14 receive a substantive review may be approved based on a qualified provider's certification  
8.15 on a form specified by the commissioner that the course complies with the provisions of  
8.16 this chapter and the laws and rules relating to the appropriate industry. For the purposes  
8.17 of this section, a "qualified provider" is one of the following: (1) a degree-granting  
8.18 institution of higher learning located within this state; (2) a private school licensed by the  
8.19 Minnesota Office of Higher Education; or (3) when conducting courses for its members, a  
8.20 bona fide trade association that staffs and maintains in this state a physical location that  
8.21 contains course and student records and that has done so for not less than three years.  
8.22 The commissioner may review any approved course and may cancel its approval with  
8.23 regard to all future offerings. The commissioner must make the final determination as to  
8.24 accreditation and assignment of credit hours for courses. Courses must be at least one hour  
8.25 in length, except courses for real estate appraisers must be at least two hours in length.

8.26 ~~Individuals wishing to receive credit for continuing education courses that have not~~  
8.27 ~~been previously approved may submit the course information for approval. Courses~~  
8.28 ~~must be in compliance with the laws and rules governing the types of courses that will~~  
8.29 ~~and will not be approved.~~

8.30 Approval will not include time spent on meals or other unrelated activities.

8.31 (b) Courses must be submitted at least 30 days before the initial proposed course  
8.32 offering.

8.33 (c) Approval must be granted for a subsequent offering of identical continuing  
8.34 education courses without requiring a new application. The commissioner must deny



9.1 future offerings of courses if they are found not to be in compliance with the laws relating  
9.2 to course approval.

9.3 (d) When either the content of an approved course or its method of instruction  
9.4 changes, the course is no longer approved for license education credit. A new application  
9.5 must be submitted for the changed course if the education provider intends to offer it for  
9.6 license education credit.

9.7 Sec. 10. Minnesota Statutes 2008, section 80A.46, is amended to read:

9.8 **80A.46 SECTION 202; EXEMPT TRANSACTIONS.**

9.9 The following transactions are exempt from the requirements of sections 80A.49  
9.10 through 80A.54, except 80A.50, paragraph (a), clause (3), and 80A.71:

9.11 (1) isolated nonissuer transactions, consisting of sale to not more than ten purchasers  
9.12 in Minnesota during any period of 12 consecutive months, whether effected by or through  
9.13 a broker-dealer or not;

9.14 (2) a nonissuer transaction by or through a broker-dealer registered, or exempt from  
9.15 registration under this chapter, and a resale transaction by a sponsor of a unit investment  
9.16 trust registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940, in a security of a class that  
9.17 has been outstanding in the hands of the public for at least 90 days, if, at the date of  
9.18 the transaction:

9.19 (A) the issuer of the security is engaged in business, the issuer is not in the  
9.20 organizational stage or in bankruptcy or receivership, and the issuer is not a blank check,  
9.21 blind pool, or shell company that has no specific business plan or purpose or has indicated  
9.22 that its primary business plan is to engage in a merger or combination of the business with,  
9.23 or an acquisition of, an unidentified person;

9.24 (B) the security is sold at a price reasonably related to its current market price;

9.25 (C) the security does not constitute the whole or part of an unsold allotment to, or  
9.26 a subscription or participation by, the broker-dealer as an underwriter of the security  
9.27 or a redistribution;

9.28 (D) a nationally recognized securities manual or its electronic equivalent designated  
9.29 by rule adopted or order issued under this chapter or a record filed with the Securities and  
9.30 Exchange Commission that is publicly available contains:

9.31 (i) a description of the business and operations of the issuer;

9.32 (ii) the names of the issuer's executive officers and the names of the issuer's  
9.33 directors, if any;

9.34 (iii) an audited balance sheet of the issuer as of a date within 18 months before the  
9.35 date of the transaction or, in the case of a reorganization or merger when the parties to

10.1 the reorganization or merger each had an audited balance sheet, a pro forma balance  
10.2 sheet for the combined organization; and

10.3 (iv) an audited income statement for each of the issuer's two immediately previous  
10.4 fiscal years or for the period of existence of the issuer, whichever is shorter, or, in the case  
10.5 of a reorganization or merger when each party to the reorganization or merger had audited  
10.6 income statements, a pro forma income statement; and

10.7 (E) any one of the following requirements is met:

10.8 (i) the issuer of the security has a class of equity securities listed on a national  
10.9 securities exchange registered under Section 6 of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934  
10.10 or designated for trading on the National Association of Securities Dealers Automated  
10.11 Quotation System;

10.12 (ii) the issuer of the security is a unit investment trust registered under the Investment  
10.13 Company Act of 1940;

10.14 (iii) the issuer of the security, including its predecessors, has been engaged in  
10.15 continuous business for at least three years; or

10.16 (iv) the issuer of the security has total assets of at least \$2,000,000 based on an  
10.17 audited balance sheet as of a date within 18 months before the date of the transaction or, in  
10.18 the case of a reorganization or merger when the parties to the reorganization or merger  
10.19 each had such an audited balance sheet, a pro forma balance sheet for the combined  
10.20 organization;

10.21 (3) a nonissuer transaction by or through a broker-dealer registered or exempt from  
10.22 registration under this chapter in a security of a foreign issuer that is a margin security  
10.23 defined in regulations or rules adopted by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve  
10.24 System;

10.25 (4) a nonissuer transaction by or through a broker-dealer registered or exempt  
10.26 from registration under this chapter in an outstanding security if the guarantor of the  
10.27 security files reports with the Securities and Exchange Commission under the reporting  
10.28 requirements of Section 13 or 15(d) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 (15 U.S.C.  
10.29 Sections 78m or 78o(d));

10.30 (5) a nonissuer transaction by or through a broker-dealer registered or exempt from  
10.31 registration under this chapter in a security that:

10.32 (A) is rated at the time of the transaction by a nationally recognized statistical rating  
10.33 organization in one of its four highest rating categories; or

10.34 (B) has a fixed maturity or a fixed interest or dividend, if:

- 11.1 (i) a default has not occurred during the current fiscal year or within the three  
11.2 previous fiscal years or during the existence of the issuer and any predecessor if less than  
11.3 three fiscal years, in the payment of principal, interest, or dividends on the security; and
- 11.4 (ii) the issuer is engaged in business, is not in the organizational stage or in  
11.5 bankruptcy or receivership, and is not and has not been within the previous 12 months a  
11.6 blank check, blind pool, or shell company that has no specific business plan or purpose or  
11.7 has indicated that its primary business plan is to engage in a merger or combination of the  
11.8 business with, or an acquisition of, an unidentified person;
- 11.9 (6) a nonissuer transaction by or through a broker-dealer registered or exempt from  
11.10 registration under this chapter effecting an unsolicited order or offer to purchase;
- 11.11 (7) a nonissuer transaction executed by a bona fide pledgee without the purpose  
11.12 of evading this chapter;
- 11.13 (8) a nonissuer transaction by a federal covered investment adviser with investments  
11.14 under management in excess of \$100,000,000 acting in the exercise of discretionary  
11.15 authority in a signed record for the account of others;
- 11.16 (9) a transaction in a security, whether or not the security or transaction is otherwise  
11.17 exempt, in exchange for one or more bona fide outstanding securities, claims, or property  
11.18 interests, or partly in such exchange and partly for cash, if the terms and conditions of  
11.19 the issuance and exchange or the delivery and exchange and the fairness of the terms and  
11.20 conditions have been approved by the administrator after a hearing;
- 11.21 (10) a transaction between the issuer or other person on whose behalf the offering is  
11.22 made and an underwriter, or among underwriters;
- 11.23 (11) a transaction in a note, bond, debenture, or other evidence of indebtedness  
11.24 secured by a mortgage or other security agreement if:
- 11.25 (A) the note, bond, debenture, or other evidence of indebtedness is offered and sold  
11.26 with the mortgage or other security agreement as a unit;
- 11.27 (B) a general solicitation or general advertisement of the transaction is not made; and
- 11.28 (C) a commission or other remuneration is not paid or given, directly or indirectly, to  
11.29 a person not registered under this chapter as a broker-dealer or as an agent;
- 11.30 (12) a transaction by an executor, administrator of an estate, sheriff, marshal,  
11.31 receiver, trustee in bankruptcy, guardian, or conservator;
- 11.32 (13) a sale or offer to sell to:
- 11.33 (A) an institutional investor;
- 11.34 (B) an accredited investor;
- 11.35 (C) a federal covered investment adviser; or
- 11.36 (D) any other person exempted by rule adopted or order issued under this chapter;

12.1 (14) a sale or an offer to sell securities by an issuer, if the transaction is part of  
12.2 a single issue in which:

12.3 (A) not more than 35 purchasers are present in this state during any 12 consecutive  
12.4 months, other than those designated in paragraph (13);

12.5 (B) a general solicitation or general advertising is not made in connection with  
12.6 the offer to sell or sale of the securities;

12.7 (C) a commission or other remuneration is not paid or given, directly or indirectly, to  
12.8 a person other than a broker-dealer registered under this chapter or an agent registered  
12.9 under this chapter for soliciting a prospective purchaser in this state; and

12.10 (D) the issuer reasonably believes that all the purchasers in this state, other than  
12.11 those designated in paragraph (13), are purchasing for investment.

12.12 Any issuer selling to purchasers in this state in reliance on this clause (14) exemption  
12.13 must provide to the administrator notice of the transaction by filing a statement of issuer  
12.14 form as adopted by rule. Notice must be filed at least ten days in advance of any sale or  
12.15 such shorter period as permitted by the administrator. However, an issuer who makes sales  
12.16 to ten or fewer purchasers in Minnesota during any period of 12 consecutive months is not  
12.17 required to provide this notice;

12.18 (15) a transaction under an offer to existing security holders of the issuer, including  
12.19 persons that at the date of the transaction are holders of convertible securities, options,  
12.20 or warrants, if a commission or other remuneration, other than a standby commission, is  
12.21 not paid or given, directly or indirectly, for soliciting a security holder in this state. The  
12.22 person making the offer and effecting the transaction must provide to the administrator  
12.23 notice of the transaction by filing a written description of the transaction. Notice must be  
12.24 filed at least ten days in advance of any transaction or such shorter period as permitted by  
12.25 the administrator;

12.26 (16) an offer to sell, but not a sale, of a security not exempt from registration under  
12.27 the Securities Act of 1933 if:

12.28 (A) a registration or offering statement or similar record as required under the  
12.29 Securities Act of 1933 has been filed, but is not effective, or the offer is made in compliance  
12.30 with Rule 165 adopted under the Securities Act of 1933 (17 C.F.R. 230.165); and

12.31 (B) a stop order of which the offeror is aware has not been issued against the offeror  
12.32 by the administrator or the Securities and Exchange Commission, and an audit, inspection,  
12.33 or proceeding that is public and that may culminate in a stop order is not known by the  
12.34 offeror to be pending;

12.35 (17) an offer to sell, but not a sale, of a security exempt from registration under the  
12.36 Securities Act of 1933 if:

13.1 (A) a registration statement has been filed under this chapter, but is not effective;

13.2 (B) a solicitation of interest is provided in a record to offerees in compliance with a  
13.3 rule adopted by the administrator under this chapter; and

13.4 (C) a stop order of which the offeror is aware has not been issued by the administrator  
13.5 under this chapter and an audit, inspection, or proceeding that may culminate in a stop  
13.6 order is not known by the offeror to be pending;

13.7 (18) a transaction involving the distribution of the securities of an issuer to the  
13.8 security holders of another person in connection with a merger, consolidation, exchange  
13.9 of securities, sale of assets, or other reorganization to which the issuer, or its parent  
13.10 or subsidiary and the other person, or its parent or subsidiary, are parties. The person  
13.11 distributing the issuer's securities must provide to the administrator notice of the  
13.12 transaction by filing a written description of the transaction along with a consent to service  
13.13 of process complying with section 80A.88. Notice must be filed at least ten days in  
13.14 advance of any transaction or such shorter period as permitted by the administrator;

13.15 (19) a rescission offer, sale, or purchase under section 80A.77;

13.16 (20) an offer or sale of a security to a person not a resident of this state and not  
13.17 present in this state if the offer or sale does not constitute a violation of the laws of the  
13.18 state or foreign jurisdiction in which the offeree or purchaser is present and is not part of

Subdivision 1. **Registration or notice filing fee.** (a) There shall be a filing fee of \$100 for every application for registration or notice filing. There shall be an additional fee of one-tenth of one percent of the maximum aggregate offering price at which the securities are to be offered in this state, and the maximum combined fees shall not exceed \$300.

(b) When an application for registration is withdrawn before the effective date or a preeffective stop order is entered under section 80A.54, all but the \$100 filing fee shall be returned. If an application to register securities is denied, the total of all fees received shall be retained.

(c) Where a filing is made in connection with a federal covered security under section 18(b)(2) of the Securities Act of 1933, there is a fee of \$100 for every initial filing. If the filing is made in connection with redeemable securities issued by an open end management company or unit investment trust, as defined in the Investment Company Act of 1940, there is an additional annual fee of ~~+20~~ 1/10 of one percent of the maximum aggregate offering price at which the securities are to be offered in this state during the notice filing period. The fee must be paid at the time of the initial filing and thereafter in connection with each renewal no later than July 1 of each year and must be sufficient to cover the shares the issuer expects to sell in this state over the next 12 months. If during a current notice filing the issuer determines it is likely to sell shares in excess of the shares for which fees have been paid to the administrator, the issuer shall submit an amended notice filing to the administrator under section 80A.50, together with a fee of ~~+20~~ 1/10 of one percent of the maximum aggregate offering price of the additional shares. Shares for which a fee has been paid, but which have not been sold at the time of expiration of the notice filing, may not be sold unless an additional fee to cover the shares has been paid to the administrator as provided in this section and section 80A.50. If the filing is made in connection with redeemable securities issued by such a company or trust, there is no maximum fee for securities filings made according to this paragraph. If the filing is made in connection with any other federal covered security under Section 18(b)(2) of the Securities Act of 1933, there is an additional fee of one-tenth of one percent of the maximum aggregate offering price at which the securities are to be offered in this state, and the combined fees shall not exceed \$300. Fees collected under this subdivision are exempted under section 16A.1285, subdivision 2.

**Sec. 13. APPROPRIATIONS; CANCELLATIONS.**

(a) The remaining balance of the fiscal year 2009 special revenue fund appropriation for the Green Jobs Task Force under Laws 2008, chapter 363, article 6, section 3,



subdivision 4, is transferred and appropriated to the commissioner of employment and economic development for the purposes of green enterprise assistance under Minnesota Statutes, section 116J.438. This appropriation is available until spent.

(b) The unencumbered balance of the fiscal year 2008 appropriation to the commissioner of commerce for the rural and energy development revolving loan fund under Laws 2007, chapter 57, article 2, section 3, subdivision 6, is canceled and reappropriated to the commissioner of commerce as follows:

(1) \$1,500,000 is for a grant to the Board of Trustees of the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities for the International Renewable Energy Technology Institute (IRETI) to be located at Minnesota State University, Mankato, as a public and private partnership to support applied research in renewable energy and energy efficiency to aid in the transfer of technology from Sweden to Minnesota and to support technology commercialization from companies located in Minnesota and throughout the world; and

(2) the remaining balance is for a grant to the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota for the initiative for renewable energy and the environment to fund start up costs related to a national solar testing and certification laboratory to test, rate, and certify the performance of equipment and devices that utilize solar energy for heating and cooling air and water and for generating electricity.

This appropriation is available until expended.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

Sec. 13. **ASSESSMENT.**

(a) The commissioner of commerce may levy a pro rata assessment on institutions licensed under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 58, to recover the costs to the Department of Commerce for administering the licensing and registration requirements of Minnesota Statutes, section 58A.10.

(b) The commissioner shall levy the assessments and notify each institution of the amount of the assessment being levied by September 30, 2010. The institution shall pay the assessment to the department no later than November 30, 2010. If an institution fails to pay its assessment by this date, its license may be suspended by the commissioner until it is paid in full.

(c) This section expires December 1, 2010.
