1.7	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.8	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 176.011, subdivision 15, is amended to read:
1.9	Subd. 15. Occupational disease. (a) "Occupational disease" means a mental
1.10	impairment as defined in paragraph (d) or physical disease arising out of and in the course
1.11	of employment peculiar to the occupation in which the employee is engaged and due
1.12	to causes in excess of the hazards ordinary of employment and shall include undulant
1.13	fever. Physical stimulus resulting in mental injury and mental stimulus resulting in
1.14	physical injury shall remain compensable. Mental impairment is not considered a disease
1.15	if it results from a disciplinary action work evaluation, job transfer, layoff, demotion,
1.16	promotion, termination, retirement, or similar action taken in good faith by the employer.
1.17	Ordinary diseases of life to which the general public is equally exposed outside of
1.18	employment are not compensable, except where the diseases follow as an incident of an
1.19	occupational disease, or where the exposure peculiar to the occupation makes the disease
1.20	an occupational disease hazard. A disease arises out of the employment only if there be a
1.21	direct causal connection between the conditions under which the work is performed and
1.22	if the occupational disease follows as a natural incident of the work as a result of the
1.23	exposure occasioned by the nature of the employment. An employer is not liable for
1.24	compensation for any occupational disease which cannot be traced to the employment as a
1.25	direct and proximate cause and is not recognized as a hazard characteristic of and peculiar

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to the trade, occupation, process, or employment or which results from a hazard to which 2.1 the worker would have been equally exposed outside of the employment. 2.2

(b) If immediately preceding the date of disablement or death, an employee was 2.3 employed on active duty with an organized fire or police department of any municipality, 2.4 as a member of the Minnesota State Patrol, conservation officer service, state crime bureau, 2.5 as a forest officer by the Department of Natural Resources, state correctional officer, or 2.6 sheriff or full-time deputy sheriff of any county, and the disease is that of myocarditis, 2.7 coronary sclerosis, pneumonia or its sequel, and at the time of employment such employee 28 was given a thorough physical examination by a licensed doctor of medicine, and a written 2.9 report thereof has been made and filed with such organized fire or police department, with 2.10 the Minnesota State Patrol, conservation officer service, state crime bureau, Department 2.11 of Natural Resources, Department of Corrections, or sheriff's department of any county, 2.12 which examination and report negatived any evidence of myocarditis, coronary sclerosis, 2.13 pneumonia or its sequel, the disease is presumptively an occupational disease and shall 2.14 be presumed to have been due to the nature of employment. If immediately preceding 2.15 the date of disablement or death, any individual who by nature of their position provides 2.16 emergency medical care, or an employee who was employed as a licensed police officer 2.17 under section 626.84, subdivision 1; firefighter; paramedic; state correctional officer; 2.18 emergency medical technician; or licensed nurse providing emergency medical care; and 2.19 who contracts an infectious or communicable disease to which the employee was exposed 2.20 in the course of employment outside of a hospital, then the disease is presumptively an 2.21 occupational disease and shall be presumed to have been due to the nature of employment 2.22 2.23 and the presumption may be rebutted by substantial factors brought by the employer or insurer. Any substantial factors which shall be used to rebut this presumption and 2.24 which are known to the employer or insurer at the time of the denial of liability shall be 2.25 communicated to the employee on the denial of liability. 2.26

(c) A firefighter on active duty with an organized fire department who is unable 2.27 to perform duties in the department by reason of a disabling cancer of a type caused 2.28 by exposure to heat, radiation, or a known or suspected carcinogen, as defined by the 2.29 International Agency for Research on Cancer, and the carcinogen is reasonably linked to 2.30 the disabling cancer, is presumed to have an occupational disease under paragraph (a). If a 2.31 firefighter who enters the service after August 1, 1988, is examined by a physician prior to 2.32 being hired and the examination discloses the existence of a cancer of a type described 2.33 in this paragraph, the firefighter is not entitled to the presumption unless a subsequent 2.34 medical determination is made that the firefighter no longer has the cancer. 2.35

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3.1 (d) For the purposes of this chapter, "mental impairment" means a diagnosis of
3.2 post-traumatic stress disorder by a licensed physician or psychologist. For the purpose of
3.3 this chapter, "post-traumatic stress disorder" means the condition as described in the most
3.4 recent edition of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders published
3.5 by the American Psychiatric Association.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 176.011, subdivision 16, is amended to read: 3.6 Subd. 16. Personal injury. "Personal injury" means any mental impairment as 3.7 defined in subdivision 15, paragraph (d), or physical injury arising out of and in the course 3.8 of employment and includes personal injury caused by occupational disease; but does 3.9 not cover an employee except while engaged in, on, or about the premises where the 3.10 employee's services require the employee's presence as a part of that service at the time of 3.11 the injury and during the hours of that service. Where the employer regularly furnished 3.12 transportation to employees to and from the place of employment, those employees are 3.13 subject to this chapter while being so transported. Physical stimulus resulting in mental 3.14 injury and mental stimulus resulting in physical injury shall remain compensable. Mental 3.15 impairment is not considered a personal injury if it results from a disciplinary action work 3.16 evaluation, job transfer, layoff, demotion, promotion, termination, retirement, or similar 3.17 action taken in good faith by the employer. Personal injury does not include an injury 3.18 caused by the act of a third person or fellow employee intended to injure the employee 3.19 because of personal reasons, and not directed against the employee as an employee, or 3.20 because of the employment. An injury or disease resulting from a vaccine in response 3.21 3.22 to a declaration by the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services under the Public Health Service Act to address an actual or potential health 3.23 risk related to the employee's employment is an injury or disease arising out of and in 3.24 3.25 the course of employment.

Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 176.081, subdivision 1, is amended to read: 3.26 Subdivision 1. Limitation of fees. (a) A fee for legal services of 25 20 percent of 3.27 the first \$4,000 of compensation awarded to the employee and 20 percent of the next 3.28 \$60,000 \$130,000 of compensation awarded to the employee is the maximum permissible 3.29 fee and does not require approval by the commissioner, compensation judge, or any other 3.30 party. All fees, including fees for obtaining medical or rehabilitation benefits, must be 3.31 calculated according to the formula under this subdivision, except as otherwise provided 3.32 in clause (1) or (2). 3.33

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4.5 insurer only if the attorney establishes that the contingent fee is inadequate to reasonably
4.6 compensate the attorney for representing the employee in the medical or rehabilitation
4.7 dispute. In cases where the contingent fee is inadequate the employer or insurer is liable

For the purposes of applying the formula where the employer or insurer is liable for

4.16 representation or \$500, whichever is less, to be paid by the employer or insurer.

4.17 (3) The fees for obtaining disputed medical or rehabilitation benefits are included
4.18 in the \$13,000 \$26,000 limit in paragraph (b). An attorney must concurrently file all
4.19 outstanding disputed issues. An attorney is not entitled to attorney fees for representation
4.20 in any issue which could reasonably have been addressed during the pendency of other
4.21 issues for the same injury.

4.22 (b) All fees for legal services related to the same injury are cumulative and may
4.23 not exceed \$13,000 \$26,000. If multiple injuries are the subject of a dispute, the
4.24 commissioner, compensation judge, or court of appeals shall specify the attorney fee
4.25 attributable to each injury.

(c) If the employer or the insurer or the defendant is given written notice of claims 4.26 for legal services or disbursements, the claim shall be a lien against the amount paid or 4.27 payable as compensation. Subject to the foregoing maximum amount for attorney fees, 4.28 up to 25 percent of the first \$4,000 of periodic compensation awarded to the employee 4.29 and 20 percent of the next \$60,000 of periodic compensation awarded to the employee 4.30 may be withheld from the periodic payments for attorney fees or disbursements if the 4.31 payor of the funds clearly indicates on the check or draft issued to the employee for 4.32 payment the purpose of the withholding, the name of the attorney, the amount withheld, 4.33 and the gross amount of the compensation payment before withholding. In no case 4.34 shall fees be calculated on the basis of any undisputed portion of compensation awards. 4.35 Allowable fees under this chapter shall be based solely upon genuinely disputed claims or 4.36

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portions of claims, including disputes related to the payment of rehabilitation benefits or 5.1 to other aspects of a rehabilitation plan. The existence of a dispute is dependent upon a 5.2 disagreement after the employer or insurer has had adequate time and information to take 5.3 a position on liability. Neither the holding of a hearing nor the filing of an application for a 5.4 hearing alone may determine the existence of a dispute. Except where the employee is 5.5 represented by an attorney in other litigation pending at the department or at the Office 5.6 of Administrative Hearings, a fee may not be charged after June 1, 1996, for services 5.7 with respect to a medical or rehabilitation issue arising under section 176.102, 176.135, 58 or 176.136 performed before the employee has consulted with the department and the 5.9 department certifies that there is a dispute and that it has tried to resolve the dispute. 5.10

(d) An attorney who is claiming legal fees for representing an employee in a workers'
compensation matter shall file a statement of attorney fees with the commissioner,
compensation judge before whom the matter was heard, or Workers' Compensation Court
of Appeals on cases before the court. A copy of the signed retainer agreement shall also
be filed. The employee and insurer shall receive a copy of the statement. The statement
shall be on a form prescribed by the commissioner and shall report the number of hours
spent on the case.

5.18 (e) Employers and insurers may not pay attorney fees or wages for legal services5.19 of more than \$13,000 per case.

(f) An attorney must file a statement of attorney fees within 12 months of the date 5.20 the attorney has submitted the written notice specified in paragraph (c). If the attorney 5.21 has not filed a statement of attorney fees within the 12 months, the attorney must send a 5.22 5.23 renewed notice of lien to the insurer. If 12 months have elapsed since the last notice of lien has been received by the insurer and no statement of attorney fees has been filed, the 5.24 insurer must release the withheld money to the employee, except that before releasing the 5.25 money to the employee, the insurer must give the attorney 30 days' written notice of the 5.26 pending release. Subd. 7. Award; additional amount. If the employer or insurer files a denial of
liability, notice of discontinuance, or fails to make payment of compensation or medical
expenses within the statutory period after notice of injury or occupational disease, or
otherwise unsuccessfully resists the payment of compensation or medical expenses,
or unsuccessfully disputes the payment of rehabilitation benefits or other aspects of
a rehabilitation plan, and the injured person has employed an attorney at law, who

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successfully procures payment on behalf of the employee or who enables the resolution of 6.1 a dispute with respect to a rehabilitation plan, the compensation judge, commissioner, or 6.2 the Workers' Compensation Court of Appeals upon appeal, upon application, shall award 6.3 to the employee against the insurer or self-insured employer or uninsured employer, in 6.4 addition to the compensation benefits paid or awarded to the employee, an amount equal 6.5 to 30 percent of that portion of the attorney's fee which has been awarded pursuant to this 6.6 section that is in excess of \$250. (a) For injury producing temporary total 6.12 disability, the compensation is 66-2/3 percent of the weekly wage at the time of injury. 6.13 (b)(1) Commencing on October 1, 2008 2013, and each October 1 thereafter, the 6.14 maximum weekly compensation payable is \$850 per week 102 percent of the statewide 6.15 average weekly wage for the period ending December 31 of the preceding year. 6.16 (2) The Workers' Compensation Advisory Council may consider adjustment 6.17 increases and make recommendations to the legislature. 6.18 (c) The minimum weekly compensation payable is \$130 per week or the injured 6.19 employee's actual weekly wage, whichever is less. 6.20 (d) Temporary total compensation shall be paid during the period of disability 6.21 6.22 subject to the cessation and recommencement conditions in paragraphs (e) to (l). Where the employee is medically 7.1 unable to continue working due to the injury, temporary total disability compensation 7.2 may continue until any of the cessation events in paragraphs (e) to (l) occurs following 7.3 recommencement. If an employee who has not yet received temporary total disability 7.4 compensation becomes medically unable to continue working due to the injury after 7.5 reaching maximum medical improvement, temporary total disability compensation shall 7.6 commence and shall continue until any of the events in paragraphs (e) to (l) occurs 7.7 following commencement. from the labor market. Temporary total disability compensation may be recommenced
following cessation under this paragraph only if the employee reenters the labor market
prior to 90 days after the employee reached maximum medical improvement and prior to
payment of 130 weeks of temporary total disability compensation. Once recommenced,
temporary total disability ceases when any of the cessation events in paragraphs (e) to
(l) occurs.

7.23 (g) Temporary total disability compensation shall cease if the total disability ends and the employee fails to diligently search for appropriate work within the employee's 7.24 physical restrictions. which meets the requirements of section 176.102, subdivision 4, or, if no plan has been
filed, the employee refuses an offer of gainful employment that the employee can do in the

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employee's physical condition. Once temporary total disability compensation has ceased 8.1 under this paragraph, it may not be recommenced. 8.2

(j) Temporary total disability compensation shall cease 90 days after the employee 8.3 has reached maximum medical improvement, except as provided in section 176.102, 8.4 subdivision 11, paragraph (b). For purposes of this subdivision, the 90-day period after 8.5 maximum medical improvement commences on the earlier of: (1) the date that the 8.6 employee receives a written medical report indicating that the employee has reached 8.7 maximum medical improvement; or (2) the date that the employer or insurer serves the 8.8 report on the employee and the employee's attorney, if any. Once temporary total disability 8.9 compensation has ceased under this paragraph, it may not be recommenced except if the 8.10 employee returns to work and is subsequently medically unable to continue working 8.11 as provided in paragraph (e), clause (2). 8.12

8.23 (m) Once an employee has been paid 52 weeks of temporary total compensation, the employer or insurer must notify the employee in writing of the 130-week limitation 8.24 on payment of temporary total compensation. A copy of this notice must also be filed 8.25 8.26 with the department.

Sec. 6. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 176.102, subdivision 5, is amended to read: 8.27 Subd. 5. On-the-job training; job placement and job development limitation. 8.28 (a) On-the-job training is to be given consideration in developing a rehabilitation plan 8.29 especially where it would produce an economic status similar to that enjoyed prior to 8.30 disability. 8.31

(b) For purposes of this subdivision, job placement includes job development 8.32 services as defined in rules adopted by the commissioner. Job placement services provided 8.33 by a qualified rehabilitation consultant firm or a registered rehabilitation vendor must 8.34 not exceed 20 hours per month or 24 consecutive or intermittent weeks. When 12 8.35

consecutive or intermittent weeks of job placement services have been provided, the 9.1 9.2 qualified rehabilitation consultant must consult with the parties and either file a plan amendment reflecting an agreement by the parties to extend job placement services for up 9.3 to an additional 12 consecutive or intermittent weeks, or file a request for a rehabilitation 9.4 conference under section 176.106. 9.9 Sec. 7. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 176.102, subdivision 10, is amended to read: Subd. 10. Rehabilitation; consultants and vendors. (a) The commissioner shall 9.10 approve rehabilitation consultants who may propose and implement plans if they satisfy 9.11 rules adopted by the commissioner for rehabilitation consultants. A consultant may be an 9.12 individual or public or private entity, and except for rehabilitation services, Department of 9.13 9.14 Employment and Economic Development, a consultant may not be a vendor or the agent of a vendor of rehabilitation services. The commissioner shall also approve rehabilitation 9.15 vendors if they satisfy rules adopted by the commissioner. 9.16

9.17 (b) An individual qualified rehabilitation consultant registered by the commissioner
9.18 must not provide any medical, rehabilitation, or disability case management services
9.19 related to an injury that is compensable under this chapter unless the case management
9.20 services are part of an approved rehabilitation plan.

9.21 Sec. 8. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 176.106, subdivision 3, is amended to read: Subd. 3. Conference. The matter shall be scheduled for an administrative 9.22 conference within 60 days after receipt of the request for a conference, except that an 9.23 9.24 administrative conference on a rehabilitation issue under section 176.102 must be held within 21 days, unless the issue involves only fees for rehabilitation services that have 9.25 already been provided or there is good cause for holding the conference later than 21 9.26 days. If there is a rehabilitation plan in effect, the qualified rehabilitation consultant must 9.27 continue to provide reasonable services under the plan until the date the conference was 9.28 initially scheduled to be held. Notice of the conference shall be served on all parties no 9.29 later than 14 days prior to the conference, unless the commissioner or compensation judge 9.30 determines that a conference shall not be held. Subd. 1b. Limitation of liability. (a) The liability of the employer for treatment,
articles, and supplies provided to an employee while an inpatient or outpatient at a small
hospital shall be the hospital's usual and customary charge, unless the charge is determined
by the commissioner or a compensation judge to be unreasonably excessive. A "small
hospital," for purposes of this paragraph, is a hospital which has 100 or fewer licensed beds.

10.11 (b) The liability of the employer for the treatment, articles, and supplies that are not limited by subdivision 1a or 1c or paragraph (a) shall be limited to 85 percent of 10.12 the provider's usual and customary charge, or 85 percent of the prevailing charges for 10.13 10.14 similar treatment, articles, and supplies furnished to an injured person when paid for by the injured person, whichever is lower. On this basis, the commissioner or compensation 10.15 judge may determine the reasonable value of all treatment, services, and supplies, and 10.16 the liability of the employer is limited to that amount. The commissioner may by rule 10.17 establish the reasonable value of a service, article, or supply in lieu of the 85 percent 10.18 limitation in this paragraph. (c) The limitation of liability for charges provided by paragraph (b) does not apply
to a nursing home that participates in the medical assistance program and whose rates are
established by the commissioner of human services.

(d) An employer's liability for treatment, articles, and supplies provided under this
chapter by a health care provider located outside of Minnesota is limited to the payment that
the health care provider would receive if the treatment, article, or supply were paid under
the workers' compensation law of the jurisdiction in which the treatment was provided.

Sec. 10. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 176.191, subdivision 3, is amended to read:
Subd. 3. Insurer payment. If a dispute exists as to whether an employee's injury
is compensable under this chapter and the employee is otherwise covered by an insurer
or entity pursuant to chapters 62A, 62C, 62D, 62E, 62R, and 62T, that insurer or entity
shall pay any medical costs incurred by the employee for the injury up to the limits of the
applicable coverage and shall make any disability payments otherwise payable by that

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insurer or entity in the absence of or in addition to workers' compensation liability. If the 11.1 injury is subsequently determined to be compensable pursuant to this chapter, the workers' 11.2 compensation insurer shall be ordered to reimburse the insurer or entity that made the 11.3 payments for all payments made under this subdivision by the insurer or entity, including 11.4 interest at a rate of 12 percent a year. If the health care provider accepts payment for the 11.5 services from the insurer or entity under chapter 62A, 62C, 62D, 62E, 62R, or 62T, the 11.6 payment shall be deemed payment in full and the employer is not liable for additional 11.7 payment under this chapter for the services.
