BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
Section 1. [299A.86] OFFICE OF ANIMAL PROTECTION.
Subdivision 1. Definitions. As used in this section, the following terms have the meanings
given.
(a) "Animal" means an animal commonly kept as a pet in households in the United
States, including dogs, cats, rabbits, guinea pigs, ferrets, small rodents, small nonnative
birds, and small nonvenomous amphibians and reptiles.
(b) "Animal rescue" means any person, group, agency, society, firm, or corporation that
takes in, accepts, or receives animals that are unwanted, surrendered, strayed, abandoned,
obtained from municipalities, or purchased, with the intent or purpose of subsequently
placing the animals in permanent homes. An animal rescue keeps animals in a person's
private home until a permanent home is found for the animals. An animal rescue does not
generally use a central facility to house animals.
(c) "Animal shelter" means any place, building, tract of land, abode, or vehicle where
animals are taken in, accepted, or received and kept that are unwanted, surrendered, strayed,
abandoned, obtained from municipalities, or purchased, with the intent or purpose of
subsequently placing them in permanent homes. Animal shelter does not include a person's
home where animals are kept as pets solely for the person's own use or enjoyment.

2.14	(d) The director shall create a Division of Enforcement as a separate division of the
2.15	Office of Animal Protection. The director shall appoint a director of the division. The director
2.16	may place the division director's position in the unclassified service if the position meets
2.17	the criteria established in section 43A.08, subdivision 1a.
2.18	(e) Animal protection officers shall be sworn peace officers as defined in section 626.84,
2.19	subdivision 1, paragraph (c), charged with statewide prevention and detection of crimes
2.20	against animals and the enforcement of laws of the state regarding animal cruelty and welfare
2.21	and shall have the full power of arrest.
2.22	Subd. 4. Duties. The Office of Animal Protection shall have the following duties:
2.23	(1) to promote programs to protect the welfare of animals;
2.24	(2) to coordinate with local law enforcement officers to enforce the requirements in
2.25	chapters 343 and 346 regarding animal welfare and the prevention of animal cruelty;
2.26	(3) to investigate alleged crimes against animals in accordance with the requirements

Agri	culture, Department of Natural Resources, Board of Veterinary Medicine, local and
state	police officers and sheriffs, city and county attorneys, and humane agents as defined

<u>S</u>	Subd. 7. Grants. The office may make grants from money available in the Office of
Anin	nal Protection account in the special revenue fund to assist Minnesota-based local
gove	ernments, veterinary clinics, and postsecondary institutions to support the activities and

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4.1	Subd. 8. Reports. (a) The office must report annually to the legislative committees with
4.2	jurisdiction over animals on grants made under subdivision 7 in the previous calendar year.
4.3	The report must include the amounts of the grants issued, the geographic distribution of the
4.4	grants, and measurable outcomes including the number of education and outreach programs
4.5	conducted and the number of animals served.
4.6	(b) On or before November 1 of each year, the office must publish and make available
4.7	an annual report on the office's efforts to:
4.8	(1) protect the welfare of animals;
4.9	(2) enforce laws related to animal welfare and the prevention of animal cruelty;
4.10	(3) train professionals on preventing animal crimes;
4.11	(4) develop and maintain a statewide dangerous dog database; and
4.12	(5) investigate violations of the laws for dangerous dogs.
4.13	Subd. 9. Money received from other sources; gifts. The office may accept and use
4.14	gifts, grants, or contributions from any source to support the office. The office may apply
4.15	for and accept grants of money from the United States, the state, a subdivision of the state,
4.16	a foundation, or a person for any of the office's purposes. Money received directly for the
4.17	Office of Animal Protection must be deposited in the Office of Animal Protection account
4.18	in the special revenue fund for use by the office.
4.19	Subd. 10. Office of Animal Protection account; appropriation. An Office of Animal
4.20	Protection account is created in the special revenue fund. All fees and penalties collected
4.21	by the office under this chapter, money received by the office as gifts or grants, or other
4.22	private or public funds obtained for the purposes of this section must be deposited in the
4.23	state treasury and credited to the Office of Animal Protection account in the special revenue
4.24	fund. Money in the account, including interest on the account, is annually appropriated to
4.25	the office for the purposes of this section.
4.26	Sec. 2. APPROPRIATION; OFFICE OF ANIMAL PROTECTION.
