Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 356.219, subdivision 8, is amended to read: 18 Subd. 8. Timing of reports. (a) For salaried firefighter relief associations, police 1.9 relief associations, and volunteer firefighter relief associations, the information required 1.10 under this section must be submitted by the due date for reports required under section 1.11 69.051, subdivision 1 or 1a, as applicable. If a relief association satisfies the definition of 1.12 a fully invested plan under subdivision 1, paragraph (b), for the calendar year covered 1.13 by the report required under section 69.051, subdivision 1 or 1a, as applicable, the chief 1.14 administrative officer of the covered pension plan shall certify that compliance on a form 1.15 prescribed by the state auditor. Subd. 6. Deferred service pensions. (a) A member of a relief association is entitled to a deferred service pension if the member:

3.32 (1) has completed the lesser of the minimum period of active service with the fire
3.33 department specified in the bylaws or 20 years of active service with the fire department;

3.34 (2) has completed at least five years of active membership in the relief association;

Sec. 5. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 424A.02, subdivision 1, is amended to read: 5.13 Subdivision 1. Authorization. (a) A defined benefit relief association, when its 5.14 articles of incorporation or bylaws so provide, may pay out of the assets of its special 5.15 fund a defined benefit service pension to each of its members who: (1) separates from 5.16 active service with the fire department; (2) reaches age 50; (3) completes at least five 5.17 years of active service as an active member of the municipal fire department to which the 5.18 relief association is associated; (4) completes at least five years of active membership 5.19 with the relief association before separation from active service; and (5) complies with 5 20 any additional conditions as to age, service, and membership that are prescribed by the 5.21 bylaws of the relief association. A service pension computed under this section may be 5.22 prorated monthly for fractional years of service as the bylaws or articles of incorporation 5.23 of the relief association so provide. The bylaws or articles of incorporation may define 5.24 a "month," but the definition must require a calendar month to have at least 16 days of 5.25 active service. If the bylaws or articles of incorporation do not define a "month," a 5.26 "month" is a completed calendar month of active service measured from the member's 5.27 date of entry to the same date in the subsequent month. The service pension earned by a 5.28 volunteer firefighter under this chapter and the articles of incorporation and bylaws of the 5.29 volunteer firefighters' relief association may be paid whether or not the municipality or 5.30 nonprofit firefighting corporation to which the relief association is associated qualifies for 5.31 the receipt of fire state aid under chapter 69. 5.32

(b) In the case of a member who has completed at least five years of active service as
an active member of the fire department to which the relief association is associated on
the date that the relief association is established and incorporated, the requirement that

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the member complete at least five years of active membership with the relief association 6.1 before separation from active service may be waived by the board of trustees of the relief 6.2 association if the member completes at least five years of inactive membership with the 6.3 relief association before the date of the payment of the service pension. During the 6.4 period of inactive membership, the member is not entitled to receive disability benefit 6.5 coverage, is not entitled to receive additional service credit towards computation of a 6.6 service pension, and is considered to have the status of a person entitled to a deferred 6.7 service pension under subdivision 7. 68

(c) No municipality or nonprofit firefighting corporation may delegate the power to
take final action in setting a service pension or ancillary benefit amount or level to the
board of trustees of the relief association or to approve in advance a service pension or
ancillary benefit amount or level equal to the maximum amount or level that this chapter
would allow rather than a specific dollar amount or level.

 Subd. 9. Limitation on ancillary benefits. A defined benefit relief association,
 including any volunteer firefighters relief association governed by section 69.77 or any
 volunteer firefighters division of a relief association governed by chapter 424, may only
 pay ancillary benefits which would constitute an authorized disbursement as specified in
 section 424A.05 subject to the following requirements or limitations:
- (1) with respect to a defined benefit relief association in which governing bylaws 8.26 provide <u>solely</u> for a lump-sum service pension to a retiring member, <u>or provide a retiring</u> 8.27 member the choice of either a lump-sum service pension or a monthly service pension 8.28 and the lump-sum service pension was chosen, no ancillary benefit may be paid to any 8.29 former member or paid to any person on behalf of any former member after the former 8 30 member (i) terminates active service with the fire department and active membership 8.31 in the relief association; and (ii) commences receipt of a service pension as authorized 8.32 under this section; and 8.33
- 8.34 (2) with respect to any defined benefit relief association, no ancillary benefit paid or

 limit the total survivor benefit amount payable.
- (5) For purposes of this section, for a monthly benefit volunteer fire relief association 10.6 or for a combination lump-sum and monthly benefit volunteer fire relief association where 10.7 a monthly benefit service pension has been elected by or a monthly benefit is payable with 10.8 respect to a firefighter, a designated beneficiary must be a natural person. For purposes 10.9 of this section, for a lump-sum volunteer fire relief association or for a combination 10.10 lump-sum and monthly benefit volunteer fire relief association where a lump-sum service 10.11 pension has been elected by or a lump-sum benefit is payable with respect to a firefighter, 10.12 a trust created under chapter 501B may be a designated beneficiary.
