1.10	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 122A.14, subdivision 9, is amended to read:				
1.11	Subd. 9. Fee. Each person licensed by the Board of School Administrators shall pay				
1.12	the board a fee of \$75, collected each fiscal year. When transmitting notice of the license				
1.13	fee, the board also must notify the licensee of the penalty for failing to pay the fee within				
1.14	the time specified by the board. The board may provide a lower fee for persons on retired				
1.15	or inactive status. After receiving notice from the board, any licensed school administrator				
1.16	who does not pay the fee in the given fiscal year shall have all administrative licenses held				
1.17	by the person automatically suspended, without the right to a hearing, until the fee has been				
1.18	paid to the board. If the board suspends a licensed school administrator for failing to pay				
1.19	the fee, it must immediately notify the district currently employing the school administrator				
1.20	of the school administrator's suspension. The executive secretary shall deposit the fees in				
1.21	the educator licensure account in the special revenue fund in the state treasury.

Subd. 8. Background checks. (a) The Board of Teaching and the commissioner
of education must request a criminal history background check from the superintendent
of the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension on all applicants for initial licenses under their
jurisdiction. An application for a license under this section must be accompanied by:
(1) an executed criminal history consent form, including fingerprints; and
(2) a money order or cashier's check payable to the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension

2.14 for the fee for conducting payment to conduct the criminal history background check. The
2.15 Board of Teaching and the commissioner of education must deposit payments received
2.16 under this subdivision in the educator licensure background check account in the special
2.17 revenue fund.

(b) The superintendent of the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension shall perform the
background check required under paragraph (a) by retrieving criminal history data as

repository. The superintendent is authorized to exchange fingerprints with the Federal
Bureau of Investigation for purposes of the criminal history check. The superintendent
shall recover the cost to the bureau of a background check through the fee charged to
the applicant under paragraph (a).

Any funds appropriated from this account 3.2 that remain unexpended at the end of the biennium cancel to the educator licensure 3.3 account in the special revenue fund. 3.4 Subd. 2. Background check account. An educator licensure background check 3.5 account is created in the special revenue fund. The Department of Education, the Board of 3.6 Teaching, and the Board of School Administrators must deposit all payments submitted by 3.7 license applicants for criminal background checks conducted by the Bureau of Criminal 3.8 Apprehension in the educator licensure background check account. Amounts in the 3.9 account are annually appropriated to the commissioner of education for payment to the 3.10 superintendent of the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension for the costs of background 3.11

Each applicant submitting an application 3.15 for the issuance, renewal, or extension of to the Board of Teaching to issue, renew, or 3.16 extend a teaching license to teach, including applications for licensure via portfolio under 3.17 subdivision 2, must be accompanied by include a processing fee of \$57. Each application 3.18 for issuing, renewing, or extending the license of a school administrator or supervisor 3.19 must be accompanied by a processing fee in the amount set by the Board of Teaching. The 3.20 processing fee for a teacher's license and for the licenses of supervisory personnel must 3.21 be paid to the executive secretary of the appropriate board and deposited in the educator 3.22 licensure account in the special revenue fund. The executive secretary of the board shall 3.23 deposit the fees with the commissioner of management and budget. The fees as set by the 3.24 board are nonrefundable for applicants not qualifying for a license. However, a fee must 3.25 be refunded by the commissioner of management and budget must refund a fee in any 3.26 case in which the applicant already holds a valid unexpired license.
