## APPENDIX Repealed Minnesota Statutes: 16-7103

## **115B.48 DEFINITIONS.**

Subd. 9. Owner or operator. "Owner or operator" means a person who:

(1) owns or has owned a dry cleaning facility; or

(2) owns or owned real property on which a dry cleaning facility operates or operated.
