1.4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.5	Section 1. GRANTS TO EXPAND ACCESS TO CHILD CARE FOR CHILDREN
1.6	WITH DISABILITIES.
1.7	Subdivision 1. Establishment. The commissioner of human services must establish
1.8	competitive grants to expand access to licensed family child care providers or licensed child
1.9	care centers for children with disabilities including medical complexities. Grants must be
1.10	awarded to counties or tribes and must be used to assist family child care providers or child
1.11	care centers to serve children with disabilities in inclusive settings alongside children without
1.12	disabilities. Competitive grants must be awarded to at least two applicants beginning no
1.13	later than December 1, 2020.
1.14	Subd. 2. Commissioner's duties. To implement these grants, the commissioner must:
1.15	(1) develop a request for proposals with stakeholder input;
1.16	(2) develop procedures for data collection, qualitative and quantitative measurement of
1.17	programmatic outcomes, and reporting requirements for grantees;
1.18	(3) convene a working group of grantees, grantee partners, and participating families to
1.19	assess progress on grant activities, share best practices, and collect and review data on grant
1.20	activities; and
1.21	(4) based on information gathered throughout the grant period and at the conclusion of
1.22	the grant period, provide a report to the chairs and ranking minorities members of the

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legislative committees with	jurisdiction over health and hu	uman services regard	ding grant
activities, with legislative re	commendations for implementi	ng inclusive child ca	re statewide.
The report must be made av	vailable to the public.

Subd. 4. Requirements	for grantees. Upon receipt of	grant funds and thro	oughout the
grant period, grant recipien	ts must:

which must meet one of the	e following criteria:		

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3.1	(i) serve ten or fewer children, including at least one child with a disability who is not
3.2	a family member of the family child care provider or of an employee of the child care center;
3.3	(ii) serve 11 to 30 children, including at least two children with disabilities; or
3.4	(iii) serve more than 30 children, including at least three children with disabilities;
3.5	(2) develop and use a process to ensure that grant funding be used to support children
3.6	with disabilities who, without the additional supports made available through the grant,
3.7	would have difficulty accessing inclusive child care settings;
3.8	(3) pursue funding for ongoing services needed for children with disabilities in inclusive
3.9	child care settings, such as:
3.10	(i) Medicaid or private health insurance coverage;
3.11	(ii) additional grant funding; or
3.12	(iii) other sources of county, state, or federal funds; and
3.13	(4) explore and seek opportunities to use existing federal funds to provide ongoing
3.14	support to family child care providers or child care centers serving children with disabilities.
3.15	Grantees must seek to minimize family financial obligations for child care for a child with
3.16	disabilities beyond what child care would cost for a child without disabilities.
3.17	Subd. 5. Reporting. Grantees must report semiannually to the commissioner according
3.18	to a manner specified by the commissioner on the following:
3.19	(1) additional supports needed to serve children with disabilities in inclusive child care
3.20	settings;
3.21	(2) costs for additional supports;
3.22	(3) billing best practices;
3.23	(4) available funding sources;
3.24	(5) processes for identifying families of children with disabilities who could benefit
3.25	from grant activities and connecting them with family child care providers or child care
3.26	centers interested in serving them; and
3.27	(6) processes used to determine whether a child is a child with a disability and means
3.28	of prioritizing grant funding to serve children with significant support needs associated with
3.29	their disability.

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4.1	Sec. 2. APPROPRIATION.
4.2	\$250,000 is appropriated from the general fund in fiscal year 2021 to the commissioner
4.3	of human services for the child care expansion grants in section 1. The commissioner may
4.4	use up to seven percent of the appropriation for administration and technical assistance.

4.5 The base appropriation is \$250,000 for each of fiscal years 2022 and 2023.
