1.6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.7	Section 1. [116L.667] CAREER PATHWAYS COORDINATORS.
1.8	Subdivision 1. Requirement. Each workforce service area must have a career
1.9	pathways coordinator who is responsible for improving coordination and communication
1.10	of workforce development programs and services within the workforce service area, with
1.11	other workforce service areas and career pathways coordinators, and with administering
1.12	agencies. A career pathways coordinator may serve as the coordinator for up to two
1.13	service areas.
1.14	Subd. 2. Responsibilities. A career pathways coordinator is responsible for:
1.15	(1) understanding the needs of existing, new, and prospective service area businesses
1.16	in regard to workforce development programs, resources, and other services;
1.17	(2) connecting job seekers, secondary and higher education institutions, employers,
1.18	and other stakeholders and partners;
1.19	(3) coordinating services to job seekers including career counseling, training, and
1.20	work experience opportunities;
1.21	(4) assessing and compiling information about all workforce development programs
1.22	and services offered in the assigned workforce service area, including adult basic education
1.23	programs, programs and services at higher education institutions and kindergarten through
1.24	grade 12 schools, and FastTRAC programs and other grant programs;

Sec. 2. CAREER PATHWAYS COORDINATORS; APPROPRIATION. 2.21

2.22 \$1,250,000 in fiscal year 2016 and \$1,250,000 in fiscal year 2017 are appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of employment and economic development 2.23 for up to nine career pathways coordinator positions in the workforce service areas and 2.24 2.25 for the purposes specified in Minnesota Statutes, section 116L.667. The commissioner, in consultation with local workforce councils and local elected officials in each of the 2.26 workforce service areas receiving funds, shall develop a method of distributing funds to 2.27 provide equitable services across workforce service areas. 2.28

Sec. 3. MINNESOTA YOUTH PROGRAM; APPROPRIATION. 2.29

- (a) \$10,000,000 in fiscal year 2016 and \$10,000,000 in fiscal year 2017 are 2.30
- appropriated from the general fund, and \$3,500,000 in fiscal year 2016 and \$3,500,000 2.31
- in fiscal year 2017 are appropriated from the workforce development fund, to the 2.32
- commissioner of employment and economic development for the Minnesota youth 2.33
