1.8	(a) \$143,000 in fiscal year 2022 and \$143,000 in fiscal year 2023 are appropriated from
1.9	the general fund to the commissioner of human services for a grant to an organization
1.10	governed by people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and administering a
1.11	statewide network of disability groups to maintain and promote self-advocacy services and
1.12	supports for persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities throughout the state.
1.13	Grant money must be used for the following purposes:
1.14	(1) to train and support a statewide network of peer-to-peer mentors for people with
1.15	developmental disabilities. The peer-to-peer mentors shall assist people with developmental
1.16	disabilities with choosing service options and learning advocacy skills necessary for them
1.17	to be fully included in their communities. Grant money must also be used to develop and
1.18	deliver curriculum to the network of peer-to-peer mentors;
1.19	(2) to provide outreach activities to people with developmental disabilities, including
1.20	statewide conferences and disability networking opportunities focused on self-advocacy,
1.21	making informed choices, and community engagement skills;

2.3	(b) \$105,000 in fiscal year 2022 and \$105,000 in fiscal year 2023 are appropriated from
