# **ARTICLE 2**

## **HIGHER EDUCATION POLICY**

12.3 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 136A.101, subdivision 5a, is amended to12.4 read:

Subd. 5a. Assigned family responsibility. "Assigned family responsibility" means
the amount of a family's contribution to a student's cost of attendance, as determined by a
federal need analysis. For dependent students, the assigned family responsibility is 96\_94
percent of the parental contribution. For independent students with dependents other than
a spouse, the assigned family responsibility is 86\_70 percent of the student contribution.
For independent students without dependents other than a spouse, the assigned family
responsibility is 50 34 percent of the student contribution.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 136A.121, subdivision 5, is amended to read: 12.12 Subd. 5. Grant stipends. The grant stipend shall be based on a sharing of 12.13 responsibility for covering the recognized cost of attendance by the applicant, the 12.14 applicant's family, and the government. The amount of a financial stipend must not 12.15 exceed a grant applicant's recognized cost of attendance, as defined in subdivision 6, after 12.16 deducting the following: 12.17 (1) the assigned student responsibility of at least 50 percent of the cost of attending 12.18 12.19 the institution of the applicant's choosing; (2) the assigned family responsibility as defined in section 136A.101; and 12.20 (3) the amount of a federal Pell grant award for which the grant applicant is 12.21

12.22 <u>financially</u> eligible, unless the student is ineligible to receive a Pell grant under United

- 12.23 States Code, title 20, section 1091(a)(5) or (d).
- 12.24 The minimum financial stipend is \$100 per academic year.
