1.10	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 16A.06, subdivision 11, is amended to read:
1.11	Subd. 11. Permanent school fund reporting. The commissioner shall annually
1.12	report to the Legislative-Citizen Permanent School Fund Advisory Committee
1.13	Commission, and the legislature the amount of the permanent school fund transfer and
1.14	information about the investment of the permanent school fund provided by the State
1.15	Board of Investment. The State Board of Investment shall provide information about how
1.16	they maximized the long-term economic return of the permanent school fund.

Subd. 5. Forest trust lands. (a) The term "state forest trust fund lands" as used

(b) The commissioner of management and budget shall credit the revenue from the

appropriated and dedicated for the purpose for which it is granted. Lands and interests in
lands so received may be sold or exchanged as provided in chapter 94.

(b) When the commissioner of natural resources accepts lands or interests in land,
the commissioner may reimburse the donor for costs incurred to obtain an appraisal needed
for tax reporting purposes. If the state pays the donor for a portion of the value of the
lands or interests in lands that are donated, the reimbursement for appraisal costs shall not
exceed \$1,500. If the donor receives no payment from the state for the lands or interests in
lands that are donated, the reimbursement for appraisal costs shall not exceed \$5,000.

(c) The commissioner of natural resources, on behalf of the state, may accept and 3.18 use grants of money or property from the United States or other grantors for conservation 3.19 purposes not inconsistent with the laws of this state.
