[609.133] SENTENCE ADJUSTMENT. 1.5 Subdivision 1. **Definition.** As used in this section, "prosecutor" means the attorney 1.6 general, county attorney, or city attorney responsible for the prosecution of individuals 1.7 charged with a crime. 1.8 Subd. 2. Prosecutor-initiated sentence adjustment. The prosecutor responsible for 1.9 the prosecution of an individual convicted of a crime may commence a proceeding to adjust 1.10 the sentence of that individual at any time after the initial sentencing provided the prosecutor 1.11 does not seek to increase the period of confinement or, if the individual is serving a stayed 1.12 sentence, increase the period of supervision. 1.13 Subd. 3. Review by prosecutor. (a) Prosecutors may review individual cases at their 1.14 discretion. 1.15 (b) Prior to filing a petition under this section, a prosecutor shall make a reasonable and 1.16 good faith effort to seek input from any identifiable victim and shall consider the impact 1.17 an adjusted sentence would have on the victim. 1.18 (c) The commissioner of corrections, a supervising agent, or an offender may request 1.19 that a prosecutor review an individual case. A prosecutor is not required to respond to a 1.20

The hearing shall be scheduled so that the parties have 3.19 adequate time to prepare and present arguments regarding the issue of sentence adjustment. 3.20 The parties may submit written arguments to the court prior to the date of the hearing and 3.21 may make oral arguments before the court at the hearing. The individual on whose behalf 3.22 the petition has been brought must be present at the hearing, unless excused under Minnesota 3.23 Rules of Criminal Procedure, rule 26.03, subdivision 1, clause (3). 3.24 (b) A victim of the offense for which sentence adjustment is sought has a right to submit 3.25 an oral or written statement to the court at the time of the hearing describing the harm 3.26 suffered by the victim as a result of the crime and the victim's recommendation on whether 3.27 adjustment should be granted or denied. The judge shall consider the victim's statement 3.28 3.29 when making a decision. (c) Representatives of the Department of Corrections, supervising agents, community 3.30 treatment providers, and any other individual with relevant information may submit an oral 3.31 or written statement to the court at the time of the hearing. 3.32

determination	n, the court shall consider what impact, if any, a sentence adjustment would
have on publ	ic safety, including whether an adjustment would promote the rehabilitation
of the individ	ual, properly reflect the severity of the underlying offense, or reduce sentencing
disparities. In	n making this determination, the court may consider factors relating to both the
offender and	the offense, including but not limited to:
(1) the in	dividual's performance on probation or supervision;
(2) the in	dividual's disciplinary record during any period of incarceration;
(3) record	ls of any rehabilitation efforts made by the individual since the date of offense
and any plan	to continue those efforts in the community;
(4) evide	nce that remorse, age, diminished physical condition, or any other factor has
significantly	reduced the likelihood that the individual will commit a future offense;
(5) the an	nount of time the individual has served in custody or under supervision; and
(6) signif	icant changes in law or sentencing practice since the date of offense.
(b) Notw	ithstanding any law to the contrary, if the court determines that there are
substantial ar	nd compelling reasons to adjust the individual's sentence, the court may modify
he sentence	in any way provided the adjustment does not:
(1) increa	se the period of confinement or, if the individual is serving a stayed sentence,
increase the	period of supervision;
(2) reduc	e or eliminate the amount of court-ordered restitution; or
(3) reduce	e or eliminate a term of conditional release required by law when a court
commits an o	offender to the custody of the commissioner of corrections.

(c) A sent	tence adjustment is not a valid basis to vacate the judgment of conviction, enter
