1.32	(1) Upon receipt of a written complaint filed with the board, the board shall promptly

a determination as to whether the complaint states a prima facie violation will be made

subject, submit a written statement addressing the prima facie determination. The notice

- (2) If a determination is made that the complaint alleges a prima facie violation,
 the board shall, within 45 days of the prima facie determination, make findings and
 conclusions as to whether probable cause exists to believe the alleged violation that
 warrants a formal investigation has occurred. Any party filing a complaint and any party
 against whom a complaint is filed must be given an opportunity to be heard by the board
 prior to the board's determination as to whether probable cause exists to believe a violation
 that warrants a formal investigation has occurred.
- (3) Upon a determination by the board that probable cause exists to believe a 2.25 2.26 violation that warrants a formal investigation has occurred, the board must undertake an investigation under subdivision 10 and must issue an order at the conclusion of 2.27 the investigation, except that if the complaint alleges a violation of section 10A.25 or 2.28 10A.27, the board must either enter a conciliation agreement or make public findings and 2.29 conclusions as to whether a violation has occurred and must issue an order within 60 days 2.30 after the filing of the complaint probable cause determination has been made.
