- 2.25 (1) of the person's <del>blood,</del> breath<del>, or urine</del> under section 169A.51 (chemical tests for intoxication), or 169A.52 (test refusal or failure; revocation of license); or
- 2.27 (2) of the person's blood or urine as required by a search warrant under sections 626.04 to 626.18.

- Subd. 2. Implied consent Breath test advisory. (a) Subject to paragraph (b), At the time a breath test is requested, the person must be informed:

Sec. 5. [171.177] REVOCATION; PURSUANT TO SEARCH WARRANT. 4.4 Subdivision 1. License revocation pursuant to search warrant. 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(b) On certification by the peace officer that there existed probable cause to believe the
person had been driving, operating, or in physical control of a commercial motor vehicle
with any presence of alcohol and that the person submitted to a test and the test results
indicated an alcohol concentration of 0.04 or more, the commissioner shall disqualify the
person from operating a commercial motor vehicle under section 171.165 (commercial
driver's license disqualification).

(c) If the test is of a person's blood or urine by a laboratory operated by the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension or authorized by the bureau to conduct the analysis of a blood or urine sample, the laboratory may directly certify to the commissioner the test results, and the peace officer shall certify to the commissioner that there existed probable cause to believe the person had been driving, operating, or in physical control of a motor vehicle in violation of section 169A.20 (driving while impaired), and that the person submitted to a test. Upon receipt of both certifications, the commissioner shall undertake the license actions described in paragraphs (a) and (b).

Subd. 4. Unlicensed drivers; license issuance denial. If the person is a resident without a license or permit to operate a motor vehicle in this state, the commissioner shall deny to the person the issuance of a license or permit after the date of the alleged violation for the same period as provided in this section for revocation, subject to review as provided in subdivisions 8 and 9.

Subd. 5. Notice of revocation or disqualification; review. A revocation under this section, or a disqualification under section 171.165 (commercial driver's license disqualification), becomes effective at the time the commissioner or a peace officer acting on behalf of the commissioner notifies the person of the intention to revoke, disqualify, or both, and of revocation or disqualification. The notice must advise the person of the right to obtain administrative and judicial review as provided in subdivisions 8 and 9. If mailed, the notice and order of revocation or disqualification is deemed received three days after mailing to the last known address of the person.

Subd. 6. **Test refusal**; driving privilege lost. (a) On behalf of the commissioner, a peace officer requiring a test or directing the administration of a chemical test pursuant to a search warrant under sections 626.04 to 626.18 shall serve immediate notice of intention to revoke and of revocation on a person who refuses to permit a test or on a person who submits to a test the results of which indicate an alcohol concentration of 0.08 or more.

(b) On behalf of the commissioner, a peace officer requiring a test or directing the administration of a chemical test of a person driving, operating, or in physical control of a

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commercial motor vehicle pursuant to a search warrant under sections 626.04 to 626.18 shall serve immediate notice of intention to disqualify and of disqualification on a person who refuses to permit a test or on a person who submits to a test the results of which indicate an alcohol concentration of 0.04 or more. (c) The officer shall: (1) invalidate the person's driver's license or permit card by clipping the upper corner of the card in such a way that no identifying information including the photo is destroyed, and immediately return the card to the person; (2) issue the person a temporary license effective for only seven days; and (3) send the notification of this action to the commissioner along with the certificate required by subdivision 3 or 4. Subd. 7. **Notice of action to other states.** When a nonresident's privilege to operate a motor vehicle in this state has been revoked or denied, the commissioner shall give information in writing of the action taken to the official in charge of traffic control or public safety of the state of the person's residence and of any state in which the person has a license. Subd. 8. Administrative review. (a) At any time during a period of revocation imposed under this section, or a period of disqualification imposed under section 171.165 (commercial driver's license disqualification), a person may request in writing a review of the order of revocation or disqualification by the commissioner, unless the person is entitled to review under section 171.166 (review of disqualification). Upon receiving a request, the commissioner or the commissioner's designee shall review the order, the evidence upon which the order was based, and any other material information brought to the attention of the commissioner and determine whether sufficient cause exists to sustain the order. Within 15 days of receiving the request, the commissioner shall report in writing the results of the review. The review provided in this subdivision is not subject to the contested case provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act in sections 14.001 to 14.69. (b) The availability of administrative review for an order of revocation or disqualification has no effect upon the availability of judicial review under this section. (c) Review under this subdivision must take place, if possible, at the same time as any administrative review of the person's impoundment order under section 169A.60, subdivision 9.

Subd. 9. **Petition for judicial review.** (a) Within 60 days following receipt of a notice

and order of revocation pursuant to this section, a person may petition the court for review.

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The petition must be filed with the district court administrator in the county where the 8.1 alleged offense occurred, together with proof of service of a copy on the commissioner, and 8.2 8.3 accompanied by the standard filing fee for civil actions. Responsive pleading is not required of the commissioner, and court fees must not be charged for the appearance of the 8.4 commissioner in the matter. 8.5 (b) The petition must: 8.6 (1) be captioned in the full name of the person making the petition as petitioner and the 8.7 commissioner as respondent; 8.8 (2) include the petitioner's date of birth, driver's license number, and date of the offense; 8.9 and 8.10 (3) state with specificity the grounds upon which the petitioner seeks rescission of the 8.11 order of revocation, disqualification, or denial. 8.12 (c) The filing of the petition does not stay the revocation, disqualification, or denial. The 8.13 reviewing court may order a stay of the balance of the revocation or disqualification if the 8.14 hearing has not been conducted within 60 days after filing the petition upon terms the court 8.15 8.16 deems proper. (d) Judicial reviews must be conducted according to the Rules of Civil Procedure, except 8.17 that prehearing discovery is mandatory and is limited to: 8.18 (1) the notice of revocation; 8.19 (2) the test record or, in the case of blood or urine tests, the certificate of analysis; 8.20 (3) the peace officer's certificate and any accompanying documentation submitted by 8.21 the arresting officer to the commissioner; and 8.22 8.23 (4) disclosure of potential witnesses, including experts, and the basis of their testimony. Other types of discovery are available only upon order of the court. 8.24 Subd. 10. Judicial hearing; issues, order, appeal. (a) A judicial review hearing under 8.25 this section must be before a district judge in any county in the judicial district where the 8.26 alleged offense occurred. The hearing is to the court and may be conducted at the same time 8.27 and in the same manner as hearings upon pretrial motions in the criminal prosecution under 8.28 section 169A.20 (driving while impaired), if any. The hearing must be recorded. The 8.29 commissioner shall appear and be represented by the attorney general or through the 8.30 prosecuting authority for the jurisdiction involved. The hearing must be held at the earliest 8.31

practicable date, and in any event no later than 60 days following the filing of the petition

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records, documents, licenses, and certificates are admissible as substantive evidence.

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(d) The court shall order that the revocation or disqualification be either rescinded or
sustained and forward the order to the commissioner. The court shall file its order within
14 days following the hearing. If the revocation or disqualification is sustained, the court
shall also forward the person's driver's license or permit to the commissioner for further
action by the commissioner if the license or permit is not already in the commissioner's
possession.

- (e) Any party aggrieved by the decision of the reviewing court may appeal the decision as provided in the Rules of Appellate Procedure.
- 10.9 (f) The civil hearing under this section shall not give rise to an estoppel on any issues
  10.10 arising from the same set of circumstances in any criminal prosecution.
  - (g) It is an affirmative defense for the petitioner to prove a necessity.

## 169A.51 CHEMICAL TESTS FOR INTOXICATION.

Subd. 3. **Type of test.** The peace officer who requires a test pursuant to this section may direct whether the test is of blood, breath, or urine. Action may be taken against a person who refuses to take a blood test only if an alternative test was offered and action may be taken against a person who refuses to take a urine test only if an alternative test was offered.
