- Subd. 1a. Occupational regulations analyst. (a) The Legislative Coordinating Commission shall establish an analyst position to analyze occupational regulations consistent with section 214.001.
- (b) The analyst must issue periodic reports, as determined by the Legislative Coordinating Commission, on the availability of service providers to and employment opportunities for members of economically underprivileged classes and racial minorities.
- (c) The analyst must review legislation to enact or modify an occupational regulation to ensure compliance with the policies in section 214.001.
- (d) The analyst may require submission of evidence from the legislation's proponents. The analyst may also require information from others knowledgeable of the occupation, labor economics, or other factors.
