BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

Section 1. APPROPRIATIONS.

1.6

The sums shown in the column under "Appropriations" are added to the

1.7

appropriations in Laws 2015, chapter 65, article 1, to the agencies and for the purposes

1.8

specified in this act. The appropriations are from the general fund and are available for the

1.9

fiscal years indicated for each purpose. The figures "2016" and "2017" used in this act

1.10

mean that the addition to the appropriation listed under them is available for the fiscal year

1.11

ending June 30, 2016, or June 30, 2017, respectively. Supplemental appropriations for the

1.12

fiscal years ending June 30, 2016, are effective the day following final enactment.

2.8 representing the best interests of children in
2.9 juvenile and family court proceedings.

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2.11 This appropriation is for the Bureau of
2.12 Criminal Apprehension DNA lab, including
2.13 the addition of eight forensic scientists. The
2.14 base for this activity shall be \$1,000,000 in
2.15 each of the fiscal years 2018 and 2019.

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2.18 The amounts that may be spent for each

2.21	Subd. 2. Correctional Institutions	5,437,000	27,712,000
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2.22 \$2,610,000 in fiscal year 2016 and
2.23 \$2,757,000 in fiscal year 2017 are to increase
2.24 capacity in the challenge incarceration
2.25 program. The base for this activity shall
2.26 be \$3,263,000 in fiscal year 2018 and
2.27 \$3,623,000 in fiscal year 2019.

2.28 \$12,440,000 in fiscal year 2017 is to expand
2.29 medical, behavioral, and mental health
2.30 services for the offender population including
2.31 24-hour nursing coverage at four additional
2.32 correctional facilities, chronic care and

3.1 infectious disease management, therapeutic
3.2 programming, discharge planning, and an
3.3 electronic health records system. The base
3.4 for this activity shall be \$11,340,000 in each
3.5 of fiscal years 2018 and 2019.

3.6 \$3,603,000 in fiscal year 2017 is to
3.7 increase the number of full-time equivalent
3.8 correctional officer positions in correctional
3.9 facilities across the state.

3.10 Subd. 3. **Community Services** 241,000 2,266,000

3.11 \$406,000 in fiscal year 2017 is to increase the
3.12 number of supervising agents for offenders
3.13 in the challenge incarceration program. The
3.14 base for this activity shall be \$812,000 in
3.15 fiscal year 2018 and \$1,421,000 in fiscal year
3.16 2019.

3.17 \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2017 is to replace
3.18 the Department of Corrections victim
3.19 notification system. This is onetime funding.

3.20 Subd. 4. **Operations Support** 63,000 4,339,000

3.21 \$4,000,000 in fiscal year 2017 is to support
3.22 technology needs. This is onetime funding.

3.23 Sec. 7. **HUMAN RIGHTS** \$ -0- \$ 900,000

3.24 This funding is to enhance statewide
3.25 outreach, education, and enforcement of the
3.26 Human Rights Act. The base for this activity
3.27 shall be \$800,000 in each of fiscal years 2018
3.28 and 2019.
