GENERAL FUND APPROPRIATION. 3.4 \$250,000 in fiscal year 2019 is appropriated from the general fund to the Minnesota 3.5 Amateur Sports Commission to contract with a qualified nonprofit organization to establish 3.6 criteria to evaluate skate park proposals for receiving grants under Minnesota Statutes, 3.7 section 240A.20; to provide technical advice to local units of government or the Minnesota 3.8 Amateur Sports Commission about the development, design, construction, and maintenance 3.9 of a skate park; and for grants to local units of government to promote the use of skate parks 3.10 3.11 by a diverse population.
