[62Q.473] BIOMARKER TESTING. 1.6 Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) For the purposes of this section, the terms defined in this 17 subdivision have the meanings given. 1.8 (b) "Biomarker" means a characteristic that is objectively measured and evaluated as an 1.9 indicator of normal biological processes, pathogenic processes, or pharmacologic responses 1.10 to a specific therapeutic intervention. Biomarkers include but are not limited to gene 1.11 mutations or protein expression. 1.12 (c) "Biomarker testing" means the analysis of an individual's tissue, blood, or other 1.13 biospecimen for the presence of a biomarker.
