(2) presence or absence of a three- or four-star Parent Aware rated program within the 4.14 school district or close proximity of the district. School sites with the highest concentration 4.15 of kindergarten students eligible for free or reduced-price lunches that do not have a three-4.16 or four-star Parent Aware program within the district or close proximity of the district shall 4.17 receive the highest priority, and school sites with the lowest concentration of kindergarten 4.18 students eligible for free or reduced-price lunches that have a three- or four-star Parent 4.19 Aware rated program within the district or close proximity of the district shall receive the 4.20 lowest priority. 4.21

(d) The aid available limit on participation for the program as specified in subdivision 4.22 6, paragraph (b), must initially be allocated among the four five groups based on each group's 4 2 3 percentage share of the statewide kindergarten enrollment on October 1 of the previous 4.24 school year. Within each group, the available aid participation limit must first be allocated 4.25 to school sites approved for aid in the previous year to ensure that those sites are funded 4.26 for the same number of participants as approved for the previous year. The remainder of 4.27 the participation limit for each group must be allocated among school sites in priority order 4.28 until that region's share of the aid participation limit is reached. If the aid limit is not reached 4.29 for all groups, the remaining amount must be allocated to the highest priority school sites, 4.30 as designated under this section, not funded in the initial allocation on a statewide basis. 4.31

4.32 (e) Once a school site <u>or mixed-delivery site under subdivision 3</u> is approved for aid
4.33 under this subdivision, it shall remain eligible for aid if it continues to meet program
4.34 requirements, regardless of changes in the concentration of students eligible for free or
4.35 reduced-price lunches.

(f) If the total aid entitlement approved based on applications submitted under paragraph
(a) is less than the aid entitlement limit under subdivision 6, paragraph (b), the commissioner
must notify all school districts and charter schools of the amount that remains available
within 30 days of the initial application deadline under paragraph (a), and complete a second
round of allocations based on applications received within 60 days of the initial application
deadline.

125A.75 SPECIAL EDUCATION PROGRAMS; APPROVAL; AID PAYMENTS; TRAVEL AID; LITIGATION COSTS.

Subd. 7. Allocation from cooperative centers, service cooperatives, education districts, and intermediate districts. For purposes of this section, a special education cooperative, service cooperative, education district, or an intermediate district must allocate its approved expenditures for special education programs among participating districts. Special education aid for services provided by a cooperative, service cooperative, education district, or intermediate district must be paid to the participating school districts.

Subd. 2b. **Cross subsidy reduction aid.** For fiscal years 2014 and 2015, the cross subsidy reduction aid for a school district, not including a charter school, equals the lesser of (a) the product of the cross subsidy reduction aid limit and the district's average daily membership served or (b) the sum of the product of the cross subsidy reduction aid percentage, the district's average daily membership served, and the sum of:

(1) \$450; plus

(2) \$400 times the ratio of the sum of the number of pupils enrolled on October 1 who are eligible to receive free lunch plus one-half of the pupils enrolled on October 1 who are eligible to receive reduced-price lunch to the total October 1 enrollment; plus

(3) .008 times the district's average daily membership served; plus the product of the cross subsidy aid percentage and the sum of:

(i) \$10,100 times the December 1 child count for the primary disability areas of autism spectrum disorders, developmental delay, and severely multiply impaired; plus

(ii) \$17,500 times the December 1 child count for the primary disability areas of deaf and hard-of-hearing and emotional or behavioral disorders; plus

(iii) \$26,000 times the December 1 child count for the primary disability areas of developmentally cognitive mild-moderate, developmentally cognitive severe-profound, physically impaired, visually impaired, and deafblind.
