2.1	Subd. 3. Services. Eligible providers wishing to participate in the pilot must notify the
2.2	commissioner, on a form designated by the commissioner, of the intent to provide an eligible
2.3	student with one of the following services:
2.4	(1) comprehensive job preparation training that must provide an eligible student with at
2.5	least 20 hours in a classroom setting, resume preparation, and assistance in establishing a
2.6	bank account;
2.7	(2) job shadowing experiences where eligible students can observe at least 30 hours of
2.8	workplace activity for a job similar to one the eligible student might be hired for. Eligible
2.9	providers shall facilitate transportation to and from the workplace for the eligible student;
2.10	<u>and</u>
2.11	(3) employment placement services to match eligible students with appropriate
2.12	employment paying at least the minimum wage in an integrated community setting. Eligible
2.13	providers shall support such placements with training for the employer and the eligible
2.14	student, both before and after hiring, to foster success.
2.15	Subd. 4. Payments. Eligible providers may apply to the commissioner, on a form
2.16	designated by the commissioner, for the following payments:
2.17	(1) \$1,000 for each eligible student certified to have completed the services under
2.18	subdivision 3, clause (1);
2.19	(2) \$1,000 for each eligible student certified to have completed the services under
2.20	subdivision 3, clause (2); and
2.21	(3) \$3,000 for each eligible student certified to have completed 90 days of employment

Sec. 2. SPECIAL EDUCATION EMPLOYMENT PILOT PROJECT;

APPROPRIATION.

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(a) \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2020 and \$2,000,000 in fiscal year 2021 are appropriated
from the general fund to the commissioner of employment and economic development for
payments to eligible providers under the special education employment pilot project created
in section 1. Of these amounts, up to four percent may be used by the commissioner for
administration and monitoring of the program. This is a onetime appropriation and funds
are available until June 30, 2022.

(b) By January 15 in 2020, 2021, and 2022, the commissioner must submit a report to the chairs and ranking minority members of the committees of the house of representatives and senate having jurisdiction over workforce development that details the use of grant funds. This report must include data on the number of individuals served and, to the extent practical, measures of progress toward the goal of transitioning special education graduates into competitive wage employment in integrated community settings.
