1.8	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.9	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 245A.05, is amended to read:
1.10	245A.05 DENIAL OF APPLICATION.
1.11	(a) The commissioner may deny a license if an applicant or controlling individual:
1.12	(1) fails to submit a substantially complete application after receiving notice from the
1.13	commissioner under section 245A.04, subdivision 1;
1.14	(2) fails to comply with applicable laws or rules;
1.15	(3) knowingly withholds relevant information from or gives false or misleading
1.16	information to the commissioner in connection with an application for a license or during
1.17	an investigation;
1.18	(4) has a disqualification that has not been set aside under section 245C.22 and no
1.19	variance has been granted;
1.20	(5) has an individual living in the household who received a background study under
1.21	section 245C.03, subdivision 1, paragraph (a), clause (2), who has a disqualification that
1.22	has not been set aside under section 245C.22, and no variance has been granted;

(6) is associated with an individual who received a background study under section 2.1 245C.03, subdivision 1, paragraph (a), clause (6), who may have unsupervised access to 2.2 children or vulnerable adults, and who has a disqualification that has not been set aside 2.3 under section 245C.22, and no variance has been granted; 2.4 2.5 (7) fails to comply with section 245A.04, subdivision 1, paragraph (f) or (g); (8) fails to demonstrate competent knowledge as required by section 245A.04, subdivision 2.6 6; 2.7 (9) has a history of noncompliance as a license holder or controlling individual with 2.8 applicable laws or rules, including but not limited to this chapter and chapters 119B and 2.9 245C; or 2.10 (10) is prohibited from holding a license according to section 245.095-; or 2.11 (11) for a family foster setting, has nondisqualifying background study information, as 2.12 described in section 245C.05, subdivision 4, that reflects on the individual's ability to safely 2.13 provide care to foster children. 2.14 (b) An applicant whose application has been denied by the commissioner must be given 2.15 notice of the denial, which must state the reasons for the denial in plain language. Notice 2.16 must be given by certified mail or personal service. The notice must state the reasons the 2.17 application was denied and must inform the applicant of the right to a contested case hearing 2.18 under chapter 14 and Minnesota Rules, parts 1400.8505 to 1400.8612. The applicant may 2.19 appeal the denial by notifying the commissioner in writing by certified mail or personal 2.20 service. If mailed, the appeal must be postmarked and sent to the commissioner within 20 2.21

calendar days after the applicant received the notice of denial. If an appeal request is made
by personal service, it must be received by the commissioner within 20 calendar days after
the applicant received the notice of denial. Section 245A.08 applies to hearings held to
appeal the commissioner's denial of an application.

2.28 Subdivision 1. **Sanctions; appeals; license.** (a) In addition to making a license conditional 2.29 under section 245A.06, the commissioner may suspend or revoke the license, impose a fine, 2.30 or secure an injunction against the continuing operation of the program of a license holder 2.31 who does not comply with applicable law or rule, or who has nondisqualifying background 2.32 study information, as described in section 245C.05, subdivision 4, that reflects on the license 2.33 holder's ability to safely provide care to foster children. When applying sanctions authorized

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under this section, the commissioner shall consider the nature, chronicity, or severity of the
violation of law or rule and the effect of the violation on the health, safety, or rights of
persons served by the program.

(b) If a license holder appeals the suspension or revocation of a license and the license 3.4 holder continues to operate the program pending a final order on the appeal, the commissioner 3.5 shall issue the license holder a temporary provisional license. Unless otherwise specified 3.6 by the commissioner, variances in effect on the date of the license sanction under appeal 3.7 continue under the temporary provisional license. If a license holder fails to comply with 3.8 applicable law or rule while operating under a temporary provisional license, the 3.9 commissioner may impose additional sanctions under this section and section 245A.06, and 3.10 may terminate any prior variance. If a temporary provisional license is set to expire, a new 3.11 temporary provisional license shall be issued to the license holder upon payment of any fee 3.12 required under section 245A.10. The temporary provisional license shall expire on the date 3.13 the final order is issued. If the license holder prevails on the appeal, a new nonprovisional 3.14 license shall be issued for the remainder of the current license period. 3.15

3.16 (c) If a license holder is under investigation and the license issued under this chapter is
3.17 due to expire before completion of the investigation, the program shall be issued a new
3.18 license upon completion of the reapplication requirements and payment of any applicable
3.19 license fee. Upon completion of the investigation, a licensing sanction may be imposed
3.20 against the new license under this section, section 245A.06, or 245A.08.

3.21 (d) Failure to reapply or closure of a license issued under this chapter by the license
