Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 136A.87, is amended to read: 1.8 136A.87 PLANNING INFORMATION FOR POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION. 1.9 (a) The office shall make available to all residents beginning in 7th grade through 1.10 adulthood information about planning and preparing for postsecondary opportunities. 1.11 Information must be provided to all 7th grade students and their parents annually by 1 12 September 30 about planning for their postsecondary education. The office may also provide 1.13 information to high school students and their parents, to adults, and to out-of-school youth. 1.14 (b) The office shall gather and share information with students and parents about the 1.15 dual credit acceptance policies of each Minnesota public and private college and university. 1.16 The office shall gather and share information related to the acceptance policies for concurrent 1.17 enrollment courses, postsecondary enrollment options courses, advanced placement courses, 1.18 and international baccalaureate courses. This information must be shared on the office's 1.19 1.20 website and included in the information under paragraph (a).
