1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.6	Section 1. [260C.701] EMANCIPATION OF MINORS.
1.7	Subdivision 1. Application. A minor who has reached the age of 16 may petition the
1.8	juvenile court for emancipation in the county in which the minor resides.
1.9	Subd. 2. Petition. (a) A petition for emancipation must be filed with the court in the county in which the minor resides and contain:
1.11	(1) the petitioning minor's name, date of birth, and address and the name and date of
1.12	birth of any of the petitioner's minor children;
1.13	(2) the minor's parent's name, date of birth, and address, if known;
1.14	(3) the minor's legal guardian or custodian's name, date of birth, and address, if known;
1.15	(4) the basis for the emancipation;
1.16	(5) whether or not the minor's parent or legal custodian is in support of the emancipation;
1.17	<u>and</u>
1.18	(6) whether the minor is the subject of or a party to any pending judicial proceedings in
1.19	the state of Minnesota or any other jurisdiction.

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(	b) At the discretion of the court, the minor's current address may be classified as
conf	idential. The petition must be served as required in the Minnesota Rules of Juvenile
Prot	ection Procedure.

(	a) The court shall provide 30 days' notice regarding the petition to the minor's parent,
the 1	minor's legal guardian, the minor, and any other party to the action.
(	b) After a hearing on the petition, the court may enter an order declaring the minor
ema	ncipated if the court finds:
<u>(</u>	1) the minor does not object to the emancipation;
(	2) the emancipation is in the best interest of the child pursuant to section 260C.511;
(	3) the minor willingly lives separate and apart from the minor's parent or guardian with
the c	consent of the minor's parent or guardian;
<u>(</u>	4) the minor is managing the minor's financial affairs;
(	5) the minor has completed high school, is enrolled in and will continue to attend high
scho	ol, or is working toward a general education development diploma;
<u>(</u>	6) the minor has demonstrated to the court a complete understanding of the effects of
the e	emancipation; and
<u>(</u>	7) except where domestic abuse has occurred between a parent and the minor under
secti	on 518B.01, subdivision 2, paragraph (a), a custodial parent of the minor or a parent
who	has parenting time with the minor pursuant to a court order has not raised an objection
to th	e emancipation.

<u>S</u>	Subdivision 1. Order. (a) The order declaring the minor emancipated shall indicate that
the r	minor has the rights in paragraph (b).
(	b) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the court shall order the following in the
_	ncipation of a minor:
(	1) the minor may consent to medical care, dental care, psychiatric care, and contract
for h	health or dental insurance without the knowledge or consent of the minor's parent;

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	(2) the minor may manage the minor's own finances, open a bank account, and enter
ir	nto a binding contract, including a lease agreement or agreement for credit;
	(3) the minor may sue or be sued in the minor's own name;
	(4) the minor is entitled to the minor's own earnings and is free from control by the
p	arent or guardian;
	(5) the minor may apply for, and receive in the minor's own name, public assistance,
<u>S</u>	ocial Security benefits, or other aid and support;
	(6) the minor may establish the minor's own residence, including renting, leasing, or
<u>p</u>	urchasing real property;
	(7) the minor may not be the subject of a petition under this chapter or in violation of a
<u>jı</u>	evenile curfew ordinance enacted by a local government, except as indicated under
SI	ubdivision 2;
	(8) the minor may enroll in any school or college in the minor's own name and apply
fo	or financial aid without parental consent;
	(9) the minor may sign releases for the release of confidential information or health care
ir	nformation and obtain vital records, including a Minnesota birth certificate;
	(10) the minor may marry without parental, judicial, or other consent; and
	(11) the minor may enlist in the military without the parent's consent.
	(c) The court order must indicate that the parent is no longer the guardian of the minor
<u>a</u>	nd that the parent is relieved of the obligation (1) to support the minor, (2) to require school
a	ttendance, or (3) to be civilly liable for the minor's acts when those rights have been granted
to	o the emancipated minor.
	Subd. 2. Exceptions. An emancipated minor is not considered an adult for the following
p	urposes:
	(a) prosecution as an adult under criminal laws, except as provided in chapter 260B and
0	ther laws applicable to minors who are not emancipated;
	(b) criminal laws of the state when the minor is a victim and the age of the victim is an
<u>e</u>	lement of the offense; or
	(c) specific constitutional and statutory age requirements regarding voting, consumption
<u>a</u> :	nd purchase of alcoholic beverages, tobacco purchases, driving, possession of firearms,
g	ambling, and other health and safety regulations.

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	Subd. 3. Review hearings; termination. An emancipation granted pursuant to this
	section shall be reviewed by the court every six months. The jurisdiction of the court over
	the minor's emancipation shall terminate on the minor's 18th birthday.
	Sec. 4. [260C.704] EMANCIPATION OF MINORS; REVOCATION.
	At any time before the emancipated minor reaches 18 years of age, the emancipated
n	ninor or an interested third party may petition for a revocation of the emancipation, and
tl	he court shall revoke the emancipation order if the minor agrees to the revocation or if the
re	equirements of section 260C.702, paragraph (b), are no longer met.
	Sec. 5. [260C.705] EMANCIPATION OF MINORS; FORMS; CONSTRUCTION
	WITH OTHER LAWS.
	Subdivision 1. Forms. The state court administrator shall prepare and each court
2	administrator shall make available petition for emancipation forms.
	Subd. 2. Construction; other laws. Nothing in this section alters the rights of
ι	unemancipated minors that are granted under other laws.

	Subd. 5. Automatic termination of support. (a) Unless a court order provides otherwise,
έ	a child support obligation in a specific amount per child terminates automatically and without
Е	any action by the obligor to reduce, modify, or terminate the order upon the emancipation
(	of the child as provided under section 518A.26, subdivision 5, or 260C.701.
	(b) A child support obligation for two or more children that is not a support obligation
i	n a specific amount per child continues in the full amount until the emancipation of the last
(	child for whose benefit the order was made, or until further order of the court.
	(c) The obligor may request a modification of the obligor's child support order upon the
(	emancipation of a child if there are still minor children under the order. The child support
	obligation shall be determined based on the income of the parties at the time the modification
	is sought.
