policies, including but not limited to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Criminal

Justice Information Services security policy, the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension's Minnesota Justice Information Services Criminal Justice Data Communications Network

security policy, and any security policies adopted by a local unit of government that are

applicable to the agency. If an agency's automated license plate reader technology or data

infrastructure is determined to be out of compliance with any applicable security policy, the

agency's further use of automated license plate readers is prohibited until an independent,
