1.4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.5	Section 1. FAMILY, FRIEND, AND NEIGHBOR GRANT PROGRAM.
1.6	Subdivision 1. Establishment. (a) A family, friend, and neighbor (FFN) grant program
1.7	is established to promote children's social-emotional learning and healthy development,
1.8	early literacy, and school readiness and to foster community partnerships to promote
1.9	children's school readiness. The commissioner of health must make grants available to fund:
1.10	(1) community health boards, local or regional libraries, community-based organizations,
1.11	nonprofit organizations, and Indian tribes working with FFN caregivers under subdivision
1.12	<u>2; and</u>
1.13	(2) community-based partnerships to implement early literacy programs under subdivision
1.14	<u>3.</u>
1.15	(b) The commissioner must attempt to ensure that grants under subdivisions 2 and 3 are
1.16	made in all areas of the state.
1.17	Subd. 2. Grants to work with FFN caregivers. (a) Grants awarded by the commissioner
1.18	under this subdivision may be used by community health boards, local or regional libraries,
1.19	community-based organizations, nonprofit organizations, and Indian tribes working with
1.20	FFN caregivers in local communities, cultural communities, and Indian tribes to:
1.21	(1) provide training, support, and resources to FFN caregivers to improve and promote
1.22	children's health, safety, nutrition, and school readiness;

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2.1	(2) connect FFN correctivers and children's families with appropriate community resources
2.1	(2) connect FFN caregivers and children's families with appropriate community resources
2.2	that support the families' physical and mental health and economic and developmental needs;

2.12	(b) Grants that the commissioner awards under paragraph (a) may also be used for:
2.13	(1) social-emotional learning, health and safety, and early learning kits for FFN
2.14	caregivers;
2.15	(2) play and learn groups with FFN caregivers;
2.16	(3) culturally appropriate early childhood training for FFN caregivers;
2.17	(4) transportation for FFN caregivers and children's families for school readiness and
2.18	other early childhood training activities;
2.19	(5) other activities that promote school readiness;
2.20	(6) data collection and evaluation;
2.21	(7) staff outreach and outreach activities;
2.22	(8) translation needs; or
2.23	(9) administrative costs that equal up to five percent of the recipient's grant award.
2.24	Subd. 3. Grants for early literacy programs. Grants awarded by the commissioner
2.25	under this subdivision must be used to fund existing or new partnerships between community
2.26	health boards, local or regional library systems, community-based organizations, nonprofit
2.27	organizations, or Indian tribes to implement early literacy programs in low-income
2.28	communities, including tribal communities, to:
2.29	(1) purchase and equip early childhood reading mobiles and math mobiles that provide
2.30	FFN caregivers and children's families with books, training, and early literacy activities;
