1.6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.7	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 383B.158, subdivision 1, is amended to
1.8	read:
1.9	Subdivision 1. Definitions. (a) In sections 383B.158 to 383B.1585, the definitions
1.10	in this subdivision apply.
1.11	(b) "Best value" describes a result intended in acquiring design-build services. Best
1.12	value determination must include price and must measure a responder's qualifications,
1.13	experience, prior performance, and responses to technical and qualitative criteria.
1.14	(c) "County board" means the Hennepin County Board of Commissioners.
1.15	(d) "Design-build selection panel" means the individuals appointed by the county
1.16	to advise the county administrator and county board in preparing and conducting
1.17	the design-build selection process. At least three members of the committee must
1.18	be individuals who are not county employees, a minimum of two members must be
1.19	professionally licensed under chapter 326, and at least one must be or must have been a
1.20	commercial contractor. No committee member shall have personal financial interest in the
1.21	project or with any of the design-build proposals.
1.22	(e) "Design-build contract" means a single contract between the county and a
1.23	design-builder to furnish the architectural, or engineering, and related design services as
1.24	well as the labor, materials, supplies, equipment, and construction services for a project.

2.1 (f) "Design-build firm" means a proprietorship, partnership, limited liability
2.2 partnership, joint venture, corporation, or any type of limited liability company,
2.3 professional corporation, or any legal entity.

2.4 (g) "Design-builder" means the design-build firm that proposes to design and build a
2.5 project governed by the procedures of this section.

2.6 (h) "Design professional" means a person who holds or employs individuals who
2.7 hold a license under chapter 326 and who is required to be registered under Minnesota law.

(i) "Primary designer" means the designer who is to have primary design
responsibility for a project, and does not include designers who are merely consulted by
the county and do not have substantial design responsibility, or designers who will or may
be employed or consulted by the primary designer.

(j) "Project" means an undertaking for the county to design, construct, erect, or
 remodel a building or facility, or to design, construct, or reconstruct a county road, bridge,
 <u>or multimodal transportation facility</u> or other infrastructure relating to a county roadway
 or multimodal transportation.

2.16 (k) "Proposal" means an offer by a design-builder to enter into a design-build
2.17 contract for a project in response to a request for proposals, including a phase-one or
2.18 phase-two proposal.

(1) "Request for proposals" or "RFP" means the document or publication through
which the county solicits proposals from prequalified design-builders to design and
construct a design-build project.

2.22 (m) "Request for qualifications" or "RFQ" means a document to prequalify and2.23 short-list potential design-builders for a project.

- the county, a proposer who waived a stipulated fee may withdraw the waiver, in which 6.21

- Subd. 4. Low-bid design-build process. (a) The county board may also use 6.24 low-bid, design-build procedures to award a design-build contract where the scope of 6.25 the work can be clearly defined. 6.26
- (b) Low-bid design-build projects may require a request for qualifications (RFQ) 6.27 and short-listing, and must require a request for proposals (RFP). 6.28
- (c) Submitted proposals under this subdivision must include separately a technical 6.29 proposal and a price proposal. The low-bid, design-build procedures must follow a 6.30
- two-step process for review of the responses to the RFP as follows: 6.31

APPENDIX Repealed Minnesota Statutes: 13-0983

383B.1585 STIPULATED FEE.

The county board, depending on the project's complexity and scope and at the board's discretion for each project, may determine that a stipulated fee be paid to each short-listed responsible proposer who provides a responsive but unsuccessful proposal. If a stipulated fee is to be paid, it must be clearly identified in the RFQ or RFP. If the county board does not award a contract, all short-listed proposers must receive the stipulated fee. If the county board cancels the contract before reviewing the technical proposals, the county board shall award each design-builder on the short list a stipulated minimum fee as set out in the RFP. The county board shall pay the stipulated fee to each proposer within 90 days after the award of the contract or the decision not to award a contract. In consideration for paying the stipulated fee, the county board may use any ideas or information contained in the proposals in connection with any contract awarded for the project or in connection with a subsequent procurement, without any obligation to pay any additional compensation to the unsuccessful proposers. Notwithstanding the other provisions of this subdivision, an unsuccessful short-list proposer may elect to waive the stipulated fee. If an unsuccessful short-list proposer elects to waive the stipulated fee, the county may not use ideas and information contained in that proposer's proposal. Upon the request of the county, a proposer who waived a stipulated fee may withdraw the waiver, in which case the county board shall pay the stipulated fee to the proposer and thereafter may use ideas and information in the proposer's proposal.
