The council, in consultation with the Minnesota 5.4 Board on Aging, shall work to inventory and identify metrics for an all-state-agencies 5.5 dashboard of age-friendly policies and practices that are being utilized across state 5.6 government agencies. The dashboard may be used to assess current programs and policies 5.7 and to inform state agencies' progress toward an age-friendly Minnesota. 5.8 Subd. 9. Central inventory of reports and analyses on aging.
