The Minnesota Turf Seed Council 3.7 must prepare a report outlining the use of the 3.8 grant money and related accomplishments. No 3.9 later than January 15, 2025, the council must 3.10 submit the report to the chairs and ranking 3.11 minority members of the legislative 3.12 committees and divisions with jurisdiction 3.13 over agriculture finance and policy. This is a 3.14 onetime appropriation. 3.15 (i) \$100,000 the first year and \$100,000 the 3.16 second year are for grants to GreenSeam for 3.17 assistance to agriculture-related businesses to 3.18 support business retention and development, 3.19 business attraction and creation, talent 3.20 development and attraction, and regional 3 21 branding and promotion. These are onetime 3.22 appropriations. (1) \$300,000 the first year and \$300,000 the 6.1 second year are for grants to The Good Acre 6.2 for the Local Emergency Assistance Farmer 6.3 Fund (LEAFF) program to compensate 6.4 emerging farmers for crops donated to hunger 6.5 relief organizations in Minnesota. This is a 6.6 onetime appropriation. 6.7 6.8 (m) \$750,000 the first year and \$750,000 the second year are to expand the Emerging 6.9 Farmers Office and provide services to 6.10 beginning and emerging farmers to increase 6.11 connections between farmers and market 6.12 opportunities throughout the state. This 6.13 appropriation may be used for grants, 6.14 translation services, training programs, or 6.15 other purposes in line with the 6.16 recommendations of the Emerging Farmer 6.17 Working Group established under Minnesota 6.18 Statutes, section 17.055, subdivision 1. The 6.19 base for this appropriation is \$1,000,000 in 6.20 fiscal year 2026 and each year thereafter. 6.21 (n) \$50,000 the first year is to provide 6.22 technical assistance and leadership in the 6.23 development of a comprehensive and 6.24 well-documented state aquaculture plan. The 6.25 commissioner must provide the state 6.26 aquaculture plan to the legislative committees 6.27 with jurisdiction over agriculture finance and 6.28 6.29 policy by February 15, 2025. (o) \$337,000 the first year and \$337,000 the 6.30 second year are for farm advocate services. 6.31 Of these amounts, \$50,000 the first year and 6.32 \$50,000 the second year are for the 6.33 continuation of the farmland transition 6.34 programs and may be used for grants to 6.35

farmland access teams to provide technical 7.1 assistance to potential beginning farmers. 7.2 Farmland access teams must assist existing 7.3 farmers and beginning farmers with 7.4 transitioning farm ownership and farm 7 5 operation. Services provided by teams may 7.6 include but are not limited to mediation 7.7 7.8 assistance, designing contracts, financial planning, tax preparation, estate planning, and 7.9 housing assistance. 7.10 (p) \$260,000 the first year and \$260,000 the 7.11 second year are for a pass-through grant to 7.12 Region Five Development Commission to 7.13 provide, in collaboration with Farm Business 7.14 Management, statewide mental health 7.15 counseling support to Minnesota farm 7.16 operators, families, and employees, and 7.17 individuals who work with Minnesota farmers 7.18 in a professional capacity. Region Five 7.19 Development Commission may use up to 6.5 7.20 percent of the grant awarded under this 7.21 paragraph for administration. 7.22 (q) \$1,000,000 the first year is for transfer to 7.23 the agricultural emergency account established 7.24 under Minnesota Statutes, section 17.041. 7 25 (r) \$1,084,000 the first year and \$500,000 the 7.26 second year are to support IT modernization 7.27 efforts, including laying the technology 7.28 7.29 foundations needed for improving customer interactions with the department for licensing 7.30 and payments. This is a onetime appropriation. 7.31 (s) \$275,000 the first year is for technical 7.32 assistance grants to certified community 7.33 development financial institutions that 7.34 participate in United States Department of 7.35

8.25	(v) The base in fiscal years 2026 and 2027 is
8.26	\$150,000 each year to coordinate
8.27	climate-related activities and services within
8.28	the Department of Agriculture and
8.29	counterparts in local, state, and federal
8.30	agencies and to hire a full-time climate
8.31	implementation coordinator. The climate
8.32	implementation coordinator must coordinate
8.33	efforts seeking federal funding for Minnesota's
8.34	agricultural climate adaptation and mitigation
8.35	efforts and develop strategic partnerships with
