(a) \$500,000 in fiscal year 2016 and \$500,000 in fiscal year 2017 are appropriated 2.18 from the general fund to the commissioner of human services to fund special projects to 2.19 2.20 provide intensive treatment and supports to adolescents and young adults 26 years of age or younger who are experiencing their first psychotic or manic episode.
