7 6301.0100 DEFINITIONS.

8 Subpart 1. to 14. [Unchanged.]

9 Subp. 15. **Nursing personnel.** "Nursing personnel" means  
10 those nurses and nursing assistants, exclusive of nursing  
11 students, who provide care to patients. An exception to this  
12 definition is permitted in part 6301.1900, subparts 6, 7, and 8  
13 when complying with parts 6301.2000 and 6301.2100.

14 Subp. 16. to 23. [Unchanged.]

16 REGISTRATION OF PROFESSIONAL AND PRACTICAL NURSES

17 6310.2600 DEFINITIONS.

18 Subpart 1. **Acceptable continuing education activity.**

19 "Acceptable continuing education activity" means a learning  
20 experience in which a professional nurse has participated,  
21 evidence of which the nurse submits to the board as part of the  
22 application for registration renewal, and which meets the  
23 requirements in parts 6310.2600 to 6310.2900.

24 Subp. 2. **Board.** "Board" means the Minnesota Board of  
25 Nursing.

26 Subp. 3. **Contact hour.** "Contact hour" means 50  
27 consecutive minutes, except in reference to the class period of  
28 an educational institution. Class periods of no less than 45  
29 minutes will be accepted as a contact hour.

30 Subp. 4. **Continuing education participation period.**

31 "Continuing education participation period" means the 24-month  
32 interval of time immediately before the registration renewal  
33 deadline during which a professional nurse must fulfill the  
34 requirements for registration renewal. The length may vary for  
35 a nurse's first registration period or reregistration period.

1 Subp. 5. **Continuing education evidence form.** "Continuing  
2 education evidence form" means the printed document provided by  
3 the board for use in reporting the information required in parts  
4 6310.2800 to 6310.2900.

5 Subp. 6. **Instructor.** "Instructor" means a presenter,  
6 preparer, or guide for a continuing education activity. Written  
7 programmed instruction comes within this definition.

8 Subp. 6a. **Late application fee.** "Late application fee"  
9 means penalty fee as authorized in Minnesota Statutes, sections  
10 148.231, subdivision 1 and 148.294, subdivision 1.

11 Subp. 7. **License.** "License" means the document issued by  
12 the board to an individual who meets for the first time the  
13 requirements to practice professional or practical nursing in  
14 Minnesota.

15 Subp. 7a. **Licensee.** "Licensee" means either a  
16 professional or practical nurse who has been granted a license  
17 to practice professional or practical nursing by the board.

18 Subp. 8. **Licensure.** "Licensure" means the process by  
19 which the board confers legal authority upon an individual  
20 authorizing the person to engage in professional or practical  
21 nursing, thereby certifying that those licensed have attained  
22 the minimal degree of competency necessary to ensure that the  
23 public health, safety, and welfare will be reasonably well  
24 protected.

25 Subp. 8a. **Mental health.** "Mental health" means an  
26 individual's emotional or intellectual ability to adapt to a  
27 changing environment.

28 Subp. 8b. **Moral character.** "Moral character" means the  
29 individual's ability to distinguish between right and wrong and  
30 act accordingly.

31 Subp. 8c. **Nursing ability.** "Nursing ability" means the  
32 mental and physical capacity and skill necessary to perform  
33 nursing actions.

34 Subp. 9. **Participation.** "Participation" means attendance  
35 at or in any other manner taking part in an acceptable  
36 continuing education activity, documentation of which is

1 submitted as a part of the application for professional nurse  
2 registration renewal.

3 Subp. 9a. **Practical Nurse.** "Practical nurse" means a  
4 person authorized by the board to engage in the practice of  
5 practical nursing as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section  
6 148.29, subdivision 4.

7 Subp. 9b. **Professional nurse.** "Professional nurse" means  
8 a person authorized by the board to engage in the practice of  
9 professional nursing as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section  
10 148.171, paragraph (3).

11 Subp. 10. **Registration.** "Registration" means the process  
12 by which the names and original license numbers of individuals  
13 licensed by the board are listed as individuals authorized to  
14 engage in professional or practical nursing during a  
15 registration period.

16 Subp. 11. **Registration renewal.** "Registration renewal"  
17 means the periodic process whereby an individual who is licensed  
18 and registered with the board requests and obtains registration  
19 for the next registration period.

20 Subp. 12. **Registration renewal deadline.** "Registration  
21 renewal deadline" means the last day of the month immediately  
22 preceding the month in which the licensee's registration expires.

23 Subp. 13. **Registration certificate.** "Registration  
24 certificate" means the document issued periodically by the board  
25 to a professional nurse or a practical nurse who meets  
26 registration requirements.

27 Subp. 14. **Registration expiration date.** "Registration  
28 expiration date" means the last calendar day of a registration  
29 period.

30 Subp. 15. **Registration period.** "Registration period"  
31 means a 24-month interval of time for which a registration  
32 certificate is issued. The period begins the date the  
33 registration certificate is issued and ends the last day of the  
34 licensee's month of birth in an even- or odd-numbered year  
35 according to licensee's year of birth. The length may vary for  
36 a nurse's first registration period or reregistration period.

1 Subp. 16. **Reregistration.** "Reregistration" means the  
2 process whereby a licensee regains the authority to practice  
3 professional or practical nursing after one or more days without  
4 current registration.

5 6310.2700 PURPOSE.

6 Parts 6310.2600 to 6310.3100 establish requirements and  
7 procedures for registration for professional nurses and  
8 practical nurses and criteria which continuing education  
9 activities must meet to be acceptable for registration renewal  
10 for professional nurses. Parts 6310.3300 to 6310.3700 establish  
11 requirements and procedures for change of name and address,  
12 duplicate and replacement documents, and verification of  
13 Minnesota license.

14 6310.2800 REGISTRATION RENEWAL REQUIREMENTS.

15 Subpart 1. **Requirement.** Each licensee is responsible for  
16 applying for renewal of registration if the person wishes to be  
17 authorized to practice as a professional or practical nurse in  
18 Minnesota.

19 Licensees are required to complete a registration renewal  
20 application and pay a renewal fee. In addition, professional  
21 nurses are required to accrue 30 contact hours of acceptable  
22 continuing education activities for registration renewal on  
23 August 1, 1982, and thereafter. Contact hours shall be accrued  
24 during a 24-month continuing education participation period  
25 ending one month before the professional nurse's registration  
26 expiration date. The number of contact hours and length of  
27 participation period may vary for a professional nurse's first  
28 registration renewal following licensure or reregistration in  
29 accordance with part 6310.2900, subpart 6.

30 Subp. 2. **Demonstration of professional nursing skill.** At  
31 least one of the acceptable continuing education activities  
32 required for registration renewal on or after August 1, 1986,  
33 shall require the professional nurse to show evidence of having  
34 successfully demonstrated to the instructor skill in performing  
35 one or a portion of a professional nursing function as indicated

1 in Minnesota Statutes, section 148.171, paragraph (3).

2 Subp. 3. [See Repealer.]

3 Subp. 4. **Application submission.** Licensed practical  
4 nurses and registered nurses shall submit a completed, signed  
5 application for registration renewal and a renewal fee to the  
6 board office. Renewal applications from professional nurses  
7 must be accompanied by a completed continuing education evidence  
8 form meeting the requirements of parts 6310.2800 and 6310.2900.  
9 Renewal applications, fees, and continuing education forms must  
10 be received in the board office in the month preceding the month  
11 in which the applicant's registration expires. Resubmission of  
12 a previously incomplete or incorrect application form and  
13 renewal fee received before the month in which the licensee's  
14 registration expires, shall constitute timely submission if  
15 received in the board office on or before the licensee's  
16 registration expiration date.

17 In 1988 and 1989 a registration renewal application and a  
18 renewal fee from a professional nurse who held current  
19 registration on July 31, 1987, shall be received in the board  
20 office on or before May 31 in the year in which the nurse's  
21 registration expires. Resubmission of a previously incomplete  
22 or incorrect application and renewal fee received on or before  
23 May 31 in the year in which the nurse's registration expires,  
24 shall constitute timely submission if received in the board  
25 office on or before July 31 of that year.

26 Subp. 5. **Late application fee.** A licensee filing for  
27 registration renewal shall pay a late application fee, as well  
28 as the renewal fee for the current renewal period if the  
29 application or renewal fee is received in the board office  
30 during the month in which the licensee's registration expires.

31 In 1988 and 1989 a registration renewal application  
32 received from a professional nurse who held current registration  
33 on July 31, 1987, shall incur a late application fee if the  
34 application or renewal fee is received in the board office  
35 during June or July in the year in which the nurse's  
36 registration expires.

1 Subp. 6. **Acceptable continuing education activity.** In  
2 order for a continuing education activity to be acceptable to  
3 the board for registration renewal, a professional nurse shall  
4 be able to substantiate that each of the criteria listed below  
5 has been met.

6 A. The content is related to one or more of the  
7 following components of professional nursing specified in  
8 Minnesota Statutes, section 148.171, paragraph (3):

9 (1) independent nursing functions as listed below:

10 (a) providing a nursing assessment of the  
11 actual or potential health needs of individuals, families, or  
12 communities;

13 (b) providing nursing care supportive to or  
14 restorative of life by functions such as: skilled ministrations  
15 of nursing care, supervising nursing personnel, teaching nursing  
16 personnel, health teaching, health counseling, case finding,  
17 referral to other health resources; and

18 (c) evaluating nursing functions; or

19 (2) delegated medical functions.

20 B. The duration of the activity was at least one  
21 contact hour.

22 C. The objectives were written in measurable terms  
23 which describe what a licensee can expect to learn.

24 D. The instructor's qualification in the subject,  
25 such as education and experience, shall be stated in written  
26 form.

27 E. The method to be utilized by the learner to  
28 determine whether or not learning occurred was in written form.  
29 Acceptable methods may include but need not be limited to  
30 self-evaluation check lists or tests.

31 F. The continuing education activity was completed  
32 during the continuing education participation period immediately  
33 preceding the registration period for which the professional  
34 nurse is seeking registration renewal.

35 G. Credit shall not be granted for identical  
36 continuing education activities submitted during any single

1 continuing education participation period.

2 H. A written statement of participation provided by  
3 the instructor or a designee following completion of each  
4 acceptable continuing education activity was obtained. A fee  
5 receipt shall not be acceptable.

6 I. A grade indicating successful completion was  
7 obtained in an acceptable continuing education activity for  
8 which grades are granted.

9 J. A continuing education activity which the  
10 professional nurse taught shall not meet that licensee's  
11 registration renewal requirements.

12 K. The continuing education activity or the provider  
13 of the activity was approved by another board of nursing,  
14 another Minnesota health-related licensing board as defined by  
15 Minnesota Statutes, section 214.01, subdivision 2, or a  
16 national, regional, or state nursing, medical, or allied health  
17 organization and the activity meets at least the criteria in  
18 items B, F, G, H, and J.

19 L. A professional nurse holding a current advanced  
20 nursing practice certificate that was based upon the meeting of  
21 periodic continuing education or other current competency  
22 recertification requirements may substitute evidence of that  
23 certification for a report of participation in continuing  
24 education activities. The certificate shall have been issued by  
25 a national nursing or medical organization such as the American  
26 Nurses Association, American College of Nurse Midwives, the  
27 Council on Recertification of Nurse Anesthetists, or the Nurse  
28 Association of the American College of Obstetricians and  
29 Gynecologists.

30 The advanced nursing practice certificate may not be  
31 substituted for any previously deferred contact hours.

32 Subp. 7. **True information.** A licensee shall submit true  
33 information. Falsification of any evidence for any registration  
34 period or failure to comply with parts 6310.2800 and 6310.2900  
35 for any two registration periods shall constitute unethical  
36 conduct and provide grounds for suspension or revocation of a

1 license.

2 Subp. 8. **Records retention.** A professional nurse shall  
3 keep records documenting each acceptable continuing education  
4 activity submitted to meet registration renewal requirements and  
5 obtain data from the acceptable continuing education activity as  
6 required in part 6310.2900, subpart 7. The records shall be  
7 kept for two years after the continuing education activities are  
8 reported to the board on the continuing education evidence form.

9 6310.2900 REGISTRATION RENEWAL PROCEDURES.

10 Subpart 1. **Service.** The licensee shall maintain with the  
11 board a correct mailing address for the purpose of receiving  
12 board communications or notices. Placing the registration  
13 renewal application in first class United States mail, postage  
14 prepaid and addressed to the licensee at the nurse's last known  
15 address shall constitute valid service.

16 Subp. 2. **Application mailing date.** The board shall mail a  
17 registration renewal application at least three full calendar  
18 months before a licensee's registration expiration date to the  
19 last known address of every licensee holding a current renewal  
20 certificate. Failure to receive the notice shall not relieve a  
21 license holder of the obligation to comply with parts 6310.2800  
22 and 6310.2900. In 1988 and 1989 registration renewal  
23 applications will be mailed by April 1 to professional nurses  
24 who held current registration on July 31, 1987.

25 Subp. 3. **Late submission.** An application and renewal fee  
26 received in the board office during the month in which the  
27 licensee's registration expires, shall not be processed and  
28 shall be returned to a licensee for payment of a late  
29 application fee. In 1988 and 1989 a registration renewal  
30 application from a professional nurse who held current  
31 registration on July 31, 1987, which was received in the board  
32 office during June or July of the year in which the nurse's  
33 registration expires shall not be processed and shall be  
34 returned to the nurse for payment of a late application fee.

35 A renewal application and fee received one or more days



1 after the licensee's registration expiration date shall be  
2 returned with an application for reregistration. The board will  
3 nullify incomplete registration renewal applications that are  
4 not completed by within 30 days following notification of the  
5 deficiency or the licensees' registration expiration dates,  
6 whichever is later. For a nullified application, the fee shall  
7 be forfeited and the application and other documents may be  
8 destroyed according to the process provided in Minnesota  
9 Statutes, section 138.17, subdivision 7.

10 Subp. 4. **Continuing education evidence form.** For  
11 professional nurses, the registration renewal application shall  
12 include a continuing education evidence form. Information to be  
13 provided by the professional nurse on an evidence form shall  
14 include:

- 15 A. identification of the professional nurse;  
16 B. identification of the continuing education  
17 activities;  
18 C. verification that the continuing education  
19 activities met all the criteria in part 6310.2800 and that the  
20 information contained on the form is true in every respect; and  
21 D. the professional nurse's signature and date signed.

22 Subp. 5. **Incomplete application; notice.** If the  
23 application form or renewal fee submitted by a licensee is  
24 incomplete, incorrect, or in noncompliance with parts 6310.2800  
25 and 6310.2900, the licensee shall within 30 calendar days after  
26 receipt by the board be notified of the deficiency and given  
27 instructions for completion or correction. The application,  
28 fee, and other documents will be retained by the board whenever  
29 possible.

30 Subp. 6. **Initial registration and first registration**  
31 **renewal.** An individual who is issued a license by the board  
32 shall also be registered by the board. The license fee shall  
33 serve as payment for the initial registration period.

34 Effective August 1, 1987, and thereafter, the initial  
35 registration period following licensure or reregistration is  
36 from six to 29 full calendar months ending the last day of the

1 licensee's month of birth in an even-numbered year if the year  
2 of birth was an even-numbered year or in an odd-numbered year if  
3 the year of birth was an odd-numbered year.

4 A licensee who does not supply a month, day, and year of  
5 birth upon a second request from the board shall be assigned a  
6 month and year for registration purposes.

7 A licensee may correct the date of birth stated on the  
8 renewal application. The board may require a licensee who  
9 wishes to correct the date of birth on file with the board to  
10 substantiate the date with official documentation.

11 Professional nurses shall accrue for the first registration  
12 renewal following licensure and reregistration the number of  
13 contact hours of acceptable continuing education activities  
14 equivalent to the number of full months in their initial  
15 registration period. The contact hours shall include at least  
16 one successful demonstration of skill in performing a portion of  
17 a component of professional nursing. The continuing education  
18 participation period begins on the date the license was issued  
19 or reregistration was completed and extends through the month  
20 immediately preceding the month in which initial registration  
21 expires.

22 Subp. 6a. **Conversion period.** Licensees holding  
23 registration certificates with an expiration date unrelated to  
24 their month of birth will be registered in the following manner  
25 during a conversion period.

26 A. All licensees who hold current registration on  
27 July 31, 1987, and who renew that registration under parts  
28 6310.2800 and 6310.2900 will be assigned a conversion  
29 registration period no shorter than six months and no longer  
30 than 29 months ending on the last day of the month of birth in  
31 an even- or odd-numbered year, according to their year of birth.

32 B. Licensees will be charged a renewal fee for the  
33 six- to 29-month conversion registration period which is  
34 prorated at \$0.835 a month and rounded to the nearest dollar  
35 according to the length of each licensee's conversion  
36 registration period.

1 C. Professional nurses shall accrue the number of  
2 contact hours of acceptable continuing education activities  
3 equivalent to the number of months in their conversion  
4 registration period. The contact hours shall include at least  
5 one demonstration of skill. The contact hours shall be added to  
6 the 30 contact hours required for their next full 24-month  
7 registration period.

8 The total number of contact hours including two  
9 demonstrations of skill must be accrued between the last day of  
10 the professional nurse's most recent participation period and  
11 the first day of the month in which the nurse's next 24-month  
12 registration period expires.

13 D. A professional nurse who lacks sufficient contact  
14 hours upon application for registration renewal during the  
15 conversion period shall have the number of contact hours lacking  
16 added to the contact hours required for the next full 24-month  
17 registration period.

18 Subp. 7. **Substantiation of continuing education activities.**  
19 Following each renewal date the board may select a sample of  
20 professional nurses applying for registration renewal and  
21 require substantiation of participation in acceptable continuing  
22 education activities. Selected professional nurses shall submit  
23 in writing the following data obtained from the provider of each  
24 continuing education activity which verifies the information on  
25 the evidence form:

26 A. Objective or objectives of each continuing  
27 education activity, if required.

28 B. Verification received by the professional nurse of  
29 the number of contact hours and, for activities lasting four or  
30 more hours, a schedule listing time periods.

31 C. Documentation of each instructor's qualifications,  
32 such as education and experience, if required.

33 D. Evidence that the professional nurse used the  
34 mechanism which was provided to determine if learning occurred.  
35 Acceptable methods may include but need not be limited to  
36 self-evaluation checklists or tests, if required.

1 E. Written verification received by the professional  
2 nurse of participation in each continuing education activity  
3 provided by an instructor involved with the continuing education  
4 activity or a designee.

5 F. The specific professional nursing content area to  
6 which each continuing education activity is related, if required.

7 G. In 1986 and thereafter, proof of compliance with  
8 part 6310.2800, subpart 2.

9 H. For continuing education activities meeting part  
10 6310.2800, subpart 6, item L, a copy of the certificate may be  
11 required and considered sufficient.

12 I. Any additional documentation the board deems  
13 necessary.

14 Subp. 8. **Insufficient hours.** If a professional nurse  
15 cannot demonstrate sufficient hours of acceptable continuing  
16 education activities, the number of hours lacking to comply for  
17 that continuing education participation period shall be added to  
18 the contact hours required in the immediately succeeding  
19 period. This part may be applied once for any one professional  
20 nurse.

21 Subp. 9. **Substantiation after deferment.** A professional  
22 nurse who defers a number of hours of continuing education to  
23 the immediately succeeding period pursuant to subpart 8 shall be  
24 required to submit with the next renewal application  
25 substantiation of participation in continuing education  
26 activities that provided the number of contact hours required  
27 for that participation period as well as the number of contact  
28 hours which were deferred from the previous participation period.

29 Subp. 10. **Noncompliance; audit.** A professional nurse in  
30 noncompliance with part 6310.2800, subparts 1, 2, and 6, shall  
31 be subject to the conditions in subpart 7. By this rule an  
32 audit shall be automatic for a nurse who has been found in an  
33 audit of the immediately preceding continuing education  
34 participation period to be in noncompliance with the rules.

35 6310.3100 REREGISTRATION.

1           Subpart 1. **Removal of name from list.** The names of  
2 licensees who do not return the complete renewal application,  
3 renewal fees, and late application fees by the registration  
4 expiration date shall be removed from the list of individuals  
5 authorized to practice professional or practical nursing during  
6 the current renewal period.

7           Subp. 2. **Reregistration requirements.** A licensee who  
8 applies for reregistration shall:

9           A. submit a completed and signed reregistration  
10 application;

11           B. respond to questions on the application that  
12 relate to causes for denial or revocation of licensure listed in  
13 Minnesota Statutes, section 148.261 for professional nurses and  
14 section 148.297 for practical nurses;

15           C. pay the registration renewal fee for the current  
16 period;

17           D. pay the late application fee if registration  
18 expired within the last two years unless the licensee submitted  
19 evidence of an incomplete or incorrect renewal application  
20 before the registration renewal deadline; and

21           E. submit evidence of meeting all relevant  
22 requirements specified in subparts 2a to 8.

23           Subp. 2a. **Continuing education.** A professional nurse must  
24 submit evidence of meeting all requirements specified in parts  
25 6310.2800 and 6310.2900. Participation in continuing education  
26 activities must have occurred during the 24 months immediately  
27 before board action on the application for reregistration.  
28 Beginning April 1, 1988, and thereafter, this requirement  
29 applies only to professional nurses whose registration expired  
30 within the two years immediately preceding application for  
31 reregistration.

32           Subp. 3. **Substitute for continuing education.** A  
33 professional nurse who has been employed as a professional nurse  
34 in another state or country or in a federal facility located in  
35 Minnesota for a period of two years or more immediately  
36 preceding application for reregistration may substitute

1 satisfactory employment references which encompass the entire  
2 employment period in lieu of the continuing education report.

3 Subp. 4. Requirements if not registered for five years or  
4 more. The licensed practical nurse whose name has not been on  
5 the registration list for five years or more must present  
6 evidence of competency in nursing before becoming reregistered.  
7 The evidence may include any of the following which occurred  
8 within the five-year period before board action on the  
9 application for a current registration certificate:

10 A. employment as a licensed practical nurse in  
11 another United States jurisdiction or foreign country;

12 B. completion of no less than one week of a refresher  
13 course;

14 C. attendance at no less than 15 clock hours of  
15 nursing-related educational offerings; or

16 D. participation in an orientation program at least  
17 one week in length conducted by an employer or potential  
18 employer; and

19 E. such other evidence as the board may reasonably  
20 require.

21 Subp. 5. Evidence of moral character and mental health. A  
22 licensee shall verify on the application that the licensee is of  
23 good moral character and in good mental health. The board may  
24 require further evidence of a licensee's character or mental  
25 health if the board has information satisfying one of the  
26 following conditions:

27 A. implying a violation of a federal, state, or local  
28 law or rule;

29 B. constituting grounds for denial or revocation of a  
30 license, if true;

31 C. implying that the licensee provided inaccurate  
32 information or omitted information solicited on the licensure,  
33 examination, registration renewal, or reregistration  
34 applications;

35 D. showing that the applicant was discharged from  
36 employment;

1 E. showing that disciplinary action was taken or is  
2 pending or the licensee is under investigation by another nurse  
3 licensing agency; or

4 F. implying that the licensee is mentally incompetent  
5 or mentally ill.

6 When denying an application for reregistration on the  
7 grounds of evidence obtained for purposes of this subpart, the  
8 board shall follow procedures established by Minnesota Statutes,  
9 section 214.10 and applicable rules.

10 Subp. 6. **Acceptable practice requirement.** Beginning April  
11 1, 1988, and thereafter, a licensee without current registration  
12 who is applying for reregistration must submit proof of at least  
13 320 hours of acceptable nursing practice in the four years  
14 immediately preceding receipt of the application for  
15 reregistration or meet the requirement in subpart 7. To be  
16 acceptable the practice must have:

17 A. consisted of employment or volunteer nursing in  
18 any setting, or participation in clinical nursing courses or any  
19 combination of these activities;

20 B. occurred only while the licensee was authorized to  
21 practice nursing unless legal authorization for the practice was  
22 not required in the jurisdiction where it occurred; or

23 C. included one or more of the functions defined in  
24 Minnesota Statutes, section 148.171, paragraph (3) for  
25 professional nurses or Minnesota Statutes, section 148.29,  
26 subdivision 4 for practical nurses, or be ~~identified~~ determined  
27 by the patient, employer, volunteer supervisor, patient's family  
28 or physician, ~~or~~ instructor, or peer as requiring the  
29 appropriate nursing license.

30 Subp. 7. **Refresher course requirement.** Beginning April 1,  
31 1988, and thereafter, licensees without current registration who  
32 do not demonstrate compliance with the acceptable practice  
33 requirement in subpart 6 must submit an affidavit of successful  
34 completion of a refresher course which occurred within the 24  
35 months immediately preceding board action on the application for  
36 reregistration. The affidavit must be signed by the person

1 responsible for the course, hereinafter, coordinator.

2 The refresher course must have been designed to meet the  
3 following criteria:

4 A. The coordinator must be a registered nurse.

5 B. The course must include theory and clinical  
6 experience components. The theory component may be conducted in  
7 a classroom or through self-study learning materials. The  
8 clinical experience may be arranged by the coordinator or by the  
9 student with the coordinator's approval.

10 C. Determination that a professional nurse or  
11 practical nurse student has successfully completed the course  
12 must include at least one evaluation of the student's ability to  
13 combine nursing abilities as outlined in part 6301.2200. The  
14 refresher course student's evaluation of combining nursing  
15 categories must include at least one ability from each subpart  
16 of part 6301.1800 and, in addition, for professional nurse  
17 students from each subpart of part 6301.1900. Whenever clinical  
18 experience has been arranged by the student, the coordinator  
19 shall be responsible for the evaluation preparation and for  
20 directing the conduct of the evaluation.

21 Subp. 8. **Limited registration certificate.** A licensee  
22 presenting an affidavit of enrollment in a refresher course will  
23 upon written request and submission of a reregistration  
24 application and fee be provided a registration certificate valid  
25 only for participation in the clinical experience component of  
26 the refresher course and no longer than 90 days. The affidavit  
27 must be signed by the refresher course coordinator.

28 Subp. 9. **Waiver.** When a licensee residing outside of  
29 Minnesota applies for reregistration for the purpose of  
30 obtaining verification of current registration status to another  
31 country or United States jurisdiction, the requirements in  
32 subpart 7 shall be waived.

33 Subp. 10. **Refresher course audit.** A licensee meeting the  
34 refresher course requirement may be selected for audit to  
35 determine that the course met the criteria in subpart 7 and that  
36 all application materials were accurate.



1 Subp. 11. Nullification and reapplication. The board will  
2 nullify incomplete reregistration applications that are not  
3 completed within the six-month period following receipt of fees  
4 or within the six-month period following issuance of a  
5 registration certificate for practice in a clinical component of  
6 a refresher course.

7 For a nullified application, the fee shall be forfeited and  
8 the application and other documents may be destroyed according  
9 to the process specified in Minnesota Statutes, section 138.17,  
10 subdivision 7. If a licensee fails to submit an application and  
11 fee within six months after the board received any other  
12 documents relating to the application, the board may destroy the  
13 documents.

14 If a licensee whose application has been nullified wants to  
15 be reregistered, a new reregistration application must be  
16 submitted and all applicable reregistration requirements must be  
17 met.
