6 WASTE EDUCATION GRANT PROGRAMS

7 9210.1000 SCOPE AND AUTHORITY.

8 Parts 9210.1010 to 9210.1060 implement the waste education grant programs created and described in Minnesota Statutes, 9 section 115A.072, by establishing the substantive criteria and 10 procedural conditions under which the director may award grants 11 for waste education information projects and for waste education 12 facilities projects. Parts 9210.1020 to 9210.1040 establish 13 14 conditions applicable to all grants under parts 9210.1000 to 9210.1060. Part 9210.1050 establishes conditions specific to 15 16 waste education information projects. Part 9210.1060 establishes conditions specific to waste education facilities 17 18 grants.

19 9210.1010 DEFINITIONS.

Subpart 1. Scope. The terms defined in this part apply to parts 9210.1000 to 9210.1060. For terms not defined in this part, the definitions in Minnesota Statutes, section 115A.03, apply, unless the context requires otherwise.

Subp. 2. Director. "Director" means the director of theOffice of Waste Management.

Subp. 3. Formal or informal education facility. "Formal or informal education facility" means an establishment where, as a fundamental objective of the persons in charge, recognized and organized instruction takes place on a regular basis. Examples of formal or informal education facilities are public and nonpublic schools and secondary institutions, environmental learning centers, youth organization facilities and camps, and community centers.

34 Subp. 4. In-kind contribution. "In-kind contribution" 35 means a noncash donation of goods or services, such as personnel

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1 time, materials or equipment, to which a cash value can be
2 reasonably assigned.

Subp. 5. Person. "Person" has the meaning given in
Minnesota Statutes, section 116.06, subdivision 8, but does not
include state agencies or the Metropolitan Council.

Subp. 6. Problem materials. "Problem materials" has the
meaning given in Minnesota Statutes, section 115A.03,
subdivision 24a.

9 Subp. 7. Waste. "Waste" means solid waste as defined in 10 Minnesota Statutes, section 116.06, subdivision 10, and 11 household hazardous waste as defined in Minnesota Statutes, 12 section 115A.96, subdivision 1, paragraph (b).

Subp. 8. Waste abatement management practices. "Waste abatement management practices" means practical, sustained, and technically feasible methods of reducing waste generation, increasing recycling, or preventing litter.

17 9210.1020 APPLICATION PROCEDURES.

18 Subpart 1. Notification by director. To initiate the 19 process for awarding grants for waste education projects, the 20 director shall publish a notice in the State Register advising 21 eligible applicants of the availability of waste education grants. The notice shall describe the procedure for awarding 22 grants and shall establish a deadline by which proposals must be 23 24 submitted. In the notice, the director may, consistent with parts 9210.1050 and 9210.1060, limit the types of eligible waste 25 education projects for which a grant would be awarded in the 26 funding round initiated by the notice and may specify the 27 maximum amount of funding to be awarded to a project. 28

Subp. 2. Proposals. Following the publication of a notice in the State Register, eligible applicants seeking grant assistance shall submit proposals as described in item A or B to the director. Proposals must be received by the director by the deadline established in the notice or they will be rejected.

A. Proposals for education information projects must contain the information in part 9210.1050, subpart 6.

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Proposals for education facilities projects must в. contain the information in part 9210.1060, subpart 6. 2

Subp. 3. Determination of eligibility and completeness. 3 For all proposals received by the director by the deadline 4 established in the notice, the director shall determine the 5 eligibility of the applicant and the proposed project; the costs 6 identified in the proposal; and the completeness of the proposal. 7

Subp. 4. Notice of determination of eligibility and 8 completeness. The director shall notify each applicant of the 9 director's determination of eligibility and completeness. 10 If the director determines that an applicant or project is 11 ineligible, the director shall reject the proposal and notify 12 the applicant. If the director determines that any of the 13 project costs are ineligible or that the proposal is incomplete, 14 the director shall notify the applicant of the ineligible 15 portion of the costs or of the deficiency. The applicant has 14 16 days after receiving the notice to correct the inadequacies 17 identified by the director; however, the director shall grant 18 reasonable and brief extensions if the applicant requests an 19 extension in writing within the 14 days and good cause exists 20 for the extension. If the inadequacies are not corrected within 21 the time allowed, the director shall reject the proposal. 22

Subp. 5. Evaluation of proposal. The director shall 23 evaluate each proposal that is determined to be eligible and 24 complete according to the applicable criteria in parts 9210.1000 25 to 9210.1060. Proposals for education information grants shall 26 be evaluated using the criteria in part 9210.1050, subpart 7. 27 Proposals for education facilities grants shall be evaluated 28 using the criteria in part 9210.1060, subpart 7. 29

Subp. 6. Award of grants. The director shall award grants 30 for those projects that the director determines best satisfy the 31 applicable criteria. The director shall notify all applicants 32 of the disposition of their applications. 33

Subp. 7. No grant awards. If the director determines that 34 no proposal will provide sufficient assistance to the state in 35 achieving its waste education goals, the director may decide not 36

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to award any grants. The director may then reinitiate the
 process for awarding grants by publishing a notice under subpart
 1.

Subp. 8. Consultation. The director shall consider the
advice of the waste education coalition in evaluating proposals.

6 9210.1030 LIMITATIONS.

Subpart 1. Reduced grant awards. The director shall ask an applicant to document the impacts of reduced financial assistance before awarding funds less than the eligible amount requested by the applicant. Reduced funds shall be awarded where the director determines that:

A. program resources are insufficient to provide full assistance to all applicants to which the director intends to award grants; or

B. the applicant could implement the project at areduced level and still achieve project objectives.

17 Subp. 2. Limitations on disbursal of funds. No grant 18 funds shall be disbursed until the grantee has executed a 19 written grant agreement with the director.

Subp. 3. Limitation on retroactive payments. No grant funds shall be disbursed to repay costs incurred prior to the award of the grant.

23 9210.1040 GRANT AGREEMENTS.

24 A grant agreement shall:

A. incorporate by reference the proposal submitted to26 the director;

B. provide that any cost overruns incurred in the development and implementation of the proposed project shall be the sole responsibility of the grantee;

30 C. require that the grantee provide written reports 31 to the director on the implementation and results of the 32 project;

D. authorize the director to rescind the grant and require the grantee to repay the grant in full if the director determines that, due to the bad faith of the grantee, a project

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has not been developed and implemented according to the terms
 and conditions of the grant agreement;

E. authorize the director to cease making further disbursements to the grantee and to recover the unspent funds if the director determines that, for reasons other than bad faith, a project has not been developed and implemented according to the terms and conditions of the grant agreement and amendment of the agreement is not justified;

9 F. require that the grantee perform and complete 10 project activities according to the terms and conditions of the 11 grant agreement;

12 G. require that the grantee maintain detailed records13 of all expenditures related to the project;

H. require that the grantee deliver to the director at least one camera-ready copy of any original waste education information developed along with at least one copy of all waste education information disseminated as part of the project. Information developed using waste education grant funds may not be copyrighted;

I. require that any written waste education
information developed as part of the project include a statement
acknowledging the office as a funding source;

J. establish that all original products resulting from the proposal are part of the public domain and cannot be sold for profit; and

26 K. establish other conditions or terms needed to27 manage or implement the grant agreement.

28 9210.1050 WASTE EDUCATION INFORMATION GRANTS.

Subpart 1. Scope. This part establishes the conditions under which the director shall award waste education information grants.

32 Subp. 2. Eligible applicants. Eligible applicants are 33 persons who propose to disseminate or develop and disseminate 34 waste education information in Minnesota. Examples of eligible 35 applicants include political subdivisions (counties, cities, and

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1 towns); schools, school districts, and higher education
2 institutions, including state colleges and universities; public
3 institutions; hospitals; public libraries; trade or industry
4 organizations; solid waste management districts; private
5 businesses; and nonprofit organizations.

6 Subp. 3. Eligible projects. Eligible projects are 7 projects to disseminate or to develop and disseminate waste 8 education information that will raise public awareness of waste 9 abatement management practices and will assist the state in 10 meeting the legislative goals established in Minnesota Statutes, 11 chapter 115A.

Subp. 4. Ineligible projects. The following are not
eligible to receive waste education information grants:

A. projects that receive at least 75 percent funding from money distributed to counties by the director under Minnesota Statutes, section 115A.557, or from money distributed by the Metropolitan Council under its landfill abatement fund grant and loan program;

B. projects that were eligible for, but did not apply for, funding from money distributed to counties by the director under Minnesota Statutes, section 115A.557, or from money distributed by the Metropolitan Council under its landfill abatement fund grant and loan program; and

C. curriculum development projects for kindergarten
 through 12th grade.

Subp. 5. Eligible costs. Eligible costs are limited to 75 26 percent of the total cost of the project. The remaining 25 27 percent must be satisfied with cash or in-kind contributions. 28 Eligible costs include expenses necessary to undertake and 29 complete eligible projects, except that the following are not 30 eligible costs: capital costs, including the cost of purchasing 31 or renting real property, and the cost of operating or 32 maintaining equipment. 33

34 Subp. 6. Proposal. An eligible applicant shall submit a 35 proposal in the form specified by the director. The director 36 may request additional information from the applicant if it is

I. the application includes comprehensive and reasonable plans for dissemination of information to a target audience;

J. the research sources to be used are reliable and7 likely to generate accurate and complete information;

K. the proposed project has the necessary financial9 commitment to cover all proposed project costs; and

10 L. the proposed project complies with federal, state, 11 and local regulations.

12 9210.1060 WASTE EDUCATION FACILITIES GRANTS.

Subpart 1. Scope. This part establishes the conditions under which the director shall award waste education facilities grants.

Subp. 2. Eligible applicants. Eligible applicants are formal or informal education facilities.

Subp. 3. Eligible projects. The following are eligible projects:

A. projects to develop model programs to incorporate long-term waste abatement management practices, litter prevention, and improved problem materials management practices into the operation of formal or informal education facilities; and

B. projects to incorporate long-term waste abatement management practices, litter prevention, and improved problem materials management practices into the operation of formal or informal education facilities.

Subp. 4. Ineligible projects. The following are not
eligible to receive waste education facilities grants:

A. projects that receive at least 75 percent funding
from money distributed to counties by the director under
Minnesota Statutes, section 115A.557, or from money distributed

34 by the Metropolitan Council under its landfill abatement fund 35 grant and loan program; and

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B. projects that were eligible for, but did not apply
 for, funding from money distributed to counties by the director
 under Minnesota Statutes, section 115A.557, or from money
 distributed by the Metropolitan Council under its landfill
 abatement fund grant and loan program.

6 Subp. 5. Eligible costs. Eligible costs are limited to 75 7 percent of the total cost of the project. The remaining 25 percent must be satisfied with cash or in-kind contributions. 8 Eligible costs include expenses necessary to undertake and 9 complete eligible projects, except that the following are not 10 eligible costs: the cost of purchasing, constructing, or 11 12 renting real property, and the cost of operating or maintaining 13 equipment. However, the cost of equipment or structures for temporary storage of recyclables is eligible for waste education 14 15 facilities grant funds, except for equipment or structures primarily needed for the collection or processing of waste. 16

17 Subp. 6. Proposal. An eligible applicant shall submit a 18 proposal in the form specified by the director. The director 19 may request additional information from the applicant if it is 20 necessary to clarify the proposal. A proposal must include the 21 following information:

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A. the names, qualifications, and addresses of the applicant and other project participants;

B. a description of the proposed project, including: (1) a statement of the specific waste abatement practices and problem materials management practices to be addressed by the project, as well as an explanation of the problem to be resolved by implementation of these practices at the location of the project;

30 (2) a work plan that includes a list of project
31 activities, an implementation schedule with specific time lines,
32 and a list of persons involved in completing each activity;
33 (3) an estimate of the total number of persons
34 expected to be reached by the project;
35 (4) a description of the benefits and other

E. the project will complement local waste education and solid waste management projects, including projects to be conducted pursuant to the comprehensive solid waste management plan of the county in which the project will be performed;

F. the project has the support of all public and private entities that are involved in the proposed project;

G. the project is conceptually, technically, and
 economically feasible;

21 H. the persons identified in the application have the 22 experience and knowledge to implement the project and are 23 committed to implementing the project in a timely manner upon 24 receipt of a grant award;

I. the proposed project has the necessary financialcommitment to cover all proposed project costs;

J. the project involves a new or innovative approach to waste abatement, litter prevention, or problem materials management practices, or involves application of an existing approach to an educational facility to which it has not been previously applied;

32 K. the proposed project will provide a substantial 33 educational benefit by enlisting student involvement or other 34 hands-on experience; and

35 L. the proposed project complies with federal, state,36 and local regulations.
