"Breeding cattle" means all 12 cattle except steers, spayed heifers, and heifers of beef breed 13 between the ages of six and 18 months imported for feeding 14 purposes, or slaughter cattle as defined in subpart 17. 15 [For text of subps 7 and 8, see M.R.] 16 Subp. 8a. Certificate of veterinary inspection. 17 "Certificate of veterinary inspection" means a certificate 18 issued by an accredited veterinarian after a physical 19 examination, stating that the cattle described are free from symptoms of contagious, infectious, or communicable disease, and 20 must include a statement of the origin of the cattle and the 21 name and address of the consignee. 22 23 [For text of subps 9 to 11, see M.R.] 24 Subp. 12. [See repealer.] 25 [For text of subp 13, see M.R.] Subp. 14. Official calfhood vaccinate. "Official calfhood 26 vaccinate" means a female bovine animal vaccinated against 27 brucellosis with an approved Brucella vaccine while from four to 28 ten months (120 to 299 days) of age, permanently identified as a 29 vaccinate, and reported at the time of vaccination to the 30 appropriate state or federal agency cooperating in the 31 eradication of bovine brucellosis. 32 [For text of subp 15, see M.R.] 33 Subp. 16. S-branded cattle. "S-branded cattle" means 34 cattle that have been identified by branding with a hot iron the 35

09/15/92 [REVISOR] CEL/LS AR2044 letter "S" at least two by two inches on the left jaw or high on 1 the tailhead over the fourth to seventh coccygeal vertebrae. 2 [For text of subp 17, see M.R.] 3 1700.0200 CATTLE CONSIGNED TO PUBLIC STOCKYARDS, APPROVED 4 5 MARKETS, OR SLAUGHTERING ESTABLISHMENTS. Cattle of any class may be consigned without a certificate 6 7 of veterinary inspection or tests to a public stockyard or market approved under parts 1715.0780 to 1715.1250. 8 9 Cattle for immediate slaughter only may be consigned 10 without a certificate of veterinary inspection or tests to 11 slaughtering establishments where the federal government 12 maintains inspection. 1700.0500 SHIPMENTS OF CATTLE NOT NEEDING CERTIFICATES OF 13 14 VETERINARY INSPECTION. The shipments of cattle in items A and B do not need 15 16 certificates of veterinary inspection: A. cattle of any class consigned to the public 17 stockyards or markets approved under parts 1715.0780 to 18 1715.1250; and 19 20 B. slaughter cattle shipped directly to slaughtering

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20 B. Staughter Cattle Shipped directly to staughtering 21 establishments under federal inspection.

22 1700.0550 CATTLE RETURNED TO MINNESOTA FROM PASTURE.

23 Cattle not under quarantine owned by Minnesota residents 24 who are not livestock dealers may be returned to the herd of 25 origin from pastures in other states without tests or 26 certificates of veterinary inspection if a permit is secured 27 from the board prior to movement.

Permits for return from pasture may be issued by the executive secretary or a designee if the pasture is owned, leased, or operated by the Minnesota resident, the pasture is contiguous to Minnesota land owned by the applicant, only the applicant's cattle are in the pasture, and the pasture has been inspected by a representative of the board.

34 1700.0600 CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION FOR CATTLE.

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1 Cattle of any class consigned to individuals or to state 2 approved markets must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection. Certificates of veterinary inspection 3 4 must show: A. the consignee's name and address; 5 6 в. the status of the herd and area of origin; 7 C. all identity numbers of the animals in the 8 shipment where required by parts 1700.0100 to 1700.1500; 9 D. the results of all tests required in parts 10 1700.0700 to 1700.1050; Ε. date of vaccination or ear tattoo of official 11 12 calfhood brucellosis-vaccinated cattle; F. age, sex, and breed; 13 14 G. the purpose for which the cattle are to be moved; 15 and H. permit number where required. 16 All certificates of veterinary inspection must be submitted 17 to the animal health office of the state of origin for approval 18 within one week of the issue date. 19 1700.0700 REQUIREMENT FOR BRUCELLOSIS TEST. 20 Official tests for brucellosis in the state of origin must 21 be used. All tests must be confirmed at a state-federal 22 cooperative laboratory. Cattle may commence movement based on 23 24 negative tests by authorized persons prior to laboratory 25 confirmation. With the exception of items A to G, all cattle must be 26 negative to brucellosis tests within 30 days prior to movement 27 into Minnesota: 28 29 A. cattle from certified brucellosis-free herds or certified brucellosis-free states not going through cattle 30 concentration points, as defined in part 1705.0060, subpart 2a; 31 B. calves under six months of age; 32 C. cattle shipped directly to the public stockyards 33 or markets approved under parts 1715.0780 to 1715.1250; 34 D. slaughter cattle going directly to a slaughtering 35

[REVISOR] CEL/LS AR2044 09/15/92 establishment under federal inspection; 1 2 E. official calfhood vaccinated dairy heifers under 20 months of age and official calfhood vaccinated beef heifers 3 4 under 24 months of age; 5 F. beef-type heifers under 18 months of age for 6 feeding purposes entering a Minnesota feedlot under permit from the board; and 7 G. steers and spayed heifers. 8 1700.0800 REQUIREMENT FOR ANAPLASMOSIS TEST. 9 10 With the exception of items A to G, all cattle must be tested negative to an official anaplasmosis test at an approved 11 12 laboratory within 30 days prior to movement: 13 A. calves under six months of age; B. cattle shipped directly to a public stockyard or 14 markets approved under parts 1715.0780 to 1715.1250; 15 C. slaughter cattle going directly to a slaughtering 16 17 establishment under federal inspection; D. beef-type heifers under 18 months of age for 18 feeding purposes entering a Minnesota feedlot under permit from 19 20 the board; E. steers and spayed heifers; 21 F. cattle from Canada, states adjacent to Minnesota, 22 and the low incidence states determined by United States 23 Department of Agriculture annual survey; and 24 G. cattle that have been sampled for anaplasmosis, 25 the results of which are pending, provided a permit has been 26 secured from the board. 27 1700.1050 REQUIREMENT FOR TUBERCULOSIS TEST. 28 All bison six months of age and over must be negative to a 29 caudal fold tuberculin test within 60 days prior to movement 30 into Minnesota. 31 1700.1200 CATTLE UNDER QUARANTINE. 32 Cattle imported without a certificate of veterinary 33 inspection except where specifically exempted in parts 1700.0100 34

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to 1700.1500, or imported when not in compliance with parts 1 1700.0100 to 1700.1500 are under quarantine. The cattle must be 2 3 examined and tested to meet the requirements of parts 1700.0100 to 1700.1500 by an accredited veterinarian at owner's expense 4 within 72 hours thereafter. Cattle that are not negative to 5 brucellosis or anaplasmosis must be sent to slaughter on permit б or returned to the herd of origin on a permit from the state of 7 origin. Cattle with other infectious, contagious, or 8 9 communicable disease must be sent to slaughter with permit, 10 returned to the point of origin with permit, or continued in quarantine at the direction of the board. 11

12 1700.1300 PERMITS.

13 The types of cattle in items A to D may be imported with a 14 certificate of veterinary inspection for a stated purpose 15 provided a permit is obtained from the board prior to movement:

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A. calves less than two months of age;

B. cattle from class B and class C states;

18 C. female feeding cattle of beef type and breed less 19 than 18 months of age entering for feeding purposes without 20 tests; or

D. cattle that have been sampled for anaplasmosis,
the results of which are pending.

23 1700.1400 CATTLE IMPORTED FROM STATES NOT CERTIFIED24 BRUCELLOSIS-FREE.

25 Cattle may be imported from states that are not certified 26 brucellosis-free if the requirements in items A and B are met. 27 Cattle originating in Minnesota that are out of Minnesota for 28 less than 30 days for an exhibition or as embryo donors or 29 recipients are exempt.

30 A. Cattle from class A states require a negative test31 within 30 days prior to movement.

32 B. Cattle from class B or class C states require a 33 permit, a negative test within 30 days prior to movement, and a 34 retest in not less than 45 nor more than 120 days following 35 arrival.

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1 1700.1500 IMPORTING FEEDING CATTLE.

2 Feeding cattle may be imported as follows: steers, spayed heifers, and calves under six months of age must be listed on a 3 certificate of veterinary inspection but need not be identified 4 5 or tested; heifers of beef type and breed under 18 months of age must be listed on a certificate of veterinary inspection but 6 need not be identified or tested provided a permit is secured 7 8 from the board. Cattle of this class imported from states classified with "B" or "C" status by Veterinary Services, United 9 States Department of Agriculture, must be branded on the jaw 10 with a hot iron with the letter "F" at least two inches high. 11 The cattle must be segregated from all other cattle except 12 steers, spayed heifers, like quarantined cattle, or cattle 13 purchased in accordance with a feeder affidavit quarantine as 14 provided in parts 1705.0060 to 1705.0540. Segregation must 15 16 consist of a drylot with no pasturing and grazing and double fencing to prevent access to drainage and other cattle. The 17 18 cattle may be: retained in a feedlot for a period not to exceed 12 months; sold for further feeding under feeder affidavit 19 20 quarantine as provided in parts 1705.0060 to 1705.0540; sold for slaughter; or moved to another state if the movement is in 21 compliance with state and federal regulations. 22

23 Upon application by the owner of quarantined cattle that 24 originated in states classified "A" or "Free" by Veterinary 25 Services, United States Department of Agriculture, the board at 26 its discretion may grant permission to the owner to make the 27 necessary tests at the owner's expense to relieve the 28 quarantine. The requirements for tests must not be less than 29 the tests required for breeding cattle.

IMPORTATION OF DOGS AND CATS

31 1700.1600 CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION FOR IMPORTATION
32 OF DOGS AND CATS.

All dogs and cats imported into Minnesota must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian except:

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A. performing dogs and cats in professional animal 2 acts;

B. dogs and cats for exhibition which are covered by 4 parts 1715.0010 to 1715.0190;

5 C. dogs and cats for research at educational and 6 scientific institutions; and

D. dogs and cats entering a veterinary facility for
8 treatment, surgery, or diagnostic procedures.

1700.1700 CONTENTS OF CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION. 9 A certificate of veterinary inspection must certify that 10 11 the dog or cat has been inspected and is free of visible signs 12 of infectious, contagious, or communicable disease and certify 13 that if the dog or cat is three months of age or over, it has a current rabies vaccination with a United States Department of 14 15 Agriculture licensed rabies vaccine according to the package insert directions. The name of the vaccine, vaccine serial 16 17 number, and date of vaccination or revaccination are to be entered on the certificate of veterinary inspection. A copy 18 must be forwarded to the Board of Animal Health by the approving 19 agency of the state of origin. 20

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IMPORTATION OF GOATS

22 1700.1900 CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION FOR GOATS.

All goats imported into Minnesota for purposes other than slaughter must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection showing individual identification by ear tag number, tattoo, or registration number for all goats six months of age and over.

A copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection approved by the animal health official of the state of origin must be immediately forwarded to the Board of Animal Health.

31 IMPORTATION OF HORSES, MULES, AND ASSES

32 1700.2100 DEFINITIONS.

33 Subpart 1. Scope. The definitions in this part apply to 34 parts 1700.2100 to 1700.2550.

[For text of subps 2 to 5, see M.R.] 1 Subp. 5a. Official test. "Official test" means the 2 3 Coggins test or other tests approved by the United States 4 Department of Agriculture conducted at a United States 5 Department of Agriculture approved laboratory. 6 Subp. 6. Reactor. "Reactor" means any horse which discloses a positive reaction to an EIA test. 7 1700.2200 CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION FOR HORSES. 8 9 All horses imported into Minnesota must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited 10 veterinarian within 30 days prior to date of importation except: 11 12 A. performing horses used by rodeos, circuses, and as 13 animal acts; 14 в. horses brought into the state for participation in trail rides, exhibitions, and horse shows where the horses are 15 examined by an official veterinarian; 16 17 C. horses consigned to slaughtering establishments under federal inspection; and 18 19 reactors consigned to a federally inspected D. slaughtering establishment operated under the Federal Meat 20 Inspection Act that are officially identified and accompanied by 21 a shipping permit issued at the point of origin by a state or 22 federal veterinarian or an accredited veterinarian. 23 A test is not required for horses listed as exceptions in 24 this part or suckling foals accompanying a negative dam. 25 1700.2300 CONTENTS OF CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION. 26 27 The certificate of veterinary inspection must certify that the horses have been examined by an accredited veterinarian 28 within 30 days prior to importation and must include an accurate 29 and complete description of each horse in the shipment including 30

31 age, sex, color, and markings. Registered horses may be 32 identified by registration name and number.

33 The certificate of veterinary inspection must certify that 34 all horses in this shipment were negative to an approved test 35 for EIA conducted at an approved laboratory within 12 months

prior to date of importation. The test date and the name of the
 laboratory must be recorded on the certificate of veterinary
 inspection.

A copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection approved by the chief livestock regulatory official of the state of origin must be mailed to the board.

7 1700.2310 PERMITS.

8 If a blood sample has been drawn but there is insufficient 9 time to obtain the laboratory results of the EIA test prior to 10 the importation, a permit for the importation of horses without 11 final laboratory results may be obtained from the board if the 12 veterinarian requesting the permit agrees to submit the 13 laboratory results promptly to the board.

14 1700.2400 SALES.

Horses imported into Minnesota for sale or resale must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection and must be tested and negative for EIA before leaving the sale premises if sold to remain in Minnesota, unless the certificate of veterinary inspection certifies to a negative test for EIA conducted at an approved laboratory within 12 months prior to the date of sale.

22 1700.2450 REACTORS.

Reactors must be quarantined, destroyed, consigned for slaughter to a slaughtering establishment under federal inspection, or returned to the state of origin under a permit issued by the state of origin. Reactors may not be moved intrastate except on a permit issued by the board. Reactors may only be moved interstate in accordance with Code of Federal Regulations, part 75.

30 1700.2500 HORSES IMPORTED WITHOUT THE REQUIRED TEST FOR EIA.
31 Horses imported without the required test for EIA must be
32 quarantined for an immediate test at the owner's expense. The
33 test must be completed within 30 days of entry into Minnesota.
34 IMPORTATION OF POULTRY

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1 1700.3110 DEFINITIONS. 2 Subpart 1. Scope. The definitions in this part apply to parts 1700.3110 to 1700.4500. 3 4 Subp. 2. Backyard chickens. "Backyard chickens" means 5 chickens of any breed in a flock that contains less than 1,000 6 birds. 7 Subp. 3. Board. "Board" means the Board of Animal Health. 8 Subp. 4. Control program. "Control program" means one or 9 more of the state or state and federal cooperative programs for 10 the control or eradication of poultry diseases. 11 Subp. 5. Disease control classification. "Disease control 12 classification" means the negative status of a flock as pertaining to one or more of the control program diseases. 13 Subp. 6. Other domesticated fowl. "Other domesticated 14 15 fowl" means fancy, exhibition, and game chickens, waterfowl, and game birds maintained in captivity, excluding pigeons and doves. 16 17 Subp. 7. Poultry. "Poultry" means turkeys, chickens, and other domesticated fowl. 18 1700.3400 POULTS, CHICKS, AND HATCHING EGGS. 19 20 Hatching eggs and poultry under five months of age may be 21 imported under the conditions in items A to C. 22 A. The importer must have a certificate of veterinary 23 inspection or National Poultry Improvement Plan Form VS 9-3. B. The importer must have a permit from the board. 24 Annual permits are available. The application for a permit must 25 be endorsed by the official disease control agency of the state 26 of origin and must indicate the disease control classifications 27 28 of the flock of origin. The flocks of origin must have the disease control 29 C. 30 classifications as follows: (1) turkeys, including wild and exhibition 31 32 turkeys: salmonella pullorum-typhoid, salmonella typhimurium, mycoplasma gallisepticum, mycoplasma synoviae, and sanitation 33 34 monitored; (2) egg-type chickens: salmonella 35

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1 pullorum-typhoid, mycoplasma gallisepticum, mycoplasma synoviae, 2 and sanitation monitored;

3 (3) meat-type chickens: salmonella
4 pullorum-typhoid, mycoplasma gallisepticum, and mycoplasma
5 synoviae; and

6 (4) backyard chickens, exhibition, game, and7 waterfowl: salmonella pullorum-typhoid.

8 1700.3600 SHIPPING CONTAINERS.

9 Only new or cleaned and disinfected poultry boxes or 10 containers may be used to ship poultry into Minnesota. The name 11 and address of the consignor and consignee, the breed, the 12 disease control classifications, and the Minnesota permit number 13 must be on the container or on the invoice that accompanies the 14 container.

15 1700.3700 EXCEPTIONS.

16 The board may waive the requirement for certain disease 17 classifications for obtaining a poultry importation permit if 18 the classification is no longer available.

Birds imported for immediate slaughter are exempt from parts 1700.3400 and 1700.3800.

21 1700.3800 ADULT POULTRY.

22 Poultry over five months of age may be imported only under 23 the conditions in items A to C.

A. The importer must have an official certificate of veterinary inspection certifying that the poultry are free from evidence of any infectious, contagious, or communicable disease and have not been exposed to such a disease.

B. The poultry must be tested for or have thefollowing disease control classifications:

30 (1) turkeys, including wild and exhibition
31 turkeys: salmonella pullorum-typhoid, salmonella typhimurium,
32 mycoplasma gallisepticum, mycoplasma synoviae, and sanitation
33 monitored;

IMPORTATION OF CERVIDAE 11 1700.4900 DEFINITIONS. 12 Subpart 1. Scope. The definitions in this part apply to 13 parts 1700.4900 to 1700.5300. 14 Subp. 2. Cervidae. "Cervidae" means all mammals of the 15 family Cervidae, including deer, elk, moose, caribou, and 16 reindeer. 17 1700.5000 REQUIREMENT FOR IMPORT PERMIT. 18 19 A permit must be obtained prior to the importation of any 20 Cervidae. 1700.5100 REQUIREMENT FOR CERTIFICATE. 21 All Cervidae imported into Minnesota must be accompanied by 22 a certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian. 23 1700.5200 REQUIREMENT FOR BRUCELLOSIS TEST. 24 All Cervidae six months of age and over must be negative to 25 a brucellosis test within 30 days prior to movement into 26 Minnesota. 27 1700.5300 REQUIREMENT FOR TUBERCULOSIS TEST. 28 All Cervidae six months of age and over must be negative to 29 a test for tuberculosis approved by the board within 90 days 30 prior to movement into Minnesota. 31 ERADICATION OF BOVINE AND BISON BRUCELLOSIS 32 33 1705.0060 DEFINITIONS.

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1	Subpart 1. Scope. The definitions in this part apply to

3	Subp. la. Board. "Board" means the Minnesota Board of

26	they are from four to ten months (120 to 299 days) of age.
27	Subp. 8. Owner. "Owner" means the legal owner, the
28	owner's agents, and the person in possession of or caring for
29	the cattle.
30	[For text of subps 9 to 15, see M.R.]
31	Subp. 16. Veterinarian. "Veterinarian" means a
32	veterinarian licensed and accredited in Minnesota or a
33	veterinarian of the United States Department of Agriculture.
34	1705.0260 OFFICIAL VACCINATION.
35	Brucella vaccine must be licensed by the United States

Department of Agriculture. Vaccine must be sold to and
 administered by veterinarians only. Vaccine must be
 administered by the method and dosage described by the
 manufacturer or the board.

5 Brucella abortus vaccine, strain 19, live culture, reduced 6 dose, may be administered to female dairy and beef cattle while 7 they are from four to ten months (120 to 299 days) of age.

8 1705.0310 CATTLE VACCINATED WITH BRUCELLA ABORTUS STRAIN 199 VACCINE.

10 Cattle vaccinated with Brucella abortus Strain 19 vaccine 11 other than females of authorized ages are not official 12 vaccinates, and, when tested, must be diagnosed as unvaccinated 13 cattle.

14 1705.0320 AREA PLAN PARTICIPATION.

15 The ring test must be conducted at least twice a year at 16 approximately equal intervals. Herds with suspicious ring tests 17 must be investigated within 30 days.

18 The board may collect blood samples for the brucellosis 19 test from breeding cattle two years of age and over at 20 concentration points, locker plants, and slaughtering 21 establishments. Reactors must be traced to herd of origin and 22 the herd investigated within 30 days.

23 1705.0430 SALES OF CATTLE AND LEASING OR LOANING CATTLE FOR 24 BREEDING.

All cattle over six months (209 days) of age passing through a cattle concentration point must be tested negative for brucellosis within 30 days prior to sale or lease or loan except:

A. cattle sold directly to a slaughtering
establishment for immediate slaughter;

30 B. cattle consigned to a public stockyards or state31 and federal approved markets;

32 C. steers and spayed heifers;

33 D. official dairy vaccinates under 20 months of age 34 and beef vaccinates under 24 months of age not parturient or

1 postparturient; 2 Ε. female feeding cattle under 18 months of age of 3 beef type and breed sold in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, 4 section 35.245, subdivision 3, providing: (1) the purchaser furnishes the seller and board 5 6 copies of complete affidavits as furnished by the board; 7 (2) the board may inspect the cattle and the 8 premises on which they are maintained at any reasonable time; 9 and 10 (3) there are facilities to maintain said cattle 11 separate and apart from all other cattle except steers, spayed 12 heifers, or other quarantined feeding cattle. The facilities must include double fencing where the cattle are confined in 13 14 such a manner as to prevent access to other cattle in adjoining yards, pastures, or fields, and such fencing as may be necessary 15 16 to prevent access of the quarantined cattle to water courses or 17 drainage ditches which flow through or discharge on such other 18 yards, pastures, or fields.

19 1705.0460 CERTIFICATES.

An agreement to comply with parts 1705.0840 to 1705.1085 15 must be signed and filed with the board by the owner. 16 17 1705.1081 ESTABLISHMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF TUBERCULOSIS-FREE ACCREDITED CERVIDAE HERD. 18 An agreement to comply with parts 1705.0840 to 1705.1085 19 must be signed and filed with the board by the owner. 20 1705.1082 ACCREDITATION. 21 If all Cervidae over six months of age have been found 22 negative on an initial test for tuberculosis approved by the 23 board and on two retests at intervals of ten to 14 months on all 24 Cervidae over six months of age and all herd additions other 25 than natural additions have been found negative on a test for 26 tuberculosis approved by the board, the herd must be accredited 27 for a period of 24 months (730 days) and a certificate of 28 accreditation must be issued. 29 1705.1083 CANCELLATION OR SUSPENSION OF ACCREDITATION. 30

Accreditation must be canceled if additions are made contrary to part 1705.1084 or an isolation of mycobacterium bovis is made. Accreditation must be suspended if an animal in

Cattle must be examined by the official veterinarian on the 6 7 day they are admitted to the exhibition. 1715.0105 SWINE PSEUDORABIES. 8 9 All swine, except swine entered in a slaughter class pursuant to part 1715.0060, must: 10 11 A. have had a negative pseudorabies test conducted 12 within 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition, a record of which and the result must be entered on a test chart 13 14 or certificate of veterinary inspection and presented to the official veterinarian at the time of entry; or 15 16 B. originate from a qualified pseudorabies negative 17 herd or a pseudorabies-controlled vaccinated herd pursuant to parts 1705.2480 and 1705.2490, with the qualified herd number or 18 19 pseudorabies-controlled vaccinated herd number and date of last qualifying test reported to the official veterinarian at the 20

21 time of entry.

22 1715.0110 EXHIBITION OF SHEEP.

23 Sheep must be examined by the official veterinarian on the 24 day they are admitted to the exhibition.

25 1715.0115 EXHIBITION OF GOATS.

Goats must be examined by the official veterinarian on the 27 day they are admitted to the exhibition.

28 1715.0130 EXHIBITION OF HORSES.

Horses must be examined by the official veterinarian on the day they are admitted to the exhibition. Trail rides are exempt from the requirements of part 1715.0040, items C and D, and this part. Those horse shows which are programmed to be completed within a period of 12 hours and at which horses are not stabled

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overnight are exempt from the requirements of part 1715.0040, items C and D, and this part. The commission veterinarian shall enforce the provisions of this part on horses brought to a racetrack licensed by the Minnesota Racing Commission. If no commission veterinarian has been appointed, the management shall employ an official veterinarian as defined in part 1715.0005, subpart 3.

Certificates of veterinary 26 inspection and required tests, except pseudorabies tests for 27 swine which must be made within 30 days, must be accepted if 28 issued and conducted within 90 days prior to the opening date of 29 the exhibition. 30

Statements 6 with reference to brucellosis status of area of origin and name 7 8 and address of consignee shall be included. Record of tests or vaccination and individual identification must be recorded when 9 10 required. 11 [For text of subp 7, see M.R.] 12 Subp. 8. [See repealer.] 13 [For text of subps 9 and 10, see M.R.] 14 Subp. 11. Official vaccinate. "Official vaccinate" means 15 a female bovine animal vaccinated against brucellosis with an approved Brucella vaccine while from four to ten months (120 to 16 17 299 days) of age, permanently identified as a vaccinate, and reported at the time of vaccination to the appropriate state or 18 federal agency. 19 20 [For text of subp 12, see M.R.] 1715.0850 CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION. 21 The official veterinarian shall examine and accept or 22 23 refuse certificates of veterinary inspection of all cattle 24 consigned to the sale, and prohibit the sale of cattle not accompanied by proper certificates of veterinary inspection 25 until necessary examinations and required tests are completed. 26 1715.0870 MASTER TEST SHEET AND OTHER MARKET RECORDS. 27 Cattle moving through the market accompanied by 28 certificates of veterinary inspection must be listed on the 29 master test sheet, and along with data as to the certificate of 30 veterinary inspection. 3 1715.1100 CATTLE FROM OTHER STATES.

4 Cattle originating in other states may be consigned to the 5 market when accompanied by a certificate of veterinary 6 inspection complying with the Minnesota importation requirements 7 and certifying to origin in a modified certified brucellosis area, or a certificate of veterinary inspection showing 8 individual identification, certifying to origin in a modified 9 10 certified brucellosis area, or a declaration signed by the owner showing address of origin, description and number of cattle in 11 shipment, destination, and further stating cattle are not under 12 quarantine because of disease. 13

14 1715.1130 CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION.

15 Cattle entering market accompanied by a certificate of 16 veterinary inspection certifying to origin in a modified 17 certified brucellosis area are subject to tests at the market.

18 1715.1140 CATTLE SOLD WITHOUT FURTHER TESTING.

19 Cattle entering market accompanied by certificate of 20 veterinary inspection with necessary tests for brucellosis 21 conducted within 30 days prior to date of importation and 22 recorded thereon, and certifying to origin in modified certified 23 brucellosis area, may be sold without further testing.

24 1715.1180 BRUCELLOSIS TEST EXCEPTIONS.
