- 7 6100.0100 STATUTORY AUTHORITY.
- 8 Parts 6100.0100 to 6100.2400 are authorized by Minnesota
- 9 Statutes, sections 84.03, 85.052, 89.031, 89.19, and 89.21.
- 10 6100.0300 SCOPE.
- 11 Parts 6100.0100 to 6100.2400 apply to state parks,
- 12 recreational areas, historic sites, waysides, forest
- 13 campgrounds, and forest day use areas under the control of or
- 14 operated by the commissioner of natural resources.
- Parts 6100.1910, 6100.1920, and 6100.2000 also apply to
- 16 state forest lands in the Richard J. Dorer Memorial Hardwood
- 17 State Forest which are under the control of, or operated by, the
- 18 commissioner of natural resources.
- 19 Parts 6100.1905, 6100.1930, and 6100.2400 apply to all
- 20 forest lands under the authority of the commissioner of natural
- 21 resources as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 89.001,
- 22 subdivision 13.
- 23 Parts 6100.0100 to 6100.2400 shall not apply to a person
- 24 lawfully engaged in the performance of the person's duties in
- 25 the management and administration of these areas including, but
- 26 not limited to, the commissioner of natural resources, the
- 27 commissioner's agents, employees, those persons operating under
- 28 contract with the Department of Natural Resources, and law
- 29 enforcement officers.
- 30 6100.0400 PENALTY.
- A person who violates any of parts 6100.0100 to 6100.2400
- 32 is guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to immediate removal from
- 33 the park, forest campground, forest day use area, the Richard J.
- 34 Dorer Memorial Hardwood State Forest, or other forest lands

- 1 under the authority of the commissioner of natural resources and
- 2 to appropriate legal action.
- 3 6100.0500 DEFINITIONS.
- 4 [For text of subps 1 and 2, see M.R.]
- 5 Subp. 3. Commissioner. "Commissioner" means the
- 6 commissioner of natural resources, state of Minnesota, acting
- 7 directly or through authorized agents.
- 8 Subp. 3a. Disabled person. "Disabled person" means a
- 9 person who is unable to walk with or without crutches, braces,
- 10 or other mechanical support.

- 12 Subp. 5a. Forest lands under the authority of the
- 13 commissioner. "Forest lands under the authority of the
- 14 commissioner" has the meaning defined in Minnesota Statutes,
- 15 section 89.001, subdivision 13.
- 16 Subp. 5b. Forest officer. "Forest officer" means a
- 17 certified Department of Natural Resources, Division of Forestry
- 18 employee authorized by Minnesota Statutes and commissioner's
- 19 operational orders to enforce rules; and, for the purposes of
- 20 parts 6100.0100 to 6100.2400, Minnesota state conservation
- 21 officers.
- 22 Subp. 5c. Richard J. Dorer Memorial Hardwood State
- 23 Forest. "Richard J. Dorer Memorial Hardwood State Forest" means
- 24 all posted state forest lands over which the commissioner of
- 25 natural resources has regulatory authority within the boundaries
- 26 of the state forest as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section
- 27 89.021, subdivision 33.
- Subp. 5d. Highway. "Highway" means roads or highways as
- 29 defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 160.02.

- 31 Subp. 7b. Park officer. "Park officer" means all
- 32 certified Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and
- 33 Recreation peace officers authorized by Minnesota Statutes and
- 34 commissioner's operational orders; and, for the purposes of
- 35 parts 6100.0100 to 6100.2400, Minnesota state conservation

- l officers.

- 3 Subp. 10a. Special event. "Special event" means an event
- 4 that is held on forest lands under the authority of the
- 5 commissioner where an activity is occurring that is not normally
- 6 allowed in the forest or where an event will attract large
- 7 numbers of people that could distrupt normal use of the forest.
- 8 Special events include, but are not limited to, motorcycle
- 9 enduros, snowmobile races, orienteering trials, group camp outs
- 10 that do not occur at designated group camps, dog sled races,
- 11 sports car rallies, and dog trials.

- 13 6100.1905 RECREATIONAL MOTOR VEHICLES; FOREST LANDS UNDER
- 14 AUTHORITY OF COMMISSIONER.
- Subpart 1. Required equipment. A recreational motor
- 16 vehicle may not be driven on forest lands, roads, or trails
- 17 under the authority of the commissioner which are open to
- 18 recreational motor vehicle use, unless equipped with:
- 19 A. When operating during the hours of darkness at
- 20 least one headlamp having a minimum candle power of sufficient
- 21 intensity to reveal persons and vehicles at a distance of at
- 22 least 100 feet ahead under normal atmospheric conditions. The
- 23 headlamp must be so aimed that glaring rays are not projected
- 24 into the eyes of oncoming vehicle operators.
- B. When operated during the hours of darkness at
- 26 least one red tail lamp, having a minimum candlepower of
- 27 sufficient intensity to exhibit a red light plainly visible from
- 28 a distance of 500 feet to the rear under normal atmospheric
- 29 conditions.
- 30 C. Brakes adequate to control the movement of, and to
- 31 stop, and to hold the vehicle under normal operating conditions.
- 32 D. A throttle so designed that when pressure used to
- 33 advance the throttle is removed, the engine will immediately and
- 34 automatically return to idle.
- 35 Subp. 2. Sled, trailer, or device towed by recreational

- l motor vehicle. A sled, trailer, or other device being towed by
- 2 a recreational motor vehicle during the hours of darkness under
- 3 normal atmospheric conditions must be equipped as follows:
- 4 A. Unobstructed and visible reflector material of at
- 5 least 16 square inches must be mounted on each side and at the
- 6 rear of the sled, trailer, or other device.
- 7 B. The reflector material required must have at least
- 8 the minimum intensity values prescribed in Table II of Federal
- 9 Specifications, L-S-300C, dated March 29, 1979, or must be in
- 10 accordance with Reflex Reflectors, Society of Automotive
- 11 Engineers, SAE J 594E, which are incorporated by reference, are
- 12 not subject to frequent change, and are universally available.
- 13 The manufacturer's trade name, or other decorative material, if
- 14 meeting minimum reflective standards, may be included in
- 15 computing the required 16 square inch area.
- 16 Subp. 3. Mufflers. A person may not operate a
- 17 recreational motor vehicle on forest lands under the authority
- 18 of the commissioner unless it is equipped with a functioning
- 19 spark arrester type muffler as required by Minnesota Statutes,
- 20 section 88.21, subdivision 4, or equipped with a United States
- 21 Forest Service approved spark arrester or combination thereof.
- 22 A person shall not operate a recreational motor vehicle on
- 23 forest lands under the authority of the commissioner unless it
- 24 is so equipped that overall noise emission does not exceed a
- 25 sound level limitation of not more than 99 decibels on the A
- 26 scale from a distance of 20 inches using test procedures and
- 27 instrumentation as set forth in the Society of Automotive
- 28 Engineers' Standard, SAE J 1287, June, 1988.
- 29 6100.1930 USE OF FOREST LANDS UNDER AUTHORITY OF COMMISSIONER.
- 30 Subpart 1. Traffic control. In order to control traffic
- 31 on forest lands under the authority of the commissioner,
- 32 recreational motor vehicle operators must comply with the
- 33 following:
- A. trail and road signs must be obeyed;
- 35 B. one-way trails or roads must be traveled in the

- l direction indicated;
- 2 C. when on a trail treadway or road, all trail or
- 3 road users must stay on the right half of the treadway or road
- 4 when meeting or being passed by another user;
- 5 D. when passing another trail or road user traveling
- 6 in the same direction, all users must pass on the left half of
- 7 the trail treadway or road and may only pass when the left half
- 8 is clearly visible and is free of oncoming traffic for a
- 9 sufficient distance ahead to permit overtaking and passing to be
- 10 completely made without interfering with the safety of any trail
- ll or road user;
- 12 E. a trail or road user about to enter onto or cross
- 13 a trail treadway or road shall yield the right-of-way to any
- 14 users already on the treadway or road to be entered or crossed;
- 15 F. when two trail or road users are about to enter an
- 16 otherwise unmarked intersection from different treadways at
- 17 approximately the same time, or are approaching an otherwise
- 18 unmarked merger of two treadways or roads from any two
- 19 directions at approximately the same time, the user on the right
- 20 shall have the right-of-way; and
- 21 G. recreational motor vehicles must yield to
- 22 nonmotorized trail users on a trail treadway and shall shut off
- 23 their machines when meeting a horse, until the horse has passed
- 24 or they have been waved on by the rider or driver of the horse.
- Subp. 2. Operation of recreational motor vehicles. It is
- 26 unlawful on forest lands under the authority of the
- 27 commissioner, trails or roads which are open for use, for any
- 28 person to drive or operate a recreational motor vehicle in any
- 29 of the following ways:
- 30 A. At a speed greater than is reasonable or proper
- 31 under all of the surrounding circumstances or greater than the
- 32 posted speed limit. Where necessary, the commissioner of
- 33 natural resources may establish and post at reasonable
- 34 intervals, a reasonable and safe maximum speed limit for the
- 35 operation of recreational motor vehicles along a specific road
- 36 or trail or on other forest lands under the authority of the

- 1 commissioner. The speed limit will be effective when signs are
- 2 erected and any operation of a recreational motor vehicle within
- 3 the posted portion of road, trail, or land in excess of the
- 4 posted speed limit is unlawful.
- 5 This speed limit may be waived in writing by the
- 6 commissioner of natural resources for special events held on
- 7 forest lands under the authority of the commissioner.
- 8 B. Without a lighted headlamp and tail lamp when
- 9 operated at night or during reduced visibility.
- 10 C. In a manner that destroys, kills, or harasses
- ll wildlife.
- D. In a manner that destroys state property.
- E. Persons under 18 years of age shall not ride or
- 14 operate an ATV or off-road motorcycle on forest lands under the
- 15 authority of the commissioner unless wearing a safety helmet
- 16 approved by the commissioner of public safety.
- F. For a recreational motor vehicle operator after
- 18 having received a visual or audible signal from a peace officer
- 19 or law enforcement officer to come to a stop, to:
- 20 (1) operate a recreational motor vehicle in
- 21 willful or wanton disregard to the signal to stop;
- 22 (2) interfere with or endanger the law
- 23 enforcement officer or any other person or vehicle; or
- 24 (3) increase speed or attempt to flee or elude
- 25 the officer.
- G. In a tree nursery or area regenerating to trees,
- 27 whether planted or natural, in a manner that damages or destroys
- 28 the trees.
- 29 Subp. 3. Special events. A special event may not be held
- 30 on forest lands under the authority of the commissioner except
- 31 with a written permit from the commissioner obtained prior to
- 32 the event.
- 33 The commissioner may charge the sponsor or permittee of a
- 34 special event a fee for use of the land, and may require
- 35 security such as a bond or cashier's check to ensure that
- 36 appropriate cleanup measures, the removal of signs, repair of

- 1 damage, and other actions are completed.
- 2 Subp. 4. Operating under the influence of alcohol or a
- 3 controlled or hazardous substance. A person may not operate or
- 4 be in control of a recreational motor vehicle on forest lands
- 5 under the authority of the commissioner while under the
- 6 influence of alcohol or a controlled or hazardous substance.
- 7 Arrest and testing procedures will be as defined in Minnesota
- 8 Statutes, sections 84.91 to 84.911.
- 9 6100.2400 SUSPENSION OF RULES.
- 10 In situations of emergency or in the case of authorized
- 11 special events, the commissioner may provide temporary
- 12 exceptions to the general rules for a specific state park,
- 13 forest campground, forest day use area, or on forest lands under
- 14 the authority of the commissioner by posting notice of the
- 15 exception at the unit, trail, road, or land.
