- 2 6200.0100 DEFINITIONS.
- 3 Subpart 1. Terms. The terms used in chapters 6200 to 6284
- 4 have the meanings given them in this part. The definitions in
- 5 Minnesota Statutes, chapters 97A, 97B, and 97C apply, except as
- 6 otherwise provided.
- 7 Subp. 2. Commissioner. "Commissioner" means the
- 8 commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources or a
- 9 designated employee.
- 10 Subp. 3. County auditor. "County auditor" means the
- ll business office of the elected county auditor or, if the county <
- 12 does not have such an elected office, the business office
- 13 appointed by the county for such purposes.
- 14 Subp. 4. Department. "Department" means the Minnesota
- 15 Department of Natural Resources.
- 16 Subp. 5. Director. "Director" means the director of the
- 17 department's Division of Fish and Wildlife or a designated
- 18 employee.
- 19 Subp. 6. Division of Enforcement. "Division of
- 20 Enforcement" means the department's Division of Enforcement,
- 21 located at 500 Lafayette Road, Saint Paul, MN 55155-4047.
- 22 Subp. 7. License Bureau. "License Bureau" means the
- 23 department's License Bureau, located at 500 Lafayette Road,
- 24 Saint Paul, MN 55155-4026.
- 25 6200.0200 GAME AND FISH GENERAL PROVISIONS.
- Subpart 1. Scope. The language contained in chapters 6200
- 27 to 6284 are subject to the provisions defined in this part.
- Subp. 2. Dates are inclusive. Dates for specified time
- 29 periods are inclusive, unless otherwise specified.
- 30 Subp. 3. Highway identification. A highway identification
- 31 refers to the status of the highway as marked on signs placed by
- 32 the Minnesota Department of Transportation.
- 33 Subp. 4. Application deadline. When an application
- 34 deadline is specified, applications that are mailed must be
- 35 postmarked on or before the deadline date. Applications that

- 1 are delivered must be delivered no later than 4:30 p.m. on the
- 2 day of the deadline.
- 3 Subp. 5. Shooting hours. Shooting hours, for purposes of
- 4 Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.075, are from one-half hour
- 5 before sunrise to sunset each day, unless otherwise specified.
- 6 Subp. 6. Incomplete or improperly completed applications.
- 7 Incomplete or improperly completed applications for licenses or
- 8 permits may be rejected by the commissioner.
- 9 Subp. 7. Returned checks and refunds. A check that is
- 10 returned to the department for nonpayment invalidates the
- ll application and the check will be destroyed. Refunds of
- 12 application fees are not made for any reason.
- 13 Subp. 8. Application for commercial licenses.
- 14 Applications for all commercial licenses can be obtained from
- 15 the License Bureau.
- 16 WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS, CRITICAL NATURAL HABITAT,
- 17 DESIGNATED WILDLIFE WATERS, AND STROMATOLITES
- 18 WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS
- 19 6210.0100 GENERAL PROVISIONS FOR USE OF WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT
- 20 AREAS.
- 21 Subpart 1. Waterfowl season, defined. "Waterfowl season"
- 22 means any open season for the taking of migratory waterfowl.
- Subp. 2. Reporting. The commissioner may require persons
- 24 to report animals taken within wildlife management areas and
- 25 submit them for inspection.
- Subp. 3. Nuisance animals. Unprotected wild animals may
- 27 not be taken within wildlife management areas from March 1 to
- 28 August 31, except by a person lawfully hunting a protected
- 29 species. Nuisance animals in wildlife management areas may be
- 30 controlled under permits issued by a wildlife manager.
- 31 Subp. 4. Compatible uses and exceptions. Wildlife
- 32 management areas may be used for wildlife observation, sport
- 33 fishing, hiking, snowshoeing, and other resource-related uses if
- 34 the uses are not inconsistent with parts 6210.0100 to
- 35 6210.0300. Exceptions to this part for specific wildlife

- 1 management areas are provided by parts 6230.0100 and 6230.0200.
- 2 Subp. 5. Hours of use. Wildlife management areas may not
- 3 be entered or used during closed hours posted at the major
- 4 access points, except by permit.
- 5 Subp. 6. Harvest of bait. Taking minnows, leeches, and
- 6 other live bait for commercial purposes within a wildlife
- 7 management area is allowed only under permit issued by the
- 8 wildlife manager.
- 9 Subp. 7. Overnight use. A person may not leave a vehicle,
- 10 trailer, or tent overnight within a wildlife management area,
- 11 except by permit or in areas and at times designated by signs
- 12 for overnight use. A vehicle, trailer, or tent lawfully left
- 13 overnight must be occupied or attended.
- Subp. 8. Alcoholic beverages. A person may not consume
- 15 alcoholic beverages within a wildlife management area, except
- 16 when lawfully occupying an overnight use area.
- 17 Subp. 9. Use of motorboats. Motorboat use is prohibited
- 18 within a wildlife management area, except where posted or as
- 19 provided in this subpart. For purposes of this chapter,
- 20 "motorboat" includes motorboats as defined in Minnesota
- 21 Statutes, section 86B.005, subdivision 9, and duckboats with
- 22 motors attached.
- 23 A. Gores Wildlife Management Area in Dakota and
- 24 Goodhue counties: motorboats may be used with no limit on size.
- B. Lac qui Parle Wildlife Management Area in Big
- 26 Stone, Chippewa, Lac qui Parle, and Swift counties: motorboats
- 27 may be used with no limit on size.
- C. Mud-Goose Wildlife Management Area in Cass county:
- 29 motorboats of ten horsepower or less may be used, except during
- 30 any waterfowl season.
- 31 D. Orwell Wildlife Management Area in Ottertail
- 32 county: motorboats of ten horsepower or less may be used.
- 33 E. Roseau River Wildlife Management Area in Roseau
- 34 county: motorboats may be used in the main channel of the
- 35 Roseau River. Motorboats of ten horsepower or less may be used
- 36 elsewhere within the area only during a waterfowl season.

- Talcot Lake Wildlife Management Area in Cottonwood 1
- 2 and Murray counties: motorboats may be used on Talcot Lake,
- except watercraft are not permitted on the north one-half of 3
- Talcot Lake during any waterfowl season. Only nonmotorized 4
- watercraft are permitted on the river and marshes within the 5
- areas open to public hunting. 6
- 7 Thief Lake Wildlife Management Area in Marshall
- 8 county: motorboats of ten horsepower or less may be used.
- 9 Walnut Lake Wildlife Management Area in Faribault
- motorboats of ten horsepower or less may be used in 10
- 11 that portion of the area known as South Walnut Lake.
- I. Gold Portage Wildlife Management Area in 12
- Koochiching and St. Louis counties: motorboats may be used with 13
- no limit on size. 14
- Subp. 10. General restrictions on vehicles. A person may 15
- 16 not operate an all-terrain vehicle, hang glider, air boat, hover
- craft, or personal watercraft defined in Minnesota Statutes, 17
- section 86B.005, within the boundaries of a wildlife management 18
- area, except that a disabled hunter with a permit approved by 19
- the regional wildlife manager may use an all-terrain vehicle. 20
- Without the written permission of the wildlife manager in 21
- charge, a person may not operate a snowmobile in a wildlife 22
- management area in that part of the state lying south and west 23
- of a line described as follows: 24
- 25
- U.S. Highway 2 from East Grand Forks east to Bemidji; thence south along U.S. Highway 71 to Wadena; thence east 26
- along U.S. Highway 10 to Staples and U.S. Highway 210 to 27
- Carlton; thence east in a straight line to the easterly 28
- boundary of the state. 29
- A vehicle may not be parked in a wildlife management area 30
- in front of a gate or in a manner that obstructs travel. 31
- Subp. 11. Motor vehicles on major areas. Motor vehicles 32
- licensed for use on a public highway may be operated up to 20 33
- miles per hour within the following wildlife management areas, 34
- unless posted otherwise: 35
- Carlos Avery Wildlife Management Area in Anoka and 36 Α.
- Chisago counties; 37
- Talcot Lake Wildlife Management Area in Cottonwood 38

- 1 and Murray counties;
- 2 C. Mille Lacs Wildlife Management Area in Kanabec and
- 3 Mille Lacs counties;
- 4 D. Red Lake Wildlife Management Area in Beltrami and
- 5 Lake of the Woods counties;
- 6 E. Roseau River Wildlife Management Area in Roseau
- 7 county;
- 8 F. Thief Lake Wildlife Management Area in Marshall
- 9 county;
- 10 G. Lac qui Parle Wildlife Management Area in Big
- 11 Stone, Chippewa, Lac qui Parle, and Swift counties; and
- 12 H. Whitewater Wildlife Management Area in Olmsted,
- 13 Wabasha, and Winona counties.
- 14 Vehicles may be operated only on established roads and may
- 15 not be driven beyond signs prohibiting vehicular use, beyond any
- 16 constructed vehicle barrier, or in a reckless or careless manner.
- 17 Subp. 12. Motor vehicles within other areas. Motor
- 18 vehicles licensed for use on a public highway are prohibited
- 19 within all other wildlife management areas, except that they may
- 20 be operated up to 20 miles per hour on those routes designated
- 21 by signs for travel purposes.
- 22 Subp. 13. Aircraft. Aircraft activities that chase, herd,
- 23 scare, or otherwise disturb wildlife are prohibited over
- 24 wildlife management areas, except in emergencies or by
- 25 authorization of the wildlife manager.
- Subp. 14. Firearms and target shooting. Target, trap,
- 27 skeet, or indiscriminate shooting is prohibited within a
- 28 wildlife management area except by permit from the
- 29 commissioner. A person may not possess an uncased or loaded
- 30 firearm or an uncased and strung bow, except when lawfully
- 31 taking a wild animal or by permit from the wildlife manager.
- 32 Subp. 15. Structures. A person may not construct or
- 33 maintain a building, dock, fence, billboard, sign, or other
- 34 structure within a wildlife management area. Temporary
- 35 waterfowl blinds may be erected but may not be used to preempt a
- 36 hunting location. Materials brought into the area for the

- 1 construction of blinds must be removed from the area each day at
- 2 the close of shooting hours.
- 3 Subp. 16. Stands. It is unlawful to construct, occupy, or
- 4 use any elevated scaffold or stand to watch for or take wild
- 5 animals in a wildlife management area, except that portable
- 6 stands may be used if they are removed each day at the close of
- 7 shooting hours and do no permanent damage. Spikes or nails
- 8 driven into trees are prohibited but screwing or clamping
- 9 devices are allowed if removed each day at the close of shooting
- 10 hours.
- 11 Subp. 17. Commercial and private business prohibited. A
- 12 person may not conduct any commercial operation, solicit
- 13 business, farm, or keep bees within a wildlife management area,
- 14 except as provided in subpart 5 or by contract, lease, permit,
- 15 or written agreement with the department.
- 16 Subp. 18. Disorderly conduct. Disorderly conduct, as
- 17 defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 609.72, is prohibited
- 18 within a wildlife management area.
- 19 Subp. 19. Abandonment of trash and property. The disposal
- 20 or abandonment of garbage, trash, spoil, sludge, rocks,
- 21 vehicles, carcasses, or other debris and the abandonment or
- 22 storage of property within a wildlife management area is
- 23 prohibited. Boats, decoys, or other property may not be left
- 24 unattended overnight, except for traps lawfully placed.
- Subp. 20. Destruction or removal of property. A person
- 26 may not destroy, disturb, or remove any plants, trees, or other
- 27 vegetative material, or signs, posts, fences, gates, buildings,
- 28 or other property in a wildlife management area, except that
- 29 wetland vegetation may be used to build blinds and edible fruits
- 30 or seeds and decorative portions of plants may be removed for
- 31 personal use. A person may not destroy or remove threatened or
- 32 endangered plants or animals as defined in chapter 6134. Wild
- 33 rice may not be harvested unless the area is specifically opened
- 34 by rule.
- 35 Subp. 21. Introduction of plants or animals. A person may
- 36 not release, place, or transplant in a wildlife management area

- any plant or animal life within a wildlife management area that
- did not originate within the area, unless approved by the
- wildlife manager. 3
- Subp. 22. Animal trespass. A person may not permit or 4
- allow livestock, horses, or other domestic animals within a 5
- wildlife management area, except: 6
- dogs accompanied by or under the control of the 7
- owner, except from April 16 through July 14 when dogs must be on 8
- a leash; or 9
- under a cooperative agreement or permit approved 10
- by the wildlife manager. Field trials are prohibited, except by 11
- permit from the wildlife manager. 12
- 13 Subp. 23. Department operations excluded. This part does
- not apply to persons lawfully engaged in the performance of 14
- their duties in the management and administration of wildlife 15
- management areas, including agents of the commissioner, persons 16
- operating under permit or contract with the department, and law 17
- 18 enforcement officers. Subparts 5 and 8 do not apply to resident
- managers or their guests while at their residences. 19
- 20 6210.0200 RED LAKE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA, BELTRAMI AND LAKE
- OF THE WOODS COUNTIES. 21
- The Red Lake Wildlife Management Area in Beltrami and Lake 22
- of the Woods counties, consists of that part of the state lying 23
- within the following described boundary: 24
- 25 All of Townships 155 and 156 North, Ranges 34 and 35 West:
- 26 and
- All of Townships 157 and 158 North, Ranges 34 and 35 West 27
- 28
- 29
- and those parts of Township 159 North, Ranges 34, 35, and 36 West, Townships 157, 158, and 159 North, Range 36 West, and Township 157 North, Ranges 32 and 33 West included in 30
- the following described boundary to wit: 31
- Beginning at the southeast corner of Section 36, Township 32
- 157 North, Range 36 West; thence westerly along the line 33
- common to Townships 156 and 157 North to the easterly 34
- right-of-way line of State Forest Road 49 known as Dick's 35 36
- Parkway; thence in a generally northerly direction along the easterly boundary of said road as it crosses Townships 157, 158, and 159 North, Range 36 West to the northwest corner of Section 20, Township 159 North, Range 36 West:

- 14 6210.0300 GOLD PORTAGE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA, KOOCHICHING AND
- 15 ST. LOUIS COUNTIES.
- 16 Subpart 1. Gold Portage Wildlife Management Area
- 17 description. The Gold Portage Wildlife Management Area,
- 18 Koochiching and St. Louis counties, consists of that part of the
- 19 following described lands and waters:
- All water areas of Rainy Lake within the fluctuating 20 21 waterline level and located within Sections 7 and 18 in Township 70 North, Range 21 West of the Fourth Principal 22 Meridian, and within Sections 12, 13, and 24 in Township 70 North, Range 22 West of the Fourth Principal Meridian. All 23 24 islands within the above water areas of Rainy Lake, which 25 would be definable as islands at a water level of 1,108.1 26 feet mean sea level, or higher, are also included in the management zone even though not technically islands below 27 28 the referenced level. 29
- 30 Subp. 2. Special provisions for Gold Portage Wildlife
- 31 Management Area. Taking species other than migratory birds and
- 32 fish within the Gold Portage Wildlife Management Area is
- 33 prohibited and portable stands may not be erected or used within
- 34 the wildlife management area.
- 35 CRITICAL NATURAL HABITAT
- 36 6210.0400 PRIORITIES FOR ACQUISITION AND IMPROVEMENT OF CRITICAL
- 37 NATURAL HABITAT.
- 38 Subpart 1. Specific criteria for selecting critical
- 39 natural habitat. As provided by Minnesota Statutes, section
- 40 84.944, the commissioner must consider the following specific
- 41 criteria in assessing the value of a proposed critical natural
- 42 habitat project:
- A. the occurrence of one or more of the state's
- 44 various rare natural resources including plants, animals, and
- 45 undisturbed natural ecological communities as identified by the

- 1 department's Natural Heritage Program;
- B. the existing and potential value of the project to
- 3 provide vital habitat for fish and wildlife, especially for
- 4 species identified for special management consideration;
- 5 C. the threat of habitat destruction if the project
- 6 is not carried out;
- 7 D. the surrounding land uses in terms of the amount
- 8 and type of similar habitat and the projected loss of habitat in
- 9 the area;
- 10 E. the location of the project within or adjacent to
- ll an existing management unit, including accessibility and
- 12 relationship to other existing state lands or waters;
- 13 F. the integrity of the land or water parcel and the
- 14 long-term viability of the project;
- G. the recreational potential of the parcel including
- 16 present and future demand and the opportunities to meet this
- 17 demand in the surrounding area; and
- 18 H. the projected acquisition or management costs and
- 19 potential future management problems.
- 20 Subp. 2. Prioritization of proposed projects. Proposed
- 21 projects that meet one or more of the specific criteria in this
- 22 part will be ranked by the commissioner in accordance with the
- 23 following priorities, listed in order of decreasing importance:
- 24 A. the potential contribution to the maintenance or
- 25 enhancement of populations of native plant, fish, and wildlife
- 26 species listed as endangered or threatened in chapter 6134;
- 27 B. the potential contribution to the protection or
- 28 enhancement of native ecological communities that are now
- 29 uncommon or diminishing;
- 30 C. the benefits provided to existing or potential
- 31 habitat for fish and wildlife populations; or
- 32 D. the enhancement of fish and wildlife oriented
- 33 recreation.
- 34 STROMATOLITES
- 35 6210.0500 POSSESSION, MOVING, OR DISTURBING STROMATOLITES.

- 1 Permits for the possession, moving, or disturbing of
- 2 stromatolites on the bed of or in any of the waters of the state
- 3 may be issued by the commissioner for bona fide scientific,
- 4 research, or educational purposes upon written application by
- 5 qualified persons, as determined by the commissioner, or
- 6 institutions. These permits shall contain conditions limiting
- 7 the number of stromatolites which may be possessed, and are
- 8 subject to cancellation at any time upon written notice provided
- 9 to the permittee.
- 10 LICENSES, PERMITS, AND EXEMPTIONS
- 11 GAME AND FISH LICENSE AGENTS AND SUBAGENTS
- 12 6212.0100 APPLICATIONS FOR GAME AND FISH LICENSE SUBAGENTS.
- 13 Subpart 1. Application for license subagents. County
- 14 auditors may appoint subagents for the sale of licenses, whether
- 15 cash or consignment, only upon the receipt of a completed
- 16 application. The application must be on a form prescribed by
- 17 the commissioner.
- Subp. 2. Applications must be approved by county auditor.
- 19 All applications must be signed by the applicant and approved by
- 20 the county auditor before licenses are furnished. If applicants
- 21 wish to sell licenses on consignment, they must include with
- 22 their application the required surety bond.
- Subp. 3. Applications made in triplicate. All
- 24 applications must be made in triplicate. The county auditor
- 25 must retain the original and must promptly forward one copy to
- 26 the commissioner. The remaining copy must be retained by the
- 27 applicant.
- 28 6212.0200 CONSIGNMENT OF GAME AND FISH LICENSES.
- 29 The county auditor must issue licenses on a consignment
- 30 basis to any subagent who has applied and who furnishes a valid
- 31 corporate surety bond properly issued by a corporation duly
- 32 licensed to issue such bonds in this state. Bonds must be:
- 33 A. in favor of the county;
- 34 B. in an amount equal to the maximum total value of
- 35 licenses, including any surcharge, but excluding the issuing

- 1 fee, expected to be held on consignment at any one time; and
- 2 C. conditioned upon the performance by the subagent
- 3 of all of the duties of a license subagent.
- 4 6212.0300 COMPLETION OF LICENSE FORMS.
- 5 Subpart 1. Licenses must be completed at place of sale.
- 6 County auditors or subagents selling licenses are responsible
- 7 for the completion of each license form of each license sold at
- 8 their place of business. Licenses must be completed using a
- 9 data recorder machine, ball point pen, or indelible pencil, in
- 10 such manner that all copies are legible.
- 11 Subp. 2. Signature requirements on license. The applicant
- 12 and the county auditor or subagent must sign their complete
- 13 names in the spaces provided so that they appear on all copies.
- 14 A rubber stamp or other device may not be used in lieu of a
- 15 signature. County auditors and subagents are responsible for
- 16 the issuance of licenses, however, employees of county auditors
- 17 or subagents may sign the name of the county auditor or subagent
- 18 followed by the initials of the employee.
- 19 Subp. 3. Restriction on issuance of resident license. A
- 20 resident license may not be issued to any person unless the
- 21 county auditor or subagent has ascertained, by personal
- 22 knowledge or written identification, that the applicant is a
- 23 resident as defined by Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.015.
- 24 6212.0400 RETURN OF "DNR COPY" OF LICENSES.
- 25 Immediately upon issuance, county auditors or subagents
- 26 must remove and return, to the License Bureau, the "DNR Copy" of
- 27 each license. Failure to promptly return completed department
- 28 copies may result in revocation of the subagent's authorization
- 29 to sell licenses.
- 30 6212.0500 REQUIRED RECORDS, REPORTS, AND PAYMENTS FOR ISSUANCE
- 31 OF GAME AND FISH LICENSES.
- 32 Subpart 1. Records required of county auditors and
- 33 subagents. County auditors must keep a record of all
- 34 transactions relating to licenses received by them and licenses

- l issued by them to their subagents, including licenses received,
- 2 sold, or returned for redemption or credit, fees collected,
- 3 commissions retained, remittances made, and cash on hand or
- 4 deposited, showing at all times the current status of the county
- 5 auditor's account and the account of each subagent. Subagents
- 6 must keep a record of all transactions relating to licenses
- 7 issued to them in the same manner as county auditors. All such
- 8 records may be subject to inspection and auditing by the
- 9 commissioner.
- 10 Subp. 2. Payments and returns of sold licenses by
- 11 subagents. Subagents must, on or before the 10th day of each
- 12 month, return to the auditor each sold-out license book from the
- 13 previous month. All proceeds from the sale of licenses, except
- 14 those for which the auditor has previously been paid, will be
- 15 paid to the auditor at the time the books are returned.
- 16 Partially sold license books and all proceeds from the sale of
- 17 licenses from such books must be returned to the auditor no
- 18 later than March 10 of each year.
- 19 Subp. 3. Retention of sold and unsold licenses by county
- 20 auditors. County auditors must preserve all sold and unsold
- 21 license books, whether sold by the auditor or a subagent, for at
- 22 least one year after the end of the license year.
- Subp. 4. Payments and reports by county auditors. County
- 24 auditors must, on or before the 15th day of each month, mail or
- 25 deliver a complete written report to the commissioner, either on
- 26 forms provided for such purpose or in a prescribed format,
- 27 covering all licenses issued and sold by the county auditor or
- 28 subagents during the preceding calendar month together with a
- 29 warrant on the county treasury for license fees as provided by
- 30 Minnesota Statutes, sections 97A.475 and 97A.485. If no license
- 31 fees were received during a preceding month, a written report so
- 32 stating must be made to the commissioner. If a county auditor
- 33 fails to submit these monthly reports within the specified time
- 34 period, the commissioner may withhold further consignments of
- 35 licenses to the county auditor until the report is received. An
- 36 immediate and complete accounting of all licenses consigned to

- 1 the county auditor during the current licensing year may be
- 2 required.
- 3 Subp. 5. Final reports of unsold licenses. The following
- 4 provisions apply to final reports of unsold licenses and
- 5 partially sold books:
- 6 A. Each subagent who has purchased or taken on
- 7 consignment licenses for resale must, not later than March 10 of
- 8 each year, return all unsold licenses and partially sold license
- 9 books to the county auditor, except that all unsold licenses to
- 10 take deer either by archery, firearm, or muzzleloader must be
- 11 returned to the auditor on the first business day after the last
- 12 day during which each type of license may be sold. The county
- 13 auditor must give to each subagent a cash refund for unsold

- 14 FISHING CONTESTS
- 15 6212.2400 PERMIT REQUIREMENTS FOR FISHING CONTESTS.
- 16 Issuance of permits for fishing contests is provided for by
- 17 Minnesota Statutes, section 97C.081. Permits may also be
- 18 required, as provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 86B.121, by
- 19 the sheriff of the county in which the contest is held.
- 20 Application to obtain a permit must be made a minimum of 14 days

- 33 6212.2500 PERMIT CONDITIONS.
- 34 Subpart 1. Permittee requirements. The contest permittee

- 1 must be an individual and a resident of this state. The
- 2 permittee is responsible for conducting the contest and may not
- 3 delegate responsibility to another party.
- 4 Subp. 2. Tagged and marked fish. Permits will be denied
- 5 for contests involving tagged or marked fish for identification
- 6 for special rewards.
- 7 Subp. 3. Trout waters. Permits may be denied when the
- 8 proposed contest water is managed for trout.
- 9 Subp. 4. Limitation on number of boats. Contest
- 10 participation will be limited to not more than one boat for each
- 11 ten acres of contest water.
- 12 Subp. 5. High use periods. Permits may be denied for
- 13 opening day, holidays, or other high use periods.
- 14 Subp. 6. Limitation on number of contests per lake.
- 15 Permits may be denied if more than one contest of seven days or
- 16 less would be in progress on any one water body on the same day.
- 17 Subp. 7. Game fish spawning periods. Permits may be
- 18 denied if contests coincide with game fish spawning periods.
- 19 Subp. 8. Live release tournaments. Permits for live
- 20 release tournaments may be denied when anticipated environmental
- 21 conditions may cause increased mortality of released fish.
- 22 Subp. 9. Limitation on number of contests per year. The
- 23 maximum number of contests that may be held annually on any one
- 24 water body may be limited.
- Subp. 10. Limitations on contest length. Permits may be
- 26 denied for contests exceeding eight hours in length during any
- 27 contest day.
- Subp. 11. Restrictions on live bait use. Permits may be
- 29 denied for live release contests where use of live bait may
- 30 cause increased mortality.
- 31 Subp. 12. Restrictions on research waters. Permits may be
- 32 denied for contests on waters where research projects are being
- 33 conducted.
- 34 Subp. 13. Restrictions on negative impact. Permits may be
- 35 denied for contests that the commissioner determines will have
- 36 excessive negative impact on natural resources or that pose

- l unacceptable safety risks for participants.
- 2 6212.2600 POSSESSION OF FISH.
- 3 Subpart 1. Possession limits. Possession limits for
- 4 contest waters apply to all contest participants at all times
- 5 except that the total number of fish killed by a contest
- 6 participant may not exceed one possession limit per event.
- 7 Subp. 2. Restrictions on sorting. Once a limit of fish
- 8 has been reduced to possession, no culling or live well sorting
- 9 of that species is allowed.
- 10 Subp. 3. Authority to hold and release fish. In contests
- 11 where fish may be returned to the contest water, the permittee
- 12 may be authorized to hold healthy fish and release them
- 13 immediately following weigh-in. Suitable release sites may be
- 14 specified in the permit.
- 15 6212.2700 CONTEST OPERATION.
- Subpart 1. Restriction on use of public accesses. No
- 17 contest may preempt use of a boat ramp or parking spaces at
- 18 public access to contest waters.
- 19 Subp. 2. Removal of debris. The permittee will be
- 20 responsible for removal of all debris, rubbish, trash, or dead
- 21 fish resulting from the contest.
- 22 Subp. 3. Inspection and removal of exotic organisms.
- 23 Inspection and removal of exotic organisms including, but not
- 24 limited to, species such as zebra mussels or Eurasian water
- 25 milfoil, as provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 18.317, from
- 26 boats and trailers entering and leaving water accesses is
- 27 required.
- 28 Subp. 4. Restriction on lotteries. No contest or any
- 29 drawing or raffle conducted in conjunction with the contest may
- 30 constitute an illegal lottery as provided by Minnesota Statutes,
- 31 section 609.75, or violate the provisions of the lawful gambling
- 32 law as provided by Minnesota Statutes, sections 349.11 to 349.23.
- 33 6212.2800 FISHING CONTEST REPORTING REQUIREMENT.
- 34 The permittee must submit a report of contest activities on

- 1 forms provided by the commissioner within 30 days after
- 2 completion of the contest. All information requested on the
- 3 report must be provided. Failure to submit a report as required
- 4 may render the permittee ineligible for future permits.
- 5 TRANSFER OF WILD ANIMALS BY GIFT
- 6 6214.0100 TRANSFER OF WILD ANIMALS BY GIFT.
- 7 Subpart 1. Requirements for receipt of gifted animals.
- 8 Lawfully taken protected wild animals may be transferred by
- 9 gift. Unless otherwise provided by this part, the donor must
- 10 prepare a receipt containing the following information and give
- 11 it to the recipient at the time of transfer:
- 12 A. name and address of donor;
- B. name and address of recipient;
- 14 C. date of transfer;
- D. description of gift, including number and species;
- 16 and
- E. license number under which the animal was taken,
- 18 or, if acquired by the donor other than by taking, a description
- 19 of how the animal was acquired.
- 20 Subp. 2. Retention of receipt with gift. Lawfully taken
- 21 protected wild animals and their parts may be acquired by gift.
- 22 Unless otherwise provided by this part, the recipient of these
- 23 animals may possess them only if a receipt has been received
- 24 from the donor and retained in possession as described in this
- 25 part.
- Subp. 3. Gift by members of same household. A receipt is
- 27 not required if both the donor and the recipient are members of
- 28 the same household and the transferred animal is stored in that
- 29 household.
- 30 PUBLIC ACCESS
- 31 6218.0100 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF PUBLIC WATER ACCESS
- 32 SITES.
- 33 Subpart 1. Parking restrictions. Vehicles must be parked
- 34 only in designated parking areas and may not obstruct any avenue
- 35 of ingress or egress to the site or launch area, except when

- 1 loading and unloading watercraft or other equipment.
- 2 Subp. 2. Taking of wildlife prohibited. A person may not
- 3 take any wildlife species, except fish by angling, on a public
- 4 water access site.
- 5 Subp. 3. Restrictions on possession of firearms, bows and
- 6 arrows, and other weapons. A person may not possess loaded
- 7 firearms within a public water access site or use any firearm,
- 8 bow and arrow, air rifle, slingshot, or other missile propelling
- 9 weapon.
- 10 Subp. 4. Plants at public water access sites protected. A
- 11 person may not remove, destroy, or damage any vegetation from a
- 12 public water access site, except as posted or permitted.
- 13 Subp. 5. Livestock prohibited. A person may not permit
- 14 livestock to enter a public water access site.
- Subp. 6. Burning prohibited. Burning within a public
- 16 water access site is allowed only in designated locations.
- Subp. 7. Destruction of public property prohibited. The
- 18 destruction of any public property within a public water access
- 19 site is prohibited.
- Subp. 8. Camping prohibited. A person may not camp on or
- 21 remain in a vehicle overnight in any public water access site,
- 22 unless the site is posted for this use by the commissioner.
- Subp. 9. Abandonment or storage of fish houses, dark
- 24 houses, other structures, or property prohibited. A person may
- 25 not leave, store, or abandon a fish house, shelter house, dark
- 26 house, other structure, or property within a public water access
- 27 site.
- Subp. 10. Storage of watercraft prohibited. A person may
- 29 not leave, store, or moor any watercraft on a public water
- 30 access site overnight.
- 31 Subp. 11. Obstruction prohibited. A person may not place
- 32 any obstacle or moor any watercraft in a manner that obstructs
- 33 ingress or egress to a public water access site.
- 34 Subp. 12. Compatible uses. Public water access sites may
- 35 be used for swimming unless otherwise posted.
- 36 Subp. 13. Intoxicating liquor prohibited. A person may

- 1 not consume intoxicating liquor within a public water access
- 2 site.
- 3 6218.0200 PUBLIC WATER ACCESS SITES WITH RESTRICTED USES.
- 4 Unless otherwise posted, a person may not use the following
- 5 public water access sites for any purpose other than loading or
- 6 unloading a watercraft or other equipment or while legally
- 7 performing activities related to the exercise of a license or
- 8 registration issued by the department:
- 9 A. North Long Lake, T. 135, R. 31, Crow Wing county;
- B. Round Lake, T. 135, R. 31, Crow Wing county; and

- 12 HUNTING REGULATIONS AND REQUIREMENTS FOR REFUGES
- 13 AND PUBLIC LANDS
- 14 WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS
- 15 6230.0100 DEFINITIONS.
- 16 Subpart 1. Scope. The terms used in this chapter have the
- 17 meanings given them in this part.
- 18 Subp. 2. Special goose season. "Special goose season"
- 19 means an open season for the taking of geese where quotas exist
- 20 on the numbers of hunters or harvest or a season that is
- 21 restricted in area or time from the regular statewide seasons.
- Subp. 3. Waterfowl season. "Waterfowl season" means any
- 23 open season for the taking of migratory waterfowl.
- 24 6230.0200 SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS.
- 25 Subpart 1. Areas requiring a permit to trap. The
- 26 following wildlife management areas are open to trapping with a
- 27 permit:
- 28 A. Carlos Avery in Anoka and Chisago counties;
- B. Hubbel Pond in Becker county;
- 30 C. Red Lake in Beltrami and Lake of the Woods
- 31 counties;
- 32 D. Talcot Lake in Cottonwood and Murray counties;
- 33 E. Mille Lacs in Mille Lacs and Kanabec counties;
- F. Lac qui Parle in Big Stone, Lac qui Parle, Swift,

- 1 and Chippewa counties;
- 2 G. Orwell in Otter Tail county;

  I. Thief Lake in Marshall county;
- J. Rothsay in Wilkin county; and
- 6 K. Whitewater in Olmsted, Wabasha, and Winona
- 7 counties.
- 8 Subp. 2. Trapping permits. On areas where trapping
- 9 permits are required, the number of trapping permits may be
- 10 limited to avoid undue depletion of the furbearer resources or
- 11 to prevent excessive crowding of trappers. The wildlife manager
- 12 may establish a method, including a drawing, for impartially
- 13 selecting the persons who may trap. An application for a
- 14 trapping permit may be rejected if the trapper has failed to
- 15 submit a trapping report for the previous season. Permits may
- 16 be revoked at any time if the permittee violates any law or
- 17 regulation or fails to comply with the requirements of the
- 18 permit.
- 19 Subp. 3. Areas closed to migratory waterfowl hunting. The
- 20 Gordon F. Yeager Wildlife Management Area in Olmsted county and
- 21 the Carl Schmidt Wildlife Management Area in Morrison county are
- 22 closed to the taking of migratory waterfowl.
- Subp. 4. Areas with hunting, trapping, and firearms
- 24 restrictions. The Bayport Wildlife Management Area in
- 25 Washington county and the Raguet Wildlife Management Area in
- 26 Scott and Carver counties are:
- 27 A. closed to the trapping of unprotected mammals,
- 28 except when there is an open trapping season for a protected
- 29 species;
- 30 B. closed to the possession of firearms unless
- 31 unloaded and contained in a case, except that shotguns with only
- 32 No. 4 buckshot or smaller diameter shot may be used during the
- 33 small game season in posted areas; and
- 34 C. open to the possession and use of lawful archery
- 35 equipment in designated hunting areas during established hunting
- 36 seasons.

- In the Bayport Wildlife Management Area, all firearms will
- 2 be allowed on the specified rifle range when supervised by the

- 4 Subp. 5. Areas closed to hunting and trapping. The
- 5 Boerner Wildlife Management Area in Sibley county, the Buelow
- 6 Wildlife Management Area in Steele county, the Bryson Wildlife
- 7 Management Area in Freeborn county, and the Hutchinson Wildlife
- 8 Management Area in McLeod county are closed to the hunting and
- 9 trapping of all species.
- 10 Subp. 6. Areas closed to hunting only. The Hearding
- 11 Island Wildlife Management Area in St. Louis county is closed to
- 12 the hunting of all species.
- Subp. 7. Areas open to waterfowl hunting only. The Gold
- 14 Portage Wildlife Management Area in Koochiching and St. Louis
- 15 counties is open to waterfowl hunting during the established
- 16 season. It is closed to all other hunting and to trapping.
- Subp. 8. Areas open to hunting beginning with the opening
- 18 of waterfowl season. The Uppgaard Wildlife Management Area in
- 19 Crow Wing county is open to hunting and trapping beginning on
- 20 the opening date of the regular migratory waterfowl season.
- 21 Unprotected species may not be taken, except during the same
- 22 time and by the same methods legal to take protected species.
- Subp. 9. Areas closed to firearms deer hunting. The Lake
- 24 Blanche Wildlife Management Area in Otter Tail county is closed
- 25 to firearms deer hunting.
- 26 STATE GAME REFUGES
- 27 6230.0300 PERMIT REQUIRED TO TRAP BEAVER AND OTTER.
- 28 A person may not trap beaver or otter within any
- 29 state-owned game refuge without first obtaining a permit from
- 30 the appropriate wildlife manager.
- 31 NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES AND FEDERAL WATERFOWL
- 32 PRODUCTION AREAS
- 33 6230.1200 GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES AND
- 34 FEDERAL WATERFOWL PRODUCTION AREAS.
- 35 Subpart 1. Waterfowl production areas open unless posted.

- 1 Unless otherwise posted, waterfowl production areas are open to
- 2 hunting and trapping.
- 3 Subp. 2. Refuges closed to taking of otter. National
- 4 wildlife refuges are closed to the taking of otter.
- 5 6230.1300 SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES.
- 6 Subpart 1. National wildlife refuges open to hunting. The
- 7 national wildlife refuges described in the following subparts
- 8 are open to the hunting and trapping of protected wild animals
- 9 during the state seasons and subject to special federal
- 10 regulations, except as otherwise provided.
- 11 Subp. 2. Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge, Marshall county.
- 12 Portions of Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge in Marshall county
- 13 are open to firearm hunting of deer and moose. Areas closed to
- 14 hunting are posted as "Area Beyond This Sign Closed," or as
- 15 shown on maps available at Refuge Headquarters.
- Subp. 3. Big Stone National Wildlife Refuge, Big Stone and
- 17 Lac qui Parle counties. Portions of Big Stone National Wildlife
- 18 Refuge in Big Stone and Lac qui Parle counties are open to
- 19 firearm and archery hunting of deer, muzzleloader hunting of
- 20 deer by permit, and firearm hunting of cottontail rabbit, jack
- 21 rabbit, gray squirrel, fox squirrel, red and gray fox, gray
- 22 partridge, and pheasant in areas posted as "Public Hunting Area"
- 23 or as shown on maps available at parking areas and Refuge
- 24 Headquarters.
- Subp. 4. Rice Lake National Wildlife Refuge, Aitkin county.
- 26 Portions of Rice Lake National Wildlife Refuge in Aitkin county
- 27 are open to firearm hunting of deer by special permit,
- 28 cottontail rabbit, snowshoe hare, gray squirrel, fox squirrel,
- 29 ruffed grouse, and spruce grouse in areas posted as "Public
- 30 Hunting Area" or as shown on maps available at Refuge
- 31 Headquarters.
- 32 Subp. 5. Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge, Sherburne
- 33 county. Portions of Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge in
- 34 Sherburne county are open to firearm and archery hunting of deer
- 35 and firearm hunting of cottontail rabbit, jack rabbit, snowshoe

- 1 hare, gray squirrel, fox squirrel, ruffed grouse, pheasant,
- 2 woodcock, Wilson's snipe, sora rail, and Virginia rail. Hunting
- 3 in closed areas and target shooting are prohibited. Maps of
- 4 hunting areas are available at Refuge Headquarters.
- 5 Subp. 6. Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge in Becker county.
- 6 Portions of Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge in Becker county
- 7 are open to firearm and archery hunting of deer and firearm
- 8 hunting of cottontail rabbit, jack rabbit, snowshoe hare, gray
- 9 squirrel, fox squirrel, ruffed grouse, snipe, woodcock, rails,
- 10 coots, and waterfowl in areas posted as "Public Hunting Area" or
- ll as shown on maps available at Refuge Headquarters.
- 12 Subp. 7. Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and
- 13 Fish Refuge, Wabasha, Winona, and Houston counties. Portions of
- 14 the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge
- 15 located in Wabasha, Winona, and Houston counties are open to
- 16 hunting except as follows: Hunting is prohibited between March
- 17 l and September l, except that hunting of wild turkey is
- 18 permitted during the spring turkey seasons. In areas posted
- 19 closed, hunting of all protected species, except geese, is
- 20 permitted beginning the day after the close of the duck season.
- 21 For more information contact Refuge Headquarters.
- 22 Subp. 8. Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge,
- 23 Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, and Scott counties. Portions of the
- 24 Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge known as Louisville
- 25 Swamp located near Carver in Scott county, and the Wilkie Unit
- 26 in Scott county, are open to deer hunting in accordance with
- 27 state and special regulations. Portions of the refuge in
- 28 Hennepin, Scott, Carver, and Dakota counties may be open to
- 29 waterfowl hunting. Areas open will be posted with signs saying
- 30 "Open to Waterfowl Hunting Special Regulations in Effect -
- 31 Consult Refuge Manager." Other areas may be open to waterfowl
- 32 hunting by special use permit.
- 33 BIG GAME REGULATIONS
- 34 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS
- 35 6232.0100 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS FOR TAKING BIG GAME.

- 1 Subpart 1. Inspection. All big game must be transported
- 2 in such a manner that inspection by registration agents or
- 3 conservation officers is readily accomplished.
- 4 Subp. 2. Animal possession. Persons taking big game must
- 5 retain any required license, permit, seal, or tag as long as any
- 6 of the meat is in their possession.
- 7 Subp. 3. Bow and arrow casing and stand requirements. All
- 8 licensed big game hunters hunting by archery must have their
- 9 bows unstrung or cased while in the field from 30 minutes after
- 10 the close of shooting hours to 30 minutes before the start of
- 11 shooting hours daily. A licensed archery hunter may not occupy
- 12 an elevated stand at any time from sunset to one hour before
- 13 sunrise while in possession of a bow and arrow unless the bow is
- 14 cased and on the ground.
- 15 Subp. 4. Elevated stands in state parks. It is unlawful
- 16 to construct, occupy, or use any elevated blind or stand for the
- 17 purpose of hunting, observing, or killing big game in state
- 18 parks, when opened to hunting, except that portable stands or
- 19 blinds may be used for this purpose provided they are removed
- 20 each day at the close of hunting hours and do no permanent
- 21 damage.
- 22 Subp. 5. Removal from site of kill. A person may
- 23 field-dress or hang a big game animal at the site of the kill,
- 24 but may not remove it from the site without the tag being
- 25 attached.
- Subp. 6. Wounded game included in bag limit. Wounded or
- 27 captured game reduced to possession must be killed before being
- 28 removed from the site where taken, and once reduced to
- 29 possession must be included in a person's daily bag limit.
- 30 DEER
- 31 6232.0200 DEFINITIONS.
- 32 Subpart 1. Scope. The terms used in parts 6232.0200 to
- 33 6232.2550 have the meanings given them in this part.
- 34 Subp. 2. Antlerless deer. "Antlerless deer" means does,
- 35 fawns, and bucks with no antler three inches or more in length.

- Subp. 3. Antlerless permit area. "Antlerless permit area"
- 2 means an area of the state consisting of one or more deer
- 3 registration blocks where taking antlerless deer is authorized
- 4 by permit.
- 5 Subp. 4. Bait. "Bait" means grains, fruits, vegetables,
- 6 nuts, hay, or other food transported and placed for the purpose
- 7 of attracting or enticing deer. Liquid scents, salt, and
- 8 minerals are not bait.
- 9 Subp. 5. Deer management permit. "Deer management permit"
- 10 means a license to take and tag a second deer available for
- 11 one-half the cost of a regular resident or nonresident license.
- 12 Subp. 6. Legal buck. "Legal buck" means a deer having at
- 13 least one antler three inches or more in length.
- 14 Subp. 7. Registration block. "Registration block" means a
- 15 geographic area designated for the registration of harvested
- 16 deer and bear as provided by part 6232.4700.
- 17 6232.0300 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS FOR TAKING DEER.
- 18 Subpart 1. Zone and date options. A firearm deer hunter
- 19 may purchase either a regular firearm license or a multizone
- 20 buck license. A hunter purchasing a regular firearm license,
- 21 including a hunter choosing a muzzleloader option, must select
- 22 only one of the zone and date options listed on the license.
- 23 For the regular firearm season, this choice will be indicated by
- 24 a punched hole at the time of purchase. A person may only hunt
- 25 deer by firearms within the zone and date options indicated on
- 26 the person's license.
- 27 Subp. 2. Modification of quota numbers for group
- 28 applications. The quota of licenses or permits for a drawing
- 29 may be increased to accommodate group members if the last
- 30 applicant to be selected is a member of a group.
- 31 Subp. 3. Party hunting. A party is a group of two or more
- 32 licensed deer hunters who are afield hunting together and are
- 33 all using firearms or all using archery equipment. A member of
- 34 a party may kill a deer for another member of the party who has
- 35 an unused tag valid for that deer. A mixed-weapons group is

- 1 considered two separate parties. Multizone buck licensees may
- 2 party hunt with regular firearms licensees.
- 3 Subp. 4. Baiting. A person may not place or use bait for
- 4 the purpose of taking deer. This restriction does not apply to
- 5 food resulting from normal or accepted farming, forest
- 6 management, wildlife management, orchard management, or other
- 7 similar land management activities.
- 8 Subp. 5. Tagging. The seal or the tag must be affixed
- 9 around the tendon or bone of a hind leg, around the base of an
- 10 antler, or through a slit cut in either ear so that the seal
- 11 cannot be readily removed.
- 12 Subp. 6. License validation. At the time a deer is tagged
- 13 at the site of kill, the license of the person whose tag is
- 14 affixed to the deer must be validated. Validation consists of
- 15 using a knife or similar sharp object to cut out or a pen to
- 16 indelibly mark the appropriate notch on the license indicating:
- 17 A. the month the deer was taken;
- 18 B. the date the deer was taken; and
- 19 C. the time of day the deer was taken.
- Subp. 7. All-terrain vehicle use by licensed hunters. A
- 21 person licensed to take deer must not operate an all-terrain
- 22 vehicle in an area open for the taking of deer by firearms
- 23 during legal shooting hours on a day that they are licensed to
- 24 take deer within that area except from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.
- 25 each day. For purposes of this chapter, all-terrain vehicles
- 26 are vehicles, including trail bikes, three-wheelers,
- 27 four-wheelers, tracked vehicles, or other manufactured or
- 28 homemade vehicles, must not be licensed for highway use. Motor
- 29 vehicles licensed for and being lawfully operated on a public
- 30 road or highway, or farm tractors being used for agricultural
- 31 purposes, are exempt from this subpart. This subpart applies to
- 32 all lands and waters regardless of ownership except that a
- 33 person using an all-terrain vehicle in pursuing an occupation on
- 34 the person's own land and not in possession of a firearm is
- 35 exempt. A permit to operate these vehicles during the
- 36 restricted hours may be issued by a conservation officer in the

- 1 event of an emergency or other unusual conditions. Legal use of
- 2 snowmobiles during the open deer season is governed by part
- 3 6100.5100.
- 4 6232.0400 REGISTRATION OF DEER.
- 5 Subpart 1. Bow and arrow deer registration. Persons
- 6 taking deer by archery must, within 48 hours after taking,
- 7 present the deer to a designated deer registration station or
- 8 other authorized agent who must provide a possession tag to be
- 9 affixed to the carcass as specified by part 6232.0300, subpart 5.
- 10 Subp. 2. Firearms deer registration. Persons taking a
- 11 deer by firearms must present the deer for registration at a

- 5 6234.1200 TAKING RACCOON.
- 6 Subpart 1. Open season. Raccoons may be taken statewide
- 7 with legal firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping from 9:00
- 8 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 15 to December 31.
- 9 Subp. 2. Bag limits. Residents may take and possess
- 10 raccoons without limit. Nonresidents may not take more than 20
- 11 raccoons per season or possess more than 20 raccoons at a time.
- 12 Subp. 3. Special provisions. The special provisions in
- 13 items A and B apply to taking raccoons.
- A. A person may use an artificial light to locate,
- 15 attempt to locate, or shoot a raccoon only if the raccoon has
- 16 been treed or put at bay by dogs. The use of dogs and lights to
- 17 take raccoon is regulated as provided by Minnesota Statutes,
- 18 sections 97B.081, 97B.621, and 97B.931.
- B. Each raccoon or, if the pelt is removed, the pelt
- 20 of a raccoon taken by a nonresident must be tagged by the person
- 21 taking it at the time and place where taken with a locking
- 22 possession tag furnished with the license. These tags must be
- 23 fastened to the raccoon or its pelt in the manner as provided by
- 24 part 6234.2600.
- 25 6234.1300 TAKING RED FOX AND GRAY FOX.
- Subpart 1. Open season. Red fox and gray fox may be taken
- 27 statewide with legal firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping
- 28 from 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday nearest September 16 to March 15.
- 29 Subp. 2. Bag limits. Residents may take and possess red
- 30 fox and gray fox without limit. Nonresidents may not take more
- 31 than an aggregate of five red and gray fox per season, or
- 32 possess more than an aggregate of five red and gray fox at a
- 33 time.
- 34 Subp. 3. Tagging. Each red or gray fox or, if the pelt is
- 35 removed, the pelt of red fox or gray fox taken by a nonresident

- 1 must be tagged by the person taking it at the time and place
- 2 where taken with a locking possession tag furnished with the
- 3 license. These tags must be fastened to the fox or its pelt in
- 4 the manner as provided by part 6234.2600.
- 5 Subp. 4. Special provisions. The special provisions in
- 6 items A and B apply to taking red fox and gray fox.
- 7 A. Fox may be run without being taken by the use of
- 8 dogs at any time during the year except from March 16 to July 14
- 9 or under permit.
- B. Dogs may be used for hunting fox during the open
- ll season.
- 12 6234.1400 TAKING BADGER AND OPOSSUM.
- 13 Subpart 1. Open season. Badgers and opossums may be taken
- 14 statewide with legal firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping
- 15 from 9:00 a.m. on the Friday nearest October 22 to the last day
- 16 in February.
- 17 Subp. 2. Bag limits. Badgers and opossums may be taken
- 18 and possessed without limit.
- 19 6234.1500 TAKING LYNX.
- 20 Taking lynx is prohibited statewide.
- 21 6234.1600 TAKING BOBCAT.
- 22 Subpart 1. Open season. Bobcats may be taken with legal
- 23 firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping from the Saturday
- 24 nearest December 1 to the Sunday nearest January 6.
- Subp. 2. Open area. Bobcats may be taken only in that
- 26 area of the state lying north of U.S. Highway 10.
- 27 Subp. 3. Bag limits. A person may not take more than five
- 28 bobcats per season by either hunting or trapping or both. A
- 29 person may not possess more than five bobcats at a time, except
- 30 that a person may possess additional pelts that the person
- 31 lawfully took, tagged, and registered during previous seasons.
- 32 Subp. 4. Tagging bobcats. Pelts and skinned carcasses are
- 33 subject to the provisions of part 6234.2600. Each bobcat or
- 34 pelt taken by a nonresident must be tagged by the person taking

- 1 it at the time and place where taken with a locking possession
- 2 tag furnished with the license. These tags must be fastened to
- bobcats or pelts in the manner as provided by part 6234.2600. 3
- 6234.1700 TAKING FISHER. 4
- 5 Subpart 1. Open season and area. Fisher may be taken only
- in the Forest Furbearer Zone by trapping from the Saturday 6
- nearest December 1 to the Sunday nearest December 16. 7
- 8 Subp. 2. Bag limits. A person may not take more than one
- 9 fisher per season or possess more than one fisher at a time,
- 10 except that a person may possess additional pelts that the
- person lawfully took, tagged, and registered during previous 11
- 12 seasons.
- Subp. 3. Tagging. Each fisher pelt must be tagged by the 13
- 14 person taking it at the time and place where taken with a
- 15 locking possession tag issued by the state. These tags must be
- 16 obtained prior to the season according to the procedure provided
- 17 by part 6234.2600. Tags will not be issued to persons under
- 18 five years of age. Tags must be fastened to fisher pelts in the
- 19 manner provided by part 6234.2600. Pelts and skinned carcasses
- are subject to the provisions of part 6234.2600. 20
- 21 6234.1800 TAKING PINE MARTEN.
- 22 Subpart 1. Open season. Pine marten may be taken by
- 23 trapping from the Saturday nearest December 1 to the Sunday
- nearest December 16. 24
- Subp. 2. Open area. Pine marten may be taken only in the 25
- following described area: 26
- 27 Beginning at the north boundary of the state at the point
- due north of the junction of State Trunk Highway (STH) 11 28
- and STH 72; thence due south to said junction; thence south along STH 72 to STH 1; thence east along STH 1 to STH 65; 29 30
- thence south along STH 65 to U.S. Highway 169; thence east 31
- 32
- along U.S. Highway 169 to STH 37; thence east along STH 37 to U.S. Highway 53; thence south along U.S. Highway 53 to 33
- 34
- the north shore of Lake Superior; thence along the north shore of Lake Superior to the north boundary of the state; thence along the north boundary of the state to the point 35
- 36
- 37 of beginning.
- 38 Subp. 3. Bag limits. A person may not take more than two
- pine marten per season or possess more than two pine marten at a 39
- 40 time, except that a person may possess additional pelts which

- 1 the person has lawfully taken, tagged, and registered during
- 2 previous seasons.
- 3 Subp. 4. Tagging pine marten. Each pine marten or pelt
- 4 must be tagged by the person taking it at the time and place
- 5 where taken with a locking possession tag issued by the state.
- 6 These tags must be obtained prior to the season according to the
- 7 procedure provided by part 6234.2600. Tags will not be issued
- 8 to persons under five years of age. Tags must be fastened to
- 9 the pine marten or their pelts in the manner provided by part

- 12 6234.1900 TAKING BEAVER.
- 13 Subpart 1. Open season and bag limits for beaver in North
- 14 Zone. Beaver may be taken and possessed without limit by
- 15 trapping from 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 26 to
- 16 April 30.
- 17 Subp. 2. Open season and bag limits for beaver in South
- 18 Zone. Beaver may be taken and possessed without limit by
- 19 trapping from 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 30 to
- 20 April 30.
- 21 6234.2000 TAKING OTTER.
- 22 Subpart 1. Open season for otter in North Zone. Otter may
- 23 be taken by trapping from 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday nearest
- 24 October 26 to the Sunday nearest January 6.
- 25 Subp. 2. Open season and area for otter in South Zone.
- 26 Otter may be taken only in that portion of the zone lying north
- 27 of U.S. Highway 10 by trapping from 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday
- 28 nearest October 30 to the Sunday nearest January 6.
- Subp. 3. Bag limits. A person may not take more than four
- 30 otter per season, or possess more than four otter at a time,
- 31 except that a person may possess additional pelts that the
- 32 person lawfully took, tagged, and registered during previous
- 33 seasons.
- 34 Subp. 4. Tagging otter. Each otter or pelt must be tagged
- 35 by the person taking it at the time and place where taken with a

- l locking possession tag issued by the state. These tags must be
- 2 obtained according to the procedure provided by part 6234.2600.
- 3 Tags will not be issued to a person under five years of age.
- 4 Tags must be fastened to otter or their pelts in the manner
- 5 provided by part 6234.2600. Pelts are subject to the provisions
- 6 of part 6234.2600.
- 7 6234.2100 SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR TAKING BEAVER AND OTTER.
- 8 Subpart 1. Setting of traps. Traps of any kind may not be
- 9 set inside a beaver house or above the water line on the outside
- 10 of a beaver house.
- 11 Subp. 2. Damage to beaver house or dam. A person may not
- 12 damage a beaver house or dam.
- 13 Subp. 3. Use of snowmobiles and all-terrain vehicles.
- 14 Snowmobiles and all-terrain vehicles may be used statewide to
- 15 transport or check beaver or otter traps and to transport beaver
- 16 or otter carcasses.
- 17 Subp. 4. Taking in wildlife management areas. Beaver and
- 18 otter may be taken by licensed trappers in wildlife management
- 19 areas by permit issued by the appropriate state wildlife manager.
- 20 Subp. 5. Taking in federal waterfowl production areas.
- 21 Waterfowl production areas are open to the trapping of beaver
- 22 and otter during established seasons.
- Subp. 6. Taking in national wildlife refuges. Within the
- 24 Agassiz, Minnesota Valley, Rice Lake, Sherburne, Tamarac, and
- 25 Upper Mississippi National Wildlife Refuges, beaver may be taken
- 26 by licensed trappers by permit issued by the appropriate refuge
- 27 manager. All other national wildlife refuges are closed to
- 28 beaver trapping. All national wildlife refuges are closed to
- 29 otter trapping.
- 30 USE OF TRAPS
- 31 6234.2200 USE OF TRAPS.
- 32 Subpart 1. Trap-tending hours and use of lights.
- 33 Trap-tending hours and use of lights are regulated as provided
- 34 by Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.931.
- 35 Subp. 2. Trap-tending interval; nondrowning sets. Any

- 1 trap capable of capturing a protected wild animal and not
- 2 capable of drowning the animal must be tended at least once each
- 3 calendar day and any animal captured must be removed from the
- 4 trap.
- 5 Subp. 3. Trap-tending interval; drowning sets. Except for
- 6 traps set under the ice, any trap capable of drowning the
- 7 captured animal must be tended at least once each third calendar
- 8 day and any animal captured must be removed from the trap.
- 9 Subp. 4. Exposed bait. A person may not set or maintain
- 10 any leghold trap within 20 feet of bait located in such a manner
- 11 that it may be seen by soaring birds.
- 12 Subp. 5. Size restriction on body-gripping traps. A
- 13 person may not set, place, or operate, except as a waterset, any
- 14 body-gripping or "conibear" type trap that has a maximum jaw
- 15 opening, when set, of greater than 7-1/2 inches measured from
- 16 the inside edges of the body-gripping portions of the jaws.
- 17 Subp. 6. Size restriction on leghold traps. A person may
- 18 not set, place, or operate any leghold trap that has a maximum
- 19 jaw opening, when set, of greater than 8-3/4 inches measured
- 20 from the inside edges of the jaws.
- 21 Subp. 7. Placement of body-gripping traps. A person may
- 22 not set, place, or operate in or within three feet of a culvert,
- 23 except as a completely submerged waterset, any body-gripping or
- 24 "conibear" type trap that has a maximum jaw opening, when set,
- 25 of greater than 6-1/2 inches measured from the inside edges of
- 26 the body-gripping portions of the jaws.
- 27 Subp. 8. Multiple-catch traps. A trap capable of taking
- 28 more than one animal at a time may not be used.
- 29 Subp. 9. Preemption of trapping site. Prior to the
- 30 opening of the trapping season for any protected species of wild
- 31 animal, no trap, either set or unset, may be placed or staked
- 32 and no flag, stake, or other device may be placed for the
- 33 purpose of marking or preempting a trapping site.
- 34 Subp. 10. Removal of traps. A trap placed for a protected
- 35 wild animal may not be left in place, either set or unset, after
- 36 the close of the applicable trapping season.

- 1 Subp. 11. Use of dogs while setting or tending traps. A
- 2 person may not be accompanied by a dog while engaged in tending
- 3 or setting traps for protected wild animals, unless the dog is
- 4 harnessed and attached to a sled or securely tethered to a tree
- 5 or other stationary object with a leash of no more than 15 feet
- 6 in length.
- 7 Subp. 12. Authorized agent. A trapper may authorize, in
- 8 writing, an agent who possesses all necessary licenses to check,
- 9 pick up, and reset, at the same site, traps set by the trapper.
- 10 Authorized agents may remove trapped animals and, if the animal
- 11 removed from the trap is required to be tagged as provided by
- 12 part 6234.2600, must affix their own tag to the animal as
- 13 prescribed.
- 14 USE OF SNARES
- 15 6234.2300 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF SNARES.
- 16 Subpart 1. Regulation of snares as traps. Unless
- 17 otherwise specified, snares may be used for taking all species
- 18 of protected wild animals that may be taken by the use of
- 19 traps. The use of snares is subject to all rules for the use of
- 20 traps that are consistent with parts 6234.2300 to 6234.2500.
- 21 Subp. 2. Snaring fox. Snares may not be used for taking
- 22 fox in the Farmland Furbearer Zone. Snares may be used for
- 23 taking fox in the Forest Furbearer Zone by permit issued by a
- 24 conservation officer. Permits are effective during the regular
- 25 fox trapping season and are valid until revoked.
- Subp. 3. Snaring bobcat and lynx. Bobcat and lynx may not
- 27 be taken by the use of snares.
- 28 6234.2400 SPECIAL RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF SNARES.
- 29 Subpart 1. Scope. The provisions of parts 6234.2300 to
- 30 6234.2500 apply to the use of snares capable of taking a wild
- 31 animal protected under provisions of Minnesota Statutes,
- 32 sections 97B.601 to 97B.671 or 97B.901 to 97B.945.
- 33 Subp. 2. Watersets in Farmland Zone. In the Farmland
- 34 Furbearer Zone, a person may not set, place, or operate any
- 35 snare except as a waterset.

- 1 Subp. 3. Snaring in culverts. A person may not set,
- 2 place, or operate a snare in a culvert, except as a completely
- 3 submerged waterset.
- 4 Subp. 4. Removal of snares. A snare set for a protected
- 5 mammal may not be left in place after the close of the
- 6 applicable trapping season.
- 7 Subp. 5. Prohibition on snares placed in deer trails.
- 8 Snares may not be set in deer trails.
- 9 Subp. 6. Use of spring poles. Snares may not be used with
- 10 spring poles or other devices where an animal caught in the
- 11 snare will be wholly or partly lifted from the ground.
- 12 Subp. 7. Snare height. A snare may not be set so that the
- 13 top of the loop is more than 16 inches above the ground or, when
- 14 the ground is snow-covered, more than 16 inches above the bottom
- 15 of a person's footprint made in the snow beneath the snare with
- 16 full body weight on the foot.
- 17 Subp. 8. Snare loop diameter. The diameter of a snare
- 18 loop may not exceed ten inches.
- 19 Subp. 9. Snare cable diameter. Snare cable or wire may
- 20 not exceed one-eighth inch in diameter.
- 21 Subp. 10. Tending snares. All snares not capable of
- 22 drowning the captured animal must be tended at least once each
- 23 calendar day and any animal captured must be removed from the
- 24 snare.
- 25 6234.2500 USE OF SNARES BY PREDATOR CONTROLLERS.
- 26 Certified predator controllers may use snares statewide at
- 27 any time while conducting predator control authorized by the
- 28 commissioner as provided by this chapter.
- 29 TAGGING AND REGISTRATION OF PELTS
- 30 6234.2600 PELT TAGGING AND REGISTRATION.
- 31 Subpart 1. Possession tag application. Possession tags
- 32 may be obtained as provided in items A to E.
- 33 A. Application for fisher, otter, or pine marten
- 34 possession tags must be made on forms provided by the
- 35 commissioner. Persons who have reached their 13th birthday by

- 1 the Friday nearest October 29 may not apply for possession tags
- 2 without first purchasing a valid trapping license. Persons who
- 3 have not yet reached their 13th birthday by the Friday nearest
- 4 October 29 may apply for possession tags by supplying their
- 5 birth date in place of trapping license number, except that no
- 6 possession tags will be issued to persons born less than five
- 7 years prior to the application deadline.
- 8 B. A person may not submit more than one application
- 9 for a legal allotment of fisher, otter, and pine marten
- 10 possession tags. Any application that is not completed in
- 11 accordance with the instructions on the application will be
- 12 rejected.
- C. Completed applications must be either mailed or
- 14 delivered to the License Bureau.
- D. The application deadline is the Friday nearest
- 16 October 29.
- 17 E. The applicant's portion of the possession tag
- 18 application will be completed by the department and returned to
- 19 the applicant. This portion is a part of the trapper's license
- 20 to take fisher, otter, and pine marten and must be in the
- 21 trapper's possession while taking or transporting these species.
- 22 Subp. 2. Possession tagging. Any possession tag or seal
- 23 required to be affixed to a pelt at the time and place where
- 24 taken must be fastened through the mouth and one eye opening in
- 25 such a way that it cannot be removed without breaking the lock.
- 26 Furbearer tags are not transferable.
- 27 Subp. 3. Registration of pelts. The pelt of each bobcat,
- 28 fisher, pine marten, and otter and the whole carcass of each
- 29 bobcat and pine marten must be presented, by the person taking
- 30 it, to a conservation officer for registration before the pelt
- 31 is sold and before the pelt is transported out of the state, but
- 32 in no event more than 48 hours after the season closes. The
- 33 entire carcass of bobcat and pine marten and the lower jaw or
- 34 head of fisher must be surrendered to the conservation officer.
- 35 The pelt of bobcat, fisher, and pine marten must have been
- 36 removed from the carcass.

- 1 Subp. 4. Prohibition on tagging animals not personally
- 2 taken. A person may not affix any tag or seal to the pelt or
- 3 carcass of any animal that the person did not take or is not
- 4 authorized to take.
- 5 Subp. 5. Requirement for tags and seals to remain affixed.
- 6 Possession and registration tags or seals must remain affixed to
- 7 the raw pelt until the pelt is tanned or mounted.
- 8 SPECIAL FURBEARER RESTRICTIONS
- 9 6234.2700 SPECIAL RESTRICTIONS ON TAKING AND POSSESSION OF
- 10 FURBEARERS.
- 11 The restrictions in items A and B apply to the possession
- 12 and transportation of accidental captures.
- A. A person may not possess or transport a fisher,
- 14 otter, pine marten, fox, bobcat, lynx, or timber wolf that was
- 15 accidentally killed or was lawfully killed while causing or
- 16 threatening injury or damage until the person notifies the local
- 17 conservation officer, other authorized department employee, or
- 18 regional enforcement office, of the killing and receives
- 19 authorization to possess, transport, or skin the animal.
- B. A person may possess or transport mink, muskrat,
- 21 beaver, badger, opossum, or raccoon accidentally killed or
- 22 lawfully killed while causing or threatening injury or damage,
- 23 only if the local conservation officer or other authorized
- 24 employee of the department is notified within 24 hours of such
- 25 killing and before any skinning has begun.
- 26 TAKE A KID HUNTING
- 27 6234.3500 TAKE A KID HUNTING.
- Take A Kid Hunting Weekend, as provided by Minnesota
- 29 Statutes, section 97A.445, is the weekend beginning on the
- 30 Saturday nearest September 23.
- 31 TURKEYS
- 32 TURKEY HUNTING
- 33 6236.0100 DEFINITIONS.
- 34 Subpart 1. Scope. The terms used in this chapter have the

- 1 meanings given them in this part.
- 2 Subp. 2. Agricultural or grazing land. "Agricultural
- 3 land" or "grazing land" has the meaning given "agricultural
- 4 land" under Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.001.
- Subp. 3. Bearded turkey. "Bearded turkey" means a turkey
- 6 with a visible beard. A beard is a feathered appendage
- 7 protruding from the breast and generally found only on males.
- 8 Subp. 4. Landowner or tenant. "Landowner" or "tenant"
- 9 means a person who is an owner or tenant of and who lives on at
- 10 least 40 acres of agricultural or grazing land within the zone
- ll being applied for.
- 12 6236.0200 TURKEY LICENSE ELIGIBILITY.
- To be eligible for a turkey license, a person must not have
- 14 any small game hunting privileges revoked within one year prior
- 15 to purchasing a turkey license.
- 16 6236.0300 TURKEY HUNT DRAWING.
- 17 Subpart 1. License application drawings. Drawings will be
- 18 conducted by the department to determine persons who will be
- 19 eligible to purchase licenses for each season. The drawings
- 20 will be subject to the quotas established by the commissioner.
- 21 Preference in the respective drawings is given to applicants
- 22 based upon the number of times they have correctly applied for a
- 23 license for that hunt but have been unsuccessful. A person
- 24 selected by the drawings is eligible to purchase a license to
- 25 hunt turkey. Upon issuance of a turkey license for the spring
- 26 or fall season, all accumulated preference for that season is
- 27 lost.
- 28 Subp. 2. Participation in application drawings.
- 29 Applicants may complete an application form for either the
- 30 spring or fall turkey hunt or both. Qualifying individuals may
- 31 apply for the resident landowner-tenant turkey drawing. All of
- 32 the following information must be supplied on the application
- 33 forms:
- 34 A. A resident applicant 18 years or older must
- 35 provide the applicant's individual Minnesota driver's license

- 1 number of 13 characters, a 13-character firearms safety number,
- 2 or an official state of Minnesota identification number of 13
- 3 characters issued by the Department of Public Safety.
- B. A nonresident 18 years or older must provide a
- 5 driver's license number or other identification number.
- 6 C. A resident or nonresident applicant age 12 to 15
- 7 by the opening day of the season may provide one of the above
- 8 numbers or may participate in the drawing without a number by
- 9 providing the applicant's full first, middle, and last name and
- 10 date of birth. Youthful applicants who do not provide a number
- ll will be placed into the drawing using a number generated by the
- 12 department.
- D. An applicant must choose one of the zones and one
- 14 of the time periods.
- 15 E. Up to four persons desiring to hunt together as a
- 16 group may apply by submitting their drawing applications in one
- 17 envelope. Applications by a group must all be for the same zone
- 18 and time period. The person within a group with the lowest
- 19 preference rating will determine the preference rating of the
- 20 group. Properly completed applications which are submitted in
- 21 one envelope will either all be selected or none selected.
- 22 Mixing landowner-tenant applications with general applications
- 23 will not be permitted for purposes of applying as a group.
- 24 F. A person who makes a faulty application or who
- 25 applies as a landowner or tenant but does not meet the
- 26 definition as provided by this part will be ineligible for that
- 27 season's drawings.
- 28 G. Application deadlines are as follows:
- 29 (1) spring season: the first Friday in December;
- 30 and
- 31 (2) fall season: the Friday nearest June 29.
- 32 Subp. 3. Landowner-tenant drawing. A landowner-tenant
- 33 license application drawing will be held subject to the
- 34 following restrictions:
- 35 A. An applicant must meet all eligibility
- 36 requirements and must provide a complete and accurate

- 1 description of the qualifying land.
- B. An applicant must be a landowner, tenant, or a
- 3 member of the landowner's or tenant's immediate family.
- 4 C. For each zone and time period, no more than 20
- 5 percent of the successful participants will be drawn from the
- 6 special landowner-tenant applications.
- 7 D. An individual participant in the landowner-tenant
- 8 drawing may submit only one application and only for the turkey
- 9 zone in which the participant resides.
- 10 E. Applicants unsuccessful in the landowner-tenant
- 11 drawing will be included in the general drawing.
- F. Landowner-tenant licensees must allow turkey
- 13 hunting as provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.435, and
- 14 the commissioner will provide descriptions of these lands to
- 15 licensed turkey hunters.
- Subp. 4. Modification of quota numbers for group
- 17 applications. The quota of licenses or permits for a drawing
- 18 may be increased to accommodate group members if the last
- 19 applicant to be selected is a member of a group.
- 20 Subp. 5. Drawing application fee. An applicant must
- 21 submit, along with the application, a cashier's check, money
- 22 order, or personal check payable to the Minnesota Department of
- 23 Natural Resources. Any check that is returned to the department
- 24 for nonpayment will invalidate the application and the check

- 4 6238.0100 DEFINITIONS.
- 5 Subpart 1. Scope. The terms used in this chapter have the
- 6 meanings given them in this part.
- 7 Subp. 2. Bred in captivity or captive-bred. "Bred in
- 8 captivity" or "captive-bred" means raptors, including eggs,
- 9 hatched or produced in captivity from parents that mated or
- 10 otherwise transferred gametes in captivity.
- 11 Subp. 3. Eyases. "Eyases" means young raptors not yet
- 12 capable of sustained flight.
- Subp. 4. Falconry. "Falconry" means the taking of quarry
- 14 by means of a trained raptor.
- 15 Subp. 5. Passage raptor. "Passage raptor" means a
- 16 juvenile raptor capable of flight.
- 17 Subp. 6. Permit. "Permit" means a falconry permit issued
- 18 by the commissioner under part 6238.0200, unless otherwise
- 19 specified.
- 20 Subp. 7. Raptor. "Raptor" means a live bird of the family
- 21 Falconidae, or the great horned owl (Bubo virginianus), or of
- 22 the family Accipitridae, other than the bald eagle (Haliaeetus
- 23 leucocephalus) and the golden eagle (Aquila chrysaetos).
- Subp. 8. Take. "Take" means to trap, capture, or attempt
- 25 to trap or capture for falconry purposes.
- 26 6238.0200 FALCONRY PERMIT.
- 27 Subpart 1. Permit requirements for residents. Unless a
- 28 falconry permit has been obtained from the commissioner, a
- 29 resident of this state may not take, possess, transport,
- 30 transfer, use, sell, purchase, barter, or offer to sell,
- 31 purchase, or barter raptors or their eggs.
- 32 Subp. 2. Permit requirements for nonresidents.
- 33 Nonresidents who have a valid falconry permit in the country,
- 34 state, province, or territory of their residence or who are
- 35 lawfully entitled or permitted to practice falconry may

- 13 percent on a supervised examination provided by the
- 14 commissioner. An applicant who fails the examination must wait
- 15 a minimum of two weeks before retaking the examination.
- Subp. 5. Inspection. Before a falconry permit is issued,
- 17 the raptor housing facilities and falconry equipment must be
- 18 inspected and approved by the commissioner. If necessary, an
- 19 inspection may be conducted prior to permit renewal.
- 20 Subp. 6. Facility standards. Applicants must possess the
- 21 minimum facilities in items A and B.
- 22 A. Indoor facilities (mews) must be large enough to
- 23 allow easy access for care of the raptors housed in the
- 24 facility. If more than one raptor is to be kept in the mews,
- 25 raptors must be tethered or separated by partitions and the area
- 26 for each bird must be large enough to allow the bird to fully
- 27 extend its wings. There must be a secure door that can be
- 28 easily closed, and at least one window, protected on the inside
- 29 by vertical bars, spaced narrower than the width of the bird's
- 30 body. The floor of the mews must permit easy cleaning and must
- 31 be well drained. Adequate perches must be provided. If tethers
- 32 are used, they must be at least long enough to allow the birds
- 33 to reach the floor.
- 34 B. Outdoor facilities (weathering area) must be
- 35 fenced and covered with netting or wire, or roofed to protect
- 36 the birds from disturbance and attack by predators except that

- 1 perches more than 6-1/2 feet high need not be covered or
- 2 roofed. The enclosed area must be large enough to ensure the
- 3 birds cannot strike the fence when flying from the perch.
- 4 Protection from excessive sun, wind, and inclement weather must
- 5 be provided for each bird. Adequate perches must be provided.
- 6 If tethers are used, they must be at least long enough to allow
- 7 the birds to reach the ground.
- 8 Subp. 7. Equipment standards. An applicant must possess
- 9 the following minimum equipment:
- 10 A. at least one pair of Alymeri jesses or similar
- 11 type constructed of pliable, high-quality leather or suitable
- 12 synthetic material, to be used when any raptor is flown free
- 13 (traditional one-piece jesses may be used on raptors when not

- B. at least one flexible, weather-resistant leash and
- 16 one strong swivel of acceptable falconry design as specified in
- 17 information provided by the department;
- 18 C. at least one suitable drinking and bathing
- 19 container for each raptor, two to six inches deep and of a width
- 20 and length each greater than the length of the raptor;
- D. at least one weathering area perch of an
- 22 acceptable design, as specified in information provided by the
- 23 department, for each raptor; and
- 24 E. a reliable scale or balance suitable for weighing
- 25 a raptor, graduated to increments of not more than one-half
- 26 ounce (15 grams).
- 27 Subp. 8. Maintenance. Facilities and equipment must meet
- 28 the standards provided by this part at all times.
- 29 6238.0300 FALCONRY PERMIT CLASSES.
- 30 Specifications for the three classes of falconry permits
- 31 are contained in items A to C.
- A. A Class III (apprentice) permittee:
- 33 (1) must be at least 14 years old;
- 34 (2) must be sponsored during the first two years
- 35 in which an apprentice permit is held, regardless of the age of

- 1 the permittee. The sponsor must be the holder of a Class II
- 2 (general) or Class I (master) falconry permit. A sponsor may
- 3 not have more than three apprentices at any one time;
- 4 (3) may not possess more than one raptor and may
- 5 not obtain more than one raptor for replacement during any

- 7 (4) may possess only the following raptors, which

- 10 (5) may only take an adult or passage kestrel or
- 11 a passage red-tailed hawk from the wild.
- B. A Class II (general) permittee:
- 13 (1) must be at least 18 years old;
- 14 (2) must have at least two years' experience in
- 15 the practice of falconry at the Class III level or its
- 16 equivalent;
- 17 (3) may not possess more than two raptors and may
- 18 not obtain more than two raptors for replacement birds during
- 19 any 12-month period; and
- 20 (4) may not take, transport, or possess any owls
- 21 or any species listed as threatened or endangered under state or
- 22 federal law.
- C. A Class I (master) permittee:
- (1) must have at least five years' experience in
- 25 the practice of falconry at the Class II level or its
- 26 equivalent;
- 27 (2) may not possess more than three raptors and
- 28 may not obtain more than two raptors taken from the wild for
- 29 replacement birds during any 12-month period;
- 30 (3) may not take any species listed as endangered
- 31 in state or federal regulations, but may transport or possess
- 32 such species in accordance with applicable rules;
- 33 (4) may not take, transport, or possess any
- 34 golden eagle for falconry purposes unless authorized in writing
- 35 in accordance with appropriate federal regulations and approved
- 36 by the commissioner; and

- 1 (5) may not take in any 12-month period, as a
- 2 part of the three bird limitation, more than one raptor listed
- 3 as threatened in state or federal regulations, and then only in
- 4 accordance with applicable rules.
- 5 6238.0400 RESTRICTIONS ON TAKING RAPTORS.
- 6 Subpart 1. Eyases. Eyases may be taken from the wild only
- 7 by a Class II or Class I falconer during the period of May 27
- 8 through July 14. No more than two eyases may be taken by the
- 9 same permittee during the calendar year. In all cases at least
- 10 one eyas must be left in a given nest.

- 25 A. Raptors must be registered.
- B. Title to raptors remains in the state of Minnesota.
- C. Raptors may not be sold, bartered, transferred, or
- 28 transported out of the state except with prior authorization
- 29 from the commissioner.
- 30 D. Raptors may be transferred as gifts between
- 31 holders of Minnesota permits, but the transfer must be reported
- 32 by the recipient within five working days to the department
- 33 regional headquarters where the bird was registered.
- 34 Subp. 6. Raptors taken outside Minnesota. Residents who
- 35 obtain raptors lawfully taken outside this state may possess and

- 1 use them for falconry purposes in this state only with proof of
- 2 lawful possession. Raptors must be registered by submitting a
- 3 Federal Form 3-186A (Migratory Bird Acquisition/Disposition
- 4 Report) as provided by part 6238.0800.
- 5 Subp. 7. Areas closed to taking raptors. Raptors to be
- 6 used for falconry may not be taken under any circumstances
- 7 within state parks or scientific and natural areas, state
- 8 wildlife management areas without a permit from the regional
- 9 wildlife manager, state game refuges without a permit from the
- 10 regional enforcement officer, or private property without
- 11 permission from the owner.
- 12 Subp. 8. Use of traps. Traps used to capture raptors must
- 13 be attended.
- 14. 6238.0500 INTENTIONAL RELEASE OF RAPTORS.
- 15 Permittees must obtain written authorization from the
- 16 commissioner before any species not indigenous to this state is
- 17 intentionally released to the wild. The band from the released
- 18 bird must be removed and surrendered to the department regional
- 19 office within five working days of release. Whenever possible,
- 20 a standard federal bird band must be attached to released birds.
- 21 6238.0600 TEMPORARY HOLDING OF RAPTORS.
- 22 Subpart 1. Federal form required. A raptor possessed
- 23 under authority of a Minnesota falconry permit may be

- 6 exceed 30 days, unless written authorization to extend the
- 7 period is obtained from the department regional office where the
- 8 falconry permit is issued.
- 9 6238.0700 RETENTION AND EXCHANGE OF FEATHERS.
- 10 Feathers that are molted or feathers from birds lawfully
- 11 held in captivity that have died may be retained and exchanged
- 12 only for imping purposes. Such feathers may not be sold or
- 13 bartered.
- 14 6238.0800 REPORTING AND MARKING OF FALCONS.
- 15 Subpart 1. Banding requirement. All raptors taken,
- 16 possessed, or transported for falconry purposes must be banded.
- 17 Captive-bred raptors must be banded with a numbered, seamless
- 18 band provided by the department regional office where the
- 19 permittee's permit is issued, or by the United States Fish and
- 20 Wildlife Service. Raptors taken from the wild must be banded
- 21 with a permanent, nonreusable band.
- 22 Subp. 2. Reporting of raptor acquisition or loss or
- 23 removal of bands. All acquisitions of raptors or loss or
- 24 removal of any band must be reported within five working days by
- 25 submitting a Federal Form 3-186A in accordance with the
- 26 instructions on the form. The blue copy must be submitted to
- 27 the department regional office where the permittee's permit is
- 28 issued.
- 29 Subp. 3. United States Fish and Wildlife Service band. If
- 30 the United States Fish and Wildlife Service band affixed to a
- 31 raptor becomes illegible, the owner must notify the department
- 32 regional office where the permit is issued.
- 33 6238.0900 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS.
- 34 Subpart 1. Required reporting for each bird. A permittee

- 1 may not take, purchase, receive, otherwise acquire, buy, sell,
- 2 barter, transfer, or dispose of any raptor, including death of
- 3 the raptor, unless the permittee submits, within five working
- 4 days, Federal Form 3-186A completed, in accordance with the
- 5 instructions on the form, for each bird. The blue copy must be
- 6 submitted to the department regional office where the permit is
- 7 issued.
- 8 Subp. 2. Change of address. Changes of address must be

- 27 6240.2600 TAKING COMMON CROWS IN WATERFOWL PRODUCTION AREAS,
- 28 GAME REFUGES, AND WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS.
- 29 Common crows may be taken on federal waterfowl production
- 30 areas that are open to hunting. Common crows may also be taken
- 31 within state game refuges open to small game hunting, except
- 32 those refuges closed to waterfowl hunting. Common crows may be
- 33 taken during the open season between September 1 and the last
- 34 day of February within wildlife management areas, unless

- 1 otherwise closed to hunting.
- 2 SHOOTING PRESERVES
- 3 6242.0100 DEFINITION OF SHOOTING PRESERVE.
- 4 A shooting preserve is a privately operated facility where
- 5 protected wild animals are released for shooting outside
- 6 regularly established seasons and regulations. Only species
- 7 authorized on the shooting preserve license may be released and
- 8 taken. A person, corporation, or partnership may not operate a
- 9 shooting preserve without a valid license. There are two
- 10 classes of shooting preserve, private and commercial, as
- 11 provided by Minnesota Statutes, sections 97A.115 and 97A.121.
- 12 6242.0200 GENERAL PROVISIONS FOR SHOOTING PRESERVES.
- 13 Subpart 1. License requirement and application procedure
- 14 for shooting preserves. Application for a shooting preserve
- 15 license must be made on forms provided by the commissioner.
- 16 Additional information may be required when renewing a license
- 17 or changing an area or species.
- 18 Subp. 2. Tagging requirements. Harvested game, except
- 19 ducks that are marked according to regulations of the United
- 20 States Fish and Wildlife Service, must be tagged with a
- 21 self-sealing tag, purchased from the commissioner, identifying
- 22 the private shooting preserve. Birds dressed and packaged in a
- 23 nonreusable sealed bag identified by the shooting preserve's
- 24 name or license number need not be tagged. The tag or package
- 25 labeling must remain attached while the bird is transported.
- Subp. 3. Posting requirements. The boundaries of shooting
- 27 preserves must be posted with signs with letters at least two
- 28 inches high. The sign must include the language "Licensed
- 29 Shooting Preserve" and "No Trespassing," must be signed by the
- 30 owner or manager, and must be posted at intervals of not more
- 31 than 500 feet around the entire boundary of the shooting
- 32 preserve.
- 33 Subp. 4. Marking of released birds. Released ring-necked
- 34 pheasants must be identifiable by a clipped outer toe of the
- 35 right foot, evidence of wearing blinders, or debeaking.

- 1 Released ducks must be identifiable by having had the hind toe
- 2 (Hallux) of the right foot removed before the age of four
- 3 weeks. Marking is not required on other species released for
- 4 hunting.
- 5 Subp. 5. Required records. Records must be kept current
- 6 within 48 hours and maintained for three years following the
- 7 year of creation.
- 8 Subp. 6. Required annual report. An annual report must be
- 9 submitted by each shooting preserve on a form provided by the
- 10 commissioner. This report is due by March 15 of each year for
- 11 the preceding calendar year.
- 12 6242.0300 OPERATION OF PRIVATE SHOOTING PRESERVES.
- 13 Private shooting preserves are authorized in counties
- 14 outside the pheasant range including Norman, Becker, Wadena,
- 15 Cass, Crow Wing, Aitkin, and Carlton counties and counties to
- 16 the north of those counties.
- 17 6242.0400 OPERATION OF COMMERCIAL SHOOTING PRESERVES.
- A person hunting waterfowl on a commercial shooting
- 19 preserve is required to have federal and state waterfowl stamps
- 20 and a small game license, except when taking only pen-reared and
- 21 marked mallards.
- 22 6242.0900 RESTRICTIONS ON SALE OF GAME FARM ANIMALS.
- 23 Subpart 1. Sales receipt requirement. For every sale of
- 24 animal parts, or products, the game farm licensee must complete
- 25 a sales receipt, provided by the commissioner, containing the
- 26 following information:
- A. name, address, and game farm license number of
- 28 licensee;
- B. name and address of purchaser or person to whom
- 30 sale is made;
- 31 C. species, number, and kinds of animals, parts, or
- 32 products sold; and
- D. identification numbers, if the animals sold are
- 34 marked with numbered tags, bands, or tattoos.

- 1 Subp. 2. Department receives original of sales receipt.
- 2 The original copy of the sales receipt of a game farm animal
- 3 must be mailed to the Division of Enforcement within 48 hours of
- 4 completion of the transaction. A second copy must be given to
- 5 the purchaser at the time the transaction is made. A third copy
- 6 must be retained by the licensee and be subject to inspection by
- 7 the commissioner. A fourth copy must be submitted to the local
- 8 conservation officer.
- 9 Subp. 3. Shipping animals by common carrier. When
- 10 animals, parts, or products are shipped by common carrier or are
- 11 transported other than by the purchaser or receiver, a second
- 12 copy of the receipt must be attached to the outside of the box,
- 13 crate, or container, or to one of the containers if a single
- 14 shipment is made in several containers.
- 15 PRIVATE FISH HATCHERIES
- 16 6250.0100 DEFINITIONS.
- 17 Subpart 1. Scope. The terms used in this chapter have the
- 18 meanings given them in this part.
- 19 Subp. 2. Approved laboratory methods. "Approved
- 20 laboratory methods" means methods described in the latest
- 21 edition of the Procedures for the Detection and Identification
- 22 of Certain Fish Pathogens published by the American Fisheries
- 23 Society Fish Health Section, also known as the Fish Health Blue
- 24 Book.
- 25 Subp. 3. Aquatic life. "Aquatic life" has the meaning
- 26 given to "private aquatic life" as defined by Minnesota
- 27 Statutes, section 17.47, and for purposes of commercial
- 28 transactions, aquatic life is livestock.
- 29 Subp. 4. Certifiable diseases. "Certifiable diseases"
- 30 include channel catfish virus, bacterial kidney disease,
- 31 bacterial furunculosis, enteric redmouth disease, enteric
- 32 septicemia of catfish, infectious hematopoietic necrosis virus,
- 33 infectious pancreatic necrosis virus, whirling disease,
- 34 proliferative kidney disease, viral hemorrhagic septicemia
- 35 virus, ceratomyxosis, epizootic epitheliotropic virus, and any

- 1 emergency disease.
- Subp. 5. Containment facility. "Containment facility"
- 3 means a licensed facility for salmonids or catfish that complies
- 4 with items A, C, and D, or B, C, and D:
- 5 A. disinfects its effluent to the standards provided
- 6 by part 6250.0800 before the effluent is discharged to public
- 7 waters;
- B. does not discharge into public waters or into
- 9 waters of the state directly connected to public waters;
- 10 C. raises aquatic life for food consumption only;
- 11 D. contains aquatic life requiring a fish health
- 12 inspection prior to transportation.
- Subp. 6. Emergency fish disease. "Emergency fish disease"
- 14 means a designated disease not already present in this state
- 15 that could impact populations of aquatic life if inadvertently
- 16 released by infected aquatic life including, but not limited to,
- 17 viral hemorrhagic septicemia virus, infectious hematopoietic
- 18 necrosis virus, infectious pancreatic necrosis virus, whirling
- 19 disease, ceratomyxosis, proliferative kidney disease, channel
- 20 catfish virus, epizootic epitheliotropic virus disease, or any
- 21 other disease listed in a rule or published by the commissioner
- 22 in the State Register on an emergency basis to be effective for
- 23 not more than 240 days.
- Subp. 7. Enzootic. "Enzootic" means a disease that is
- 25 known to occur within well-defined geographic boundaries.
- Subp. 8. Fish health inspection. "Fish health inspection"
- 27 means an on-site statistically based sampling in accordance with
- 28 procedures set forth in the Fish Health Blue Book for all lots
- 29 of fish on the facility.
- 30 Subp. 9. Fish health inspector. "Fish health inspector"
- 31 means an individual certified as a fish health inspector by the
- 32 American Fisheries Society or a state, federal, or provincial
- 33 resource management agency, except that a certification may not
- 34 be made by an inspector who has a conflict of interest in
- 35 connection with the outcome of the certification.
- 36 Subp. 10. Game fish. "Game fish" is defined by Minnesota

- 1 Statutes, section 97A.015, except that green or orange spotted
- 2 sunfish are not considered game fish for purposes of determining
- 3 fish of significant public value.
- 4 Subp. 11. Intensive culture. "Intensive culture" means
- 5 the rearing of fish at densities greater than can be supported
- 6 in the natural environment.
- 7 Subp. 12. Licensed facility. "Licensed facility" means a
- 8 licensed private fish hatchery including all licensed waters.
- 9 Subp. 13. Lot. "Lot" means a group of fish of the same
- 10 species and age that originated from the same discrete spawning
- 11 population and that always have shared a common water supply.
- 12 Various age groups of adult brood stock of the same species may
- 13 comprise the same lot if they have shared the same containers
- 14 for one brood cycle.
- Subp. 14. Minnows. "Minnows" is defined by Minnesota
- 16 Statutes, section 97A.015, except the 12-inch restriction on
- 17 sucker minnows does not apply.
- 18 Subp. 15. Public waters. "Public waters" is defined by
- 19 Minnesota Statutes, section 103G.005.
- Subp. 16. Quarantine facility. "Quarantine facility"
- 21 means a culture system that is enclosed in a building and is
- 22 separated from other fish culture facilities where fish can be
- 23 isolated and maintained while preventing their introduction or
- 24 pathogen introduction into the environment.
- Subp. 17. Standard facility. "Standard facility" means a
- 26 licensed facility with a continual or intermittent discharge of
- 27 effluent to public waters.
- Subp. 18. Waters of the state. "Waters of the state" is
- 29 defined by Minnesota Statutes, section 103G.005.
- 30 6250.0200 FISH HATCHERY OPERATIONS.
- 31 Subpart 1. Acquisition and sale of private aquatic life.
- 32 Aquatic life legally possessed may be bought, acquired, and sold
- 33 by licensed facilities as provided by this chapter.
- 34 Subp. 2. Acquisition from state. The commissioner may
- 35 sell aquatic life to licensed facilities at fair market value.

- 1 Fair market value must be determined by the average market price
- 2 charged in this state and contiguous states and provinces for
- 3 similar quantities.
- 4 Subp. 3. Methods to harvest aquatic life. Licensed
- 5 facilities may use all reasonable methods to operate and harvest
- 6 aquatic life from licensed facilities, including nets.
- 7 Subp. 4. Discharge may require permit. The discharge from
- 8 a private fish hatchery must comply with discharge permits
- 9 required by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency.
- 10 Subp. 5. Ownership of aquatic life. The following
- 11 provisions apply to the ownership of aquatic life:
- 12 A. Notwithstanding other provisions of law, aquatic
- 13 life lawfully acquired and possessed by a licensed facility is
- 14 private aquatic life and property of the owner of the licensed
- 15 facility.
- B. Private aquatic life in public waters may become
- 17 property of the state if the waters are not part of a licensed
- 18 facility. The commissioner will notify the licensee that the
- 19 aquatic life in a facility that is no longer licensed will
- 20 become property of the state if the aquatic life is not
- 21 removed. If the licensee does not respond in writing within 30
- 22 days after receiving the notice and make alternative
- 23 arrangements, or does not remove the aquatic life by 60 ice-free
- 24 days after receiving the notice, the private aquatic life
- 25 becomes property of the state.
- 26 C. Private aquatic life that is transferred to the
- 27 state or released into public waters that are not part of a
- 28 licensed facility is owned by the state and may be considered
- 29 wildlife.
- 30 Subp. 6. Control of licensed waters. The following
- 31 provisions apply to the use of licensed waters by the public:
- 32 A. If the public cannot legally access waters of the
- 33 state that are part of a licensed private fish hatchery except
- 34 by permission of the licensee, the use of the waters by the
- 35 public is subject to restriction by the licensee.
- 36 B. Waters of the state may not be licensed for

- 1 aquaculture use to more than one licensee.
- 2 Subp. 7. Angling in licensed waters. A person may not
- 3 take fish by angling from waters subject to subpart 6, unless
- 4 the person has written permission from the licensee and:
- A. has an invoice when in possession of fish; or
- 6 B. takes fish under an angling license, subject to
- 7 the limits and conditions in the game and fish laws.
- 8 6250.0300 FISH HATCHERY LICENSE.
- 9 Subpart 1. License required. The following provisions
- 10 apply to the licensing of a private fish hatchery:
- 11 A. A person or entity may not operate a private fish
- 12 hatchery without first obtaining a private fish hatchery license
- 13 from the commissioner.
- B. An application for a private fish hatchery license
- 15 must be made on a form provided by the commissioner.
- 16 C. A license issued by the commissioner is not a
- 17 determination of private property rights, but is only based on a
- 18 determination that the private fish hatchery does not have a
- 19 significant detrimental impact on the public resource.
- 20 Subp. 2. Listed waters. The following provisions apply to
- 21 the listing of waters for private fish hatcheries:
- 22 A. A private fish hatchery license must list:
- 23 (1) the specific waters of the state that may be
- 24 used in connection with the licensed private fish hatchery and
- 25 whether the hatchery is a standard, containment, or quarantine
- 26 facility as defined by part 6250.0100;
- 27 (2) whether aeration requiring a permit is
- 28 approved;
- 29 (3) whether piscicide use is approved; and
- 30 (4) those waters where nonindigenous species will
- 31 be kept.
- 32 B. The right to use waters licensed for private fish
- 33 hatchery or aquatic farm purposes may be transferred between
- 34 licensees with prior approval by the commissioner if
- 35 requirements for species to be raised are met. Waters that are

- 1 continually connected by a permanent watercourse to other waters
- 2 must not be approved for private fish hatchery use, except that
- 3 connected waters that are isolated from other waters may be
- 4 licensed as a single body of water. Waters that are
- 5 intermittently connected or may become connected with other
- 6 waters may be denied, or screening or other measures may be
- 7 required to prevent passage of aquatic life. Listed waters may
- 8 be changed on approval by the commissioner.
- 9 C. The commissioner will conduct an inspection of
- 10 waters to be licensed prior to approving or denying initial
- ll licensing of the waters.
- D. Waters containing game fish of significant public
- 13 value may be denied licensing unless the applicant can
- 14 demonstrate exclusive riparian control.
- 15 E. Waters containing game fish of significant public
- 16 value may be denied licensing unless the game fish of
- 17 significant public value are sold to the licensee, removed for
- 18 other state use by the department, or disposed of as provided in
- 19 writing by the commissioner.
- 20 F. Waters licensed under a private fish hatchery
- 21 license may be aerated during open water periods without a
- 22 separate aeration permit.
- 23 Subp. 3. Listed species. The following provisions apply
- 24 to the listing of species for licensed waters:
- 25 A. A private fish hatchery license must list the
- 26 species of aquatic life approved for each licensed water.
- 27 Listed species of aquatic life may be changed on written request
- 28 to and approval by the commissioner. Species of aquatic life
- 29 regulated by Minnesota Statutes, chapters 97A, 97B, and 97C, may
- 30 not be cultured unless listed on the license.
- 31 B. All waters licensed before July 1, 1992, under a
- 32 private fish hatchery license must be approved for species
- 33 listed under current licenses if other conditions for licensing
- 34 are met.
- 35 C. If licensed waters are located within a 25-year
- 36 floodplain and are not enclosed within a building, species of

- 1 aquatic life may be licensed at the discretion of the
- 2 commissioner.
- 3 D. Licensed waters located outside of a 25-year
- 4 floodplain or enclosed within a building may be licensed for any
- 5 species, except that the commissioner may deny licensing for
- 6 species not present in the state.
- 7 Subp. 4. Inspections and enforcement. The premises,
- 8 property, vehicles, private aquatic life, and equipment where
- 9 private fish hatchery operations are being conducted are subject
- 10 to inspection as provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.215.
- 11 Subp. 5. Records. The following provisions apply to the
- 12 maintenance and retention of records:
- 13 A. Licensees must keep complete, up-to-date records
- 14 of the operation of the private fish hatchery. The records must
- 15 be kept for at least three years.
- B. The records must include the following information:
- 17 (1) for each species acquired, the number and
- 18 pounds of fish or eggs acquired, the names and addresses of the
- 19 sources from which acquired, and the dates of receipt;
- 20 (2) for each species sold or disposed of, the
- 21 number and pounds of fish sold or disposed of, the names and
- 22 addresses of the purchasers or persons to whom the conveyances
- 23 are made, and the dates of sale; and
- 24 (3) for fish sperm or viable eggs, the amount
- 25 acquired or sold, the names and addresses of the sources from
- 26 which acquired, the purchasers to whom conveyed, and the dates
- 27 of purchase or sale.
- 28 C. On or before March 1 of each year, the licensee
- 29 must submit a complete annual report, on a form provided by the
- 30 commissioner, covering the quantity of all species sold or
- 31 purchased in the preceding license year.
- 32 D. Records are subject to inspection by the
- 33 commissioner during reasonable hours.
- 34 6250.0400 TRANSPORTATION OF AQUATIC LIFE.
- 35 Subpart 1. Requirements for importation, transportation

- 1 within the state, or stocking of fish. Except as provided in
- 2 subpart 3, an operator of a private fish hatchery may not import
- 3 aquatic life into the state, transport aquatic life within the
- 4 state, or stock waters of the state with aquatic life without
- 5 first obtaining a bill of lading or transportation permit from
- 6 the commissioner, with disease certification, if applicable.
- 7 Subp. 2. Bill of lading. The following provisions apply
- 8 to the use of a bill of lading:
- 9 A. A person may transport aquatic life except
- 10 salmonids or catfish with a completed bill of lading for:
- 11 (1) intrastate transportation of aquatic life
- 12 between licensed private fish hatcheries, aquatic farms, or
- 13 aquarium facilities licensed for the same species and of the
- 14 proper classification for the aquatic life; and
- 15 (2) stocking of waters other than public waters.
- 16 B. When aquatic life is transported between licensed
- 17 private fish hatcheries, aquatic farms, or aquarium facilities,
- 18 a copy of the bill of lading must be submitted to the regional
- 19 fisheries manager:
- 20 (1) at least 72 hours before the transportation,
- 21 if species transported into a watershed are not found in it or
- 22 have their original source outside this state and contiguous
- 23 states; or
- 24 (2) within 30 days in cases not covered by
- 25 subitem (1).
- C. A bill of lading is also required at least 72
- 27 hours before any transportation between licensed waters of the
- 28 same licensee, if species transported into a watershed are not
- 29 found in it or have their original source outside this state and
- 30 contiguous states.
- 31 D. For transportation and stocking of waters that are
- 32 not public waters:
- 33 (1) a bill of lading must be submitted to the
- 34 regional fisheries manager 72 hours before transporting fish for
- 35 stocking;
- 36 (2) a bill of lading must be submitted to the

- l regional fisheries manager within five days after stocking if
- 2 the waters to be stocked are confirmed not to be public waters
- 3 by telecopy or telephone prior to stocking by the regional
- 4 fisheries office; or
- 5 (3) a completed bill of lading may be submitted
- 6 to the regional fisheries office by telecopy prior to
- 7 transporting fish for stocking. Confirmation that the waters to
- 8 be stocked are not public waters may be made by returning the
- 9 bill of lading by telecopy or in writing, in which cases
- 10 additional copies need not be submitted to the department.
- 11 E. Bill of lading forms may only be issued by the
- 12 Department of Natural Resources office located in St. Paul, and
- 13 new bill of lading forms may not be issued until all previously
- 14 issued forms have been returned.
- Subp. 3. Exemptions for transportation permits and bills
- 16 of lading. The following provisions apply to exemptions for
- 17 transportation permits and bills of lading:
- 18 A. A bill of lading or transportation permit is not
- 19 required by a private fish hatchery licensee for importation,
- 20 transportation, or export for the following:
- 21 (1) minnows taken under a private fish hatchery
- 22 license in this state and transported intrastate;
- 23 (2) aquarium or ornamental fish including
- 24 tropical, subtropical, and saltwater species that cannot survive
- 25 in the waters of the state, which may be imported or transported
- 26 if accompanied by shipping documents;
- 27 (3) fish or fish eggs that have been processed
- 28 for use as food, bait, or other purposes unrelated to fish
- 29 propagation;
- 30 (4) live fish, except salmonids and catfish, from
- 31 a licensed private fish hatchery, which are transported directly
- 32 to an outlet for processing or for other food purposes if
- 33 accompanied by shipping documents;
- 34 (5) fish being exported if accompanied by
- 35 shipping documents;
- 36 (6) sucker eggs, sucker fry, or fathead minnows

- 1 transported intrastate for bait propagation or feeding of
- 2 cultured aquatic life;
- 3 (7) species of fish that are found within the
- 4 state used in connection with public shows, exhibits,
- 5 demonstrations, or fishing pools for periods not exceeding 14
- 6 days; or
- 7 (8) transfer of aquatic life between licensed
- 8 waters of the same licensee, except when required in subpart 2.
- 9 B. Shipping documents required under this subpart
- 10 must show the place of origin, owner or consignee, destination,
- 11 number, and species.
- 12 Subp. 4. Transportation permit requirements. A
- 13 transportation permit is required for all importation,
- 14 transportation, or stocking of private aquatic life not covered
- 15 by subpart 2 or exempted in subpart 3. A transportation permit
- 16 may be used for multiple shipments within the 30-day term for
- 17 the permit if the source and the destination remain the same.
- 18 Transportation permits, which may authorize importation or
- 19 stocking of public waters, may be issued through department
- 20 regional offices or the St. Paul office, and must be obtained
- 21 prior to shipment.
- 22 Subp. 5. Permit application. An application for a
- 23 transportation permit must be made on forms provided by the
- 24 commissioner. An application for a transportation permit for
- 25 salmonids and catfish, their eggs, or sperm must be accompanied
- 26 by certification that the source of the eggs or sperm are free
- 27 of certifiable diseases, except that eggs with enteric redmouth,
- 28 whirling disease, or furunculosis may be imported, transported,
- 29 or stocked following treatment approved by the commissioner, and
- 30 fish with bacterial kidney disease may be imported, transported,
- 31 or stocked into areas where the disease has been previously
- 32 introduced. A copy of the transportation permit showing the
- 33 date of certification inspection must accompany the shipment of
- 34 fish while in transit and must be available for inspection by
- 35 the commissioner. By 14 days after a completed application is
- 36 received, the commissioner will approve or deny the importation

- 1 permits as provided in this part.
- Subp. 6. Vehicle identification. The following provisions
- 3 apply to the identification of vehicles used in the operation of
- 4 a private fish hatchery:
- A. A vehicle used by a licensee for transporting
- 6 aquatic life must be identified with the licensee's name and
- 7 town of residence as it appears on the license and the license
- 8 number.
- 9 B. A vehicle used by a licensee must have
- 10 identification displayed so that it is readily visible from
- 11 either side of the vehicle in letters and numbers not less than
- 12 2-1/2 inches high and with a three-eighths inch wide stroke.
- 13 Identification may be permanently affixed to vehicles or
- 14 displayed on removable plates or placards placed on opposite
- 15 doors of the vehicle or on the tanks carried on the vehicle.
- 16 6250.0500 IMPORTATION OF AQUATIC LIFE.
- 17 Subpart 1. Licensed facilities. The following provisions
- 18 apply to the importation of aquatic life:
- 19 A. The commissioner may issue transportation permits
- 20 to import:
- 21 (1) indigenous and naturalized species except
- 22 trout, salmon, and catfish from any source to a standard
- 23 facility;
- 24 (2) trout, salmon, and catfish from a
- 25 nonemergency disease area to a containment facility if the fish
- 26 are certified within the previous year to be free of certifiable
- 27 diseases, except that eggs with enteric redmouth, whirling
- 28 disease, or furunculosis may be imported following treatment
- 29 approved by the commissioner, and fish with bacterial kidney
- 30 disease may be imported into areas where the disease has been
- 31 previously introduced; and
- 32 (3) trout, salmon, and catfish from a facility in
- 33 a nonemergency disease area with a disease-free history of three
- 34 years or more to a standard facility, except that eggs with
- 35 enteric redmouth, whirling disease, or furunculosis may be

- 1 imported following treatment approved by the commissioner, and
- 2 fish with bacterial kidney disease may be imported into areas
- 3 where the disease has been previously introduced.
- 4 B. If a source facility in a nonemergency disease
- 5 area cannot demonstrate a history free from disease, aquatic
- 6 life may only be imported into a quarantine facility.
- 7 Subp. 2. Enzootic disease area. The following provisions
- 8 apply to the importation of aquatic life in enzootic disease
- 9 areas:
- 10 A. Except as otherwise provided and except that eggs
- 11 with enteric redmouth, whirling disease, or furunculosis may be
- 12 imported following treatment approved by the commissioner, and
- 13 fish with bacterial kidney disease may be imported into areas
- 14 where the disease has been previously introduced, fish may be
- 15 imported from emergency disease enzootic areas only as
- 16 fertilized eggs under the following conditions:
- 17 (1) to be imported into a standard facility,
- 18 fertilized eggs must have a disease-free history for at least
- 19 five years;
- 20 (2) to be imported into a containment facility,
- 21 fertilized eggs must have a disease-free history for at least
- 22 three years; or
- 23 (3) to be imported into a quarantine facility,
- 24 fertilized eggs may have a disease-free history of less than
- 25 three years.
- B. A hatchery inspection must occur at least once a
- 27 year and fish must have been tested for all certifiable
- 28 diseases. The inspection must include at least viral testing of
- 29 ovarian fluids at the 95 percent confidence level of detecting
- 30 two percent incidence of disease (ovarian fluids must be sampled
- 31 for certification of viral hemorrhagic septicemia and infectious
- 32 hematopoietic necrosis). Bacterial diseases must be sampled at
- 33 the 95 percent confidence level with a five percent incidence of
- 34 disease. The inspection must be performed by a fish health
- 35 inspector in cooperation with the producer with subsequent
- 36 examination of the collected tissues and fluids for the

- l detection of certifiable diseases.
- 2 6250.0600 STOCKING PRIVATE AQUATIC LIFE.
- 3 A person may not release private aquatic life into public
- 4 waters that are not licensed as part of a private fish hatchery
- 5 without first obtaining a transportation permit from the
- 6 commissioner. The commissioner may deny issuance of a permit if
- 7 releasing the private aquatic life is not consistent with the
- 8 management plan for the public waters.
- 9 6250.0700 LICENSE AND INSPECTION FEES.
- 10 Subpart 1. Private fish hatchery. The private fish
- ll hatchery license must contain endorsements for the rights and
- 12 privileges of the following licenses under the game and fish
- 13 laws. The endorsements must be made upon payment of the license
- 14 fee provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.475, for the
- 15 following licenses:
- A. minnow dealer license;
- B. minnow retailer license for sale of minnows as
- 18 bait;
- 19 C. minnow exporting license;
- D. minnow dealer helper license;
- 21 E. private fish hatchery vehicle endorsement, which
- 22 includes a minnow dealer vehicle license, a minnow retailer
- 23 vehicle license, an exporting minnow hauler vehicle license, and
- 24 a fish vendor vehicle license;
- 25 F. sucker egg taking license; and
- 26 G. game fish packers license.
- 27 Subp. 2. Inspection fees. The fees for the following
- 28 inspections are:
- 29 A. initial inspection of each water to be licensed,
- 30 \$50;
- 31 B. fish health inspection and certification, \$20 plus
- 32 \$80 per lot thereafter; and
- 33 C. initial inspection for containment and quarantine
- 34 facility inspections, \$50.

- 1 6250.0800 DISEASE TRANSMISSION.
- 2 Subpart 1. Facility designation. The following provisions
- 3 apply to the designation of facilities to prevent disease
- 4 transmission:
- 5 A. The licensee may apply to the commissioner for
- 6 designation of all or a portion of a facility as a standard,
- 7 containment, or quarantine facility on forms provided by the
- 8 commissioner either as part of the license application or
- 9 separately.
- B. By 15 business days after an application is
- 11 received, the commissioner must notify the applicant if there
- 12 are any deficiencies in the application. By 30 business days
- 13 after a complete application is received, the commissioner will
- 14 approve or deny the designation requested.
- Subp. 2. Disinfection. The following provisions apply to
- 16 disinfection of effluent from containment facilities:
- 17 A. Containment facilities must disinfect effluent
- 18 prior to discharge to public waters. The effluent required to
- 19 be disinfected includes water used by a containment facility in
- 20 the production of the aquatic life of concern, waste or
- 21 mortalities from the aquatic life of concern, and live forage or
- 22 commercial feed discarded from the containment facility. Runoff
- 23 from precipitation and excess water from natural springs, wells,
- 24 or other sources that is not used in the production of aquatic
- 25 life is not effluent to be disinfected.
- 26 B. Disinfection treatment may include chlorination or
- 27 other processes. If chlorine disinfection is utilized, a
- 28 measurable residual level of 1.0 part per million of active
- 29 chlorine in the effluent must be maintained for one hour of
- 30 retention time. The effluent must comply with chapter 7050.
- 31 C. A disinfection treatment process must ensure
- 32 uninterrupted effluent treatment in the event of electrical
- 33 power failure, a primary system failure, or other similar events
- 34 that would cause treatment interruptions.
- 35 D. The effluent disinfection process must be sited,
- 36 designed, and operated in a manner that allows inspection by the

- 1 commissioner at all times to determine whether adequate effluent
- 2 disinfection is maintained.
- 3 E. The commissioner may prescribe reasonable
- 4 documentation of daily monitoring of treatment system
- 5 performance to be included in the licensee's annual report. The
- 6 records must be available for daily inspection by the
- 7 commissioner during normal business hours and maintained for
- 8 three years.
- 9 Subp. 3. Fish health inspection. The following provisions
- 10 apply to fish health inspections:
- 11 A. A private fish hatchery propagating trout, salmon,
- 12 or catfish and having an effluent discharge from the private
- 13 fish hatchery into public waters must have an annual fish health
- 14 inspection conducted by a certified fish health inspector.
- 15 Testing must be conducted according to approved laboratory
- 16 methods.
- B. A fish health inspection fee must be charged based
- 18 on each lot of fish sampled. The fee, by check or money order
- 19 payable to the department, must be prepaid or paid at the time a
- 20 bill or notice is received from the commissioner that the
- 21 inspection and processing of samples is completed.
- 22 C. Upon receipt of payment and completion of
- 23 inspection, the commissioner will notify the operator and issue
- 24 a fish health certificate. The certification must be made
- 25 according to the Fish Health Blue Book by a person certified as
- 26 a fish health inspector.
- D. All aquatic life in transit or held at transfer
- 28 stations within the state may be inspected by the commissioner.
- 29 This inspection may include the collection of stock for purposes
- 30 of pathological analysis. Sample size necessary for analysis
- 31 will follow guidelines listed in the Fish Health Blue Book.
- 32 Subp. 4. Emergency disease determination. If an emergency
- 33 disease exists, the commissioner may order the fish in the
- 34 facility to be impounded, confiscated, sold, or destroyed and
- 35 the facility disinfected. The commissioner will make every
- 36 effort to allow disposed fish to be sold for market if there is

- 1 no imminent danger of a significant adverse impact on natural
- 2 fish populations or human health or of escape of the pathogen to
- 3 public waters.
- 4 6250.0900 GAME FISH.
- 5 Subpart 1. Acquisition and purchase. Game fish sperm,
- 6 viable game fish eggs, or live game fish may not be taken from
- 7 public waters for aquaculture purposes but may be purchased from
- 8 the state or acquired from licensed aquatic farms or private
- 9 fish hatcheries.
- 10 Subp. 2. Restriction on sale of game fish. Species of the
- 11 family salmonidae or ictaluridae, except bullheads, must be free
- 12 of certifiable diseases if sold for stocking or transfer to
- 13 another private fish hatchery or aquatic farm, except that eggs
- 14 with enteric redmouth, whirling disease, or furunculosis may be
- 15 transferred or stocked following treatment approved by the
- 16 commissioner, and fish with bacterial kidney disease may be
- 17 transferred or stocked to areas where the disease has been
- 18 previously introduced.
- 19 Subp. 3. Acquisition of fish for brood stock. Game fish
- 20 brood stock may be sold to private fish hatcheries by the state
- 21 at fair market value. As a one-time purchase for brood stock
- 22 development, up to 20 pairs of adults may be provided, if
- 23 available, by the state through normal operations.
- Subp. 4. Sale of eggs by state. The commissioner may
- 25 offer for sale as eggs or fry up to two percent of the
- 26 department's annual game fish egg harvest. Additional eggs or
- 27 fry may be sold if they are surplus to this state's program
- 28 needs.
- 29 Subp. 5. Purchase of eggs dependent upon facility. A
- 30 licensee may purchase game fish eggs or fry from the state at a
- 31 rate based on the capacity of the facility to hatch and rear
- 32 fish. A licensee may purchase walleye at a rate of no more than
- 33 one-half quart of eggs or 5,000 fry for each acre of licensed
- 34 surface water. This limitation may be waived if a private fish
- 35 hatchery is an intensive facility. The allowable purchase of

- l trout or salmon eggs must be based on the capacity of rearing
- 2 tanks and flow of water through the private fish hatchery.
- 3 Subp. 6. Stocking walleye north of marked state Highway
- 4 210. Walleye from outside of the area of the state north of
- 5 marked state Highway 210 may not be stocked in waters of the
- 6 state north of marked state Highway 210 without approval by the
- 7 commissioner.
- 8 6250.1000 MINNOWS.
- 9 Subpart 1. Taking from public waters. A licensee may take
- 10 minnow sperm, minnow eggs, and live minnows from public waters
- 11 for private fish hatchery purposes under a private fish hatchery
- 12 license.
- Subp. 2. Importation of live minnows. Minnows from
- 14 outside of this state may not be imported live except as
- 15 provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 97C.515.
- 16 6250.1100 SUCKER EGGS.
- 17 Sucker eggs may be taken from public waters with a sucker
- 18 egg license endorsement, which authorizes sucker eggs to be
- 19 taken at a rate of one quart of eggs for each 1-1/2 acres of
- 20 licensed surface waters, except that for intensive culture
- 21 systems, sucker eggs may be taken at a rate of two quarts per
- 22 1,000 muskellunge fry being reared.
- 23 6250.1200 WHITE EARTH INDIAN RESERVATION.
- Until the commissioner reaches an agreement with the White
- 25 Earth Indian Reservation regarding the acquisition and sale of
- 26 aquatic life from public waters, a private fish hatchery
- 27 licensee may acquire and transport rough fish, as defined by
- 28 Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.015, and yellow perch lawfully
- 29 acquired and possessed by a tribal member for sale under tribal
- 30 laws and regulations on the White Earth Indian Reservation.
- 31 Transportation of rough fish and yellow perch off the
- 32 reservation must be accompanied by documentation showing the
- 33 source and number of the yellow perch.
- 34 FISHING METHODS

1 ROUGH FISH

- 2 6252.0100 SEASONS AND METHODS FOR TAKING ROUGH FISH.
- 3 Rough fish may be taken by resident licensed individuals,
- 4 in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, sections 97C.371 and
- 5 97C.373, by the following methods during the period May 1 to,
- 6 but not including, the third Monday in February. Rough fish may
- 7 be taken by these methods between sunrise and sunset in all
- 8 inland waters, except where the taking of fish is otherwise
- 9 prohibited by law or rule:
- 10 A. Harpooning equipment may not be used within 1,000
- 11 feet of an established swimming beach. Harpooning equipment may
- 12 be discharged only when both the equipment and operator are
- 13 entirely beneath the surface of the water and may not be carried
- 14 in a cocked position while out of the water.
- B. Rough fish may be taken by archery provided that
- 16 the arrows used are tethered or controlled by an attached line.
- 17 The use of crossbows is prohibited.
- 18 6252.0200 DAILY AND POSSESSION LIMIT OF ROUGH FISH TAKEN BY
- 19 SPEARING.
- 20 Daily and possession limits of rough fish taken by spearing
- 21 are:
- 22 A. suckers, 50;
- 23 B. redhorse, 50;
- C. bullheads, 100; and
- D. other species, no limit.
- 26 6252.0300 RESTRICTIONS ON TAKING ROUGH FISH.
- Except as provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 97C.345,
- 28 rough fish may not be taken by spearing, harpooning, and archery
- 29 in any designated trout stream or lake, posted spawning area, or
- 30 any water where spawning, trapping, or hatchery operations are
- 31 being carried on.
- 32 6252.0350 PROHIBITION ON RETURNING ROUGH FISH TO WATERS.
- Rough fish taken by spearing, harpooning, and archery may
- 34 not be returned to the water and rough fish may not be left on

- 1 the banks of any water of the state.
- 2 POSSESSION AND MARKING OF FISH NETS
- 3 6252.0400 REQUIRED MARKING OF FISH NETS.
- 4 Fish nets, including minnow seines used by minnow dealers,
- 5 must be marked, as provided by Minnesota Statutes, section
- 6 97C.351, as follows:
- 7 A. pound nets must be marked on the top rope of the
- 8 back side of the pound or crib;
- 9 B. fyke nets must be marked on the top side of the
- 10 end hoop opposite the lead;
- 11 C. hoop nets must be marked on the top side of an end
- 12 hoop;
- D. seines must be marked on one end of the float line
- 14 near the first float; and
- 15 E. gill nets must be marked on one end of the float
- 16 line near the first float. One end of the gill net must have a
- 17 pole, stake, or buoy projecting at least two feet above the
- 18 surface of the water or ice.
- 19 Tags for marking nets must be of a minimum size of 2-1/2
- 20 inches by five-eighths inch and must be provided by the owner or
- 21 operator of the nets.
- 22 WHITEFISH AND CISCOES
- 23 6252.0500 OPEN SEASONS FOR TAKING WHITEFISH AND CISCOES.
- 24 Subpart 1. Schedules designating open seasons for certain
- 25 waters. The waters listed in each of the following schedules
- 26 will be open during the designated seasons to the netting of
- 27 whitefish and ciscoes. Unless otherwise indicated, the names of
- 28 the bodies of water refer to lakes.
- 29 Subp. 2. Schedule I. All bodies of water listed in this
- 30 schedule, known as Schedule I, are to be opened and closed on a
- 31 48-hour notice posted at lake accesses and other public places,
- 32 provided that a gill net or any part of a gill net may not be
- 33 set in any water deeper than six feet, measured from the lake
- 34 bottom to the top surface of the water or ice.

- 16 without having obtained the prior permission of the Leech Lake
- 17 Band of Chippewa Indians in a manner and form the band requires.
- 18 TURTLES
- 19 6256.0500 COMMERCIAL TAKING OF TURTLES.
- 20 Subpart 1. Scope. The language of this part applies to
- 21 individuals possessing turtle seller licenses.
- 22 Subp. 2. Equipment. Turtles may be taken by a person
- 23 possessing a turtle seller's license by means of turtle traps,
- 24 turtle hooks, and other authorized commercial fishing gear.
- 25 Flexible webbing turtle traps must be of mesh size not less
- 26 than 3-1/2 inches bar measure or seven inches stretch measure.
- 27 Wire turtle traps must be of mesh size not less than 3-1/2
- 28 inches bar measure and must have at least one square opening in
- 29 the top panel measuring at least four inches on a side and one
- 30 of the same dimension near the bottom in each of the side panels.
- 31 Subp. 3. Prohibited methods of taking turtles. A person
- 32 possessing a turtle seller's license may take turtles in any
- 33 manner except by the use of explosives, drugs, poisons, lime,
- 34 and other harmful substances or firearms.
- 35 Subp. 4. Operation of turtle trap. A turtle trap must be
- 36 set in water shallow enough to place the top no deeper than one
- 37 inch below the water surface. Each trap must be checked and

- 1 serviced at intervals not exceeding 48 hours. A licensee may
- 2 not operate more than 40 traps.
- 3 Subp. 5. Required marking of turtle trap. When in use,
- 4 each turtle trap must have affixed on it a tag of permanent
- 5 material visible from above, legibly bearing the name, address,
- 6 and license number of the operator. This information must be
- 7 recorded in an indelible manner on the tag. The tag must be of
- 8 dimensions not less than 2-1/2 inches in length by five-eighths
- 9 inch in width.
- 10 Subp. 6. Turtles taken incidental to other operations.
- 11 Turtles taken incidental to other commercial fishing operations
- 12 may be possessed, transported, and sold, provided the operator
- 13 is a holder of a turtle seller's license.
- Subp. 7. Required reporting by turtle seller. Reports
- 15 must be submitted, on forms provided by the commissioner, by a
- 16 holder of a turtle seller's license at the time of license
- 17 renewal or March 1, whichever comes first. The forms must
- 18 record the numbers and pounds of turtles taken, species of
- 19 turtles taken, and other information as specified.
- 20 Subp. 8. Report on buying turtles for resale. A licensee
- 21 who buys turtles for resale or for processing and resale must
- 22 keep a correct and complete book record of all transactions and
- 23 activities covered in the license, not inconsistent with
- 24 Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.425.
- 25 MUSSELS
- 26 6258.0100 SEASON FOR HARVESTING MUSSELS FOR PERSONAL USE.
- During the open season, a person possessing a valid
- 28 resident or nonresident angling license or a person exempt from
- 29 licensing may take and possess at any time, for personal use
- 30 only, not more than 24 live whole or 48 shell halves of
- 31 freshwater mussels. Mussels may be harvested in waters of the
- 32 state where fish may be taken by angling. Mussels must be
- 33 harvested by hand picking only and may not be purchased or sold.
- 34 6258.0200 SEASON TO COMMERCIALLY HARVEST MUSSELS BY PERMIT.
- 35 Subpart 1. Open season for commercially harvesting

- 1 mussels. The open season for taking mussels is May 16 through
- 2 August 31.
- 3 Subp. 2. Allowed times for harvesting. Mussels may be
- 4 harvested from sunrise to sunset only.
- 5 6258.0300 PERMITS FOR COMMERCIAL HARVEST OF MUSSELS.
- 6 Subpart 1. Harvest permit required. A person may not take
- 7 or possess more than 24 live whole or 48 shell halves of
- 8 freshwater mussels without first obtaining a written permit,
- 9 from the commissioner, to commercially harvest mussels.
- 10 Subp. 2. Harvest permit issuance. Commercial harvest
- 11 permits may be issued subject to the following criteria:
- 12 A. Applications must be submitted to the local area
- 13 or regional fisheries office on forms provided by the
- 14 commissioner.
- B. Approved permits will be issued only to Minnesota
- 16 residents who possess a valid Minnesota resident angling license
- 17 or who are exempt from licensing.
- 18 C. Application forms must be signed by the
- 19 applicant. All requested information must be provided. Failure
- 20 to properly and fully complete an application form will result
- 21 in its rejection.
- 22 Subp. 3. Harvest permit duration. A permit to harvest
- 23 mussels may be issued annually and may be issued for periods
- 24 shorter than one season, at the discretion of the commissioner.
- Subp. 4. Harvest permit termination to protect resource.
- 26 The commissioner may terminate a permit to harvest mussels upon
- 27 48 hours written notice to protect aquatic resources.
- 28 6258.0400 SPECIES FOR COMMERCIAL HARVEST.
- Only three ridge (Amblema plicata) mussels may be harvested
- 30 under a commercial harvest permit. Additional species may be
- 31 requested for harvest from specific sites by special permit.
- 32 Three ridge mussels may lawfully be harvested, as live whole
- 33 mussels or shell halves, provided that they cannot pass through
- 34 a 2-3/4 inch diameter hole.

- 1 6258.0500 HARVEST SITES FOR PERMITTEES.
- Subpart 1. Identification of mussel harvest sites. Mussel
- 3 harvest sites must be identified in the application and permit
- 4 by legal description or in other defining terms as needed to
- 5 accurately locate the area.
- 6 Subp. 2. Harvesting restricted outside of permitted site.
- 7 The taking of mussels by a permittee or crew member from a place
- 8 outside the permitted harvest site is prohibited.
- 9 6258.0600 HARVEST GEAR FOR PERMITTEES.
- 10 Mussels may be taken only by hand picking with or without
- 11 aid of breathing apparatus.
- 12 6258.0700 PERMITTEE HARVEST OPERATIONS.
- Subpart 1. Notice of harvest operations. The permittee
- 14 must inform the local area fisheries office and conservation
- 15 officer 24 hours in advance of any intended mussel harvest
- 16 operations. Changes in location or dates will require an
- 17 additional notification.
- Subp. 2. Required attendance of permittee. The permittee
- 19 must be in attendance at all mussel harvest operations.
- Subp. 3. Limitation on size of a harvesting crew. A
- 21 mussel harvesting crew is limited to four persons, including the
- 22 permittee. Helpers' names must be listed on the permit and the
- 23 helpers must be Minnesota residents possessing a license to take
- 24 fish by angling or be exempted from licensing.
- Subp. 4. Return of undersized mussels or shells.
- 26 Undersized three ridge mussels or unlawful mussel shells, live
- 27 or dead, must be returned immediately to the water at the site
- 28 where taken.
- 29 Subp. 5. Restriction on harvesting mussels near dams.
- 30 Harvesting of mussels may not occur within 1,000 feet downstream
- 31 of a dam.
- 32 6258.0800 PERMITTEE REPORTS, RECORDS, AND INSPECTIONS.
- 33 Subpart 1. Required records. A permittee must keep
- 34 records of each mussel sales transaction. The records must be

- 1 verifiable with supporting sales slips and include:
- A. pounds of mussels sold;
- B. name and address of the buyer; and
- 4 C. date of transaction.
- 5 Records must be kept current within 48 hours of each
- 6 transaction. Failure to keep complete and current records may
- 7 result in immediate revocation of the permit and may render the
- 8 permittee ineligible for permits for one year. All records must
- 9 be maintained and available for inspection, at the permittee's
- 10 address, for three years.
- 11 Subp. 2. Required reports. A permittee must submit
- 12 reports monthly while the permit is valid on forms provided by
- 13 the commissioner. Reports must be submitted by the 15th of each
- 14 month even if no harvest activity took place. All information
- 15 requested on the report must be provided. Failure to submit
- 16 required reports may result in revocation of the existing permit

- 18 Subp. 3. Inspections. Records required in this part,
- 19 business and operation premises, and boats, vehicles, and gear

- 22 6258.0900 SPECIAL RESTRICTIONS ON TAKING MUSSELS.
- 23 Subpart 1. Restriction on returning processed mussels to
- 24 the water. Meats resulting from the processing of live whole
- 25 mussels may not be returned to the water or deposited on a
- 26 shoreline or adjacent land. The meat of mussels lawfully
- 27 obtained may be used as bait for angling purposes.

- 7 COMMERCIAL FISHING GENERAL RESTRICTIONS
- 8 6260.0100 DEFINITIONS.
- 9 Subpart 1. Scope. The terms used in this chapter have the
- 10 meanings given them in this part.
- 11 Subp. 2. Net bar measurement. "Net bar measurement" means
- 12 the interior distance between adjacent angles of a single mesh
- 13 of a net when extended. An entire net or lot of netting is
- 14 considered to be of the same mesh size as the majority of ten or
- 15 more meshes in any part of the net or lot at least three meshes
- 16 removed from the selvage or side lines selected at random.
- 17 Subp. 3. Net stretch measurement. "Net stretch
- 18 measurement" means the interior distance between opposite knots
- 19 or corners of a single mesh of a net, taken between the thumb
- 20 and forefingers and applying enough pressure laterally to allow
- 21 the opposite side of the mesh to meet. An entire net or lot of
- 22 netting is considered to be of the same mesh size as the
- 23 majority of ten or more meshes in any part of the net or lot of
- 24 netting at least three meshes removed from the selvage or side
- 25 lines selected at random.
- 26 6260.0200 COMMERCIAL FISHING CONDITIONS AND PROHIBITIONS.
- 27 Subpart 1. License, permit, or contract required. A
- 28 person may not conduct a commercial fishing operation on any
- 29 waters of the state except under license, permit, or contract
- 30 and in conformance with the requirements of the license, permit,
- 31 contract, parts 6260.0100 to 6260.2400, and other applicable
- 32 law. The commissioner may require any commercial operator to
- 33 cease fishing operations when the commissioner finds that the
- 34 operations are destructive to game fish or for any other
- 35 reasonable cause.

- 1 Subp. 2. Angling license requirements. Permittees,
- 2 contractors, licensed commercial operators, or their helpers may
- 3 not engage in any commercial fish removal operations without
- 4 first being in possession of a valid Minnesota angling license
- 5 or be otherwise permitted by law to take fish by angling.
- 6 6260.0300 COMMERCIAL FISHING PERMIT ISSUANCE.
- 7 Subpart 1. Issuance of permits for designated species.
- 8 The commissioner may issue the permits listed in subparts 2 to 4
- 9 for the taking of designated species of fish by means and
- 10 conditions and in such waters and times as may be necessary for
- 11 the removal of the designated species.
- 12 Subp. 2. Class A permits. Class A permits may be issued
- 13 for the use of a hand-held implement or device used by a single
- 14 operator. Class A permits may also be issued for the taking of
- 15 turtles at night with the aid of an artificial light, subject to
- 16 the provisions of all applicable laws and part 6256.0500.
- 17 Subp. 3. Class B permits. Class B permits may be issued
- 18 for:
- A. permanently or temporarily installed traps in
- 20 waters of the state with fish migrations;
- 21 B. the use of seines by persons other than licensed
- 22 inland commercial operators;
- 23 C. licensed inland commercial operators to fish
- 24 waters other than the core waters of their assigned area;
- D. licensed inland commercial operators to fish
- 26 unassigned waters; or
- 27 E. licensed inland commercial operators to crib fish
- 28 in waters other than where taken.
- Subp. 4. Class C permits. Class C permits may be issued
- 30 for:
- 31 A. licensed inland commercial operators to fish
- 32 waters assigned to other inland commercial operators;
- B. licensed inland commercial operators to use gear
- 34 other than seines or hoopnets; or
- 35 C. experimental, research, or special projects.

- 1 6260.0400 COMMERCIAL FISHING REPORTS.
- 2 All commercial fishing operators must submit reports, on
- 3 forms provided by the commissioner, on their commercial fishing
- 4 activities containing all information as required by the
- 5 commissioner. Issuance of licenses, contracts, or permits may
- 6 be delayed until all reports have been received. The
- 7 commissioner may revoke a commercial fishing license, contract,
- 8 or permit of a person who fails to submit reports.
- 9 6260.0500 REQUIRED NOTIFICATION OF OPERATIONS.
- 10 Licensed commercial operators must notify the area
- 11 fisheries supervisor of each operation prior to the start of any
- 12 fishing activity. If contact with the area fisheries supervisor
- 13 cannot be made, the local conservation officer must be notified.
- 14 6260.0600 INSPECTION BY COMMISSIONER.
- Inland commercial fish operators, their helpers, records,
- 16 premises, and operating sites, are subject to and must be
- 17 available for supervision and inspection by the commissioner
- 18 with respect to all commercial fishing activities and
- 19 transactions, including the disposition of fish removed.
- 20 6260.0700 ENTRY UPON OR USE OF LAND.
- The licensee, permittee, or contractor must obtain any
- 22 permission necessary for entry upon or use of land in connection
- 23 with the fishing operations. Issuance of the license, permit,
- 24 or contract is not a guarantee by the state of access to or use
- 25 of land, nor does the state have any obligation to obtain
- 26 permission for access or use.
- 27 6260.0800 DISPOSITION OF NONLICENSED SPECIES.
- 28 Licensed commercial operators must use all reasonable means
- 29 to avoid taking, killing, or injuring fish other than those
- 30 which may be lawfully taken under their license. Fish of any
- 31 kind not permitted to be lawfully taken in licensed commercial
- 32 fishing operations must be immediately returned to the water.
- 33 6260.0900 SPORT ANGLING EQUIPMENT RESTRICTIONS.

- l Licensed commercial operators, crew members, or any person
- 2 associated with the commercial taking of fish may not possess
- 3 any game fish or sport angling equipment while operating
- 4 licensed commercial fishing gear or while traveling to or from
- 5 the place of operation of the gear.
- 6 6260.1000 DISCOVERY OF A FISH KILL.
- 7 Upon the discovery of a fish kill, an operator must notify
- 8 the area fisheries supervisor as soon as possible.
- 9 6260.1100 MARKING UNCOVERED HOLES IN ICE.
- 10 Uncovered holes through the ice must be marked in
- 11 accordance with Minnesota Statutes, chapter 86B. Marking signs
- 12 must be obtained and placed by the operator.
- 13 6260.1200 PROPER MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF FISHING GEAR.
- 14 Commercial fish operators must perform all measures
- 15 necessary to ensure proper maintenance and operation of their
- 16 fishing gear, including webbing repair of nets and daily
- 17 cleaning of stationary fish trap panels.
- 18 6260.1300 PREVENTION OF INTERFERENCE WITH PUBLIC USE OF WATERS.
- 19 Commercial fish operators must make every effort to prevent
- 20 interference with navigation, recreational activities, other
- 21 authorized commercial fishing operations, game fish spawning
- 22 areas, or other public use of the public waters in which they
- 23 are operating. They may not, in their operations, materially
- 24 impede or obstruct the flow of water or cause any overflow upon
- 25 public or private property.
- 26 GEAR FOR TAKING ROUGH FISH
- 27 6260.1400 GEAR SPECIFICATIONS FOR TAKING ROUGH FISH.
- Subpart 1. Seine specifications. The mesh of seines may
- 29 not be more than the following specifications:
- 30 A. Seine bag: three inches, stretch measure.
- 31 B. The first 300 feet of seine on each side of the
- 32 bag: three inches, stretch measure.
- 33 C. The mesh in the balance of the seine: five

- 1 inches, stretch measure.
- 2 Subp. 2. Hoop net specifications. Hoop nets may not have
- 3 center leads over 25 feet long nor hoops that exceed four feet
- 4 in diameter. The mesh in all hoop nets, including leads, may
- 5 not be over two inches stretch measure. Twine used in hoop
- 6 nets, including leads, may not be smaller than size 18.
- 7 COMMERCIAL FISHING IN INTERNATIONAL WATERS
- 8 6260.1500 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON NAMAKAN AND SAND POINT LAKES.
- 9 Subpart 1. Species, seasons, and limits. Whitefish and
- 10 rough fish may be taken by licensed commercial operators in
- 11 Namakan Lake and Sand Point Lake only from January 1 through
- 12 March 15 and from May 16 through December 31.
- 13 The minimum size limit for whitefish taken by commercial
- 14 fishing operations is 18 inches total length.
- 15 Subp. 2. Use of gill nets. Gill net sections of 500 feet
- 16 in length or less in Namakan Lake are considered a single net.
- 17 Gill nets may not extend more that 50 meshes in depth when in
- 18 operation. Gill nets may be set in connected strings of any
- 19 number.
- Subp. 3. Use of pound and fyke nets. The mesh of the
- 21 pound in pound and fyke nets may not exceed four inches, stretch
- 22 measure.
- Subp. 4. Use of submerged trap nets. The mesh of the
- 24 pound or crib of submerged trap nets may not exceed three
- 25 inches, stretch measure.
- 26 Subp. 5. Restrictions on gear. The provisions of this
- 27 subpart apply to commercial gear restrictions on Namakan and
- 28 Sand Point Lakes:
- 29 A. Gill nets and submerged trap nets must contain a
- 30 buoy at each end of each net or string of nets and each buoy
- 31 must be marked with a white flag extending not less than three
- 32 feet above the water. The flag must not be less than one foot
- 33 square.
- B. Pound, fyke, and submerged trap nets may be set in
- 35 connected strings of not more than two.

- 1 C. Licensees may not operate more than 3,500 feet of
- 2 gill nets on Namakan Lake.
- 3 D. All nets must be lifted and emptied of fish at
- 4 least once in every 48-hour period when set in open water and at
- 5 least once in every 96-hour period, weather permitting, when set
- 6 under the ice.
- 7 6260.1600 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON RAINY LAKE.
- 8 Subpart 1. Species, seasons, and limits. Whitefish and
- 9 rough fish may be taken by licensed commercial operators in
- 10 Rainy Lake from June 1 through December 31 subject to the
- 11 specified length limits. The minimum length for whitefish taken
- 12 by commercial fishing operations is 18 inches.
- 13 Subp. 2. Use of pound nets. Pound net leads may not
- 14 exceed 825 feet in length. Pound nets may be not set in
- 15 connected strings of more than two.
- Subp. 3. Net locations. Nets may not be set within 500
- 17 feet of the mouth of any stream nor within that portion of Rainy
- 18 Lake, including Black Bay, within the boundaries of Koochiching
- 19 county under the jurisdiction of this state. Under special
- 20 permit, pound, trap, or fyke nets may be set at any place within
- 21 any closed area of Rainy Lake which is approved by the
- 22 commissioner during the period from June 15 through April 15 for
- 23 the sole purpose of taking rough fish and whitefish. Nets may
- 24 not be lifted except during daylight hours.
- 25 Subp. 4. Lifting of nets. All nets in Rainy Lake must be
- 26 lifted and emptied of fish at least once in every 48-hour
- 27 period, unless a longer period is granted by the commissioner.
- 28 Subp. 5. Special provisions for commercial fishing on
- 29 Rainy Lake. The provisions in this subpart apply to commercial
- 30 fishing operations on Rainy Lake:
- 31 A. Monthly reports must be submitted by the tenth day
- 32 of the month following the month reported to Area Fisheries
- 33 Headquarters.
- 34 B. In case of the death of a licensed commercial
- 35 operator during the fishing season, the operator's legal

- 1 representative or successor in interest succeeds to the rights
- 2 of the deceased license holder and may continue operations under
- 3 the license until its expiration.
- 4 6260.1700 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON LAKE OF THE WOODS.
- 5 Subpart 1. Species, seasons, and limits. The commercial
- 6 fishing season on Lake of the Woods is January 1 through
- 7 December 31.
- 8 Subp. 2. Use of fyke nets. Fyke nets may be used as
- 9 provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 97C.825, except that a
- 10 lead may not exceed 300 feet in length. The size of the mesh in
- 11 the crib may not be less than 2-1/2 inches nor more than four
- 12 inches, stretch measure. The wings may not exceed 100 feet in
- 13 length and the lead may not exceed 300 feet in length. The
- 14 hoops may not exceed six feet in height.
- Subp. 3. Use of staked trap nets. The crib of staked trap
- 16 nets in Lake of the Woods may not exceed 22 feet on any side
- 17 with the top open and breaching the water surface. The lead may
- 18 not exceed 400 feet in length.
- 19 Subp. 4. Use of pound nets. There is no limit on the size
- 20 of the crib of pound nets in Lake of the Woods. The crib must
- 21 have an opening at the top breaching the water surface. The
- 22 lead may not exceed 825 feet in length.
- Subp. 5. Use of submerged trap nets. Submerged trap nets
- 24 in Lake of the Woods must contain a buoy at each end of each net
- 25 and each buoy must be marked with a yellow or blaze orange flag
- 26 displaying not less than one square foot of surface and rising
- 27 not less than three feet above the water. Attached to the staff
- 28 of each buoy must be an identification tag. The minimum size of
- 29 the tag must be 2-1/2 inches by five-eighths inch. Each tag
- 30 must have the operator's name and license number engraved upon
- 31 it.
- 32 Subp. 6. Restrictions on gear used in Lake of the Woods.
- 33 The provisions in this subpart apply to commercial gear
- 34 restrictions on Lake of the Woods:
- 35 A. Fyke, staked trap, and pound nets have no depth

- 1 limitation, but may be set only in areas specified in the
- 2 license, and may be set in strings of not more than two.
- 3 B. Commercial fishing in Lake of the Woods is
- 4 prohibited within 500 feet of the mouth of any stream, within
- 5 two miles of the lakeside shoreline of Pine Island, or in Four
- 6 Mile Bay and Zippel Bay.
- 7 In Muskeg Bay from June 20 through October 14, no portion
- 8 of a net may be in water less than 15 feet deep. Along the
- 9 southern shoreline of Big Traverse Bay from June 1 through
- 10 October 14, no portion of a net may be in water less than 15
- 11 feet deep. Submerged trap nets may be set in strings of not
- 12 more than two. Submerged trap nets may not be placed in the
- 13 Northwest Angle Inlet west of a line from a point on the
- 14 international boundary midway between Buckets Island and
- 15 Magnuson Island; thence southeasterly to the easterly shore of
- 16 Magnuson Island; thence southerly and westerly along said shore
- 17 to the line between Twp. 168 N., Rge. 34 W., Sec. 23 and Sec.
- 18 24; thence south to the shore of the mainland in Twp. 168 N.,
- 19 Rge. 34 W, Sec. 26.
- 20 C. All nets must be lifted and emptied of fish at
- 21 least once every 48-hour period in Lake of the Woods, unless a
- 22 longer period is granted by the commissioner.
- 23 Subp. 7. Required reporting. Commercial operators
- 24 licensed to fish Lake of the Woods must submit monthly reports
- 25 by the tenth day of the month following the month reported to
- 26 the area fisheries headquarters.
- 27 Subp. 8. Helper's license restrictions. A person may not
- 28 be issued more than one helper's license for Lake of the Woods
- 29 unless they are the holder of a commercial master license.
- 30 Subp. 9. Operation under two licenses. A person may not
- 31 operate under a master and a helper commercial fishing license
- 32 during the same license year on Lake of the Woods.
- 33 Subp. 10. Death of commercial operator. In case of the
- 34 death of a licensed commercial operator licensed to fish Lake of
- 35 the Woods, the operator's legal representative or successor in
- 36 interest succeeds to the rights of the deceased license holder,

- 1 and may continue operations under the license until its
- 2 expiration.
- 3 Subp. 11. Required stake removal. Within ten days after
- 4 removing nets, commercial operators must remove from the lake
- 5 bed all net stakes used in their operations.
- 6 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON LAKE SUPERIOR
- 7 6260.1800 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON LAKE SUPERIOR.
- 8 Subpart 1. Species, seasons, and limits. The species of
- 9 fish in this subpart may be taken in Lake Superior by licensed
- 10 commercial operators in accordance with this subpart:
- 11 A. Ciscoes, chubs, alewives, whitefish, menominee
- 12 whitefish, smelt, and rough fish may be taken at any time,
- 13 except that lake herring may be taken from December 1 through
- 14 October 31.
- B. Whitefish may be taken in pound or trap nets at
- 16 any time but no whitefish less than 20 inches total length may
- 17 be possessed, bought, or sold. Whitefish less than 20 inches in
- 18 length must be returned to the water immediately.
- 19 C. Lake trout may not be taken by commercial fishing
- 20 except by permit and no lake trout less than 17 inches in length
- 21 may be possessed, bought, or sold. Lake trout legally taken
- 22 under permit must be sealed with a tag, provided by the
- 23 commissioner, affixed through the mouth and out the gill. The
- 24 tag must be affixed immediately upon removal from the water and
- 25 before the boat is brought to shore. No untagged lake trout may
- 26 be possessed, bought, or sold by licensed commercial operators.
- 27 Lake trout of lawful size incidentally taken to commercial
- 28 operations and dead when removed from the water may be possessed
- 29 only if sealed with a tag, provided by the commissioner, affixed
- 30 through the mouth and out the gill. Untagged incidentally taken
- 31 lake trout may not be possessed, bought, or sold by licensed
- 32 commercial operators. All incidentally taken live lake trout
- 33 and all untagged dead lake trout must be returned to the water
- 34 immediately.
- 35 Subp. 2. Use of gill nets. While used on Lake Superior, a

- 1 tag which is not smaller than 2-1/2 inches by five-eighths inch
- 2 permanently bearing the owner's name and address must be
- 3 attached to one end of the gill net float line near the first
- 4 float.
- 5 While used on Lake Superior, herring nets are considered
- 6 gill nets which are weighted to fish in a floating or suspended
- 7 position off the bottom, and cisco or chub nets are gill nets
- 8 which are weighted to fish on the bottom.
- 9 Subp. 3. Use of pound or trap nets. Pound or trap nets
- 10 used on Lake Superior may be of any dimensions or mesh size.
- 11 Pound or trap nets must be marked with a tag which is at least
- 12 2-1/2 inches by five-eighths inch permanently bearing the
- 13 owner's name and address and attached to the top rope of the
- 14 back side of the pound or crib. Trap nets set with anchors must
- 15 have attached to the end farthest from shore one fluorescent
- 16 orange or fluorescent red marker buoy constructed so that a
- 17 minimum of 18 inches of buoy surface is visible above water in
- 18 the absence of current or under the weight of nets and line.
- 19 The number of the owner's Lake Superior commercial fishing
- 20 license must be plainly marked, in black, on the marker buoy.
- 21 The marker buoy must be marked with a fluorescent orange or
- 22 fluorescent red flag, at least one foot square, attached to the
- 23 top of a flag staff at least five feet long, and the buoy
- 24 constructed so that the flag staff is supported in a vertical
- 25 position. All buoys and floats used in pound or trap net sets
- 26 must be constructed of styrofoam, plastic, rubber, or other
- 27 materials nonhazardous to navigation.
- Subp. 4. Required net markings. Gill nets, when set in
- 29 Lake Superior, must be attached at each end to fluorescent
- 30 orange or fluorescent red marker buoys constructed such that a
- 31 minimum of 18 inches of buoy surface is visible above water in
- 32 the absence of current or under the weight of nets and lines.
- 33 The number of the owner's Lake Superior commercial fishing
- 34 license must be plainly marked, in black, on each end marker
- 35 buoy. Each end marker buoy must be marked with a fluorescent
- 36 orange or fluorescent red flag, at least one foot square,

- 1 attached to the top of a flag staff at least five feet long, and
- 2 the buoy must be constructed so that the flag staff is supported
- 3 in a vertical position. In addition, the marker buoy attached
- 4 to the shoreward (or westerly) end of each set must have a one
- 5 foot square white flag positioned immediately below the
- 6 fluorescent orange or fluorescent red flag. No other buoys
- 7 employed in gill net sets may be marked with fluorescent orange
- 8 or fluorescent red flags. All buoys and floats used in gill net
- 9 sets must be constructed of styrofoam, plastic, rubber, or other
- 10 materials nonhazardous to navigation.
- 11 Subp. 5. Net limits for individual operators. No more
- 12 than 100,000 feet of herring net may be licensed in Minnesota
- 13 waters of Lake Superior and no more than 2,000 feet of herring
- 14 net may be allocated to an individual licensee, except as
- 15 provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 97C.835.
- No more than 120,000 feet of cisco or chub net may be
- 17 licensed in Minnesota waters of Lake Superior and no more than
- 18 12,000 feet of cisco or chub net may be allocated to an
- 19 individual licensee, except as provided by Minnesota Statutes,
- 20 section 97C.835.
- 21 Subp. 6. Net locations. Gill nets may not be set within
- 22 one-quarter mile of the shore in the area extending from the
- 23 Superior entrance to Pigeon River, except under permit issued by
- 24 the commissioner. Gill nets set on the bottom may not be in
- 25 water shallower than 40 fathoms except under permit.
- Subp. 7. Required reporting. Commercial fishing operators
- 27 must submit a record of their commercial fishing operations for
- 28 each month of the calendar year. These reports must be
- 29 submitted within ten days after the end of the month for which
- 30 the report is made. Reports must be made regardless of whether
- 31 fish are taken and regardless of whether any fishing operations
- 32 have taken place.
- 33 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON INLAND MISSISSIPPI RIVER
- 34 6260.1900 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON INLAND MISSISSIPPI RIVER.
- 35 Subpart 1. Species, seasons, and limits. Rough fish may

- 1 be taken in the Mississippi River from the St. Croix River
- 2 junction to St. Anthony Falls, including the following waters:

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- Subp. 2. Restrictions on use of bait for set lines. A
- 29 person using set lines may not use any frogs, bullheads, or
- 30 perch of any size for bait on the Inland Mississippi River.
- 31 Subp. 3. Set line markings. All set lines on the Inland
- 32 Mississippi River must be equipped with a tag furnished by the
- 33 commissioner. At one end of every set line there must be a
- 34 white flag at least 16 inches square, the upper end of which
- 35 must extend at least two feet above the water and which must be
- 36 numbered with figures at least three inches in height
- 37 corresponding with the number of the license authorizing the use
- 38 of the set line.
- 39 Subp. 4. Lifting and set times. Set lines must be lifted
- 40 and all fish removed at least once every 48 hours and may be set
- 41 or lifted only between sunrise and sunset. Commercial fishing
- 42 regulations for boundary waters are found in chapter 6266 under
- 43 the listing for each state.
- 44 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON INLAND WATERS
- 45 6260.2000 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON INLAND WATERS.
- Subpart 1. Release of commercial fish. Commercial fish
- 47 species may not be released into any waters, unless necessary to
- 48 prevent injury to game fish. Fish placed in a holding crib must

- 1 not be returned to the water under any circumstances.
- 2 Subp. 2. Assignment of fishing areas. Licensees will be
- 3 assigned an inland commercial fishing area at the time the
- 4 license is issued. When it is determined that the issuance of a
- 5 class B or C permit is desirable for waters which are included
- 6 within the boundaries of an existing licensee's specified
- 7 fishing area, that licensee will be given the first opportunity
- 8 to apply for the permit, and will be considered before other
- 9 applicants. When it is determined that the issuance of a
- 10 contract is desirable for waters which are included within the
- 11 boundaries of an existing licensee's specified fishing area,
- 12 that licensee must be given first opportunity to apply for the
- 13 contract, and must be considered before other applicants.
- 14 Subp. 3. Use of seines. The mesh in the seine bag and
- 15 first 300 feet of each side of the bag used in inland waters may
- 16 not be larger than three inches, stretch measure. The balance
- 17 of the seine may not be of mesh size larger than five inches,
- 18 stretch measure. There is no limit on the depth of the seine
- 19 measured perpendicularly from cork line to lead line or in the
- 20 twine size or strength.
- 21 Subp. 4. Use of hoop nets. Center leads of hoop nets used
- 22 in inland waters may not exceed 25 feet in length and hoops may
- 23 not exceed four feet in diameter. The webbing for the entire
- 24 net may not exceed two inches, stretch measure, or be of twine
- 25 size less than 18 gauge or 150 pound strength.
- 26 Subp. 5. Use of crib nets. Crib net design for inland
- 27 waters is at the discretion of the operator, except that mesh
- 28 size in cribs may not be larger than two inches, stretch
- 29 measure, or be of twine size smaller than 18 gauge or 150 pound
- 30 strength. Wooden cribs must be constructed so that the sides
- 31 and bottoms have no openings larger than one inch.
- 32 Subp. 6. Restrictions on seines and hoop nets. Seines and
- 33 hoop nets used in inland commercial fishing operations must be
- 34 of a design which will allow the release of nontarget species
- 35 unharmed.
- 36 Subp. 7. Marking of hoop nets. A tag having a minimum

- 1 size of 2-1/2 inches by five-eighths inch and permanently
- 2 bearing the name and residence address of the operator must be
- 3 attached to the top side of the end hoop and near the top of a
- 4 hoop net stake of hoop nets used in inland waters. Hoop net
- 5 stakes must also be marked with an orange or yellow flag, at
- 6 least one foot square, the upper end of which extends at least
- 7 three feet above the surface of the water or ice. Hoop nets
- 8 that are set in open water with anchors must be marked with
- 9 white buoys of at least one gallon displacement bearing the name
- 10 and residence of the operator in contrasting color.
- 11 Subp. 8. Marking of seines. A tag having a minimum size
- 12 of 2-1/2 inches by five-eighths inch and permanently bearing the
- 13 name and residence address of the operator must be placed near
- 14 the first float on one end of the float line of seines used in
- 15 inland waters.
- Subp. 9. Lifting of hoop nets. Hoop nets must be checked
- 17 not less than two times in each seven-day period during open
- 18 water fishing in inland waters and not less than one time in
- 19 each seven-day period when fishing under ice.
- 20 All commercial fish removal operations must be conducted
- 21 during daylight hours, when feasible. The area fisheries
- 22 supervisor must be notified immediately in the instance of an
- 23 exception.
- Subp. 10. Removal of gear. All commercial fishing gear
- 25 and equipment must be removed from inland waters at the time a
- 26 license, permit, or contract becomes void. Hoop nets must be
- 27 removed from the water during the period between freeze-up in
- 28 the fall and ice-out in the spring.
- 29 GENERAL PROVISIONS FOR COMMERCIAL FISHING OPERATIONS
- 30 6260.2100 INTENSITY AND TIMING OF FISHING EFFORTS.
- 31 Licensees, permittees, or contractors must make an effort
- 32 to take fish in the specified area which effort is satisfactory
- 33 by the commissioner. Failure to make a satisfactory effort may
- 34 be grounds for nonrenewal of the license, permit, or contract.
- 35 6260.2200 LICENSE REVOCATION.

- Upon revocation of the license, permit, or contract,
- 2 operators may not be eligible for another license, permit, or
- 3 contract until one year from the date of the revocation.
- 4 INLAND COMMERCIAL FISHING AREAS
- 5 6260.2300 COMMERCIAL FISHING AREAS WITHIN INDIAN RESERVATIONS.
- 6 Those portions of the inland commercial fishing areas and
- 7 core waters established by part 6260.2400 that lie within the
- 8 established boundaries of Indian reservations are not subject to
- 9 the provisions of parts 6260.0100 to 6260.2400.
- 10 6260.2400 DESCRIPTION OF INLAND COMMERCIAL FISHING AREAS.
- 11 Subpart 1. Identification of inland commercial fishing
- 12 areas. The areas described in this part are established as
- 13 inland commercial fishing areas. Within each area, the
- 14 specified waters are hereby designated as core waters. Core
- 15 waters are identified by name and county, Division of Waters
- 16 identification number (Id. No.), (Township (Twp.)), (Range
- 17 (Rge.)), and (Section (Sec.) number).
- 18 Subp. 2. Inland Commercial Fishing Area No. 1. Inland
- 19 Commercial Fishing Area No. 1 consists of all of Lincoln and
- 20 Lyon counties lying south of State Highway No. 19 and all of
- 21 Murray county lying north of State Highway No. 30.

- 3 A. Cutting or pulling aquatic plants for the purpose
- 4 of constructing shooting and observation blinds in amounts
- 5 sufficient for that purpose.
- 6 B. Gathering aquatic plants or plant parts, other
- 7 than wild rice and American lotus, for personal use only.
- 8 C. Cutting or pulling submerged and floating-leaf
- 9 aquatic vegetation in order to maintain a site for swimming or
- 10 boat docking not to extend along more than 50 feet of the
- 11 owner's shoreline or one-half the length of the owner's total
- 12 shoreline, whichever is less, and that does not exceed 2,500
- 13 square feet in area, except that a boat channel extending to
- 14 open water, not to exceed 15 feet in width, may be maintained.

- 26 (3) aquatic plants that have been cut or pulled
- 27 must immediately and permanently be removed from the water.
- D. Destroying aquatic vegetation incidental to soil

- 32 E. Cutting or pulling purple loosestrife (lythrum

- Subp. 2. Justification required for issuance of permits.
- 3 Permits for the destruction of emergent and floating-leaf
- 4 vegetation including wild rice, bulrush, water lilies, and other
- 5 vegetation will not be issued unless the commissioner determines
- 6 sufficient justification exists.
- 7 Subp. 3. Mechanical control. The provisions in items A to
- 8 C apply to conditions for mechanical control of aquatic
- 9 vegetation.
- 10 A. A person who cuts or pulls aquatic vegetation must
- 11 immediately and permanently remove the vegetation from the water
- 12 and dispose of it above the ordinary high water level of any

- 17 be treated at the discretion of the commissioner when authorized
- 18 by previous aquatic nuisance control permits.
- 19 (3) For riparian property owners' associations,
- 20 watershed districts, lake-improvement districts, municipalities,
- 21 or similar entities, or for bay-wide vegetation control programs
- 22 on lakes that have distinct bays, only the percentage limitation
- 23 on littoral area applies. Treatment areas may be distributed
- 24 along the shore at the applicant's discretion, provided that
- 25 spawning areas and protected plants may not be treated.
- 26 (4) On storm water retention ponds, treatment may
- 27 occur on up to five acres or one-half the surface area of the
- 28 pond, whichever is less.
- B. Applications from riparian property owners'
- 30 associations for large area or bay-wide treatment must include a
- 31 written statement of the plan and a map showing areas proposed
- 32 to be treated. The commissioner may reduce the amount of
- 33 littoral area which the applicant proposes to control. Any
- 34 application for treatment must include the names, addresses,
- 35 location on lake, and signatures of all property owners whose
- 36 shorelines will be treated. A notarized statement signed by an

- 1 officer of a sponsoring riparian property owners' association or
- 2 similar organization, listing all properties whose shoreline
- 3 will be treated, may be substituted for signatures.
- 4 C. Waterfowl feeding and resting areas established as
- 5 provided by Minnesota Statutes, sections 97A.095 and 97A.101,
- 6 and lakes designated as waterfowl feeding and resting areas,
- 7 natural environment lakes established pursuant to part
- 8 6120.3000, or wildlife management lakes may not be treated for
- 9 control of submerged vegetation.
- D. Watercourses or portions of watercourses
- ll classified as wild as defined under either the Minnesota or
- 12 federal Wild and Scenic Rivers Acts as provided by Minnesota
- 13 Statutes, section 103F.325, and Public Law Number 90-542, United
- 14 States Code, title 16, section 1271 et seq., as amended, may not
- 15 be treated.
- 16 Subp. 6. Control of algae. An application for proposed
- 17 lake-wide control of algae must be accompanied by evidence that
- 18 a majority of the riparian property owners are in favor of the
- 19 proposed treatment.
- 20 Subp. 7. Pesticide treatment of drinking water. The
- 21 commissioner may not issue a permit for pesticide treatment of
- 22 waters used by humans for drinking unless approval is obtained
- 23 from the Minnesota Department of Health.
- 24 6280.0500 AQUATIC NUISANCE CONTROL PERMIT FEES.
- 25 Subpart 1. Permit application fees. The provisions in
- 26 items A to C apply to aquatic nuisance control permit fees.
- 27 A. When application is made to control two or more
- 28 nuisance conditions, only the larger fee applies. A permit
- 29 application fee, in the form of a check or money order payable
- 30 to the State Treasurer, must accompany each permit application
- 31 when required by the following fee schedule:
- 32 (1) to control rooted vegetation by chemical
- 33 means: \$20 plus 40 cents per shoreline foot of the proposed
- 34 treatment area, up to a maximum of \$200;
- 35 (2) to control emergent vegetation, or to control

- 1 submerged or floating-leaf aquatic vegetation in an area larger
- 2 than 2,500 square feet, by mechanical control: \$20 for the
- 3 first acre or portion of an acre and \$2 for each additional acre
- 4 or portion to be controlled, up to a maximum of \$200;
- 5 (3) to gather or harvest aquatic plants or plant
- 6 parts other than wild rice, for sale purposes: no charge;
- 7 (4) to transplant aquatic plants or bog into
- 8 protected waters: no charge;
- 9 (5) to control chara, filamentous algae, snails
- 10 that carry swimmer's itch, or leeches, singly or in
- 11 combination: \$4 per 100 shoreline feet or portion proposed to
- 12 be treated, up to a maximum of \$200;
- 13 (6) to control algae by lake-wide application of
- 14 copper sulfate or other approved algicide: \$20 plus 40 cents
- 15 per acre to be treated, up to a maximum of \$200; and
- 16 (7) to control purple loosestrife (lythrum
- 17 salicaria) by chemical means: no charge.
- 18 B. If the fee does not accompany the application, the
- 19 applicant will be notified and no action will be taken on the
- 20 application until the fee is received.
- 21 C. The fee is not refundable, whether the application
- 22 is permitted, modified, denied, or withdrawn, unless the
- 23 commissioner determines that the activity does not require a
- 24 permit.
- Subp. 2. Fees for inspection, supervision, and monitoring.
- 26 The provisions in items A to C apply to fees for the inspection,
- 27 supervision, and monitoring of aquatic nuisance control programs.
- A. If field inspection, supervision, or monitoring is
- 29 required as a permit condition, the applicant or permittee will
- 30 be charged \$60, provided the commissioner has notified the
- 31 applicant of the potential fee and the applicant has chosen to
- 32 continue the application. There will be only one inspection fee
- 33 per application. Inspection fees are not refundable for any
- 34 reason.
- 35 B. Supervision by a department employee will be
- 36 required, unless waived, for initial lake-wide treatment of

- 1 excessive algae blooms by inexperienced permittees and may be
- 2 periodically required for treatments by experienced groups.
- 3 C. Field inspections will be made in cases of new
- 4 applications for pesticide treatment or mechanical control of
- 5 areas one acre or larger. Field inspection of other previously
- 6 permitted areas will also be required at intervals to evaluate
- 7 conditions and the need for continued control measures.
- 8 Subp. 3. Fees for state and federal agencies. The fees
- 9 set forth by this part will not be required of any state agency
- 10 as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 15.01, or of any
- 11 federal agency.
- 12 6280.0600 APPROVAL OF PESTICIDES AND METHODS USED FOR AQUATIC
- 13 NUISANCE CONTROL.
- 14 Subpart 1. Chemicals must be registered as aquatic
- 15 herbicides or algicides. Only chemicals registered with the
- 16 United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as aquatic
- 17 herbicides or algicides and registered with the Minnesota
- 18 Department of Agriculture, and approved for use in public waters
- 19 by the commissioner, may be used for chemical control of aquatic
- 20 vegetation or algae in public waters. Permits may be granted
- 21 for experimental use of unregistered chemicals and methods in a
- 22 bona fide experimental program under an experimental use permit
- 23 from the EPA, the Minnesota Department of Agriculture, and the
- 24 commissioner.
- Subp. 2. Instructions and precautions of pesticides must
- 26 be followed. Pesticides must be applied according to the label
- 27 registration rates provided by the manufacturer and other
- 28 restrictions imposed by the department. Pesticide-treated areas
- 29 must be posted with signs provided by the department bearing the
- 30 permit number; the name of pesticide used; the date of
- 31 treatment; and dates on which water from the treated area may be
- 32 safely used for swimming, fishing, and other uses, as specified
- 33 on the product label or by the department. When differences in
- 34 instructions exist, the department recommendations must be
- 35 followed. The permittee or agent is responsible for the

- 1 placement and removal of required signs. The treatment area
- 2 must be posted in such a way that people entering from any
- 3 direction can see the signs, or as otherwise prescribed in the
- 4 permit.
- 5 6280.0700 COMMERCIAL APPLICATORS AND OPERATORS.
- 6 Subpart 1. Pesticide applicators. A person or firm may
- 7 not apply pesticides of any kind for hire for aquatic nuisance
- 8 control on protected waters unless a commercial pesticide
- 9 applicator's license has been obtained from the Minnesota
- 10 Department of Agriculture. A pesticide applicator's license
- 11 must be endorsed by the department before pesticides may be
- 12 applied under an aquatic nuisance control permit.
- 13 Subp. 2. Nonchemical operators. A person or firm may not
- 14 cut, pull, or remove aquatic vegetation by nonchemical methods
- 15 on public waters for hire without first obtaining an aquatic
- 16 operator's permit issued by the department. Issuance of an
- 17 aquatic operator's permit is contingent upon determination by
- 18 the commissioner that the applicant has adequate equipment and
- 19 knowledge to properly control aquatic vegetation in public
- 20 waters. This subpart does not apply to persons or firms using
- 21 power-operated earth-moving equipment in public waters under
- 22 terms of permits issued by the department for work in the bed of
- 23 public waters as provided by Minnesota Statutes, section
- 24 103G.245. Persons or firms that use aquatic vegetation cutting
- 25 and harvesting equipment must thoroughly remove and properly
- 26 dispose of all viable residual plants and viable plant parts
- 27 from the equipment before transporting it to another body of
- 28 water.
- 29 6280.0800 ANNUAL REPORTS AND TREATMENT NOTICES.
- 30 Subpart 1. Annual report. The holder of an aquatic
- 31 operator's permit, commercial pesticide applicator's license, or
- 32 aquatic nuisance control permit must, no later than November 15
- 33 of each year, report to the commissioner, on the forms provided,
- 34 information on aquatic nuisance control operations requested.
- 35 Failure to report will be grounds for refusing to issue such

- 1 permits in the future.
- 2 Subp. 2. Treatment notice. Holders of aquatic nuisance
- 3 control permits or their agents must give notice of the proposed
- 4 date of treatment to all persons specified on the permit. The
- 5 notification must be received prior to beginning any work under
- 6 the permit. Failure to give notice is grounds for revocation of
- 7 any existing permit or refusal to issue future permits.
- 8 Notification is not required for mechanical control of
- 9 vegetation where no permit is required.
- 10 6280.0900 REVOCATION.
- 11 The commissioner may revoke any aquatic operator's permit,
- 12 aquatic endorsement of a commercial pesticide applicator's
- 13 license, or aquatic nuisance control permit without prior notice
- 14 whenever it has been determined that it is necessary to protect
- 15 the interests of the public, to protect human life, or to
- 16 protect fish and wildlife, or for violation of the terms and
- 17 conditions of permits, this chapter, or other applicable laws or
- 18 rules.
- 19 6280.1000 VARIANCE.
- 20 Provisions of this chapter may be waived under special
- 21 circumstances when deemed necessary by the commissioner for the
- 22 protection and preservation of the natural resources of the
- 23 state.
- 24 6280.1100 APPEAL OF PERMIT DETERMINATION.
- The terms, conditions, or denial of a permit application
- 26 may, within 30 days of receipt of written notice, be appealed to
- 27 the commissioner by filing a written request for review. If
- 28 written request for review is not submitted within 30 days, the
- 29 permit decision becomes final.
- 30 GINSENG
- 31 6282.0100 OPEN DATES FOR TAKING WILD GINSENG.
- 32 Wild ginseng (Panax quinquefolium) may be harvested, in
- 33 accordance with this chapter, statewide from September 1 to
- 34 December 31.

- 1 6282.0200 HARVEST LIMITS FOR WILD GINSENG.
- Wild ginseng may be harvested during only the open season.
- 3 There is no limit on wild ginseng during the open season.
- 4 6282.0300 HARVESTING WILD GINSENG IN WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS
- 5 AND STATE PARKS.
- 6 Subpart 1. Harvesting in wildlife management areas. A
- 7 person may not harvest wild ginseng within any state-owned
- 8 wildlife management area without first obtaining a permit from a
- 9 state wildlife manager.
- 10 Subp. 2. Harvesting in state parks. A person may not
- ll harvest wild ginseng within a state park or other area under the
- 12 administration of the Department of Natural Resources, Division
- 13 of Parks and Recreation.
- 14 6282.0400 REGULATIONS ON WILD GINSENG DEALERS.
- Subpart 1. Dealer's license required. A person must
- 16 possess a wild ginseng dealer's license to purchase wild ginseng
- 17 from a harvester (digger); sell wild ginseng to an unlicensed
- 18 dealer or to a processor, broker, wholesaler, or retailer; or
- 19 carry, ship, or export wild ginseng out of the state.
- 20 Subp. 2. Restrictions on issuing dealer's license. A wild
- 21 ginseng dealer's license may be issued annually and only to
- 22 residents of Minnesota.
- Subp. 3. Dealers must keep records. Licensed wild ginseng
- 24 dealers must keep complete, accurate, and up-to-date business
- 25 records on forms provided by the commissioner. Each purchase or
- 26 sale of any ginseng grown in Minnesota, whether wild or
- 27 artificially propagated, must be recorded in the record book
- 28 within 48 hours. Record books must be open to inspection by the
- 29 commissioner during all reasonable hours. Records must contain
- 30 the following information for each transaction:
- A. names of all persons from whom wild ginseng was
- 32 purchased or to whom ginseng was sold;
- B. date of each transaction;
- 34 C. quantity by weight of all ginseng purchased and

- 1 all ginseng sold; and
- D. whether the ginseng purchased or sold is
- 3 artificially propagated or wild, and the quantity by weight of
- 4 each.
- 5 Subp. 4. Reporting by dealers. On or before March 15 of
- 6 each year, licensed wild ginseng dealers must submit, on a form
- 7 provided by the commissioner, a report of their transactions in
- 8 ginseng during the preceding license year. This report must
- 9 consist of a summary of the records kept as provided by this
- 10 part and must be in the format specified on the form.
- 11 Subp. 5. Personal use of wild ginseng. This part does not
- 12 apply to persons possessing, for personal use only, not more
- 13 than ten ounces of dried wild ginseng, except that such wild
- 14 ginseng may not be sold.
- 15 6282.0500 GENERAL PROVISIONS FOR HARVESTING WILD GINSENG.
- 16 Subpart 1. Restriction on green roots. A person may not
- 17 sell, purchase, or possess any green roots of wild ginseng,
- 18 except during the open season.
- 19 Subp. 2. Restriction on exportation. A dealer licensed
- 20 under part 6282.0400 may not carry, ship, or export out of the
- 21 state any ginseng grown in Minnesota, whether wild or
- 22 artificially propagated, without first presenting the ginseng to
- 23 a conservation officer who must inspect it and attach to each
- 24 container or package a label provided and signed by the officer
- 25 verifying the contents, and containing the following information:
- A. dealer's name and license number;
- 27 B. date of inspection;
- 28 C. quantity by weight of ginseng contained in the
- 29 package; and
- 30 D. whether the ginseng contained is wild or
- 31 artificially propagated, and the quantity by weight of each.
- 32 Subp. 3. Harvest restrictions on wild ginseng. A person
- 33 may not harvest, dig, or disturb any wild ginseng plant unless
- 34 the plant has at least three prongs (leaves) with five leaflets
- 35 each.

- 1 Subp. 4. Removing and planting seeds. Immediately after
- 2 digging or removing any wild ginseng plant, the digger must
- 3 remove all of the seeds from the plant's berries and plant them
- 4 in the area where the plant was dug. Seeds must be planted by
- 5 removing surface litter, planting each seed at a depth of
- 6 one-half inch in the underlying soil, and replacing the surface
- 7 litter over the planting site.
- 8 WILD RICE
- 9 6284.0100 OPEN DATES FOR HARVESTING WILD RICE.
- 10 The opening date for the harvesting of wild rice is no
- 11 earlier than August 1 and no later than September 30. Except as
- 12 provided by this chapter, the opening date, days, and hours of
- 13 harvest are established by the wild rice director in writing not
- 14 less than 72 hours prior to the opening and will be announced by
- 15 issuance of a news release.
- 16 6284.0200 RESTRICTIONS ON DEPUTY WILD RICE DIRECTORS.
- 17 A deputy director of the wild rice harvest may not harvest
- 18 any wild rice on any waters for the purpose of testing the
- 19 ripeness of the rice, or for any other purpose, at any time
- 20 before the waters have been opened for harvesting.
- 21 6284.0300 METHODS OF HARVESTING WILD RICE.
- In addition to the restrictions in Minnesota Statutes,
- 23 section 84.111, a boat, skiff, or canoe may not have any
- 24 extension or appliance built onto it or attached to it which
- 25 will increase its normal or ordinary height or its capacity to
- 26 carry wild rice. Flails used to harvest wild rice must be round
- 27 and smooth.
- 28 6284.0400 PERMIT REQUIRED ON FEDERALLY DESIGNATED AREAS.
- 29 A person must obtain the required federal permits before
- 30 harvesting wild rice in Voyageur's National Park, on the Tamarac
- 31 National Wildlife Refuge, or on the Sherburne National Wildlife
- 32 Refuge.
- 33 6284.0500 HARVESTING WILD RICE IN WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS.

- 1 All wildlife management areas are closed to the harvest of
- 2 wild rice, except for the following:
- 3 A. Mud-Goose, Cass county;
- B. Kettle Lake, Carlton county;
- 5 C. Hubbel Pond, Becker county; and
- D. Duck Lake, Crow Wing county.
- 7 6284.0600 HARVESTING WILD RICE IN WHITE EARTH, LEECH LAKE, BOIS
- 8 FORTE, GRAND PORTAGE, FOND DU LAC, AND MILLE LACS INDIAN
- 9 RESERVATIONS.
- 10 Subpart 1. Allowable methods for harvesting. The methods
- ll for harvesting wild rice on public waters within the original
- 12 boundaries of the White Earth, Leech Lake, Bois Forte, Grand
- 13 Portage, Fond du Lac, and Mille Lacs Indian reservations are
- 14 subject to the provisions of this chapter, to the extent these
- 15 provisions are not inconsistent with this part.
- Subp. 2. Persons eligible to harvest. Only the
- 17 commissioner, tribal members, and persons who are residents of
- 18 the reservation on which they are harvesting, may harvest or
- 19 gather wild rice within the boundaries of the reservation.
- Subp. 3. Wild rice management. The harvest of all native
- 21 wild rice within a reservation is managed by the wild rice
- 22 committee of that reservation's business committee. Every
- 23 member of a wild rice committee is appointed a deputy director
- 24 of the wild rice harvest.
- Subp. 4. Open dates for harvesting in reservations. The
- 26 opening date, days, and hours of harvest must be established by
- 27 the wild rice committees not less than 24 hours prior to the
- 28 designated opening and must be publicly announced by issuance of
- 29 a news release.
- 30 Subp. 5. Alterations to open dates in reservations. Once
- 31 opened, the wild rice committees may alter the days and the
- 32 hours of harvest on any of the waters by posting notice of the
- 33 change at the major entrances to the waters affected not less
- 34 than 12 hours prior to the time the alterations are to take
- 35 effect.

- 1 Subp. 6. Harvesting license required in reservations.
- 2 Persons, other than tribal members, harvesting wild rice within
- 3 a reservation must possess a license to harvest wild rice.
- Subp. 7. Dealer license required in reservations. Every
- 5 non-Indian wild rice buyer purchasing wild rice on a reservation
- 6 must possess a wild rice dealer's license.
- 7 6284.0700 HARVESTING WILD RICE IN LEECH LAKE RESERVATION.
- 8 Subpart 1. Allowable methods for harvesting. In addition
- 9 to the following subparts, the methods for harvesting on public
- 10 waters within the original boundaries of the Leech Lake Indian
- 11 Reservation are subject to the provisions of this chapter to the
- 12 extent that these provisions are not inconsistent with this part.
- Subp. 2. Permit requirements in the reservation. Persons
- 14 eligible to harvest wild rice in the reservation must adequately
- 15 identify themselves to the reservation business committee or its
- 16 agents and obtain a reservation permit to harvest wild rice.
- 17 The reservation business committee may charge a fee for
- 18 reservation permits. The fee for reservation permits sold to
- 19 nontribal members must be the same as that charged to tribal
- 20 members. The reservation permit must be carried upon the person
- 21 while engaged in harvesting and displayed to authorized state or
- 22 reservation conservation officers upon request.
- Subp. 3. Harvesting license required in reservation.
- 24 Persons, other than tribal members, harvesting wild rice on the
- 25 reservation must possess a license to harvest wild rice in
- 26 addition to the reservation permit.
- 27 Subp. 4. Dealer license required in reservation.
- 28 Non-Indian wild rice buyers buying wild rice within the
- 29 reservation must possess a buyer's permit from the reservation
- 30 business committee in addition to a state wild rice dealer's
- 31 license.
