- 6 6900.0010 DEFINITIONS.
- 7 [For text of subpart 1, see M.R.]
- 8 Subp. la. Acceptable graduate training. "Acceptable
- 9 graduate training" means at least 12 consecutive months of
- 10 postgraduate training in a clinical residency or preceptorship
- 11 as described in part 6900.0020, subpart 5, 6, or 7.

- 13 6900.0020 LICENSURE REQUIREMENTS.

- Subp. 2. Education. The applicant must submit a complete
- 16 transcript of education obtained in any college accredited by
- 17 the Council on Podiatric Medical Education, American Podiatric
- 18 Medical Association.
- 19 The transcript must contain the date of graduation, degree
- 20 granted, and an original seal of the college.
- 21 Subp. 3. Examination. The applicant must have received a
- 22 passing score on each part of the National Board of Podiatric
- 23 Medical Examiners Licensing Examination. A passing score is the
- 24 number corresponding to or greater than the cut score
- 25 recommended by the national board. The cut score is the score
- 26 which separates passing scores from failing scores.
- 27 A copy of the applicant's scores must be submitted. The
- 28 copy must contain an original seal of the national board.
- 29 Subp. 3a. State clinical examination. The applicant must
- 30 pass a state clinical examination as required in Minnesota
- 31 Statutes, section 153.16, subdivision 1, paragraph (c).
- 32 A state clinical examination shall include demonstration of
- 33 the clinical application of podiatric medical knowledge and
- 34 skill, but need not include demonstrations on actual patients.
- 35 The examination may be developed in cooperation with boards of

- 1 podiatric medicine in other states. A passing score is the
- 2 number corresponding to or greater than the cut score
- 3 recommended by a test development consultant.
- 4 Subp. 4. Graduate training. Applicants graduating in 1987
- 5 and thereafter from a podiatric medical school must present
- 6 evidence of satisfactory completion of acceptable graduate
- 7 training. For applicants entering a graduate training program
- 8 after June 30, 1995, the evidence of satisfactory completion
- 9 must include written verification from the program supervisor
- 10 and submission of the applicant's surgical and other training
- 11 logs. The logs will be returned at the applicant's request.
- 12 Subp. 5. Clinical residency. A clinical residency is a
- 13 formal, structured postdoctoral training program approved by the
- 14 Council on Podiatric Medical Education of the American Podiatric
- 15 Medical Association and sponsored by and conducted in an
- 16 institution such as a hospital or ambulatory health care
- 17 facility or conducted by a college of podiatric medicine
- 18 accredited by the Council on Podiatric Medical Education of the
- 19 American Podiatric Medical Association. The residency must:

- 21 D. provide the podiatric medical graduate with
- 22 clinical experience necessary to become competent in the full
- 23 scope of podiatric medicine and surgery.

- Subp. 7. Preceptor requirements. The preceptor must:
- 26 A. provide hands-on training in the care of children
- 27 and adults that offers experience as defined by the statutory
- 28 scope of practice including drug therapy, radiology, local
- 29 anesthesia, analgesia, biomechanics, physical medicine,
- 30 rehabilitation, and the following surgeries:

- 33 E. instruct and direct the unlicensed podiatrist in
- 34 the podiatrist's duties, oversee and check the work, provide
- 35 general directions, and comply with at least the following
- 36 criteria:

- 1 (1) review and evaluate patient services provided
- 2 by the unlicensed podiatrist from information in patient charts
- 3 and records on a daily basis and the unlicensed podiatrist's
- 4 surgical and other training logs on a monthly basis; review of
- 5 patient charts and records may either be in person or by
- 6 telecommunication;

- 8 Subp. 8. [See repealer.]
- 9 Subp. 8a. Applicant lacking state clinical examination. An
- 10 applicant for licensure who has met the licensure requirements
- 11 in Minnesota Statutes, section 153.16, except passing the state
- 12 clinical examination may be granted a temporary permit for one
- 13 year to practice according to the requirements in part
- 14 6900.0160, subpart 3, and may be scheduled for the personal
- 15 appearance at any time during the year.

- 17 6900.0160 TEMPORARY PERMIT.
- Subpart 1. Prerequisites. An applicant for a temporary
- 19 permit to practice podiatric medicine must submit a complete,
- 20 acceptable application for a Minnesota temporary permit
- 21 accompanied by the required fee. The clinical examination and
- 22 personal interview may be completed during the permit period.
- The applicant must submit a transcript as provided in part
- 24 6900.0020, subpart 2, and written evidence that the applicant
- 25 has been accepted as a resident, preceptee, or graduate trainee
- 26 in an acceptable graduate training program.
- 27 Subp. 2. Term of permit. A granted permit is valid for
- 28 the period of graduate training of 12 months beginning with the
- 29 first day of graduate training. A permit may be reissued for
- 30 one of the following reasons:
- 31 A. the applicant submits acceptable evidence that the
- 32 training was interrupted by circumstances beyond the control of
- 33 the applicant and that the sponsor of the program agrees to the
- 34 extension; or
- 35 B. the applicant is continuing in a residency that

- 1 extends for more than one year.

- 3 6900.0200 LICENSE RENEWAL.
- 4 Subpart 1. License renewal term. The license renewal term
- 5 is 24 months beginning on July 1 and ending on June 30. The
- 6 term of renewal begins on July 1 in odd-numbered years for a
- 7 licensee whose license number is an odd number and in
- 8 even-numbered years for a licensee whose license number is an
- 9 even number.
- 10 Subp. la. First license renewal following licensure. For
- 11 the first renewal period following the initial licensure period,
- 12 the fee and continuing education requirements for renewal of the
- 13 license are that fraction of the license renewal fee and
- 14 continuing education hours, to the nearest dollar and hour,
- 15 respectively, that is represented by the ratio of the number of
- 16 days the license is held in the initial licensure period to 730
- 17 days.
- 18 Subp. 1b. Submission of license renewal application. A
- 19 licensee must submit to the board a license renewal application
- 20 on a form provided by the board, together with the license
- 21 renewal fee, postmarked no later than June 30 in the year of
- 22 renewal. The application form must be signed by the licensee in
- 23 the place provided for the renewal applicant's signature and
- 24 include evidence of participation in approved continuing
- 25 education programs, as described in part 6900.0300, and any
- 26 other information as the board may reasonably require.
- 27 Subp. lc. Renewal application postmarked after June 30. A
- 28 renewal application postmarked after June 30 in the renewal year
- 29 shall be returned to the licensee for addition of the late
- 30 renewal fee. A license renewal application postmarked after
- 31 June 30 in the renewal year is not complete until the late
- 32 renewal fee has been received by the board.
- 33 Subp. 2. Failure to submit renewal application. The
- 34 procedures in subparts 3 to 6 will be followed by the board for
- 35 licensees who have failed to submit the renewal application as

- 1 provided in subparts 1b and 1c.
- 2 Subp. 3. Notice. Any time after July 1 of the applicable
- 3 year, the board will send to the last address on file with the
- 4 board, a notice to a licensee who has not completed and
- 5 submitted a license renewal application. The notice will state
- 6 that the licensee has failed to make application for renewal;
- 7 the amount of renewal and late fees and information about
- 8 continuing education that must be submitted in order for the
- 9 license to be renewed; that the licensee may voluntarily
- 10 terminate the license by notifying the board; and that failure
- ll to respond to the notice by the date specified, which date must
- 12 be at least 30 days after the notice is sent by the board,
- 13 either by applying for license renewal as provided in subpart 1b
- 14 or by notifying the board that the licensee has voluntarily
- 15 terminated the license, will result in expiration of the license
- 16 and terminating the right to practice.

- 18 6900.0210 REINSTATEMENT OF LICENSE.
- 19 Subpart 1. Requirements. Upon a podiatrist's compliance
- 20 with the requirements in this part, the podiatrist's license
- 21 must be reinstated. The podiatrist requesting reinstatement of
- 22 a license shall submit the following materials:

- C. for each year the license has been inactive,
- 25 evidence of participation in one-half the number of hours of
- 26 acceptable continuing education required for biennial renewal,
- 27 under part 6900.0300, up to five years;
- D. if the license has been inactive for more than
- 29 five years, the amount of acceptable continuing education
- 30 required in item C, must be obtained during the five years
- 31 immediately before application; or

- 34 6900.0300 CONTINUING EDUCATION.
- 35 [For text of subpart 1, see M.R.]

- 1 Subp. la. Prorating continuing education hours. The
- 2 number of continuing education hours required during the initial
- 3 licensure period is that fraction of 30 hours, to the nearest
- 4 whole hour, that is represented by the ratio of the number of
- 5 days the license is held in the initial licensure period to 730
- 6 days. Continuing education in infection control, including
- 7 blood borne diseases, is required for renewal periods beginning
- 8 on or after September 1, 1993. For initial licensure periods of
- 9 less than two years, one continuing education hour in infection
- 10 control is required.
- 11 Subp. 2. Obtaining continuing education hours. Continuing
- 12 education hours shall be obtained in the following manner:
- 13 A. attendance at educational programs approved by the
- 14 board under subpart 3 or completion of verifiable home study
- 15 programs under subpart 3b;
- B. attendance at hospital staff meetings (no more
- 17 than three hours of hospital staff meetings may be used for
- 18 license renewal each year); or
- 19 C. participation in acceptable graduate training.
- 20 Subp. 3. Requirements of program approval. Each
- 21 continuing education program used to meet the license renewal
- 22 requirements must be approved by the board before the program is
- 23 accepted, based on the following criteria:

- Subp. 3b. Home study programs. The criteria listed in
- 27 subpart 3 for program approval shall apply to home study
- 28 programs to the extent the criteria are relevant to home study
- 29 programs. In addition, the sponsor of the home study program
- 30 must verify that the licensee has completed the program by means
- 31 of an independently scored quiz related to the subject matter of
- 32 the program or other procedure that is approved by the board.
