Carcass. 9 domestic animal or fowl that has died or has been killed otherwise than by being slaughtered for human or animal 10 consumption. Domestic animal does not include a species of 11 animal maintained in the home of the owner whether or not the 12 particular domestic animal was so housed at any time prior to 13 14 its death. 15 Subp. 5. Collecting station. "Collecting station" means an establishment maintained and operated under permit where 16 carcasses or discarded animal parts may be unloaded from trucks 17 operating under permit, for temporary keeping. 18 [For text of subp 6, see M.R.] 19 Subp. 6a. Discarded animal parts. "Discarded animal parts" 20 21 means all or a part of animals, fish, or poultry that have been killed for human or animal consumption and not used for that 22 23 purpose. Subp. 6b. Disposal by other methods. "Disposal by other 24 methods" means the disposal of carcasses or discarded animal 25 parts by a board-approved method other than burning, burial, 26 rendering, or processing into animal food. 27 [For text of subp 7, see M.R.] 28 29 Subp. 7a. Fur farm. "Fur farm" means a premises on which fox, ferrets, mink, and other animals are raised for the 30 production of fur. 31 32 Subp. 8. [See repealer.] Subp. 9. [See repealer.] 33 Subp. 9a. Off-site pickup point. "Off-site pickup point" 34 means a location away from the building site where carcasses may 35

"Rendering" means the processing of 3 all or a part of carcasses, fish or poultry, including scraps, 4 discarded animal parts, and grease, by cooking to produce 5 inedible by-products. Rendering includes the skinning and 6 dismembering of carcasses. 7 Subp. 12. Rendering plant. "Rendering plant" means an 8 establishment where rendering is conducted and includes: 9 10 Α. the rooms or buildings where skinning and dismembering of carcasses is conducted; 11 12 B. the tanks in which carcasses are cooked; the rooms or buildings used for storage of hides, 13 с. tankage, or other products from processing and the adjacent area 14 used in the operation of collecting, hauling, skinning, 15 16 dismembering, and cooking carcasses and packaging, storing, and loading the finished product of the rendering operation; 17 D. the area used for the disposal of waste material 18 unsuitable for rendering; and 19 E. the liquid waste disposal facilities of the plant. 20 Subp. 12a. Toxic material. "Toxic material" means a 21 22 poisonous substance that killed an animal. 23 Subp. 13. Truck. "Truck" means a vehicle or conveyance 24 used for the transportation of carcasses or discarded animal parts including scraps, grease, or other renderable parts. 25 1719.0200 PERMITS. 26 27 The board may issue a permit to owners or operators of rendering, animal food processing plants, or other 28 establishments to transport the carcasses or discarded animal 29 parts over the public highways to their plant upon receipt of a 30 31 properly executed application form furnished by the board. The application must include: 32 A. the name of the establishment and location by 33 county and city or town; 34 B. a description of each truck owned, leased, 35

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contracted, or used in the transportation of carcasses,
 including the license number and truck body number;

3 C. the location of each collecting station, if any,4 by county and city or town; and

5 D. the signature of the owner or operator of the 6 establishment or an authorized agent.

7 1719.0300 PERMITS REQUIRED.

Permits from the board are required for all trucks used to 8 transport carcasses or discarded animal parts over public 9 roads. The permit authorizes the permittee to transport the 10 11 carcasses or discarded animal parts over public roads to an establishment but does not authorize crossing state lines. 12 13 Permits are valid for one year unless revoked in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, section 35.93. The permittee shall comply 14 with rules of other state and federal agencies. No permit is 15 required for a person to haul the carcass of an animal which was 16 owned by that person before the animal died. 17

18 1719.0310 TRUCKS CROSSING STATE LINES.

19 Trucks crossing state lines must meet applicable conditions 20 in any reciprocal agreement between the states involved.

21 1719.0400 TRUCK OWNED BY PERSON OTHER THAN OWNER OR OPERATOR OF 22 RENDERING PLANT.

If a truck is owned by a person other than the owner or operator of the establishment, the owner or operator of the truck and the owner or operator of the establishment are responsible for compliance with all laws and rules pertaining to the transportation of carcasses. The application must indicate the name and address of the owner of the truck.

29 1719.0500 INSPECTION OF PLANT FACILITIES AND TRUCKS.

Before permits are issued, an inspection of the plant, collecting station, and trucks must be made by an agent of the board to determine if the facilities of the plant and the trucks comply with this chapter. A report of the inspection must be filed with the board.

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1 1719.0600 BURYING OR BURNING.

2 The Pollution Control Agency has adopted rules governing 3 burying or burning carcasses or discarded animal parts.

4 1719.0700 CARCASS OF ANIMAL WHICH HAS DIED FROM ANTHRAX.

5 Permits shall not allow the removal, composting, 6 transportation, or rendering of any carcass of an animal which 7 has died from anthrax. The carcass must be treated according to 8 parts 1705.0010 to 1705.0050.

9 1719.0750 CARCASS OF ANIMAL THAT DIED FROM RABIES.

10 If circumstances exist that do not reasonably allow the 11 burning or burial of a carcass of an animal that has died from 12 rabies or is suspected of having died from rabies, the carcass 13 may be transported to a rendering plant for special handling 14 under the advisement of a veterinarian.

15 1719.0800 CARCASS OF ANIMAL THAT DIED FROM TOXIC MATERIALS.
16 Permits do not allow the removal, transportation, or
17 rendering of a carcass of an animal that has died from toxic
18 materials unless the material is inactivated by the rendering
19 process. The Pollution Control Agency has adopted rules about
20 the concentration of toxic agents in composted material.

21 1719.1000 ENDANGERING HEALTH OF DOMESTIC ANIMALS.

If the board determines that the removal, transportation, rendering, or feeding of a carcass of an animal or fowl that has died or has been killed because of a specific disease will endanger the health of the domestic animals of the state, the board shall notify the owner or person in charge that the carcass may not be removed from the premises, except with a permit from the board.

29 1719.1100 PERMITS TO FUR FARMS.

30 Permits are required for fur farmers to haul carcasses or 31 discarded animal parts to feed their animals. The carcasses or 32 discarded animal parts may be fed only to their own animals.

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1719.1200 TRANSPORTATION OF CARCASSES AND DISCARDED ANIMAL PARTS. 1 Trucks permitted for the transportation of carcasses, or 2 discarded animal parts to establishments, must be equipped with 3 a truck body or tank that is watertight and so constructed that 4 no drippings or seepings from the carcasses can escape. 5 The truck body or tank must have a permanent cover and be completely 6 enclosed. Temporary cover ar rangements may be used on trucks or 7 trailers in special circumstances such as hauling carcasses from 8 collecting stations directly to the main plant if the cover 9 arrangement passes inspection as being completely enclosed and 10 prior approval is received from the board or its agent. 11 The tailgate must completely enclose the rear openings of the 12 truck. Trucks used for hauling renderable products other than 13 carcasses must be adequately constructed to prevent dripping and 14 equipped with a cover to prevent the transported product against 15 16 undue exposure to the outside.

17 1719.1300 TRANSPORTATION FOR DISPOSAL BY OTHER METHODS.

Persons hauling carcasses or discarded animal parts for disposal by other methods shall keep the carcasses or discarded animal parts completely covered and in a leakproof container or truck body while being transported over any public road.

22 1719.1500 TRUCK BODY NUMBER.

Each truck used for the transportation of carcasses and discarded animal parts to an establishment must be assigned a body number by the establishment. Both the establishment name or truck owner's name and the body number of the truck must be printed in a conspicuous place and manner on the left side of the truck bed or body in figures at least four inches high.

29 1719.1600 FUR FARM TRUCK IDENTIFICATION.

No numbers are required on trucks used to haul carcasses or discarded animal parts to be used for fur farm food, but the truck must have the name of the owner or farm name on the left side of the truck in letters at least two inches high.

34 1719.1700 CLEANING AND DISINFECTION.

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If a truck, a person in Charge of a truck, or an agent has 1 been on a premises for the purpose of removing a carcass, before 2 the truck can be taken on a public road or on other premises the 3 4 wheels of the truck and the shoes or boots of persons who have been upon the premises must be thoroughly cleaned and 5 disinfected with a disinfectant of a prescribed strength 6 approved by the board. The cleaning and disinfecting must also 7 be conducted prior to the truck or persons in charge of the 8 truck leaving the establishment. 9

10 1719.1800 INSECTICIDE.

Before closing the cover and leaving the premises, a sufficient amount of an FDA-approved insecticide must be discharged into the truck body to destroy accumulated flies before the next stop during the time from May 1 to September 30.

15 1719.1900 OFF-SITE PICKUP POINT.

16 Carcasses left at an off-site pickup point must be in an 17 animal-proof enclosed area that is at least 200 yards from a 18 neighbor's buildings. Carcasses must be picked up within 72 19 hours, except if the enclosed area is refrigerated to less than 20 45 degrees Fahrenheit, the carcasses must be picked up within 21 seven days.

22 1719.2000 USE OF VEHICLE FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

A vehicle used for the transportation of carcasses or discarded animal parts may not be used for any other purpose until it is thoroughly cleaned and disinfected. Trucks and containers must be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected after emptying.

28 1719.2100 CARCASS UNLOADING AND RELOADING.

No carcass may be removed from a truck except for final disposal or at a collecting station.

A carcass must be unloaded within enclosures or a building provided for that purpose. A carcass may not be allowed to remain in the collecting station for a period longer than 24 hours before reloading into another permitted truck for

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transportation directly to an establishment, except a carcass
 kept at less than 45 degrees Fahrenheit may remain for up to
 seven days.

4 1719.2200 ESTABLISHMENTS.

A permit may not be issued to the owner of an establishment 5 6 unless the plant and any collecting station includes a building or buildings adapted to the purpose intended, with adequate 7 ventilation and concrete floors with good drainage, and so 8 9 constructed that it may be maintained in a sanitary condition. The floors, walls, ceilings, posts, doors, and other structural 10 11 parts of the building or buildings must be of impervious 12 materials or protected with impervious materials. All windows, doors, and other openings must be screened or constructed to 13 prevent entry of rodents, insects, and other animals. 14 Management shall establish and maintain a routine insect and 15 rodent extermination program. 16

17 1719.2300 RENDERING CARCASSES.

18 Skinning and dismembering of carcasses must be done in 19 buildings properly constructed and provided for that purpose. 20 The cooking vats must be airtight except for proper escapes or 21 vents. All carcasses and discarded animal parts must be 22 disposed of by subjecting them to a recognized cooking and 23 rendering procedure.

1719.2400 FLUSHING OR SCRUBBING; DISPOSAL OF LIQUID WASTE. 24 The entire processing area and equipment of an establishment or 25 collecting station must be thoroughly flushed or scrubbed daily 26 with live steam or 185 degrees Fahrenheit potable water when the 27 plant is in operation. All floor washings and other liquid 28 waste or accumulation of water must be disposed of through 29 30 proper disposal facilities which conform to the rules of the 31 Department of Health, the Pollution Control Agency, and other governmental agencies. 32

33 1719.2500 OFFICIAL OR ALTERNATE VETERINARIAN.

34 The management of a pet or mink food plant shall employ or

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engage the services of an accredited licensed veterinarian to 1 inspect carcasses and supervise plant sanitation. 2 The veterinarian selected may designate, with plant manager 3 approval, an alternate veterinarian to perform this service in 4 the veterinarian's absence. Compensation for services rendered 5 by the veterinarians must be paid by the plant management. 6 The veterinarian and alternate, if any, must be named on the permit 7 application and be authorized by the board to act as official 8 veterinarian. 9

10 The official veterinarian shall report to the board any 11 failure on the part of plant management to carry out sanitary 12 procedures in this chapter.

13 1719.2600 INSPECTION BY VETERINARIAN.

14 Carcasses presented to the veterinarian for inspection must 15 have the lungs, heart, liver, and kidneys attached. Prior to 16 inspection, the carcasses must be held in a chill room at a 17 temperature of 40 to 45 degrees Fahrenheit to prevent 18 decomposition.

19 1719.2700 CONDEMNED CARCASSES.

20 Carcasses which show evidence of a dangerous communicable disease, decomposition, or any toxic material must be declared 21 22 unfit for processing into pet animal or mink food. The carcasses must be identified as condemned. Condemned carcasses 23 24 must be held in a room or area separate from the processing area and removed for rendering within a reasonable time. Condemned 25 carcasses or discarded animal parts must be transported in 26 permitted vehicles only. 27

28 1719.2800 CARCASSES AND DISCARDED ANIMAL PARTS PASSED FOR USE IN29 PET ANIMAL AND MINK FOOD.

30 Carcasses and discarded animal parts passed for use in pet 31 animal and mink food must be identified, cut up, 32 decharacterized, packaged, weighed, labeled, stored, and 33 transported according to Code of Federal Regulations, title 9, 34 chapter III, section 325.11.

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1 1719.2900 SANITATION.

2 Processing of animal car casses and discarded animal parts 3 into pet animal or mink food must be accomplished in a plant 4 maintained in a sanitary condition.

5 1719.3000 RECORDS.

Plants operating under a permit to process carcasses into б pet animal and mink food must keep the following records and 7 make them available at all reasonable times to an agent of the 8 board upon request: the name and address of the owner and the 9 date an animal carcass was picked up and received for inspection 10 and processing and an inventory of the weight and number of 11 cartons of inedible meat and carcass parts processed, stored, 12 and transported each day. 13

14 1719.3100 SANITATION GUIDELINES.

15 To decrease bacterial contamination of the plant and the 16 finished product, the operator of an establishment shall, to the 17 extent practicable:

18 A. divide the raw material room, processing room, and 19 finished product room into completely separate areas by solid 20 walls and ceilings;

B. control the work pattern of employees from one work area to another or supply equipment and space for scrubbing footwear, changing clothes, and washing hands between the work areas;

C. avoid the transfer of equipment, tools, mechanical loaders, or scrapers, particularly from the raw material or processing area to the storage and blending areas;

D. maintain a constant and active rodent, bird, and insect control program especially in areas where the finished product is stored;

31 E. exclude visitors or provide good security measures 32 such as disposable or washable footwear, and conduct tours from 33 finished product to raw material area;

34 F. avoid excess production, accumulation, and

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distribution of dust in the grinding area, including covering 1 conveyor belts and whirling machinery to keep air movement at a 2 minimum and removing dust that settles on beams, shelves, window 3 4 sills, and equipment;

G. reprocess all spillage through the cookers; 5 conduct a thorough daily cleanup of floors and 6 Η. equipment, avoiding the accumulation of pools of water and 7 keeping floor and equipment as dry as possible; 8

make adequate washing, showering, and dressing 9 I. facilities available to all employees; and 10

J. participate in available salmonella monitoring 11 programs. 12

1719.3200 PITS OR DEPOSITORIES. 13

Pits or depositories must be leakproof and built on an 14 impervious pad. Pollution control agency rules also apply to 15 pits or depositories. 16

1719.4000 COMPOSTING. 17

Β.

Subpart 1. Species allowed. Composting is allowed for 18 poultry, swine, sheep, and goats if parts 1719.0100 to 1719.4250 19 are followed. The board may authorize on an experimental or 20 permit basis other species to be composted or alternative 21 22 methods to be used.

[For text of subp 2, see M.R.] 23 24 Subp. 3. Compost facility. A composting facility must: be built on an impervious, weightbearing pad that 25 Α. is large enough to allow the equipment to maneuver; 26

be covered with a roof to prevent excessive 27 moisture on the composting material, but if sawdust or other 28 29 water-repelling material is used as the bulking agent, a roof may not be necessary; 30

be built of rot-resistant material that is strong 31 c. enough to withstand the force exerted by the equipment; and 32 be large enough to handle each day's normal 33 D. mortality through the endpoint of the composting and that 34 consists of a minimum of two heat cycles. 35

22 1719.4250 PENALTIES.

23 Construction or operation of an establishment, fur farm, 24 truck, or compost facility in violation of this chapter results 25 in penalties pertaining to improper disposal of dead animals as 26 well as possible charges for violations of the rules by other 27 state or local agencies.

The penalties assessed to the party or parties responsible for a violation that are civil penalties under Minnesota Statutes, section 35.95, or criminal penalties under Minnesota Statutes, section 35.96, must be enforced through an action by the county attorney, the attorney general, or the board as the situation dictates.
