6 6210.0100 GENERAL PROVISIONS FOR USE OF WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT

7 AREAS.

8 [For text of subsps 1 to 16, see M.R.]

9 Subp. 17. Commercial and private business prohibited. A
10 person may not conduct any commercial operation, solicit
11 business, farm, or keep bees within a wildlife management area,
12 except as provided in subpart 6 or by contract, lease, permit,
13 or written agreement with the department.

15 6230.0400 SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR STATE GAME REFUGES.

16 [For text of subpart 1, see M.R.]

17 Subp. 2. Bemidji Game Refuge, Beltrami county. The
18 Bemidji Game Refuge in Beltrami county is open to:

19 A. small game hunting, except waterfowl, through
20 October 31;

21 B. trapping for beaver, mink, and muskrat only; and

22 C. deer and bear hunting by archery through the first
23 Sunday in December.

25 Subp. 4. Claremont Game Refuge, Dodge county. The
26 Claremont Game Refuge in Dodge county is open to:

27 A. small game hunting, except ducks and mergansers;

28 B. trapping; and

29 C. deer and bear hunting by archery.

30 [For text of subsps 5 to 20, see M.R.]

31 Subp. 21. Lac qui Parle Game Refuge, Chippewa and Lac qui
32 Parle counties. The following special provisions apply to the
33 Lac qui Parle Game Refuge, Chippewa, and Lac qui Parle counties:

34 A. Those portions within the Lac qui Parle State
35 Recreational Area, Mission Site, or that are posted to prohibit

1 trespass are closed to hunting. The remainder of the refuge is
2 open to:

3 (1) waterfowl hunting during the open goose
4 season in the Lac qui Parle zone, only at designated hunting
5 stations as provided by parts 6230.0500 and 6230.1100;

6 (2) deer hunting; and

7 (3) small game hunting, except during the goose
8 season in the Lac qui Parle Goose Zone where small game hunting
9 is allowed only at designated hunting stations as provided by
10 parts 6230.0500 to 6230.1100.

11 B. From September 20 to December 1, a person may not
12 trespass on any part of the refuge which is posted with signs
13 prohibiting trespass during this period, except that fishing is
14 permitted in the posted closed area within the Lac qui Parle
15 Goose Zone until the day before the opening day of the goose
16 season and beginning again the day after the goose season closes.

17 C. A person may not trespass on Rosemoen Island at
18 any time during the year.

20 Subp. 35. Paul Bunyan Game Refuge, Hubbard county. The
21 Paul Bunyan Game Refuge in Hubbard county is open to:

23 D. deer and bear hunting by archery.

25 Subp. 37. Pine County Game Refuge Unit 2, Pine county.

26 The Pine County Game Refuge Unit 2 in Pine county is open to:

27 A. small game hunting;

28 B. trapping; and

29 C. deer and bear hunting by archery.

30 [For text of subps 38 to 47, see M.R.]

31 Subp. 48. Talcot Lake Waterfowl Refuge, Cottonwood county.

32 A. Waterfowl hunting, in an area adjacent to the
33 Talcot Lake Waterfowl Refuge in Cottonwood county, is prohibited
34 within the right-of-way of State Trunk Highway 62 from the
35 Cottonwood-Murray county line on the west to the junction with
36 County State Aid Highway 7, Cottonwood county, on the east.

1 B. The Talcot Lake State Waterfowl Refuge is open to
2 goose hunting by persons with disabilities at designated hunting
3 stations. Hunters with disabilities may reserve designated
4 stations according to regulations available at the Talcot Lake
5 Wildlife Management Area Headquarters. All other applicable
6 controlled hunt regulations in parts 6230.0500 and 6230.1100
7 apply to persons hunting at these stations.

9 Subp. 51. **Bellwood Game Refuge, Dakota county.** The
10 Bellwood Game Refuge in Dakota county is open to:

11 A. trapping; and

12 B. deer and bear hunting by archery.

13 Subp. 52. **Anoka and Isanti Counties Game Refuge, Anoka and**
14 **Isanti counties.** The Anoka and Isanti Counties Game Refuge in
15 Anoka and Isanti counties is open to firearms deer hunting by
16 permit.

17 6230.1400 HUNTING RESTRICTIONS FOR RICHARD J. DORER MEMORIAL
18 HARDWOOD STATE FOREST.

19 A person may not hunt with firearms in those portions of
20 the Brightsdale Management Unit of the Richard J. Dorer Memorial
21 Hardwood State Forest surrounding the forest resource center in
22 Fillmore county that are posted closed to firearms hunting.

23 6232.0100 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS FOR TAKING BIG GAME.

27 6232.0300 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS FOR TAKING DEER.

28 Subpart 1. **Zone and date options.** A firearm deer hunter
29 may purchase a firearm license valid for the regular firearms
30 deer season or muzzleloader season, a license to take antlered
31 deer in more than one zone, or a resident youth license. A
32 hunter purchasing a resident youth license or a regular firearm
33 license, including a hunter choosing a muzzleloader option, must
34 select only one of the zone and date options listed on the

1 license. For the regular firearm season, this choice will be
2 indicated by a punched hole at the time of purchase. A person
3 may only hunt deer by firearms within the zone and date options
4 indicated on the person's regular firearm license.

6 6232.0400 REGISTRATION OF DEER.

7 Subpart 1. [See repealer.]

8 Subp. 2. **Registration requirements.** Persons taking a deer
9 must present the deer for registration at a designated deer
10 registration station or agent of the commissioner and obtain a
11 big game possession tag:

12 A. before the deer is processed either privately or
13 commercially; and

14 B. within 24 hours after the close of the season in
15 which the deer was taken.

16 All deer taken in special hunt areas must be registered as
17 specified in the materials provided to all special hunt
18 permittees.

19 Subp. 3. [See repealer.]

20 Subp. 4. **General provisions for registration of deer.** The
21 deer license number and the year for which the possession tag is
22 issued must be recorded in the appropriate place on the
23 possession tag in indelible ink. If a mistake is made in
24 writing the license number, the agent must reissue a correct
25 possession tag. Registration agents are not required to inspect
26 deer at registration stations. Legally registered deer may be
27 transported anytime during or after the deer hunting season. No
28 part of the carcass, except skin or entrails, may be removed
29 until after the possession tag has been affixed. The possession
30 tag must be affixed securely as described for the tag as
31 provided by part 6232.0300, subpart 5. A person may not process
32 a deer unless it has been registered as evidenced by an attached
33 possession tag.

34 6232.0600 SEASONS AND ZONES FOR TAKING DEER BY ARCHERY.

35 Subpart 1. **Open dates.** Except as provided in subpart 2,

1 the open dates for taking deer by archery are from the Saturday
2 nearest September 16 through December 31.

3 Subp. 2. **Northeast Border Zone.** The following provisions
4 apply to the taking of deer by archery in the Northeast Border
5 Zone:

6 A. The open area consists of: Deer Registration
7 Blocks 115, 116, 117, 118, 127, 130, and 194.

8 B. Open dates are from the Saturday nearest September
9 16 through the last day of the regular Zone 1 firearms deer
10 season.

11 Subp. 3. [See repealer.]

12 6232.1100 SPECIAL RESTRICTIONS FOR CAMP RIPLEY ARCHERY HUNT.

13 Subpart 1. **Access to Camp Ripley.** This subpart applies to
14 access into Camp Ripley during the archery hunt.

15 [For text of items A to C, see M.R.]

16 D. Permittees will be allowed beyond the department
17 checkpoint only from one hour before sunrise to 1-1/2 hours
18 after sunset on each day open for hunting, or as otherwise
19 authorized by the commissioner.

20 [For text of items E and F, see M.R.]

21 G. All-terrain vehicles are not permitted in Camp
22 Ripley during the Camp Ripley archery hunt, except as authorized
23 by permit for hunters with disabilities. All vehicles are
24 restricted to operating only on designated roads, except as
25 authorized by permit.

26 H. Vehicles in line at the checkpoint must be
27 occupied. Permittees must stay with their vehicles.

29 6232.1500 ARMS USE AREAS AND RESTRICTIONS.

30 Subpart 1. **Shotgun use area.** During the firearms season
31 in the shotgun use area, only legal shotguns loaded with
32 single-slug shotgun shells, legal muzzleloading long guns, and
33 legal handguns may be used for taking deer. Legal shotguns
34 include those with rifled barrels.

35 The shotgun use area is that portion of the state lying

1 within the following described boundary:

2 Beginning on the north boundary of the state at U.S.
3 Highway 75; thence along U.S. Highway 75 to U.S. Highway 2;
4 thence along U.S. Highway 2 to State Trunk Highway (STH) 9;
5 thence along STH 9 to STH 102; thence along STH 102 to STH
6 32; thence along STH 32 to STH 34; thence along STH 34 to
7 Interstate Highway 94 (I-94); thence along I-94 to County
8 State Aid Highway (CSAH) 40, Douglas County; thence along
9 CSAH 40 to CSAH 82, Douglas County; thence along CSAH 82 to
10 CSAH 22, Douglas County; thence along CSAH 22 to CSAH 6,
11 Douglas County; thence along CSAH 6 to CSAH 14, Douglas
12 County; thence along CSAH 14 to STH 29; thence along STH 29
13 to CSAH 46, Otter Tail County; thence along CSAH 46, Otter
14 Tail County, to CSAH 22, Todd County; thence along CSAH 22
15 to U.S. Highway 71; thence along U.S. Highway 71 to STH 27;
16 thence along STH 27 to the Mississippi River; thence along
17 the east bank of the Mississippi River to STH 23; thence
18 along STH 23 to STH 95; thence along STH 95 to U.S. Highway
19 8; thence along U.S. Highway 8 to the eastern boundary of
20 the state; thence along the east, south, west, and north
21 boundaries of the state to the point of beginning.

23 6232.2200 ARMS USE AREAS AND RESTRICTIONS FOR MUZZLELOADERS.

24 Only legal muzzleloaders with metallic open or peep type
25 sights may be used for taking deer during the muzzleloader
26 season.

27 6232.3000 BEAR QUOTA AREAS.

28 Subpart 1. Quota area licenses. Licenses for bear quota
29 areas are limited in number and are issued through a drawing as
30 provided in part 6232.2900. Quota area licenses are valid only
31 in the quota area specified on the license.

32 Subp. 1a. Bear Quota Area 12. Bear Quota Area 12 consists
33 of that portion of the state lying within the following
34 described boundary:

35 Beginning at the intersection of State Trunk Highway (STH)
36 72 and the northern boundary of the state; thence along STH
37 72 to the Tamarac River; thence along the southerly shore
38 of said river to Upper Red Lake; thence along the
39 southeasterly shore of said lake to the eastern boundary of
40 the Red Lake Indian Reservation; thence along the easterly,
41 southerly, and westerly boundaries of said Reservation to
42 the point where the Clearwater River leaves the Reservation
43 boundary; thence along the south shore of said river to
44 County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 2, Polk County; thence
45 along CSAH 2 to CSAH 27, Pennington County; thence along
46 CSAH 27 to STH 1; thence along STH 1 to CSAH 28, Pennington
47 County; thence along CSAH 28 to CSAH 54, Marshall County;
48 thence along CSAH 54 to CSAH 6, Marshall County; thence
49 along CSAH 6 to STH 89; thence along STH 89 to County Road
50 (CR) 134, Marshall County; thence along CR 134 to STH 54;
51 thence along STH 54 to CSAH 9, Roseau County; thence along
52 CSAH 9 to CSAH 2, Roseau County; thence along CSAH 2 to STH
53 89; thence along STH 89 to STH 310; thence along STH 310 to
54 the Roseau River; thence along the south shore of said

1 river to STH 89; thence along STH 89 to the northern
2 boundary of the state; thence along the northern boundary
3 of the state to the point of beginning.

5 6232.3100 BEAR NO-QUOTA AREA.

6 Licenses for the no-quota area are not limited in number
7 and may be purchased from a county auditor's office, county
8 auditor's subagents in Pine, Kanabec, Roseau, and Marshall
9 counties, or the license bureau. A person may not purchase a
10 license for both a quota area and the no-quota area in the same
11 year. No-quota licenses are valid only in the no-quota area.

12 6232.3200 BAIT STATIONS AND GARBAGE DUMPS.

14 Subp. 6. **Bear bait stations near previously baited areas.**

15 A person may not establish a bear bait station within 100 yards
16 of a site where bait has been placed prior to the Friday nearest
17 August 14.

19 6232.3700 GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR TAKING MOOSE.

20 [For text of subps 1 and 2, see M.R.]

21 Subp. 3. **Blaze orange requirement.** The visible portion of
22 the hunter's cap, if worn, and outer garments, above the waist
23 excluding sleeves and gloves, must be blaze orange or be covered
24 by blaze orange. Blaze orange includes a camouflage pattern of
25 at least 50 percent blaze orange within each square foot.

26 Persons whose sincerely held religious beliefs do not permit
27 them to wear blaze orange may wear bright red as an alternative
28 color in the same manner as blaze orange.

30 Subp. 6. **Orientation required.** Persons licensed to take
31 moose must attend an orientation session and have their licenses
32 validated prior to hunting. Members of a party need not attend
33 the same orientation session.

35 6232.4100 MOOSE ZONES.

1 [For text of subps 1 to 23, see M.R.]

2 Subp. 24. **Moose Zone 25.** Moose Zone 25 consists of that
3 portion of the state lying within the following described
4 boundary:

5 Beginning at the intersection of County State Aid Highway
6 (CSAH) 2, Cook County, and Forest Road (FR) 166; thence
7 along FR 166 to CSAH 7, Lake County; thence along CSAH 7 to
8 FR 354; thence along FR 354 to the south shore of Kawishiwi
9 Lake; thence in a northeasterly direction along the shore
10 of Kawishiwi Lake to the eastern-most point on Kawishiwi
11 Lake; thence overland in a northeasterly direction to a
12 small bay on the southwestern shore of Watonwan Lake in the
13 Northeast Quarter of the Northeast quarter of Section 21,
14 Township 62 North, Range 6 West; thence in a southeasterly
15 direction along the southwest shore of said lake to its
16 southeastern-most point; thence overland in a northeasterly
17 direction to Cat Eyes Lake; thence in an easterly direction
18 through Cat Eyes Lake to the stream at the eastern-most
19 point on the lake; thence in an easterly direction along
20 said stream to Phoebe Lake; thence along the west and north
21 shore of Phoebe Lake to the unnamed flowage which enters
22 Phoebe Lake from Grace Lake; thence upstream in an easterly
23 direction along the unnamed flowage to Grace Lake; thence
24 along the southwest shore of Grace Lake to the portage
25 connecting Grace and Beth Lakes; thence in an easterly
26 direction along said portage to Beth Lake; thence in an
27 easterly direction through the center of Beth Lake to the
28 east shore and the portage connecting Beth and Alton Lakes;
29 thence in an easterly direction along said portage to Alton
30 Lake; thence in an easterly and northerly direction along
31 the south and east shores of Alton Lake to the portage
32 connecting Alton and Sawbill Lakes; thence in an easterly
33 direction along said portage to Sawbill Lake; thence in a
34 southerly direction along the west shore of Sawbill Lake to
35 the Sawbill Campground and CSAH 2, Cook County; thence
36 along CSAH 2 to the point of beginning.

37 [For text of subps 25 to 30, see M.R.]

38 Subp. 31. **Moose Zone 61.** Moose Zone 61 consists of that
39 portion of the state lying within the following described
40 boundary:

41 Beginning at the western-most point on Round Lake in
42 Section 33, Township 65 North, Range 4 West, Cook County,
43 and the portage trail to West Round Lake; thence in a
44 westerly direction along said portage trail to West Round
45 Lake; thence in a northwesterly direction through West
46 Round Lake to the portage trail to Edith Lake; thence in a
47 westerly direction along said portage trail to Edith Lake;
48 thence in a westerly direction through Edith Lake to the
49 portage trail to Brant Lake; thence in a westerly direction
50 along said portage trail to Brant Lake; thence in a
51 northwesterly direction through Brant Lake to the portage
52 trail to Gotter Lake; thence in a westerly direction
53 through Gotter Lake to the portage trail to Flying Lake;
54 thence along said portage trail to Flying Lake; thence in a
55 northwesterly direction through Flying Lake to the portage
56 trail to Green Lake; thence in a southeasterly direction
57 along said portage trail to Green Lake; thence in a
58 westerly direction through Green Lake to the portage trail
59 to Bat Lake; thence along said portage trail to Bat Lake;
60 thence in a southwesterly direction through Bat Lake to the
61 portage trail to Gillis Lake; thence in a southerly
62 direction across said portage to Gillis Lake; thence along

1 the northern, eastern and southern shores of Gillis Lake to
 2 the stream to Crooked Lake; thence in a southeasterly
 3 direction along said stream to Crooked Lake; thence along
 4 the eastern shore of Crooked Lake to the stream to Tarry
 5 Lake; thence in a southerly direction along said stream to
 6 Tarry Lake; thence along the northern, eastern and southern
 7 shores of Tarry Lake to the stream to Mora Lake; thence in
 8 a southerly direction along said stream to Mora Lake;
 9 thence along the eastern and southern shores of Mora Lake
 10 to the stream to Time Lake; thence in a southeasterly
 11 direction along all streams and through Time, Whipped,
 12 Fente, and Afton Lakes to Frost River; thence in an
 13 easterly direction along Frost River, through Pencil,
 14 Chase, and Octopus Lakes to the eastern end of Octopus
 15 Lake; thence in a southeasterly direction along an unnamed
 16 flowage to Noodle Lake; thence in a southwesterly direction
 17 along an unnamed flowage to Wing Lake; thence in a
 18 southeasterly direction through Wing Lake to its
 19 easternmost tip; thence overland and across Guard Lake for
 20 approximately 1,800 feet total in an easterly direction to
 21 Ranger Lake; thence in a southeasterly direction through
 22 Ranger Lake to its outlet to Cherokee Lake, thence in an
 23 easterly direction along said outlet to Cherokee Lake;
 24 thence in a northeasterly direction through Cherokee Lake
 25 and along all streams through Town and Cash Lakes to the
 26 southeast corner of Cash Lake; thence in an easterly
 27 direction along an unnamed flowage to the center of the
 28 South Half of Section 32 of T. 64N, R. 3W; thence overland
 29 for approximately 0.6 miles in an easterly direction to the
 30 unnamed lake in the Southwest Quarter of Section 33, T.
 31 64N, R. 3W; thence in an easterly direction through said
 32 unnamed lake and along its outlet stream to Davis Lake;
 33 thence in an easterly direction and along all streams and
 34 portages through Davis, Pup, Winchell, Gaskin, and Icicle
 35 Lakes to the east end of Icicle Lake; thence overland
 36 approximately 0.1 mile in an easterly direction to Snack
 37 Lake; thence in an easterly direction through Snack Lake
 38 and its outlet stream to Vista Lake; thence in a northerly
 39 direction along all streams and portages between Vista,
 40 Horseshoe, Caribou, and Lizz Lakes to Poplar Lake; thence
 41 in a westerly direction along the southern and western
 42 shores of Poplar Lake to the stream to Skipper Lake; thence
 43 in a westerly direction along said stream and other streams
 44 or swamps through Skipper, Little Rush, Rush, Banadad,
 45 Sebeka, Ross, George, Lower George, Rib, Cross Bay, and
 46 Snipe Lakes to the northwest corner of Snipe Lake; thence
 47 overland approximately 0.4 miles in a northwesterly
 48 direction to the northeast corner of Missing Link Lake;
 49 thence in a westerly direction along the northern shore of
 50 Missing Link Lake to the portage to Round Lake; thence in a
 51 northeasterly direction along said portage to Round Lake;
 52 thence in a northwesterly direction along the southwest
 53 shore of Round Lake to the point of beginning.

54 Subp. 32. **Moose Zone 62.** Moose Zone 62 consists of that
 55 portion of the state lying within the following described
 56 boundary:

57 Beginning at the Sawbill Campground at the southern end of
 58 Sawbill Lake; thence in a westerly direction across Sawbill
 59 Lake to the portage connecting Sawbill and Alton Lakes;
 60 thence in a westerly direction along said portage to Alton
 61 Lake; thence in a southwesterly direction through Alton
 62 Lake to the portage to Beth Lake; thence along all portage
 63 trails and through Beth and Grace Lakes to Phoebe Lake;
 64 thence along the east and south shores of Phoebe Lake to an
 65 unnamed flowage in Section 13 of Township 62 North, Range 6
 66 West entering Phoebe Lake from the south; thence in
 67 southerly and westerly directions along said flowage to Cat

1 Eyes Lake; thence in a westerly direction through Cat Eyes
2 Lake to its western-most point; thence overland in a
3 southwesterly direction to the southeastern end of Watonwan
4 Lake; thence in a northwesterly direction along the
5 southwestern shore of Watonwan Lake to a bay in the
6 Northeast Quarter of the Northeast Quarter of Section 21 of
7 Township 62 North, Range 6 West; thence overland in a
8 southwesterly direction to the eastern-most point on
9 Kawishiwi Lake; thence in a southwesterly direction along
10 the shore of Kawishiwi Lake to the public access at the
11 south end of Kawishiwi Lake; thence in a northwesterly
12 direction through the center of Kawishiwi Lake to its
13 outlet, the Kawishiwi River; thence in a northerly
14 direction along the Kawishiwi River through Square and
15 Kawasachong Lakes to Lake Polly; thence in a northwesterly
16 direction through Lake Polly to the Kawishiwi River; thence
17 in a northerly direction along the Kawishiwi River, through
18 Koma Lake, to Malberg Lake; thence in a northwesterly
19 direction through Malberg Lake to the portage trail in the
20 northwest corner of Malberg Lake leading to Kawishiwi
21 River; thence in a northwesterly direction along said
22 portage to Kawishiwi River; thence in a northeasterly
23 direction along Kawishiwi River through Kivaniva,
24 Kivandeba, and John Ek Lakes to the south end of John Ek
25 Lake; thence overland for approximately 100 feet in an
26 easterly direction to an unnamed flowage; thence in an
27 easterly direction along said unnamed flowage across the
28 South Half of the North Half of Section 31 of Township 64
29 North, Range 5 West (T. 64N, R. 5W) to an unnamed lake in
30 the Northeast Quarter of the Northeast Quarter of said
31 Section 31, T. 64N, R. 5W; thence overland for
32 approximately 600 feet in a southeasterly direction to an
33 unnamed pond in the Southwest Quarter of the Northwest
34 Quarter of Section 32, T. 64N, R. 5W; thence overland for
35 approximately 0.3 miles in an easterly direction to an
36 unnamed flowage leading to Teat Lake; thence in an easterly
37 direction along said unnamed flowage through Teat and
38 Lawless Lakes to the eastern end of Lawless Lake; thence
39 overland and all waters for approximately 0.8 miles in a
40 southeasterly direction to Mesaba Lake; thence in a
41 northeasterly direction through Mesaba Lake to an unnamed
42 stream to Hub Lake; thence in a northerly direction along
43 said unnamed stream to Hub Lake; thence along the east and
44 south shores of Hub Lake to the stream leading to Chuck
45 Lake; thence in an easterly direction along said stream,
46 through Chuck and Florence Lakes to the northeast tip of
47 Florence Lake; thence overland for approximately 100 feet
48 in a northeasterly direction to Caper Lake; thence in a
49 northerly direction through Caper Lake and along the
50 unnamed flowage to the north to Frost River; thence in an
51 easterly direction along Frost River, through Pencil, Chase
52 and Octopus Lakes to the eastern end of Octopus Lake;
53 thence in a southeasterly direction along an unnamed
54 flowage to Noodle Lake; thence in a southwesterly direction
55 along an unnamed flowage to Wing Lake; thence in a
56 southeasterly direction through Wing Lake to its

39 6258.0300 COMMERCIAL PERMITS FOR MUSSELS.

40 Subpart 1. Commercial permit required. A person may not
 41 take, possess, buy, sell, or transport more than 24 live whole
 42 or 48 shell halves of freshwater mussels, or assist another
 43 person in such taking, without first obtaining a commercial
 44 mussel permit from the commissioner.

45 Subp. 2. Commercial permit issuance. Commercial mussel
 46 permits may be issued subject to the criteria in items A to C.

48 Subp. 3. Commercial permit duration. A commercial mussel

28 shore. No untagged lake trout may be possessed, bought, or sold
29 by licensed commercial operators. Lake trout of lawful size

33 out the gill. Untagged incidentally taken lake trout may not be
34 possessed, bought, or sold by licensed commercial operators.

1 All incidentally taken live lake trout and all untagged dead
2 lake trout must be returned to the water immediately.

4 Subp. 3. Use of pound or trap nets. Hoops and center
5 leads of pound or trap nets used on Lake Superior may be of any
6 length and diameter. The webbing for pound or trap nets,
7 including leads, may not exceed 2-1/2 inch stretch measure, or
8 be of twine size less than ~~±8~~ 9 gauge or ~~±50~~ 70 pound strength.
9 Pound or trap nets may not be set within one-quarter mile of the
10 mouth of any stream unless approved by the commissioner. Pound
11 or trap nets may not be set in harbors from May 25 through March
12 31, except for St. Louis Bay, unless approved by the
13 commissioner. Commercial operators must notify the Lake
14 Superior Fisheries Office within 48 hours if they are unable to
15 lift and empty pound or trap nets at least once every 48 hours.
16 All net stakes, lines, and anchors must be removed from the lake
17 bed within ten days of removing pound and trap nets. Commercial
18 operators must notify the Lake Superior Fisheries Office prior
19 to setting pound or trap nets and at the beginning of each week
20 that pound or trap nets are used. The commissioner may deny the
21 use of pound or trap nets during periods when such use would
22 conflict with fisheries management activities. Pound or trap
23 nets must be marked with a tag which is at least 2-1/2 inches by
24 five-eighths inch permanently bearing the owner's name and
25 address and attached to the top rope of the back side of the
26 pound or crib. Trap nets set with anchors must have attached to
27 the end farthest from shore one fluorescent orange or
28 fluorescent red marker buoy constructed so that a minimum of 18
29 inches of buoy surface is visible above water in the absence of
30 current or under the weight of nets and line. The number of the
31 owner's Lake Superior commercial fishing license must be plainly
32 marked, in black, on the marker buoy. The marker buoy must be
33 marked with a fluorescent orange or fluorescent red flag, at
34 least one foot square, attached to the top of a flag staff at
35 least five feet long, and the buoy constructed so that the flag
36 staff is supported in a vertical position. All buoys and floats

1 used in pound or trap net sets must be constructed of styrofoam,
2 plastic, rubber, or other materials nonhazardous to navigation.

4 Subp. 6. Net locations. Gill nets may not be set within
5 one-quarter mile of the shore in the area extending from the
6 Superior entrance to Pigeon River, except under permit issued by
7 the commissioner. Gill nets set on the bottom may not be in
8 water shallower than 50 fathoms if closer than one mile from the
9 Minnesota shore and 40 fathoms if farther than one mile from the
10 Minnesota shore except under permit.

11 Subp. 7. Required reporting. Commercial fishing operators
12 must submit a record of their commercial fishing operations for
13 each month of the calendar year. These reports must be
14 submitted within ten days after the end of the month for which
15 the report is made. Reports must be made regardless of whether
16 fish are taken and regardless of whether any fishing operations
17 have taken place. Separate records must be kept for each pound
18 or trap net used in Lake Superior and St. Louis Bay. Reports
19 for pound or trap nets must include the number of game fish kept
20 and released, and must be submitted to the Lake Superior Office
21 by the tenth day of each month for the preceding month, whether
22 or not pound or trap nets were fished.
