39 6258.0300 COMMERCIAL PERMITS FOR MUSSELS.

40 Subpart 1. Commercial permit required. A person may not 41 take, possess, buy, sell, or transport more than 24 live whole 42 or 48 shell halves of freshwater mussels, or assist another 43 person in such taking, without first obtaining a commercial 44 mussel permit from the commissioner.

Subp. 2. Commercial permit issuance. Commercial mussel
permits may be issued subject to the criteria in items A to C.
[For text of items A to C, see M.R.]

Subp. 3. Commercial permit duration. A commercial mussel
permit may be issued annually and may be issued for periods
shorter than one season, at the discretion of the commissioner.
Subp. 4. Commercial permit termination to protect

52 resource. The commissioner may terminate a commercial mussel 53 permit upon 48 hours' written notice to protect aquatic 54 resources.

6258.0400 SPECIES FOR COMMERCIAL HARVEST. 1

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Only three ridge (Amblema plicata) mussels may be harvested 2 under a commercial mussel permit. Additional species may be 3 requested for harvest from specific sites by special permit. 4 Three ridge mussels may lawfully be harvested, as live whole 5 mussels or shell halves, provided that they cannot pass through 6 a 2-3/4 inch diameter hole. 7

6258.0500 HARVEST SITES FOR PERMITTEES. 8

9 [For text of subpart 1, see M.R.] Harvesting restricted outside of permitted site. Subp. 2. 10 The taking of mussels by a permittee from a place outside the 11 permitted harvest site is prohibited. 12

6260.1800 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON LAKE SUPERIOR. 13

Subpart 1. Species, seasons, and limits. The species of 14 fish in this subpart may be taken in Lake Superior by licensed 15 commercial operators according to this subpart. 16

A. Chubs, alewives, whitefish, menominee whitefish, 17 smelt, and rough fish may be taken at any time. Ciscoes may be 18 taken from December 1 through October 31, except that ciscoes 19 may be taken from November 1 through November 30 under a special 20 permit approved by the commissioner. 21

C. Lake trout may not be taken by commercial fishing 23 except by permit. Lake trout legally taken under permit must be 24 sealed with a tag, provided by the commissioner, affixed through 25 the mouth and out the gill. The tag must be affixed immediately 26 upon removal from the water and before the boat is brought to 27 shore. No untagged lake trout may be possessed, bought, or sold 28 by licensed commercial operators. Lake trout of lawful size 29 incidentally taken to commercial operations and dead when 30 removed from the water may be possessed only if sealed with a 31 tag, provided by the commissioner, affixed through the mouth and 32 out the gill. Untagged incidentally taken lake trout may not be 33 possessed, bought, or sold by licensed commercial operators. 34

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All incidentally taken live lake trout and all untagged dead 1 lake trout must be returned to the water immediately. 2 [For text of subp 2, see M.R.] 3 Subp. 3. Use of pound or trap nets. Hoops and center 4 leads of pound or trap nets used on Lake Superior may be of any 5 6 length and diameter. The webbing for pound or trap nets, including leads, may not exceed 2-1/2 inch stretch measure, or 7 be of twine size less than $\frac{1}{2}\theta$ gauge or $\frac{1}{2}5\theta$ 70 pound strength. 8 Pound or trap nets may not be set within one-quarter mile of the 9 mouth of any stream unless approved by the commissioner. 10 Pound or trap nets may not be set in harbors from May 25 through March 11 31, except for St. Louis Bay, unless approved by the 12 commissioner. Commercial operators must notify the Lake 13 14 Superior Fisheries Office within 48 hours if they are unable to lift and empty pound or trap nets at least once every 48 hours. 15 All net stakes, lines, and anchors must be removed from the lake 16 bed within ten days of removing pound and trap nets. Commercial 17 operators must notify the Lake Superior Fisheries Office prior 18 19 to setting pound or trap nets and at the beginning of each week 20 that pound or trap nets are used. The commissioner may deny the use of pound or trap nets during periods when such use would 21 22 conflict with fisheries management activities. Pound or trap nets must be marked with a tag which is at least 2-1/2 inches by 23 24 five-eighths inch permanently bearing the owner's name and address and attached to the top rope of the back side of the 25 26 pound or crib. Trap nets set with anchors must have attached to the end farthest from shore one fluorescent orange or 27 fluorescent red marker buoy constructed so that a minimum of 18 28 29 inches of buoy surface is visible above water in the absence of current or under the weight of nets and line. The number of the 30 owner's Lake Superior commercial fishing license must be plainly 31 marked, in black, on the marker buoy. The marker buoy must be 32 marked with a fluorescent orange or fluorescent red flag, at 33 34 least one foot square, attached to the top of a flag staff at least five feet long, and the buoy constructed so that the flag 35 staff is supported in a vertical position. All buoys and floats 36

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used in pound or trap net sets must be constructed of styrofoam, 1 plastic, rubber, or other materials nonhazardous to navigation. 2

3 [For text of subps 4 and 5, see M.R.] Net locations. Gill nets may not be set within Subp. 6. 4 one-quarter mile of the shore in the area extending from the 5 Superior entrance to Pigeon River, except under permit issued by 6 the commissioner. Gill nets set on the bottom may not be in 7 water shallower than 50 fathoms if closer than one mile from the 8 Minnesota shore and 40 fathoms if farther than one mile from the 9 Minnesota shore except under permit. 10

Subp. 7. Required reporting. Commercial fishing operators 11 must submit a record of their commercial fishing operations for 12 each month of the calendar year. These reports must be 13 submitted within ten days after the end of the month for which 14 the report is made. Reports must be made regardless of whether 15 fish are taken and regardless of whether any fishing operations 16 have taken place. Separate records must be kept for each pound 17 or trap net used in Lake Superior and St. Louis Bay. Reports 18 for pound or trap nets must include the number of game fish kept 19 and released, and must be submitted to the Lake Superior Office 20 by the tenth day of each month for the preceding month, whether 21 or not pound or trap nets were fished. 22

6260.2000 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON INLAND WATERS. 23
