- 7 7505.3100 LOSS OF SUPPORT.
- 8 [For text of subps 1 to 3, see M.R.]
- 9 Subp. 4. Three-year review. The board shall review a
- 10 claim for loss of support every three years to determine whether
- 11 the claimant is still eligible for benefits. The board shall
- 12 evaluate the claim giving consideration to the claimant's
- 13 financial need and to the availability of funds to the board.
- 14 If the claimant's gross annual income reported on the claimant's
- 15 tax return for the prior year is more than 185 percent of the
- 16 federal poverty level for that year, the claimant is not
- 17 considered to have a continuing financial need and benefits must
- 18 be discontinued. After benefits are discontinued, they cannot
- 19 be resumed at a later time.
- 20 7505.3200 LOSS OF INCOME.
- 21 [For text of subpart 1, see M.R.]
- 22 Subp. 2. Computation of lost income: victim self-employed
- 23 or unemployed. If the victim was self-employed or unemployed at
- 24 the time of the crime for which the claim has been filed, loss
- 25 of income must be calculated at a rate which is based upon the
- 26 victim's average net income in the 12 months before the crime
- 27 for which the claim was filed as evidenced by tax returns, W-2
- 28 forms, check stubs, or other government agency records.
- The board shall deny an award for lost wages when it is
- 30 determined the victim failed to report those wages upon which
- 31 the loss is based to state or federal revenue departments as
- 32 required by law. No compensation may be provided for unreported
- 33 wages.
- No anticipated work may be considered for compensation,
- 35 unless the victim had been hired by an employer and was unable

- 1 to begin employment as a result of the crime-related injuries.
- 2 [For text of subps 2a to 4, see M.R.]
- 3 Subp. 5. Maximum number of weeks. Compensation for loss
- 4 of income usually may not exceed 26 weeks. If the victim's
- 5 disability continues past 26 weeks, the victim may request an
- 6 extension for up to 13 additional weeks. This request must
- 7 include an evaluation by a physician that states continuing
- 8 disability and explains any extenuating circumstances.
- 9 Subp. 6. Maximum number of hours. The board may not
- 10 compensate for hours missed in excess of 40 hours per week.
- 11 Subp. 7. Parent and spouse of deceased. Payment of wage
- 12 loss compensation for a parent or spouse of a victim who died as
- 13 the direct result of a crime usually may not exceed six weeks.
- 14 If the emotional disability of the parent or spouse continues
- 15 past six weeks, the parent or spouse may make a request for an
- 16 extension of the lost wages. The request must include an
- 17 evaluation by a physician or psychologist stating that there is
- 18 a continuing emotional disability due to the crime and a date by
- 19 which the claimant is expected to return to work. The extension
- 20 may not exceed 20 weeks.
- 21 Subp. 8. Students. The board must not reimburse a
- 22 claimant for loss of tuition, scholarship, or student loan funds
- 23 or loss of income due to a delay in completion of schooling
- 24 related to the crime.
- 25 7505.3500 PARENTS OF CHILD VICTIMS.
- 26 The board shall authorize payment for up to five counseling
- 27 sessions for a parent who is a primary caretaker of a victim of
- 28 domestic child abuse or child sexual assault, if the treatment
- 29 plan filed under and complying with part 7505.2700 indicates
- 30 that the sessions directly benefit the victim.
- 31 When care is needed by a victim and when a determination is
- 32 made by the board that a parent or any other guardian of the
- 33 victim is an appropriate person to provide care to the victim,
- 34 the board shall authorize payment to reimburse the parent for
- 35 lost wages. Total payment to a parent under this provision must

- 1 not exceed \$2,000. Computation of lost wages shall be the same
- 2 as under part 7505.3200.

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- 4 EFFECTIVE DATE. Minnesota Rules, parts 7505.0100, subpart 2a;
