2 Adopted Permanent Rules Relating to Wildlife

3 6200.0200 GAME AND FISH GENERAL PROVISIONS.

4 [For text of subps 1 to 5, see M.R.]

5 Subp. 6. **Incomplete or improperly completed applications;**  
6 **correction of agent errors.**

7 A. Incomplete or improperly completed applications  
8 for licenses or permits may be rejected by the commissioner.

9 B. To correct for an error made by the department or  
10 a department agent in processing an application, the  
11 commissioner may:

12 (1) increase the quota of licenses or permits for  
13 a drawing to accommodate an applicant who could have been drawn  
14 if the error had not been made; or

15 (2) restore an applicant's preference rating to  
16 the level it would have been if the error had not been made.

18 6230.0200 SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS.

20 Subp. 3. **Areas closed to migratory waterfowl hunting.** The  
21 Gordon F. Yeager Wildlife Management Area and the Eastside  
22 Wildlife Management Area in Olmsted County and the Carl Schmidt  
23 Wildlife Management Area in Morrison County are closed to the  
24 taking of migratory waterfowl. On the Gordon F. Yeager Wildlife  
25 Management Area, small game taken by firearms may only be taken  
26 with shotguns using No. 4 or smaller diameter shot.

2 Subp. 5. Areas closed to hunting and trapping. The  
3 Boerner Wildlife Management Area in Sibley County, the Buelow  
4 Wildlife Management Area in Steele County, the Bryson Wildlife  
5 Management Area in Freeborn County, the Chapa-Kak-Say-Za  
6 Wildlife Management Area in Steele County, and the Hutchinson  
7 Wildlife Management Area in McLeod County are closed to the  
8 hunting and trapping of all species. The Sand Prairie Wildlife  
9 Management Area in Sherburne County is closed to the hunting and  
10 trapping of all species, except hunting by individuals with  
11 disabilities participating in a special hunt.

12 Subp. 6. Areas closed to hunting only. The Hearinging  
13 Island Wildlife Management Area in St. Louis County, the Pine  
14 City Wildlife Management Area in Pine County, and the Carl and  
15 Verna Schmidt and Bur Oak Wildlife Management Areas in LeSueur  
16 County are closed to the hunting of all species.

18 Subp. 12. Sanctuary areas open to hunting. The following  
19 sanctuary areas of wildlife management areas posted with  
20 "Wildlife Sanctuary Do Not Trespass" signs are open for hunting  
21 as specified:

23 B. The Carlos Avery Wildlife Management Area  
24 sanctuaries are open for:

25 (1) hunting by persons with disabilities at  
26 designated stands, by permit; and

1 6230.0250 GENERAL PROVISIONS FOR USE OF WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT  
2 AREAS.

3 [For text of subps 1 to 8, see M.R.]

4 Subp. 9. Use of motorboats. Motorboat use is prohibited  
5 within a wildlife management area, except where posted or as  
6 provided in this subpart. For purposes of this chapter,  
7 "motorboat" includes motorboats as defined in Minnesota  
8 Statutes, section 86B.005, subdivision 9, and duckboats with  
9 motors attached.

11 K. Chub Lake Wildlife Management Area in Dakota  
12 County: motorboats may be used with no limit on size.

13 Subp. 10. General restrictions on vehicles.

14 A. A person may not operate an all-terrain vehicle,  
15 hang glider, air boat, hover craft, or personal watercraft  
16 defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 86B.005, within the  
17 boundaries of a wildlife management area. Exceptions for  
18 all-terrain vehicle use include:

19 (1) use during deer seasons as provided in part  
20 6232.0300, subpart 7, item B;

21 (2) use by a hunter with a disability who has a  
22 permit approved by the area wildlife manager under Minnesota  
23 Statutes, section 97A.137, subdivision 3;

24 (3) use for ice fishing as provided in item C;  
25 and

26 (4) use on designated trails as provided in  
27 Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.133, subdivision 3.

1 For purposes of this chapter, all-terrain vehicle means  
2 vehicles as defined in part 6232.0300, subpart 7, item C.

10 6230.0400 SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR STATE GAME REFUGES.

12 Subp. 2. Bemidji Game Refuge, Beltrami County. The  
13 Bemidji Game Refuge in Beltrami County is open to:

14 A. small game hunting, except waterfowl, through the  
15 Thursday nearest November 4;

16 B. Canada goose hunting during the early goose  
17 season, except on Lake Bemidji, the Mississippi River, and Stump  
18 Lake;

19 C. trapping for beaver, mink, otter, and muskrat  
20 only; and

21 D. deer and bear hunting by archery; ~~and~~

22 ~~E. deer and bear hunting by firearms.~~

24 Subp. 4. Claremont Game Refuge, Dodge County. The  
25 Claremont Game Refuge in Dodge County is open to:

26 A. small game hunting, except ducks and mergansers;

27 B. trapping;

1 C. deer hunting by muzzleloader during the  
2 muzzleloader season; and

3 D. deer and bear hunting by archery.

4 Subp. 5. **Clay County Game Refuge, Clay County.** The Clay  
5 County Game Refuge in Clay County is open to:

6 A. prairie chickens;

7 B. deer and bear hunting by firearms;

8 C. deer and bear hunting by archery; and

9 D. Canada goose hunting during the early goose season.

11 Subp. 8. **East Minnesota River Game Refuge, Blue Earth and**  
12 **Le Sueur Counties.** The East Minnesota River Game Refuge in Blue  
13 Earth and Le Sueur Counties is open to deer, wild turkey, and  
14 bear hunting by archery.

16 Subp. 11. **Evansville Game Refuge, Douglas County.** The  
17 Evansville Game Refuge in Douglas County is open to:

18 A. trapping;

19 B. Canada goose hunting during the early goose  
20 season; and

21 C. deer and bear hunting by firearms.

23 Subp. 21. **Lac qui Parle Game Refuge, Chippewa and Lac qui**  
24 **Parle Counties.** The following special provisions apply to the  
25 Lac qui Parle Game Refuge, Chippewa and Lac qui Parle Counties:

26 A. Those portions within the Lac qui Parle State  
27 Recreational Area, Mission Site, or that are posted to prohibit

1 trespass are closed to hunting. The remainder of the refuge is  
2 open to:

3 (1) waterfowl hunting only during the open Canada  
4 goose season in the West Central Goose Zone, only at designated  
5 hunting stations as provided by parts 6230.0500 to 6230.1100;

6 (2) deer hunting; and

7 (3) small game hunting other than waterfowl,  
8 except from the first day of the open Canada goose season  
9 through the last day of the open Canada goose season in the West  
10 Central Goose Zone, when small game hunting is allowed only at  
11 designated hunting stations as provided by parts 6230.0500 to  
12 6230.1100. Small game hunting is not allowed on closed Canada  
13 goose hunting days during a split goose season.

15 Subp. 22. **Lake Ripley Game Refuge, Meeker County.** The  
16 Lake Ripley Game Refuge in Meeker County is open to:

17 A. small game hunting, except waterfowl, after the  
18 duck season; and

19 B. trapping after the duck season.

21 Subp. 29. [See repealer.]

22 [For text of subp 30, see M.R.]

23 Subp. 31. **Nerstrand Woods Game Refuge, Rice County.** That  
24 portion of the Nerstrand Woods Game Refuge in Rice County that  
25 is within the Nerstrand Big Woods State Park and the Prairie  
26 Creek Woods Scientific and Natural Area is open to deer hunting  
27 by muzzleloader special permit only. The remainder of the

1 refuge is open to:

- 2 A. small game hunting, except waterfowl;
- 3 B. trapping;
- 4 C. deer and bear hunting by firearms; and
- 5 D. deer and bear hunting by archery.

7 Subp. 54. **Mud-Bardwell Game Refuge, Martin County.** The  
8 Mud-Bardwell Game Refuge in Martin County is open to special  
9 goose hunts.

10 Subp. 55. **Collegeville (St. John's) Game Refuge, Stearns**  
11 **County.** The Collegeville (St. John's) Game Refuge in Stearns  
12 County is open to firearms deer and bear hunting during the  
13 established seasons, by written permission of the landowner.

14 Subp. 56. **Carleton Game Refuge, Dakota and Rice Counties.**  
15 The Carleton Game Refuge in Dakota and Rice Counties is open for  
16 deer hunting by archery from the fourth Thursday in November to  
17 December 31, by written permission of the landowner.

18 Subp. 57. **Talcot Lake Game Refuge, Cottonwood County.** The  
19 following special provisions apply to the Talcot Lake Game  
20 Refuge, Cottonwood County.

21 A. Those portions within the Talcot Lake Game Refuge  
22 that are posted to prohibit trespassing are closed to hunting.  
23 The remainder of the refuge is open to waterfowl hunting during  
24 the open Canada goose seasons only at designated hunting  
25 stations as provided by parts 6230.0500 to 6230.1100.

26 B. Designated hunting stations within the refuge must  
27 be spaced no less than 200 yards apart and must be no more than

1 100 yards inside the refuge, as measured from the posted  
2 boundary.

3 Subp. 58. Clear Lake Game Refuge, Sherburne County. The  
4 Clear Lake Game Refuge in Sherburne County is open to:

5 A. deer hunting by firearms; and

6 B. deer hunting by archery.

7 6230.0600 DESCRIPTIONS OF CONTROLLED HUNTING ZONES.

8 [For text of subps 1 to 6, see M.R.]

9 Subp. 7. Talcot Lake Zone, Cottonwood County. On the  
10 Talcot Lake Game Refuge and Sanctuary in Cottonwood County, the  
11 controlled hunting zones include the East Side Zone and the West  
12 Side Zone:

13 A. The East Side Zone is:

14 (1) the 200 yard wide area which is east of the  
15 west right-of-way boundary of that portion of County State-Aid  
16 Highway (CSAH) 7, Cottonwood County, described as follows:

17 Beginning at the center of Section 17, Township 105 North,  
18 Range 38 West; thence south along CSAH 7 to State Trunk  
19 Highway (STH) 62; and

20 (2) the West Half of the East Half of Section 29,  
21 Township 105 North, Range 38 West, Cottonwood County.

24 6230.0700 LAC QUI PARLE SPECIAL PROVISIONS.

25 Subpart 1. Time periods for special provisions. In  
26 addition to the regulations provided by part 6230.0500, the  
27 following subparts apply to all persons in the Lac qui Parle



1 Controlled Hunting Zones during the open season for taking  
2 Canada geese in the Lac qui Parle Goose Zone.

3 Subp. 2. **Hunting stations.** Waterfowl and small game  
4 hunters may reserve designated hunting stations in accordance  
5 with regulations available at the Lac qui Parle Wildlife  
6 Management Area headquarters. Reservation dates may not be  
7 changed. Only one hunting group, consisting of no more than  
8 three hunters, may occupy a designated hunting station at one  
9 time. Not more than six hunting groups per day may occupy a  
10 designated hunting station.

11 Subp. 3. **Entry permit required.** On public lands, a person  
12 may not hunt migratory waterfowl or small game in the controlled  
13 hunting zone without first registering at the check station and  
14 obtaining an entry permit. Entry permits must be displayed as  
15 specified on the permit. Hunters age 18 or older will be  
16 charged a \$3 daily fee for the Lac qui Parle entry permit.  
17 Failure to comply with the provisions of the permit or special  
18 provisions relating to the controlled hunt will result in  
19 immediate revocation of the permit for that day.

21 6230.0800 THIEF LAKE SPECIAL PROVISIONS.

22 Subpart 1. **Time period for special provisions.** In  
23 addition to the regulations provided by part 6230.0500, the  
24 following subparts apply to waterfowl and small game hunters in  
25 the Thief Lake Controlled Hunt Zone during all open waterfowl  
26 seasons, except that restrictions on small game hunting apply  
27 only from the opening of the regular waterfowl season through

1 the Monday nearest October 22.

2 Subp. 2. **Designated hunting station.** Hunters must use  
3 designated hunting stations and on a first come first served  
4 basis. Hunters are limited to one trip to the hunting stations  
5 before noon and one trip after noon each day.

6 Subp. 3. [See repealer.]

7 Subp. 4. **Firearms must be cased.** All firearms must be  
8 cased except within ten feet of the designated hunting station.

9 Subp. 5. **Limitation on number of shells possessed.** Only  
10 persons hunting may bring shotgun shells into the controlled  
11 hunting zone. A hunter may not bring more than six shells per  
12 trip into the controlled hunting zone or have more than six  
13 shells in possession at any one time.

14 Subp. 6. **Restrictions on occupancy of designated parking**  
15 **lots and hunting stations.** A person may not park in or  
16 otherwise occupy any designated controlled hunting zone parking  
17 lot or occupy any hunting station from 10:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m.

18 Subp. 7. **Closed hunting stations.** A person may not occupy  
19 or hunt from any hunting station that is posted closed.

20 6230.1000 ROSEAU RIVER AND ROCHESTER REGULATIONS.

21 [For text of subps 1 to 3, see M.R.]

22 Subp. 4. **Firearms must be cased.** All firearms must be  
23 cased except within ten feet of a hunting station.

24 6230.1100 TALCOT LAKE SPECIAL PROVISIONS.

25 Subpart 1. **Time period for special provisions.** In  
26 addition to the general regulations, the following subparts

1 apply to all persons in the Talcot Lake Controlled Hunting Zones  
2 during open Canada goose seasons.

3 Subp. 2. **Hunting.** In the Talcot Lake Controlled Hunting  
4 Zones, waterfowl hunting is allowed only at designated hunting  
5 stations. Hunting species other than waterfowl is prohibited on  
6 public land in the Talcot Lake Controlled Hunting Zones.

7 [For text of subp 3, see M.R.]

8 Subp. 4. **Designated hunting stations.** Waterfowl hunters  
9 on public lands must hunt only at the designated hunting  
10 stations having numbers corresponding to their parking stall  
11 number.

12 Subp. 5. **Restrictions on entry to zone.** Persons may not  
13 occupy a hunting station on public land within the controlled  
14 hunting zone except when their vehicles are occupying numbered  
15 parking stalls in a designated parking lot in the controlled  
16 hunting zone. Persons other than those hunting at a designated  
17 hunting station may not occupy a numbered stall or park in a  
18 designated parking lot.

20 Subp. 7. **Firearms must be cased.** All firearms must be  
21 cased except within ten feet of a hunting station.

22 6232.0200 DEFINITIONS.

23 [For text of subps 1 and 2, see M.R.]

24 Subp. 3. [See repealer.]

25 [For text of subp 3a, see 27 SR 348]

26 Subp. 4. **Bait.** "Bait" means grains, fruits, vegetables,  
27 nuts, hay, or other food that is capable of attracting or

1 enticing deer and that has been transported and placed by a  
2 person. Liquid scents, salt, and minerals are not bait.

3 Subp. 4a. **Deer permit area.** "Deer permit area" means an  
4 area of the state consisting of one or more deer registration  
5 blocks. Deer permit areas open for taking legal bucks and  
6 antlerless deer during the regular firearms deer season are  
7 defined as follows:

8 A. "intensive deer permit area" means a deer permit  
9 area where taking deer of either sex is authorized by a regular  
10 firearms license, except a multizone buck license, and where  
11 multiple bonus permits are authorized;

12 B. "managed deer permit area" means a deer permit  
13 area where taking deer of either sex is authorized by a regular  
14 firearms license, except a multizone buck license, and where one  
15 bonus permit is authorized; and

16 C. "lottery deer permit area" means a deer permit  
17 area where taking legal bucks is authorized by a regular  
18 firearms license and taking antlerless deer is authorized by an  
19 either-sex permit.

20 Subp. 5. **Bonus permit.** "Bonus permit" means a license to  
21 take and tag deer by archery or firearms, in addition to deer  
22 authorized to be taken under regular archery or firearms  
23 licenses. It is available for one-half the cost of a regular  
24 resident or nonresident license and is valid immediately upon  
25 issuance, as long as the purchaser has a valid regular license.  
26 Deer taken and tagged with a bonus permit must be antlerless  
27 unless otherwise prescribed by the commissioner.

1 Subp. 5a. [See repealer.]

2 [For text of subps 6 to 8, see M.R.]

3 Subp. 9. **Regular licenses.** "Regular firearms license"  
4 means a license valid for taking a deer by firearms in the  
5 regular firearms or muzzleloader season, except bonus permits.  
6 "Regular archery license" means a license valid for taking a  
7 deer by archery in the archery season, except bonus permits.

8 6232.0300 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS FOR TAKING DEER.

9 Subpart 1. **Zone and date options.** A firearm deer hunter  
10 may purchase a firearm license valid for the regular firearms  
11 deer season or muzzleloader season, a multizone buck license to  
12 take antlered deer in more than one zone, an all-season deer  
13 license, or a resident youth license. A hunter purchasing a  
14 resident youth license or a regular firearm license, including a  
15 hunter choosing a muzzleloader option, must select only one of  
16 the zone and date options listed on the license. For the  
17 regular firearm season, this choice will be printed on the  
18 license at the time of purchase. A person may only hunt deer by  
19 firearms within the zone and date options indicated on the  
20 person's firearm license.

21 [For text of subp 2, see M.R.]

22 Subp. 3. **Party hunting.** A party is a group of two or more  
23 licensed deer hunters who are afield hunting together and are  
24 all using firearms or all using archery equipment. A member of  
25 a party may kill a deer for another member of the party who has  
26 an unused tag valid for that deer, except as provided by  
27 Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.301. A mixed-weapons group is

1 considered two separate parties. Multizone buck licensees may  
2 party hunt with regular firearms licensees. Persons issued  
3 permits under Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.055, subdivision  
4 3, who are hunting in a lottery deer permit area and do not have  
5 an either-sex permit may not tag antlerless deer for another  
6 member of the party.

7       Subp. 4. **Baiting.** A person may not hunt deer (1) with the  
8 aid or use of bait, (2) in the vicinity of bait if the person  
9 knows or has reason to know that bait is present, or (3) in the  
10 vicinity of where the person has placed bait or caused bait to  
11 be placed within the previous ten days. This restriction does  
12 not apply to food resulting from normal or accepted farming,  
13 forest management, wildlife food plantings, orchard management,  
14 or other similar land management activities.

15       Subp. 5. **Tagging.** The tag of the license valid for the  
16 taking of the deer must be affixed around the tendon or bone of  
17 a hind leg, around the base of an antler, or through a slit cut  
18 in either ear so that the tag cannot be readily removed.

19       Subp. 6. **License purchase and validation.**

20           A. A bonus permit may be purchased any time  
21 throughout the open deer seasons. Bonus permits are valid  
22 immediately upon purchase, as long as the purchaser has a valid  
23 regular license. When a regular license is purchased after the  
24 start of the season for that license, a bonus permit is not  
25 valid until the waiting period has expired for the regular  
26 license.

27           B. At the time a deer is tagged at the site of kill,

1 the tag must be validated. Validation consists of using a knife  
2 or similar sharp object to cut out or a pen to indelibly mark  
3 the appropriate notches on the tag indicating:

- 4 (1) the month the deer was taken;
- 5 (2) the date the deer was taken; and
- 6 (3) the time of day the deer was taken.

8 Subp. 8. **Bag limit.** A person may not tag more than one  
9 deer during a license year by any method, except as authorized  
10 in items A to D.

11 A. In Marshall, Kittson, Roseau, Lake of the Woods,  
12 and Pennington Counties, a person may tag one deer with a  
13 regular archery license and another with a regular firearms  
14 license, including the muzzleloader option or multizone buck  
15 license. Both deer must be taken and registered in this  
16 five-county area.

17 B. A person may tag a second, third, fourth, or fifth  
18 deer by archery, firearm, or muzzleloader with a bonus permit in  
19 specified areas as prescribed in this chapter.

20 C. In no case may a person tag more than five deer  
21 per year by firearms, archery, or both methods combined, except  
22 a sixth deer may be tagged if the person takes a deer with a  
23 free landowner permit.

24 D. Total bag limits by deer permit area are as  
25 follows:

- 26 (1) the total bag limit for lottery deer permit  
27 areas is one deer, except all-season license holders may take

1 two deer;

2 (2) the total bag limit for managed deer permit  
3 areas is two deer, except all-season license holders may take up  
4 to three deer. Archery, firearms, and muzzleloader hunters  
5 using bonus permits may not harvest antlerless deer in more than  
6 one managed deer permit area;

7 (3) the total bag limit for intensive deer permit  
8 areas is five deer; and

9 (4) in addition to the total bag limits under  
10 subitems (1) to (3), a person with a free landowner deer license  
11 may take one additional antlerless deer on land owned or leased  
12 by the person in managed and intensive deer permit areas.

14 6232.0400 REGISTRATION OF DEER.

15 [For text of subp 2, see M.R.]

16 Subp. 4. **General provisions for registration of deer.** The  
17 deer license number and the year for which the possession tag is  
18 issued must be recorded in the appropriate place on the  
19 possession tag in indelible ink. If a mistake is made in  
20 writing the license number, the agent must reissue a correct  
21 possession tag. Registration agents are not required to inspect  
22 deer at registration stations. Legally registered deer may be  
23 transported anytime during or after the deer hunting season. No  
24 part of the carcass, except skin or entrails, may be removed  
25 until after the possession tag has been affixed, except that  
26 deer may be quartered prior to registration as long as all parts  
27 remain together and are presented for registration and the head



1 of the deer remains attached to one quarter. The possession tag  
2 must be affixed securely to the deer at any of the locations  
3 specified in part 6232.0300, subpart 5. A person may not  
4 process a deer unless it has been registered as evidenced by an  
5 attached possession tag.

6 6232.0500 DEER LICENSES FOR MILITARY PERSONNEL.

7 Military personnel and disabled veterans may obtain a  
8 license to hunt deer as authorized by Minnesota Statutes,  
9 sections 97A.441 and 97A.465, under the conditions in this part.

10 A. The free license, either-sex permit, and tag must  
11 be obtained from an electronic license system special agent or  
12 the Department of Natural Resources License Center.

13 B. The zone and the date option selected by the  
14 applicant shall be printed on the license.

15 C. The license entitles the holder to take a deer of  
16 either sex in the zone and during the date option selected. A  
17 license is not valid in the special areas provided in this  
18 chapter. Military or disabled veteran licensees are not  
19 eligible for free bonus permits, all-season deer licenses, or  
20 multizone buck licenses.

22 6232.0600 SEASONS AND ZONES FOR TAKING DEER BY ARCHERY.

24 Subp. 2. **Northeast Border Zone.** The following provisions  
25 apply to the taking of deer by archery in the Northeast Border  
26 Zone:

1           A. The open area consists of: Registration Blocks  
2 116 and 127.

4 6232.0700 LEGAL DEER BY ARCHERY.

5           Antlerless deer and legal bucks may be taken by archery,  
6 except that archery hunters may not take antlerless deer in  
7 lottery deer permit areas that have no either-sex permit quota  
8 or in lottery deer permit areas that have a quota of youth  
9 antlerless permits for firearms deer hunters under part  
10 6232.1800, subpart 9.

11 6232.0900 CAMP RIPLEY ARCHERY HUNT.

13           Subp. 2. **Permit required to hunt.** Only persons possessing  
14 a valid Minnesota archery or all-season deer hunting license, an  
15 unused possession tag valid for taking a deer by archery, and a  
16 permit validated for the Camp Ripley archery hunt will be  
17 permitted to enter Camp Ripley. Permits are not transferable  
18 between individuals or hunting dates. The permit for the Camp  
19 Ripley archery hunt authorizes the permit holder to take one  
20 deer at Camp Ripley, unless otherwise authorized by the  
21 commissioner. A permit holder may not take any species other  
22 than deer at Camp Ripley.

23 6232.1000 APPLICATION PROCESS FOR CAMP RIPLEY ARCHERY HUNT.

24           Subpart 1. **Preference drawing.** If the number of  
25 applications for Camp Ripley archery hunt permits exceeds the  
26 quota in the annual hunting regulations, a preference drawing

1 shall be used to select permit holders. A person may enter the  
2 preference drawing by supplying the person's driver's license  
3 number, official state identification number, or 13-digit  
4 firearms safety identification number on the application.  
5 Applicants establish a preference rating based on the number of  
6 times they have applied in previous years and have not obtained  
7 a permit. The preference rating increases each year the  
8 applicant applies unsuccessfully. Persons applying for the  
9 first time have no preference. Applicants receiving a permit  
10 lose their accrued preference.

11 Subp. 2. **Group selection.** Up to four persons may apply as  
12 a group. Either all members of a group will be selected or none  
13 will be selected. The preference rating of applicants who apply  
14 as a group is based on the individual in the group with the  
15 lowest preference. All group members must apply for the same  
16 time period.

17 Subp. 3. **Application requirements.** Applicants for permits  
18 must:

- 19 A. be at least 12 years of age prior to the third  
20 Thursday in October;
- 21 B. apply for only one of the hunting periods;
- 22 C. submit no more than one application per year;
- 23 D. apply by the Friday nearest August 17; and
- 24 E. pay a nonrefundable application fee as provided by  
25 statute.

26 6232.1100 SPECIAL RESTRICTIONS FOR CAMP RIPLEY ARCHERY HUNT.

27 Subpart 1. **Access to Camp Ripley.** This subpart applies to

1 access into Camp Ripley during the archery hunt.

2 A. Archers with valid permits must enter and leave  
3 Camp Ripley only by way of the southeast railroad gate and only  
4 from noon on the day before the hunt to 8:00 p.m. on the last  
5 day of the hunt.

9 6232.1250 TAKING DEER BY ARCHERY UNDER BONUS PERMITS.

10 Subpart 1. Purchase. The purchase of a bonus permit is  
11 authorized for any person who has purchased a valid archery deer  
12 license for the current year. Bonus permits may be purchased  
13 from electronic license system agents, the Department of Natural  
14 Resources License Center, and other authorized agents.

15 Subp. 2. Restrictions. Bonus permits may be used to take  
16 antlerless deer in managed and intensive deer permit areas and  
17 in special hunt areas prescribed by the commissioner. In  
18 managed deer permit areas, one bonus permit may be used to take  
19 an antlerless deer. In intensive deer permit areas and special  
20 hunt areas, up to four bonus permits may be used to take  
21 antlerless deer.

22 6232.1300 SEASONS FOR TAKING DEER BY FIREARMS.

23 Subpart 1. Zone 1. Legal bucks may be taken in Zone 1 for  
24 a 16-day period beginning the Saturday nearest November 6. In  
25 managed or intensive deer permit areas, antlerless deer may be  
26 taken throughout this season. In lottery deer permit areas and

1 in special hunt areas, antlerless deer may be taken only by  
2 permit throughout this season and only within the deer permit or  
3 special hunt area specified on each hunter's permit, except as  
4 specifically authorized by statute. A person who is authorized  
5 by statute to take a deer of either sex without an either-sex  
6 permit and who is licensed for Zone 1 may take an antlerless  
7 deer without a permit in any Zone 1 deer permit area, except in  
8 those lottery deer permit areas where no either-sex permits are  
9 offered.

10 Subp. 2. **Zone 2.** Legal bucks may be taken in Zone 2 for a  
11 nine-day period beginning the Saturday nearest November 6. In  
12 managed or intensive deer permit areas, antlerless deer may be  
13 taken throughout this season. In lottery deer permit areas and  
14 in special hunt areas, antlerless deer may be taken only by  
15 permit throughout this season and only within the deer permit or  
16 special hunt area specified on each hunter's permit, except as  
17 specifically authorized by statute. A person who is authorized  
18 by statute to take a deer of either sex without an either-sex  
19 permit and who is licensed for Zone 2 may take an antlerless  
20 deer without a permit in any Zone 2 deer permit area, except in  
21 those lottery deer permit areas where no either-sex permits are  
22 offered.

23 Subp. 3. **Zone 3.** This subpart applies to season dates in  
24 Zone 3.

25 A. Legal bucks may be taken in the early Zone 3A  
26 season for a seven-day period beginning the Saturday nearest  
27 November 6. In managed or intensive deer permit areas,

1 antlerless deer may be taken throughout this season. In lottery  
2 deer permit areas and in special hunt areas, antlerless deer may  
3 be taken only by permit throughout this season and only within  
4 the deer permit or special hunt area specified on each hunter's  
5 permit, except as specifically authorized by statute. A person  
6 who is authorized by statute to take a deer of either sex  
7 without an either-sex permit and who is licensed for Zone 3A may  
8 take an antlerless deer without a permit in any Zone 3A deer  
9 permit area, except in those lottery deer permit areas where no  
10 either-sex permits are offered.

11           B. Legal bucks may be taken during the late Zone 3B  
12 season for a nine-day period beginning the Saturday nearest  
13 November 20. In managed or intensive deer permit areas,  
14 antlerless deer may be taken throughout this season. In lottery  
15 deer permit areas and in special hunt areas, antlerless deer may  
16 be taken only by permit throughout this season and only within  
17 the deer permit or special hunt area specified on each hunter's  
18 permit, except as specifically authorized by statute. A person  
19 who is authorized by statute to take a deer of either sex  
20 without an either-sex permit and who is licensed for Zone 3B may  
21 take an antlerless deer without a permit in any Zone 3B deer  
22 permit area, except in those lottery deer permit areas where no  
23 either-sex permits are offered.

24           Subp. 4. Zone 4. This subpart applies to season dates in  
25 Zone 4.

26           A. Legal bucks may be taken in the early Zone 4A  
27 season for a two-day period beginning the Saturday nearest

1 November 6. In managed or intensive deer permit areas,  
2 antlerless deer may be taken throughout this season. In lottery  
3 deer permit areas and in special hunt areas, antlerless deer may  
4 be taken only by permit throughout this season and only within  
5 the deer permit or special hunt area specified on each hunter's  
6 permit, except as specifically authorized by statute. A person  
7 who is authorized by statute to take a deer of either sex  
8 without an either-sex permit and who is licensed for Zone 4A may  
9 take an antlerless deer without a permit in any Zone 4A deer

12           B. Legal bucks may be taken in the late Zone 4B  
13 season for a four-day period beginning the Saturday nearest

16 deer permit areas and in special hunt areas, antlerless deer may  
17 be taken only by permit throughout this season and only within  
18 the deer permit or special hunt area specified on each hunter's  
19 permit, except as specifically authorized by statute. A person  
20 who is authorized by statute to take a deer of either sex  
21 without an either-sex permit and who is licensed for Zone 4B may  
22 take an antlerless deer without a permit in any Zone 4B deer

25           Subp. 5. **Taking antlerless deer on firearms licenses.** The  
26 provisions for taking antlerless deer in this part apply to the  
27 use of a regular firearms, all-season, or youth deer license

1 tag. In addition, antlerless deer may be taken and tagged with  
2 bonus permits as prescribed in parts 6232.1900 and 6232.1950.

3 Subp. 6. Permit quota adjustments. The commissioner may  
4 reduce either-sex and special hunt permit quotas for permit  
5 areas wholly or partially within the 1837 Ceded Territory at the  
6 time the computerized drawing is conducted to accommodate tribal  
7 declarations for antlerless deer harvest in the 1837 Ceded  
8 Territory in compliance with Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa v.  
9 Minnesota, 119 S. Ct. 1187 (1999).

9   firearms deer license validated for the proper zone and time  
10   period and a permit valid for that area is required to hunt deer  
11   in firearms special hunt areas. Special hunt permit  
12   applications must be made at an electronic license system agent  
13   or the Department of Natural Resources License Center.

14           Subp. 2. Application process. Applications for all  
15   firearms special hunt permits must be made according to this  
16   subpart and according to application instructions provided by  
17   the commissioner.

18           A. Each person must apply at an electronic license  
19   system agent or the Department of Natural Resources License  
20   Center. A person may not apply more than once for a hunt,  
21   whether as an individual or as a member of a group.

22           B. Up to four persons desiring to hunt as a group may  
23   apply together. Group applications will either all be selected  
24   or none selected.

25           C. The preference rating of applicants who apply as a  
26   group will be based on the individual in the group with the  
27   lowest preference.

28           D. The application deadline is the first Thursday

1 following Labor Day.

2 E. If the number of applications for permits in any  
3 area exceeds the quota determined by the commissioner, a  
4 preference drawing will be held to determine who will be issued  
5 permits as provided by part 6232.1800.

7 6232.1750 DEER PERMIT AREA DESIGNATION.

8 The commissioner shall annually designate all deer permit  
9 areas as intensive, managed, or lottery and shall establish  
10 permit quotas for taking deer of either sex in lottery deer  
11 permit areas.

12 6232.1800 EITHER-SEX PERMITS AND PREFERENCE DRAWINGS.

13 Subpart 1. Procedures for applying for an either-sex  
14 permit. Residents and nonresidents are eligible for either-sex  
15 permits. A person may not apply for an either-sex deer permit  
16 without first purchasing a firearms or all-season deer license.  
17 The application may be made for only one of the deer permit  
18 areas described in this part, and must be for the zone and dates  
19 on the applicant's deer license. A person may not submit more  
20 than one application for an either-sex permit. A person may  
21 apply for an either-sex permit or a special hunt permit, but not  
22 both.

23 The application deadline is the first Thursday following  
24 Labor Day.

25 Subp. 2. Preference drawings for either-sex permits in  
26 lottery deer permit areas and special hunt area permits. If the

1 number of applications for either-sex permits in a lottery deer  
2 permit area or for permits in a special hunt area exceeds the  
3 quota set forth in the annual hunting regulations, a preference  
4 drawing will be used to select permit holders. Persons 12 years  
5 of age or older may enter the preference drawing by supplying  
6 their driver's license number, official state of Minnesota  
7 Identification Number, or 13-digit Firearms Safety  
8 Identification Number on the application, except that resident  
9 hunters under age 16 on the Saturday nearest November 6 may not  
10 apply for either-sex permits. All applicants who have reached  
11 their 18th birthday by the first Thursday following Labor Day  
12 must provide one of these three numbers to qualify. Applicants  
13 under 18 years of age who do not submit one of these numbers  
14 will be assigned a number and will be entered into the  
15 preference drawing. Applicants establish a preference rating  
16 based upon the number of times they have applied in previous  
17 years and have not obtained an either-sex or special hunt area  
18 permit. The preference rating will increase each year the  
19 applicant applies unsuccessfully for either an either-sex or  
20 special hunt area permit. Persons applying for the first time  
21 have no preference. Applicants receiving either-sex or special  
22 hunt area permits lose their accrued preference.

23       Subp. 3. **Deer permit areas.** Deer permit areas are  
24 comprised of registration blocks of the same number.

25 6232.1950 TAKING DEER BY FIREARMS UNDER BONUS PERMITS.

26       Subpart 1. **Purchase.** The purchase of a bonus permit is  
27 authorized for any person who has purchased and presents a

1 regular firearms deer license for the current year. Bonus  
2 permits may be purchased for one-half the cost of a regular  
3 license from electronic license system agents, the Department of  
4 Natural Resources License Center, and other authorized agents.

5 Subp. 2. **Restrictions.** Bonus permits may be used to take  
6 antlerless deer by firearms during the regular firearms and  
7 muzzleloader seasons as follows:

8 A. for the regular firearms season, hunters must have  
9 a regular firearms license valid for the appropriate zone and  
10 time option, except the muzzleloader option, to take deer under  
11 a bonus permit in the respective zone and time period for which  
12 the license is valid. One bonus permit may be used to take an  
13 antlerless deer in one managed deer permit area as prescribed in  
14 part 6232.1750. Up to four bonus permits may be used to take  
15 antlerless deer in intensive deer permit areas as prescribed in  
16 part 6232.1750 and in special hunt areas as prescribed in part  
17 6232.1600; and

18 B. for the muzzleloader season, one bonus permit may  
19 be used to take an antlerless deer in one managed deer permit  
20 area as prescribed in part 6232.1750. Up to four bonus permits  
21 may be used to take antlerless deer in intensive deer permit  
22 areas as prescribed in part 6232.1750 and in special hunt areas  
23 prescribed by the commissioner.

24 6232.2000 MULTIZONE BUCK LICENSE.

25 [For text of subpart 1, see M.R.]

26 Subp. 2. **Antlerless deer and special hunts.** Multizone  
27 buck license holders may not apply for lottery either-sex

1 permits or special hunt area permits. Multizone buck licensees  
2 may purchase and use bonus permits to take antlerless deer in  
3 managed and intensive deer permit areas or special hunt areas  
4 prescribed by the commissioner. Bonus permits for multizone  
5 buck hunters are valid during any open firearms zone or time  
6 period, except the late Zone 3B and the muzzleloader seasons.  
7 Multizone buck licensees may not take antlerless deer under  
8 Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.055, subdivision 3, or 97B.301,  
9 subdivision 6.

10 6232.2050 ALL-SEASON DEER LICENSE.

11 Subpart 1. Season and open area.

12 A. An all-season deer license allows a hunter to take  
13 and tag one legal buck and one antlerless deer per year.

14 All-season deer license holders may hunt deer in any of the  
15 following seasons, according to all rules and laws for methods  
16 of taking in each respective season and zone:

17 (1) the archery deer season;

18 (2) the muzzleloader deer season; and

19 (3) the regular firearms season during any open  
20 firearms zone and time period, except the Zone 3B season.

21 B. In lottery deer permit areas, all-season deer  
22 hunters must apply for and receive authorization to take and tag  
23 an antlerless deer by firearms.

24 C. In managed or intensive deer permit areas,  
25 all-season deer hunters may take and tag an antlerless deer with  
26 the antlerless tag accompanying the license.

27 D. A person who is authorized by statute to take an

1 antlerless deer without an either-sex permit and who purchases  
2 an all-season deer license may take antlerless deer during the  
3 firearms season as authorized in part 6232.1300.

4 Subp. 2. **Bonus permits.** All-season deer license holders  
5 may use one bonus permit in a managed deer permit area and may  
6 use up to three bonus permits in intensive deer permit areas, as  
7 prescribed in part 6232.1750.

8 6232.2100 MUZZLELOADER SEASON AND AREAS.

9 [For text of subpart 1, see M.R.]

10 Subp. 2. **Open zone.** The muzzleloader season is open  
11 statewide, except that the following deer permit areas are

14 6232.2550 YOUTH SPECIAL DEER HUNTS.

15 Subpart 1. **General requirements.** Youth special deer hunt  
16 permittees may hunt in open areas and times designated by the  
17 commissioner. All participating youths must attend a mandatory  
18 orientation and must be accompanied by at least one adult mentor  
19 who is at least 18 years of age and authorized by the youth's  
20 parent or guardian. The accompanying adult may not hunt. Party  
21 hunting is not allowed. Persons participating in youth archery  
22 special deer hunts must obtain a valid license for taking deer  
23 by archery by the beginning date of the respective hunt.  
24 Persons participating in youth firearms special deer hunts must  
25 obtain a license for taking deer by firearms, valid for any zone  
26 or season option, by the beginning date of the respective hunt.



1 The blaze orange requirements in Minnesota Statutes, section  
2 97B.071, paragraph (a), apply to all hunters and trappers, and  
3 all adult mentors of youth hunters, in areas open to youth  
4 firearms deer hunting during the open hunting dates established  
5 in this part.

6 Subp. 2. **Application requirements.** Applications for youth  
7 special hunts must be made according to this part and according  
8 to application instructions provided by the commissioner.  
9 Applicants for youth firearms special hunts must be at least 12  
10 years old and under age 16 by the beginning hunt date.  
11 Applicants for youth archery special hunts must be at least 12  
12 years old and under age 18 by the beginning hunt date. Each  
13 person must apply at an electronic license system agent or the  
14 Department of Natural Resources License Center. Group  
15 applications are not allowed. If the number of eligible  
16 applicants exceeds the quota established by the commissioner,  
17 the commissioner shall conduct a drawing to determine eligible  
18 participants. Preference for the youth special hunt drawing is  
19 given to applicants based on the number of years they have  
20 correctly applied for a youth special hunt permit but have been  
21 unsuccessful. Upon issuance of a youth special hunt permit, all  
22 accumulated preference is lost. The application deadline is the  
23 Friday nearest August 17.

24 6232.2560 YOUTH SPECIAL DEER SEASONS.

25 Youths participating in youth special deer seasons must  
26 obtain a license for taking deer by firearms, valid for any zone  
27 or season option, by the beginning date of the special season.

1 A youth special season participant may take one deer, which must  
2 be antlerless. One bonus permit may be used. An adult mentor  
3 age 18 or older authorized by the youth's parent or guardian  
4 must accompany the youth hunter at all times during the hunt.  
5 The accompanying adult may not hunt. Party hunting is not  
6 allowed. The blaze orange requirements in Minnesota Statutes,  
7 section 97B.071, paragraph (a), apply to all hunters and  
8 trappers, and all adult mentors of youth hunters, in the areas  
9 open to firearms deer hunting during the youth special seasons  
10 established in this part.

11 6232.2900 BEAR PERMIT PROCEDURES.

13 Subp. 2. Drawings. Drawings will be conducted by the  
14 department to determine those eligible to purchase a bear  
15 license within the bear quota areas. Preference in the drawings  
16 will be given to applicants based upon the number of times they  
17 have correctly applied for a license in a quota area in previous  
18 years but have not been selected. Upon issuance of a quota area  
19 license, all accumulated preference will be lost. Obtaining a  
20 no-quota bear license will have no effect upon eligibility or  
21 preference in the drawings. In quota areas with fewer  
22 applicants than available licenses, the remaining available  
23 licenses may be first offered to unsuccessful applicants for  
24 other quota areas on a first-come, first-served basis. To  
25 obtain a remaining available license, an eligible person must  
26 apply individually and in person at an electronic license system  
27 agent location or individually through the ELS-Internet or

1 ELS-Telephone system. Any remaining available licenses not  
2 purchased by unsuccessful applicants may then be issued to any  
3 eligible person as prescribed by the commissioner on a  
4 first-come, first-served basis. Individuals who purchase these  
5 remaining available licenses will retain their accumulated  
6 preference.

7 Subp. 3. **Required identification number, eligibility.** A  
8 person whose big game hunting privileges are not suspended and,  
9 if born after December 31, 1979, has successfully completed a  
10 firearms safety course approved by the commissioner prior to the  
11 opening day of the bear season, is eligible to purchase a bear  
12 license for the no-quota area or to enter a drawing for a permit  
13 area license. All applicants who will have reached their 18th  
14 birthday by September 1 must provide a driver's license number,  
15 a Minnesota identification card number issued by the Department  
16 of Public Safety, or a 13-digit Firearms Safety Certificate  
17 number. Eligible applicants under this age who do not submit one  
18 of these numbers will be assigned a number and entered into the

22 Subpart 1. **General procedures.** The provisions in this

26 party of two, three, or four. All party members must apply for  
27 the same zone.

6 application instructions provided by the commissioner. Each  
7 person must apply at an electronic license system agent or the  
8 Department of Natural Resources License Center. Drawings shall  
9 be conducted by the department to determine persons who are  
10 eligible to purchase licenses for the season. The drawings are  
11 subject to the quotas established by the commissioner.  
12 Preference in the respective drawings is given to applicants  
13 based upon the number of times they have correctly applied for a  
14 license for the hunt but have been unsuccessful. A person  
15 selected by the drawings is eligible to purchase a license to  
16 hunt prairie chicken. Upon issuance of a prairie chicken  
17 license, all accumulated preference for prairie chicken hunting

19 Subp. 2. Participation in application drawings.

20 A. Applicants must complete an application for the  
21 prairie chicken hunt. A person may not apply more than once as  
22 an individual or as a member of a group. Qualifying individuals  
23 may apply for the resident landowner-tenant prairie chicken  
24 drawing.

25 B. A resident applicant must provide the applicant's  
26 individual Minnesota driver's license number of 13 characters, a  
27 13-character firearm safety number, or an official state

1 identification number of 13 characters issued by the Department  
2 of Public Safety.

3 C. An applicant must choose one of the prairie  
4 chicken permit areas and one of the time periods.

5 D. Up to four persons desiring to hunt together as a  
6 group may apply as a group. Group applications shall either be  
7 all selected or none selected. Applications by a group must all  
8 be for the same prairie chicken permit area and time period.  
9 The preference rating of applicants who apply as a group shall  
10 be based on the individual in the group with the lowest  
11 preference. Group applications must be made up of either all  
12 general or all landowner-tenant applications.

13 E. A person who applies as a landowner or tenant but  
14 does not meet the definition as provided in this chapter is  
15 ineligible for that season's drawings.

16 F. The application deadline is the last Friday in

8 chicken permit area in which the participant's qualifying  
9 property is located.

10 F. Landowners or tenants unsuccessful in the  
11 landowner-tenant drawing shall be included in the general  
12 drawing.

13 G. Landowner-tenant licensees must allow public  
14 prairie chicken hunting on their land during that prairie  
15 chicken season and the commissioner shall provide descriptions  
16 of these lands to licensed prairie chicken hunters.

17 Subp. 4. **Modification of quota numbers for group**  
18 **applications.** The quota of licenses or permits for a drawing  
19 may be increased to accommodate group members if the last  
20 applicant to be selected is a member of a group.

21 Subp. 5. **Drawing application fee.** An applicant must pay a  
22 fee as prescribed by statute at time of application at the  
23 electronic license system-point of sale (ELS-POS). Refunds of  
24 application fees shall not be made for any reason.

25 Subp. 6. **Undersubscribed prairie chicken permit areas.** In  
26 permit areas with fewer applicants than available licenses, the  
27 remaining available licenses may be first offered to

1 unsuccessful applicants for other permit areas on a first-come,  
2 first-served basis. An eligible person must apply individually  
3 and in person at an ELS-POS agent location or individually

16 6237.0400 TAKING PRAIRIE CHICKENS.

17 Subpart 1. **Open season and methods.** Prairie chickens may  
18 be taken during the five-day period beginning on the Saturday  
19 nearest October 20.

20 Subp. 2. **Arms restrictions.** Prairie chickens may be taken  
21 by shotgun or bow and arrow. A person may not take prairie  
22 chickens with a rifle or handgun.

23 Subp. 3. **Bag limit.** A person may not take more than two  
24 prairie chickens per season or possess more than two prairie  
25 chickens.

26 Subp. 4. **Open areas.** Prairie chicken permit areas are

1 open for the prairie chicken season as prescribed by the  
2 commissioner. Prairie chicken licenses are valid only in the  
3 prairie chicken permit area specified on the license.

4 **Subp. 5. Game refuges open to taking prairie chickens.**

5 The Clay County Game Refuge in Clay County is open for the  
6 taking of prairie chickens during open prairie chicken seasons  
7 in the zone in which it is located.

8 **6237.0500 PRAIRIE CHICKEN PERMIT AREA DESCRIPTION.**

9 **Subpart 1. Generally.** Prairie chicken permit areas are  
10 comprised of partial, single, or grouped registration blocks, as  
11 established in part 6232.4700, and are described according to  
12 this part.

13 **Subp. 2. Area 405A.** Prairie chicken permit area 405A  
14 consists of those portions of registration block 405 described  
15 as follows:

16 Beginning at the intersection of U. S. Highway 2 and State  
17 Trunk Highway (STH) 9; thence along U. S. Highway 2 to STH  
18 32; thence along STH 32 to STH 102; thence along STH 102 to  
19 STH 9; thence along STH 9 to point of beginning.

20 **Subp. 3. Area 407A.** Prairie chicken permit area 407A  
21 consists of those portions of registration block 407 described  
22 as follows:

23 Beginning at the intersection of State Trunk Highway (STH)  
24 9 and STH 102; thence along STH 102 to STH 32; thence along  
25 STH 32 to STH 200; thence along STH 200 or STH 9; thence  
26 along STH 9 to point of beginning.

27 **Subp. 4. Area 407B.** Prairie chicken permit area 407B  
28 consists of those portions of registration block 407 described  
29 as follows:

30 Beginning at the intersection of State Trunk Highway (STH)

1 9 and STH 200; thence along STH 200 to STH 32; thence along  
2 STH 32 to County State-Aid Highway (CSAH) 34, Clay County;  
3 thence along CSAH 34 to STH 9; thence along STH 9 to point  
4 of beginning.
