## 1.2 Adopted Permanent Rules Relating to Horse Racing

- 1.3 **7876.0100 ON-TRACK STABLING.**

Subp. 10. Original health certificate. Any horse arriving on the grounds must 1.5 be accompanied by an original health certificate issued not more than ten days prior to 1.6 arrival. The health certificate must be completed by an accredited veterinarian and must 1.7 contain complete equine infections anemia test results, including the date, laboratory, 1.8 and accession number of the most recent negative EIA test. The health certificate must 1.9 be surrendered to the stable gate personnel for immediate transmittal to the commission 1.10 veterinarian. The health certificate will remain valid for 30 days from the date of issue, 1.11 with the date of issue counted as day one. Horses leaving the facility and returning during 1 12 this 30-day period do not have to be accompanied by a new health certificate. Horses 1.13 leaving and returning after the 30-day period will need to be accompanied by a new 1.14 original health certificate issued not more than ten days prior to arrival. 1.15

Subp. 11. Record of negative test for equine piroplasmosis. When an active case 1.16 of equine piroplasmosis (EP) is reported by a government agency within North America, 1.17 the Racing Commission, the executive director, or the deputy director, in consultation 1.18 with the chief commission veterinarian, has the authority to require proof of an equine 1.19 piroplasmosis (EP) test taken within 12 months of the date of entry upon the racetrack 1.20 when a horse enters or is already on the confines of the racetrack. No horse shall be 1.21 allowed to enter the confines of any association holding a license to conduct a race 1 22 meeting or race in Minnesota unless the horse has had the required test. The test must 1.23 indicate a negative result for *Theileria equi* and *Babesia caballi*. Record of the negative 1.24 test shall be attached to the certificate of veterinarian inspection (CVI) and presented at the 1.25 stable gate when the horse first enters the confines. 1.26

Subp. 4. Original health certificate. Any horse arriving on the grounds must be 2.3 accompanied by an original health certificate issued not more than ten days prior to 2.4 arrival. The health certificate must be completed by an accredited veterinarian and must 2.5 2.6 contain complete equine infections anemia test results, including the date, laboratory, and accession number of the most recent negative EIA test. The health certificate must 2.7 be surrendered to the stable gate personnel for immediate transmittal to the commission 2.82.9 veterinarian. The health certificate will remain valid for 30 days from the date of issue, with the date of issue counted as day one. Horses leaving the facility and returning during 2.10 this 30-day period do not have to be accompanied by a new health certificate. Subp. 5. Record of negative test for equine piroplasmosis. When an active case of 2.14 equine piroplasmosis (EP) is reported by a government agency within North America, 2.15 the Racing Commission, the executive director, or the deputy director, in consultation 2.16 with the chief commission veterinarian, has the authority to require proof of an equine 2.17 piroplasmosis (EP) test taken within 12 months of the date of entry upon the racetrack 2.18 when a horse enters or is already on the confines of the racetrack. No horse shall be 2.19 allowed to enter the confines of any association holding a license to conduct a race 2.20 meeting or race in Minnesota unless the horse has had the required test. The test must 2.21 indicate a negative result for Theileria equi and Babesia caballi. Record of the negative 2.22 test shall be attached to the certificate of veterinarian inspection (CVI) and presented at the 2.23 stable gate when the horse first enters the confines. 2.24

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## 2.25 7876.0120 ON- AND OFF-TRACK STABLING OF NONRACING HORSES.

Any horse arriving on the grounds must be accompanied by an original health 3.1 certificate issued not more than ten days prior to the arrival. The health certificate must 3.2 be completed by an accredited veterinarian and must contain complete equine infectious 3.3 anemia (EIA) test results, including the date, laboratory, and accession number of the 3.4 most recent negative EIA test. The health certificates must be surrendered to stable gate 3.5 personnel for immediate transmittal to the commission veterinarian. The health certificate 3.6 shall remain valid for 30 days from the date of issue, with the date of issue counted as day 3.7 one. Horses leaving the facility and returning during this 30-day period do not have to be 3.8 accompanied by a new health certificate. Horses leaving and returning after the 30-day 3.9 period will need to be accompanied by a new original health certificate issued not more 3.10 than ten days prior to arrival. The horse must also have a negative equine piroplasmosis 3.11 test as prescribed in part 7876.0100, subpart 11, or 7876.0110, subpart 5. 3.12

3.15 Subp. 11a. Intra-articular (IA). "Intra-articular" or "IA" means in the joint space.

3.16 Subp. 11b. Intramuscular (IM). "Intramuscular" or "IM" means in the muscle.

3.17 Subp. 11c. Intravenous (IV). "Intravenous" or "IV" means in the vein.

3.18 Subp. 11d. **Ketoprofen.** "Ketoprofen" is a nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drug with 3.19 the chemical name 2-(3-benzoylphenyl)propionic acid.

3.21 Subp. 12a. Limit of detection (LOD). "Limit of detection" or "LOD" means the
3.22 lowest concentration of the drug that can be detected by a particular laboratory method.

"Limit of quantitation" or "LOQ" 3.23 means the lowest concentration of the drug that can be reliably quantified by a particular 3.24 laboratory method and is generally higher than the LOD. 3.25 Subp. 13. Medication. "Medication" is a substance, compound, or element, or 4.1 combination thereof, which is or can be administered to a horse for the purpose of 4.2 preventing, curing, or alleviating the effects of any disease, condition, ailment, or infirmity, 4.3 or symptom thereof, or for altering in any way the behavior, attitude, temperament, or 4.4 performance of a horse, including athletic performance. The term medication includes 4.5 all analgesics, anesthetics, depressants, narcotics, stimulants, tranquilizers, and other 4.6 classifications of medications. Nothing herein shall be deemed to include: 4.7 A.
