1370.0140 PLANS, SPECIFICATIONS, PERMITS.

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Storm shelter plans, engineering calculations, diagrams, and other required data must be prepared by <u>a registered an</u> architect or <u>professional engineer licensed to practice in Minnesota according to the Minnesota Board of Architecture, Engineering, Land Surveying, Landscape Architecture, Geoscience, and Interior Design laws and rules. For permit <u>procedures requirements</u>, see <u>section 106 of the Uniform Building Code</u>, <u>incorporated by reference in part 1305.0010</u> chapter 1300.</u>

1370.0150 SPACE REQUIREMENTS.

A minimum of four square feet per person park resident must be provided within a storm shelter. The square footage of the storm shelter is determined by the total number of park residents. The total number of park residents is determined by the park owner, architect, or professional engineer and must be included in plans and specifications required by part 1370.0140. A ceiling height of not less than seven feet must be provided over 60 percent of the floor area.
