A person who wins a contest for one type of stamp is eligible for the other fish and wildlife stamp contests described in part 6290.0200.

commissioner of natural resources and will consist of at least five members from reflecting
areas of expertise including, but not limited to: art, hunting or fishing, outdoor media,
conservation, or publishing. Judges will serve for a length of time to be established by
the department.
