1.9 to the taking of migratory waterfowl. On the Gordon F. W. Yeager Wildlife Management
1.10 Area, small game taken by firearms may only be taken with shotguns using No. 4 or
1.11 smaller diameter shot.

2.5 86B.005, subdivision 9, and duckboats with motors attached.

7.16 A. ~~Waterfowl and small game hunters may reserve designated hunting stations~~

7.18 ~~headquarters. Reservation dates may not be changed. Only one hunting group, consisting~~
7.19 ~~of no more than three hunters, may occupy a designated hunting station at one time. Not~~

7.21 B. ~~From the third Thursday in October through November 30, waterfowl and~~
7.22 ~~small game hunters may reserve designated hunting stations according to regulations~~
7.23 ~~available at the Lac qui Parle Wildlife Management Area headquarters. Reservation~~
7.24 ~~dates may not be changed.~~

8.1 C. From December 1 through the end of the Canada goose season, waterfowl
8.2 hunters must use designated hunting stations and use of the stations is on a first-come,
8.3 first-served basis.

8.4 Subp. 3. **Entry permit required.** From the third Thursday in October through
8.5 November 30, on public lands, a person may not hunt migratory waterfowl or small game
8.6 in the controlled hunting zone without first registering at the check station and obtaining
8.7 an entry permit. Entry permits must be displayed as specified on the permit. Hunters age
8.8 18 or older will be charged a \$3 daily fee for the Lac qui Parle entry permit. Failure to
8.9 comply with the provisions of the permit or special provisions relating to the controlled
8.10 hunt will result in immediate revocation of the permit for that day.

8.11 Subp. 4. **Limitation on number of shells possessed.** Only persons hunting may
8.12 bring shotgun shells into the controlled hunting zone. A waterfowl or small game
8.13 hunter may not bring in more than 12 shells per trip or have in possession more than 12
8.14 shells at any one time, except that small game hunters may possess more than 12 shells
8.15 beginning December 1.

8.16 Subp. 5. **Firearms must be cased.** Waterfowl and small game hunters must have
8.17 firearms cased, except within ten feet of assigned hunting stations.

8.18 Subp. 6. **Actions after taking bag limit.** Within one hour of hunt completion each
8.19 party member must ~~submit any geese taken for inspection at the Lac qui Parle Wildlife~~
8.20 ~~Management Area headquarters and, if hunting on public lands,~~ personally return their
8.21 entry permit to the check station and report the harvest of geese.

8.22 Subp. 7. **Limitation on number of trips.** ~~Hunters are limited to two trips per day to~~
8.23 ~~the hunting stations.~~ Hunters are limited to one trip to the hunting stations before noon
8.24 and one trip after noon each day.

9.1 Subp. 8. **Restrictions on occupancy of designated parking lots and hunting**
9.2 **stations.** A person may not park in or otherwise occupy a designated controlled hunting
9.3 zone parking lot or occupy a hunting station from 10:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m.

9.4 Subp. 9. **Closed hunting stations.** A person may not occupy or hunt from a hunting
9.5 station that is posted closed.

9.7 Subpart 1. **Open season.** Raccoons may be taken statewide with legal firearms, bow
9.8 and arrow, and by trapping from 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 22 to ~~March~~
9.9 ~~15~~, except in the North Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone as described in part 6234.1000,
9.10 subpart 3, where raccoon may be taken with legal firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping
9.11 beginning at 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 17. The season ends March 15.

9.14 Subpart 1. **Open season.** Gray and red fox may be taken statewide with legal

9.16 ~~22 to March 15~~, except in the North Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone as described in
9.17 part 6234.1000, subpart 3, where gray and red fox may be taken with legal firearms,
9.18 bow and arrow, and by trapping beginning at 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October
9.19 17. The season ends March 15.

9.21 **6234.1400 TAKING BADGER AND OPOSSUM.**

9.22 Subpart 1. **Open season.** Badgers and opossums may be taken statewide with legal
9.23 firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping from 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October
9.24 ~~22 to March 15~~, except in the North Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone as described in
10.1 part 6234.1000, subpart 3, where badger and opossum may be taken with legal firearms,

10.2 bow and arrow, and by trapping beginning at 9:00 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October
 10.3 17. The season ends March 15.

 10.13 rights-of-way, or in fencelines along road rights-of-way, except as a waterset.

10.21 A. A person may not possess or transport a ~~fisher, otter, pine marten, fox,~~
 10.22 ~~bobcat,~~ lynx; or gray wolf that was accidentally killed or was lawfully killed while causing
 10.23 or threatening injury or damage until the person notifies the local conservation officer,
 11.1 other authorized department employee, or regional enforcement office, of the killing and
 11.2 receives authorization to possess, transport, or skin the animal.

11.3 B. A person may possess or transport fox, mink, muskrat, beaver, badger,
11.4 opossum, or raccoon accidentally killed or lawfully killed while causing or threatening
11.5 injury or damage, only if the local conservation officer or other authorized employee of the
11.6 department is notified within 24 hours of such killing and before any skinning has begun.

11.7 C. A person may possess or transport a fisher, otter, or pine marten that has been
11.8 accidentally killed or a bobcat that has been either lawfully killed when causing damage or
11.9 accidentally killed only after notifying the local conservation officer or other authorized
11.10 employee of the department of such killing. After making the required notification and
11.11 taking possession of the animal, the person may not skin, transfer possession, or otherwise
11.12 dispose of the animal until the person receives authorization from a conservation officer
11.13 or other authorized department employee.

11.14 D. A person must report any incidental taking of a Canada lynx to the local
11.15 conservation officer within 24 hours of the taking.

11.16 **6236.0100 DEFINITIONS.**

 12.8 taken statewide during the 86-day period beginning the Saturday on or nearest October 1
 12.9 only in areas of the state when and where the Canada goose season is open.

12.10 Subp. 2. **Daily limit.** A person may not take more than 20 snow, blue, and Ross'
 12.11 geese in combination; ~~two~~ one white-fronted geese goose; and one brant each day.

12.12 **6240.1200 SPECIAL PROVISIONS ON TAKING GEESE DURING EARLY**
 12.13 **SEASONS SEASON.**

12.14 Subpart 1. [See repealer.]

12.15 Subp. 2. [See repealer.]

12.16 Subp. 3. **Open season.** The open early season for taking Canada geese begins the
 12.17 first Saturday in September and ends on September 22, except:

12.18 A. the season begins on Sunday, September 1, in any year when the first
 12.19 Saturday falls on September 7; and

12.20 B. the season closes on the Friday before the duck season opens in years when
 12.21 the duck season opens on or before September 22.

12.22 Subp. 4. **Daily limits.** A person may not take more than five Canada geese per day
 12.23 during the early season.

12.24 Subp. 5. **Taking near water.**

13.1 A. Taking Canada geese during the early season is prohibited on or within
 13.2 100 yards of all surface waters:

- 13.3 (1) in the Northwest Goose Zone;
 13.4 (2) in the Swan Lake Goose Zone; and
 13.5 (3) within the boundaries of the Carlos Avery Wildlife Management Area.

13.6 B. Taking Canada geese on or within 100 yards of surface waters during the
 13.7 early Canada goose season is allowed for youth hunters participating in youth waterfowl
 13.8 hunting days and on specific bodies of water in closed zones as described or shown on
 13.9 maps provided by the commissioner.

13.20 Subp. 2. **Game refuges.**

13.21 A. The following refuges are open to goose hunting during the first two days of
 13.22 the regular goose season: Fox Lake Game Refuge in Martin County and the Saint James
 13.23 Game Refuge in Watonwan County are open to goose hunting during the first three days
 13.24 of the regular goose season in the respective zones in which they are located.

14.1 B. The Fox Lake Game Refuge is open to goose hunting from the last Saturday
 14.2 of the December Canada goose season to the end of the goose season in the zone in which

14.3 ~~it is located, except~~ for the last seven days of the statewide goose season. There is no
14.4 goose hunting within 100 yards of Fox and Temperence Lakes.

14.5 **Subp. 3. Waterfowl refuges.**

14.6 A. The following refuges are open to Canada goose hunting during the early
14.7 goose season: Harstad Slough Waterfowl Refuge in Stevens County is open to Canada
14.8 goose hunting during the early September goose season and the Rickert Lake Waterfowl
14.9 Refuge in Steele County.

14.10 B. The Mud-Bardwell Waterfowl Refuge in Martin County is open to Canada
14.11 goose hunting from the Saturday on or nearest November 1 to the end of the goose season
14.12 in the zone in which it is located, except. There is no goose hunting within 100 yards of
14.13 Mud and Bardwell Lakes. ~~The Rickert Lake Waterfowl Refuge in Steele County is open to~~
14.14 ~~Canada goose hunting during the early September goose season. The waterfowl sanctuary~~
14.15 ~~within this refuge is closed to hunting and trespass, as posted.~~

14.18 Subp. 7. Walleye stamp. "Walleye stamp" means the stamp issued by the department
14.19 under Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.075, to individuals that voluntarily choose to
14.20 contribute to walleye stocking and related activities.

14.21 Subp. 8. Wild turkey stamp. "Wild turkey stamp" means the pictorial stamp issued
14.22 by the department under Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.075, to individuals who have

15.1 **Subpart 1. Eligibility requirements.** Each stamp contest is open only to residents of

15.4 A person who wins a contest is ineligible to enter a contest for the same type of stamp
15.5 for ~~two successive years~~ the year of competition following the contestant's first win. A
